MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

REPORT on the Audit of the Accounts of the Colombo Municipality for the Year 1904, submitted in compliance with the provisions of Section 119 of Ordinance No. 7 of 1887.

THE accounts of the year have been duly audited, and monthly reports forwarded to Council as required by the Ordinance.

2. A system of continuous inspection and examination of the account books and ledgers of the Municipal Office has been in force, obviating the necessity of periodical examination; and mistakes, where they could be corrected, have been corrected at once, and in other ways much time and labour have been saved to the Council's officers. The account books of the Municipal Departments outside the Municipal Office were examined on the following dates, and remarks on the inspection have been duly forwarded to the Chairman for attention:—

- Cemetery, Kanatta, January 22, 1905.
- Cemetery, Madampitiya, February 16, 1905.
- Slaughter-house, Dematagoda, May 18 and June 6, 1905.
- Slaughter-house, Madampitiya, February 16, 1905.

3. Special attention having been given to the outstanding remarks of Audit on the accounts, a large proportion of the older arrears in this respect has been wiped off. A large number of

remarks, however, still remain unanswered, and several of them are of long standing; this is especially the case with those relating to the Health Department, Sanitary Branch. A statement (marked A) is attached of outstanding remarks sent up to the end of April, 1905.

4. There have been also great delays in replying to letters, no answers having been forthcoming in some instances, although attention had been invited four times or more. The personal attention of the Chairman has been requested to this matter, as the delays involve loss of time and cause much inconvenience to this office. From the annexed list (marked B) of letters sent to end of May which have remained unanswered, it will be seen that they relate mostly to the Works Department.

5. A statement (marked C) is also annexed of store returns not forwarded to Audit. It will be observed that many of the returns for the half-year ended 30th June, 1904, and some even for the half-year ended 31st December, 1903, have not yet been received for Audit. Attention has several times been invited to this, and it is important to note that no practical use can be made of these returns when they are forwarded so late.

6. The monthly accounts generally have been regularly received for Audit.

7. A payment made by a collector on account recoveries of consolidated rates on 20th August, 1904, was by an omission in accounting not brought to account on that day; the mistake was not traced for several days after. This was due to the Bank Pass Book not having been regularly checked with the accounts; the necessity for this being done oftener has been pointed out to the Chairman, who has taken steps in the matter.

8. Receipts for payments made to the Council were issued without their being numbered, and generally loose; these are now printed with serial numbers at the Printing Department, and usually stitched up. This affords an efficient check that all printed receipts are duly accounted for.

9. Uniforms for officers, guides, &c., were hitherto supplied without tenders being called for, but on the suggestion of Audit tenders have been called for, and contracts entered into, for the supplies for 1905.

10. The total sum in fixed deposits at the end of the year was Rs. 700,000.

11. The disbursements for the year exceeded the receipts by Rs. 88,220.24, the deficiency being made up from the surplus balances of previous years. The balances for the two years were—

12. A sum of Rs. 350,000 was paid from Municipal current revenue to meet expenses during the year on account of the drainage works. With the sum of Rs. 250,000 previously advanced, the total sum paid for these works from Municipal Funds amounts to Rs. 600,000.

13. It is satisfactory to note that the amount outstanding on advance accounts on the 31st December, 1904, was only Rs. 2,395.50, which represents amount advanced to the Municipal Engineer for payment of labour for Christmas. This was fully settled in January, 1905. The previous advances which were outstanding on account of metal and gravel were closed in 1904.

14. Balances to the credit of deposits have been carried forward to the account of 1905, under date the 31st December, 1904; the total of such balances amounted to Rs. 26,251.63. Steps were taken by Audit for the settlement of old deposits; the matter has, however, not yet been fully disposed of by the Municipal officers, to whom the papers were forwarded for the necessary action.

15. Thirty-eight contracts were entered into during the year, and copies thereof were duly supplied to Audit.

16. The expenditure on salaries of Establishment, excluding the Conservancy Branch, was Rs. 117,723.33, showing an increase of Rs. 23,370.31 as compared with the expenditure in 1903. The comparative number of officers employed in each Department for 1903 and 1904 is shown below:—

The following officers retired on pension during 1904:—A. Weinman, from March, 1904, and J. A. LaBrooy from October, 1904, and provision was also made for the pensionary contributions of seconded officers for 1903 and 1904.

18. The following gratuity was awarded during the year with sanction of Council:—To widow and children of Inspector Casie Chetty Rs. 770.

19. Special attention was paid during the year to the Assessment Department. The ledgers for several years had not been correctly balanced, so that there was very great difficulty in arriving at even an approximate estimate of correct balances. The ledgers and connected accounts were overhauled, some of them from 1897, and the accounts were closed where possible, and balances in respect of the remainder brought forward as correctly as possible in the new ledgers for 1905. There should be no difficulty now in keeping the books in such a manner so as to find out accurate balances at any time. A statement of the outstanding balances for each division on 1st January, 1905, is annexed (Statement marked D).

20. In accordance with the suggestion of the Chairman, it has been decided to treat the fourth quarter's dues of each year as belonging to the following year, as the fourth quarter's dues are generally paid after the close of the quarter; thus what is due for 1905 would be from fourth quarter, 1904, to third quarter, 1905. The accounting in the statement of arrears mentioned above and the figures for 1905 are based on this arrangement.

21. Pressure was brought to bear with the view of settling up old accounts of assessment dues, and every endeavour made to bring up the accounts to a satisfactory state, and from the comparative statement below it will be observed that the results have been very satisfactory. 23. There was some delay (which was unavoidable on account of the system then existing) on the part of the Railway Officers in forwarding recoveries and connected receipts to the Municipal Office, resulting in much inconvenience and confusion of accounts in the latter office. After consultation by Audit with the Chairman, Municipal Council, and the Accountant of the Railway, a scheme has been devised and approved by Government by which the Municipal Office will receive the recoveries on the 15th April each year, so that the amounts may be brought to account in due time.

24. The Head Clerk of the Commutation Department was granted overtime allowance for doing work at home, but as such a practice does not obtain in the Public Service, and as the payment of overtime to officers of the Municipality is governed by the rules in Government Departments, it was pointed out that the practice is a bad one and liable to abuse. The Audit, however, had no alternative but to pass the charge, as the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment authorized the continuance of the same practice during 1905 also.

25. The new system of accounts inaugurated in the Conservancy Branch of the Health Department has so far worked well. During the present year it is intended to thoroughly overhaul these accounts, so that any weakness in the present methods may be detected and remedied.

27. A new system of accounts was started in the Works Department from January, 1904, but the rules relating to this were approved by the Standing Committee on Municipal Works on 23rd April, 1904, and by the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment on 20th May, 1904. The rules were not forwarded to Audit for any remarks previous to their adoption. In the course of the examination of the accounts Audit, however, found it necessary to point out some defects in the rules, and make observations with a view to their amendment and improvement. Much more work than before is caused by the new system: for example, formerly where estimates were directly debited against for stores by one entry, the transaction on the present system involves three entries: One debit against the advance account for purchase of stores, next debit against the estimate, and then a credit to the advance account. The details of debits, notwithstanding the increase of work, have been carefully scrutinized and over debits and other errors have been pointed out by Audit for rectification. At the request of Audit the receipted orders on contractors for stores are attached to the payment vouchers; this furnishes an efficient safeguard against double payment for stores received. The books were neatly kept and information readily obtainable in the office.

28. Check rolls from May, 1904, were forwarded for Audit without the usual classification showing debits against estimates, on the assumption that the new rules did not provide for the insertion of this information. On Audit pointing out that check rolls are vouchers, and every voucher should be headed against a particular vote duly authorized, the necessary particulars have since been furnished. With respect to the verification of check rolls, the rules of 21st January, 1903, require the Municipal Engineer or Assistant Engineers to verify the labour periodically *not less than once a week*, but it is evident from the declarations attached to the check rolls that this requirement is *not* fully complied with. This has been pointed out to the Chairman.

29. In the examination of the accounts of the Works Department it was observed that there was a diversity of practice in taking into account value of materials returned from works. In some cases the value of such materials was deducted in the ledger from the total expenditure and the nett amount was shown in the Cash Books as expenditure for the month, while in other instances the value of the materials was credited to the estimate by cross entry. It has been pointed out to the Chairman that the first procedure is irregular and objectionable, and that there should not be two ways of accounting. The value of materials returned should be credited to the estimate and the Advance Account for stores debited with same; these transactions should in all cases be carried out by cross entries.

30. Complaint has been repeatedly made that completion reports on estimates are unduly delayed; it is regretted that there has been no improvement in this respect, and the Chairman's special attention has been drawn to it by several letters. Several completion reports of estimates of 1902, 1903, and 1904 have not yet been furnished to Audit.

31. The new system of accounting in the Works Department affects also the Municipal Stores. The Storekeeper now keeps only a Day Book of Receipts and Issues; the Ledgers of Stores (Stock and Tools) are kept by clerks in the Municipal Engineer's Office. The rules also provide that the Storekeeper should hold a receipted Issue Order in exchange for the Stores. This procedure is not followed, as the copy intended to be retained by the Storekeeper is also filed in the Municipal Engineer's Office. In this connection the following remarks were addressed to the Council through the Chairman: "The Storekeeper is supposed to enter in his Day Book the issue of materials, &c., but he does not hold in his hands any receipt for his having parted with stores. The Storekeeper would seem bound to have stores in his possession or an equivalent receipt from a duly authorized officer for parting with them." A few articles from store were verified by Audit, but as the Municipal Engineer has undertaken the verification of stores, no extensive verification has been held by Audit

pending a reply from the Chairman, Municipal Council, to whom a communication was addressed on this matter.

32. Statements (marked E, F, and G) are annexed of votes in the Budgets of 1904 and re-votes of previous years not availed of for expenditure during the year.

33. An excess on estimate No. 212 for converting Kynsey and Kanatte roads from gravel to metal roads was by authority of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works (subsequently approved by Council) passed against estimate No. 62 for upkeep of metal roads. Audit pointed out that the procedure was irregular, and that a supplementary vote should have been taken to meet the excess instead of charging over-expenditure on a special vote to an estimate for upkeep. The Chairman stated in reply that the remarks of Audit have been noted for future guidance.

34. An over-expenditure on estimate No. 69 for the purchase of tools for other works was traced by Audit, and the amount Rs. 164.78 surcharged. The total in the Works Department Expenditure Ledger showed Rs. 975.65, but in carrying forward the totals of the months an item of Rs. 189.13 was omitted. The correct expenditure was, therefore, Rs. 1,164.78, being Rs. 164.78 in excess of the vote of Rs. 1,000.

35. The books of accounts of the slaughter-houses were well kept, but in order to simplify the accounts a form has been devised, and is now in use, by which the accounts of admission and slaughtering hitherto kept in two books are kept in one. Besides, the full transactions of the day are shown in a page in one book, apart from the saving of clerical labour.

36. The accounts of the cemeteries were kept in order; some suggestions have been made for their improvement, and they will be acted upon.

37. Nothing practical has yet been done, although commented upon by Audit for two years, as to affixing numbers to tombs in the Madampitiya cemetery.

38. In the matter of cremations carried out in public cemeteries, Audit pointed out that, although the law provides that the Municipal Council shall make regulations as to the fees to be paid, no fees are charged, none having been prescribed. In reply it was stated that there were no regulations for recovering fees in such cases. It was on this account that Audit made the suggestion, as the recovery of fees for cremations performed on ground not given over to religious bodies was considered a proper source of Municipal revenue.

39. The fee paid for appraising lands and properties has been 1 per cent. on the amount assessed; in the opinion of Audit this is a high rate, and it was suggested that measures be taken for reducing it, and it is understood that action is being taken by the Chairman as suggested.

40. The Auditors for the year were the Hon. the Auditor-General and Messrs. E. de Kretser and B. V. Caspersz.

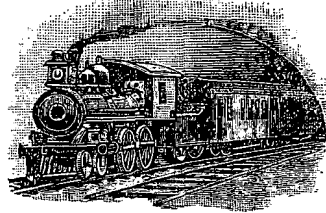
