Limits of the Town of Kandana

North A line drawn west from the Rilaula boundary stone on the Colombo Negombo road, which stone is about 6 chains to the south of the 11th milepost, to a point about half a mile to the west of the said stone where the said line meets the western boundary, a line drawn east from the said boundary stone parallel to the Welgampraya Batagama Village Committee road across the railway line to a point 4 chains to the east of the said line

East From the said point a line drawn south eastwards parallel to the said railway line until it cuts the western boundary of the paddy fields, the western boundary of the paddy fields southwards to a point 2 chains to the north of the Kandana Galahitayawa road From this point a line drawn eastwards parallel to the said road to a point 2 chains to the east of the junction of the Kandana Galahitayawa road and the Kandana Ragama District Road Committee road From this point a line running southwards or south-eastwards parallel with the Kandana Ragama District Road Committee road and 2 chains to the east of it until it meets the southern boundary

South A straight line drawn through a point on the railway line 16 chains to the south of Kandana station railway crossing south westwards towards the Kandana village boundary stone on the Colombo Negombo road which stone is about 11 chains to the south of the 10th milestone on the said road, and produced eastwards to meet the eastern boundary This line to form the southern boundary westwards to a point 2 chains to the east of the Colombo Negombo road From this point a line drawn southwards parallel with the Colombo Negombo road until it meets the road running to Anyakande estate, the said road running to Anyakande estate to its junction with the Colombo Negombo road, a line drawn due west from the junction of the said road running to Anyakande estate and the Colombo Negombo road to a point 2 chains to the west of the Colombo Negombo road From this point a line drawn northwards parallel to the Colombo Negombo road as far as a point 2 chains due west of the Kandana village boundary stone, which stone is about 11 chains to the south of the 10th milepost on the Colombo Negombo road, from this point a line drawn due west to a point half a mile to the west of the Colombo-Negombo road

West From the extremity of the southern boundary a line drawn northwards parallel to the Colombo Negombo road till it meets the northern boundary

- in the case of any land on which there is no building (other than a building used solely for the purpose of housing animals or poultry) and which is under regular cultivation of any kind, four per centum of the annual rent, and
- in the case of any land on which there is no building (other than a building used solely for the purpose of housing animals or poultry) and which is under permanent cultivation, one per centum of the annual rent

2 (1) For the purposes of the land tax, the Chairman may by notice in writing require any person who is liable or may be supposed to be liable to such tax—

- (a) to render a return substantially in the form prescribed in the Schedule hereto, and
- (b) to furnish such other information or to produce or cause to be produced such documents as may in the opinion of the Chairman, be necessary for that purpose

(2) Every person on whom a notice under clause (a) of paragraph (1) is served shall, within fourteen days from the date of such service, correctly and truly fill up, sign, date, and deliver or transmit to the office of the Committee the form served with such notice, and every person on whom a notice under clause (b) is served shall comply with the requirements of such notice

(3) For the purposes of ^{the} law, any notice which is addressed to any person and which is (a) delivered to an adult member of his household or his servant, or (b) affixed on a conspicuous part of the premises in respect of which the tax is to be imposed, in any case where such adult member or servant refuses to accept the notice or where there is no such adult member or servant on the premises, shall be deemed to have been duly served on that person

3 No person shall obstruct any assessor or any person acting under the orders of an assessor, in the lawful discharge of his duties

4 In these by laws—

- “building” includes any hut, shed, or roofed enclosure, whether used for human habitation or otherwise,
- “Chairman” means the Chairman of the Committee,
- “Committee” means the Village Committee

By laws relating to the Tax on Vehicles and Animals

1 (1) For the purposes of the tax on vehicles and animals levied under section 47 of the Ordinance, every person who has possession or custody or control of any vehicle or animal liable to such tax shall furnish to the Chairman a Schedule of particulars relating to such vehicle or animal in such form as may be provided for the purpose by the Committee

(2) The schedule shall be filled up and returned to the Chairman within seven days of its receipt by the person to whom such schedule is delivered

2 If any person after having furnished the schedule referred to in by law 1, acquires, keeps or uses any vehicle

or animal, not mentioned in such schedule, he shall, within one month from the date on which he acquires or commences to keep or use any such vehicle or animal, notify the Chairman in writing of the fact of such acquisition, keeping or use and further furnish true and correct information in respect of every such vehicle or animal so acquired, kept or used

3 Subject to the provisions of section 47 (2) of the Ordinance, every person who has furnished the schedule referred to in by law 1 shall without further notice be liable in respect of vehicles or animals entered in such schedule to pay the tax for the year for which such schedule is furnished, and every person who has sent the written notice referred to in by law 2 shall be liable to pay the tax on vehicles or animals referred to in such notice for the year in which such vehicles or animals, were acquired by him or otherwise came into his possession

4 Every person who having furnished the schedule referred to in by law 1 or the written notice referred to in by law 2, claims to be exempt under section 47 (3) of the Ordinance, from the liability to pay the tax in respect of any vehicle or animal which is entered in or referred to in such schedule or notice shall forthwith give notice in writing to the Chairman of his claim for such exemption specifying the grounds on which such claim is made

5 The annual tax payable under the provisions of section 47 of the Ordinance shall be paid at the office of the Committee on or before the thirty first day of March in each year. Provided that in any case where the schedule referred to in by law 1 or the written notice referred to in by law 2 is furnished to the Chairman after the thirty first day of March in any year, the tax in respect of each vehicle or animal referred to in such schedule or notice shall be payable within one month of the date on which such schedule or notice is so furnished

6 On payment of the annual tax the Chairman shall issue or caused to be issued in respect of every vehicle for which such tax is paid, a metal plate with such distinguishing letters, for the several kinds of vehicles, as may be assigned to the village area by the Commissioner of Local Government, and with figures denoting the year for which the plate is issued and the corresponding number in the register of vehicles. Where any such plate becomes indistinct or defaced by use or otherwise, the owner shall return it to the Chairman and shall be entitled on making a payment of 25 cents to receive a fresh plate. The Chairman, may, on his being satisfied by affidavit or otherwise that any such plate has been lost or stolen issue a fresh plate on the application of the owner and on payment by such owner of 50 cents

7 The owner or person in charge of every vehicle shall affix the plate issued in respect of that vehicle under by law 6 on a conspicuous part of that vehicle

(a) be parked in any public place except a public stand, or
(b) be halted on any highway except for the purpose of setting down or taking up passengers or goods

9 The puller of every licensed jinricksha shall exhibit in a prominent part of the jinricksha a copy of the Table of Rates and Fares supplied to him by the Chairman

10 The rates and fares which the puller of any licensed jinricksha may charge for the conveyance of passengers or goods shall be determined in accordance with the Table of Rates and Fares set out in the Schedule to these regulations

11 The person liable for a contravention of any of the foregoing regulations shall be the puller of the jinricksha

Award under the Essential Services (Avoidance of Strikes and Lockouts) Order, 1942, in the Labour Dispute between the Electricity Department Employees and the Urban Council, Jaffna

THE employees of the Electricity Department of the Jaffna Urban Council submitted under paragraph 6 (1) of the Essential Services (Avoidance of Strikes and Lockouts) Order, 1942, a petition praying for the settlement by the District Judge, Jaffna, of the dispute that had arisen between them and the Jaffna Urban Council. After the District Judge started the inquiry, the Urban Council, Jaffna, adopted, at its meeting on August 13, 1943, a new salary scale for the staff of the Electricity Department, which they placed before the District Judge. The following summary of the award finally made by the District Judge is published for the information of all concerned, in terms of paragraph 8 (4) of the above mentioned Order —

- (i) that Assistant Driver M S Kandiah be placed on the new salary scale adopted by the Urban Council for the staff of the Electricity Department subject to the modification that the annual increments should be fixed at Rs 36 and that M S Kandiah be paid his salary on the basis that he has earned two increments amounting to Rs 72 in addition to his present salary as from August 1, 1943
- (ii) that Assistant Drivers Soosapillai and Henry be paid the first increment of Rs 36 a year in addition to their present salary as from August 1, 1943
- (iii) that the switch board operator Jayasunderam be placed on the salary scale approved by the resolution of the Urban Council and that as from August 1, 1943, he be paid Rs 360 per annum with increments in terms of that scale
- (iv) that switch board operator Ponnuthurai be paid his salary at the rate of Rs 330 per annum as from August 1, 1943, with increments in terms of that scale
- (v) that each of the street lamp lighters be paid in addition to the salaries now being drawn, the first increment at the rate of Rs 18 per annum as from August 1, 1943
- (vi) that the other employees of the Electricity Department of the Urban Council be paid salaries according to the scale fixed by the resolution passed at the meeting of the Jaffna Urban Council held on August 13, 1943
- (vii) that the war allowance should be paid to the employees of the Electricity Department from February 6, 1943, at the enhanced rate (i.e., rates paid by the Ceylon Government to their employees)

Methods in use at present obtain the desired degree of physical wither, by the use of hot air, forced air, fans, &c., without any attempt to control the chemical wither

The object of the present invention is to bring about the desired amount of chemical wither at relatively low temperature without any regard to the state of physical wither. This is attained by keeping the temperature of the lofts as low as possible with humidified air. After a time interval of 18 to 24 hours depending on the temperature at which chemical wither is carried out, the leaf is hurried on to the rollers where it is subjected to light rolling, and then placed in the expressors where the excess moisture is expelled by mechanical means. The usual process of rolling, fermenting and firing follows. If necessary, the expressed liquor may be concentrated and reincorporated with the leaf

"Improvements in and relating to the charging of rockets"

Abstract—The inventors state that hitherto rockets have been charged by hand. As each charge of powder is placed in the rocket casing, an operator tamps it down, a special tool is used for this, and the operator hits this tool the required number of times with a mallet

The apparatus according to the present invention is designed to overcome the disadvantages associated with manual operation. It comprises a reciprocating pump of small bore and long stroke connected to a hydraulic press via a manually operated valve which is also connected to a bye-pass. A pressure gauge and relief valve are also incorporated. In operation the material in the rocket casing is subjected to a series of pulsating jerks which gradually increase in intensity till the pressure is relieved by the operator operating the bye-pass, or by the relief valve opening

Abstract—The applicants state that hitherto the manufacture of pulp using bagasse of sugar cane entirely or in greater part as the starting material has not been commercially successful as it was customary to subject the material to a "drastic" chemical treatment involving high concentration of cooking liquor, high temperatures and pressures and long periods of cooking, the material after such treatment required only light mechanical action to reduce it to pulp. They further state that this "drastic" chemical action causes excessive hydrolysis, and that the hydrolysed products are lost in subsequent washing, resulting in a low yield of pulp of inferior strength, in addition dark coloured compounds are formed which render the use of a high percentage of bleaching agent necessary in the subsequent process

The object of the invention is to produce a high percentage of stronger and more easily bleachable pulp from bagasse, by first subjecting the bagasse to "mild" chemical treatment, followed by severe mechanical disintegration. The "mild" treatment is defined to be 'subjecting the fibrous starting material to the chemical digesting action of a predominantly alkaline cooking liquor (other than a predominantly lime liquor) and controlling the total chemical action of digestion namely (1) temperatures and pressures and (2) time periods of cooking substantially inversely with respect to one another whereby to carry out the chemical action under conditions which are "mild" nature only, and obtain a digested material which is softened and substantially delignified but in which the fibro-vascular bundles are not substantially broken up, nor are capable of being broken up, by light mechanical action, into fibre groups or short fibres'

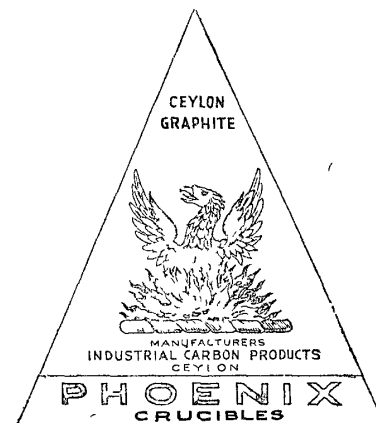
