PROCLAMATIONS BY THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR.

In the Name of His Majesty EDWARD THE SEVENTH, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

His Excellency EVERARD FERDINAND IM THURN, Esquire, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Lieutenant-Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

IM THURN.

WHEREAS by section 4 of Ordinance No. 25 of 1901 it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation to be for that published in the *Government Gazette*, to bring any Province, district, town, or place under the provisions of the said Ordinance, and to define the limit of such Province, district, town, or place for the purposes of this Ordinance, and such Proclamation to amend, alter, or revoke as and whenever the Governor shall, with the like advice, determine:

Now therefore know Ye that We, the said Lieutenant-Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim that the said Ordinance No. 25 of 1901, for the registration of which shall be brought into operation within the limits of the Municipality of Colombo from the 1st day of July, 1903.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-fourth day of June, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine hundred and Two.

GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS.

The following by-laws made by the Municipal Council, Colombo, under section 5 of Ordinance No. 25 of 1901, are published for general information.

By-laws referred to.

1. It shall be lawful for the Chairman of the Municipal Council from time to time to require every occupier of a house to furnish a return showing the number of description of dogs kept in such house or premises attached thereto and the names of the persons to whom they belong, and the age of every dog that is less than six months old, and every such occupier shall be bound to furnish such return filled in with correct information within one week after being so required to furnish it.

2. The Chairman of the Municipal Council may refuse to issue a certificate of registration for any dog which in his opinion is so maimed or diseased as to be unfit to live, or which in his opinion is ill-treated or neglected by its owner or the person in possession of it.

3. It shall be lawful for the Chairman to require the production of any dog for which registration is applied for, and to decline to issue a certificate of registration until it is produced.

4. A fee of 75 cents shall be charged for each certificate issued. Provided that in the case of a dog which is under six months of age at the time of the issue of the certificate, no fee shall be chargeable at the time of issue, but the owner or person in possession of it shall pay the fee as soon as the dog reaches the age of six months. Should any question at any time arise as to the age of any dog the decision of the Chairman on the question of its age shall be final.

5. A collar with the certificate number stamped on it will be issued in respect of each dog registered should the person applying for the certificate so require. A charge of 10 cents will be made for each collar issued.

6. Certificates for dogs shall have the following conditions attached thereto:—

The certificate is liable to be cancelled by the Chairman after notice to be left at the address of the owner:—

- (a) Should the dog become so maimed or diseased as to be incurable and to be in the opinion of the Chairman or Municipal Veterinary Surgeon unfit to live,
- (b) Should the Chairman be satisfied that the dog is habitually ill-treated or continually neglected by its owner,
- (c) Should the dog be permitted by its owner to associate with dogs belonging to others, at a time when it is suffering from any infectious or contagious disease.

7. The owner of every dog for which a certificate has been refused or cancelled because the conditions attached to the certificate have not been complied with, shall on being noticed to do so, produce the dog at the Municipal dog pound at a time to be stated in the notice and deliver it over to the pound keeper.

THE following rules made by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in terms of section 4 of the Ordinance No. 2 of 1896, are published for general information:—

In these rules, unless the context otherwise requires—

“Child” means a person under the age of 14 years.

“Young person” means a person of the age of 14 years and under the age of 18 years.

“Woman” means a woman of 18 years of age and upwards.

“Machinery” includes any driving strap or band.

“Mill-gearing” comprehends every shaft, whether upright, oblique, or horizontal, and every wheel, drum, or pulley by which the motion of the first moving power is communicated to any machine.

1. Every hoist or tackle, near to which any person is liable to pass or to be employed, and every wheel, if within a distance of 3 ft. 6 in. from the floor, directly connected with steam, water, electrical, or other mechanical power, whether in the engine-house or not, and every part of a steam, gas, or oil engine, electrical motor, dynamo, or water-wheel, shall be securely fenced; and

2. Every wheel-race not otherwise secured shall be securely fenced close to the edge of the mill-race; and

3. Every part of the mill-gearing belting, ropes, or chains driven in any way whatever within a distance of 3 ft. 6 in. from the floor, shall either be securely fenced or be in such position or of such construction as to be as safe to every person employed in the factory as it would be if it were securely fenced; and

4. All fencing shall be of wood 3 ft. 6 in. high, posts 3 in. by 3 in., top rail 3 in. by 2 in., intermediate rails, two in number, 2 in. by 1½ in. If iron is used for rails it must be not less than 1 in. in diameter, and shall be maintained in an efficient state while the parts required to be fenced are in motion.

5. All wires conveying electrical current from the dynamo to the motors or lamps shall have highly insulated covering so as to constitute no source of danger; and

6. Every main switchboard shall be under lock and key and bear clear instructions for its use by the inexperienced.

7. No child shall be allowed to clean any part of the machinery in the factory while the same is in motion.

8. No young person or woman shall be allowed to clean any mill-gearing belts, ropes, or chains conveying motive power from the driving to the driven machine while the same is in motion.

9. No child, young person, or woman shall be allowed to work between fixed and traversing parts of any self-acting machine while the machine is in motion.

10. No person shall be allowed to have or shall have control over a boiler in which steam is generated for the purpose of driving machinery, unless he can produce a certificate of competency in the annexed form A from the Inspecting Engineer appointed by Government, or from an Engineer specially licensed for the purpose by the Government, or from the Engineer in charge of such boiler.

11. All persons specially authorized in writing thereto by the Government shall be Inspectors for the purposes of Ordinance No. 2 of 1896 in respect of such factories as shall be enumerated upon such written authority, and shall at all reasonable hours of the day have free access to such factories for the purposes of inspecting machinery in use therein, or any part thereof, and shall report to the Government Agent any failure to comply with the provisions of these rules.

The Inspectors thus appointed shall furnish once a year, if possible, a report on each factory in their charge and forward it to the Government Agent, on or before the date appointed by that officer, accompanied either by a certificate in the annexed form B (Certificate of Compliance) or by a statement showing why he is unable to grant such certificate.

Such certificate shall be signed by the Engineer in charge of such boiler or boilers and connected machinery, or other Engineer nominated by the owner of such factory and specially licensed for the purpose by Government.

12. For the purposes of these rules the Governor may accept a certificate in the same form signed by the Engineer in charge of a boiler and connected machinery in lieu of a certificate by an Inspector appointed

under rule 11, provided that such certificate be made annually and sent to the Government Agent of the Province in which the factory is situated not later than the 31st January.

13. Upon receipt of the certificate referred to in the foregoing rules, the Government Agent shall forward a copy to each of the persons named therein, such copy being duly countersigned by the Government Agent.

14. It shall be lawful for the Government Agent, when he is satisfied that any part of the machinery of a factory is a source of danger to any person or persons employed therein, to make an order in writing directing that such protective measure as he may think necessary be taken in regard to such part of the machinery.

15. The manager or superintendent shall carry out such order as quickly as possible, unless he lodges within ten days of the receipt of the order an appeal against the order to the Governor in Executive Council, by whom the order may be confirmed, modified, or annulled.

16. The superintendent or manager shall comply with the order which may be made by the Governor within two weeks of the receipt of a communication containing the decision arrived at.

17. Nothing in these rules shall be read or construed to preclude a special inspection being made of any factory at any time within reasonable hours, by any person duly and specially authorized by the Government Agent to make such special inspection.

The rules dated 27th October, 1897, and 28th April, 1901, are cancelled.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency EVERARD FERDINAND IM THURN, Esquire, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Lieutenant-Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

EVERARD IM THURN.

WHEREAS by section 7 of "The Police Ordinance, 1865," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, from time to time as occasion may require, to establish by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, a police force for the effectual protection of person and property within such towns as to them shall appear to require the same, and that whenever such force shall be so established within any town, the said Ordinance shall come into operation therein.

And whereas by section 13 of the said Ordinance it is enacted that the Proclamation establishing a police force in any town shall also specify and define the limits of such town:

And whereas it is expedient to establish a police force in the town of Dikoya, in the Central Province, and to specify and define the limits of the said town under the provisions of the said Ordinance.

Now know Ye that We, the Lieutenant-Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby, as from and after the 15th day of July, One thousand Nine hundred and Two, establish a police force in the town of Dikoya aforesaid under the provisions of the said section 7 of the said Ordinance, and do under the provisions of section 13 of the said Ordinance specify and define the limits of the said town to be those set out in the schedule hereto.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Fourth day of July, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Two.

The Northern Limit.—The railway crossing near 1½ milepost on the Dimbula-Dikoya road.

On the East.—A line from the railway crossing at 1½ milepost on the Dimbula-Dikoya road to the house occupied by the Secretary of the Police Court, thence to the mill-dam, and thence along the Hatton estate road to the junction of estate roads below Adam's Peak Hotel tennis courts, thence a straight line to the up home railway signal post, and thence a line passing behind Fisher's bungalow to the stream flowing between that bungalow and the cart road, then along the stream to the southern boundary of the Dikoya estate to the point where it joins the Dikoya stream, and thence up the said stream to the point opposite the culvert on the Dikoya-Wanarajah road, including also a distance of 270 yards along the Bathford Valley road as far as the road leading to the Darawella racecourse, and including on the west all lands between the road and the Darawella-oya up to its junction with the Dikoya stream, and on the east all land, &c., within 100 ft. from centre of the road.
