Pacific Ocean—Fiji Island—Kadavu—The Light at Cape Washington installed.

With reference to Notice to Mariners issued by this office, No. 58, dated March 8, 1902, the Acting Receiver-General, Suva, has given further notice dated May 10, 1902, that on March 1, 1902, the light was installed in the lighthouse at Cape Washington, the most westerly point of the island of Kadavu (latitude 19° 6′ S., longitude 177° 58′ E.).

The height of the light is 202 ft. above high-water level.

The light is a fourth order white dioptric fixed light, and is visible between the magnetic bearings of S. 3° W. through W. to N. 13° E.

Pacific Ocean—Fiji Islands—Koro Island—The Light on Vunuku Point installed.

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 131, dated May 13, 1902, issued by this office, the Acting Rezeiver-General, Suva, has given further notice that on March 1, 1902, the light was installed in the lighthouse at Vunuku, the most easterly point of the island of Koro (latitude 17° 22' S., longitude 179° 26' E.).

The height of the light is 187 ft. above high-water level. The light is a fourth order red dioptric fixed light, and is visible between the mangetic bearings of S. 40° W. through E. to N. 40° E.

Pacific Ocean—Fiji Islands—Wailagilala—The Light replaced.

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 58, dated March 8, 1902, issued by this office, the Acting Receiver-General, Suva, has given further notice that on April 10, 1902, the catoptric light at Wailagilala (latitude 16° 45'

S., longitude 179° 6' W.) was replaced by a fourth order white dioptric fixed light, which is visible between the magnetic bearings of N. 64° E. through N. to S. 42° W.

The height of the light is 95 ft. above high water level.

New Zealand-North Island, East Coast-Poverty Bay-Position of Hawea Buoy altered.

With reference to Mariners No. 94, dated April 12 last. issued by this office, the British Admiralty has given further notice (No. 336 of 1902) that on April 24, 1902, the red buoy marking Hawea rock, Poverty bay, would be moved about 24 cables S. 46° E. to a position southward of the rocks recently discovered, from which Gisborne flagstaff bears No. 4° E., distant 12 70 cables, and Pah hill N. 65° E.

China—Hongkong—Lye Mun Point—Position of Light-Hongkong Harbour—Prohibited Anchorage.

With reference to notice to Mariners No. 68, dated March 10 last, issued by this office, the British Admirarty has given further notice (No. 337 of 1902), that the position of the fixed red light, exhibited from a gibbet on the shore near Lye mun point, is 3½ cables N. 72° E. from K ung am. Appoximate position: lat. 22° 174′ N., long. 11.° 144′ E. Also, that enchanges is prohibited in the similar of

Also, that anchorage is prohibited in the vicinity of the telegraph cable crossing the harbour from near the Admiralty Dock at Kaulung to a position west of north point Hongkong. The prohibited area is marked by beacons which have been moved as under:—

At Kaulung-

The eastern beacon has been shifted 300 ft. S. 79° E. from its former position.

The western beacon has been shifted 540 ft. S. 72° W. from its former position.

At Hongkong-

The eastern beacon has been moved 310 ft. N. 55° E. from its former position.

The western beacon remains unaltered.

The red lights exhibited from these beacons are screened as before, viz., so that when two lights on the same side of the harbour are visible anchorage is prohibited.

Approximate position: lat. 22° 18′ N., long. 114° 10′ E.

Variation, 1° easterly in 1962.

shoal in the entrance to Sibuguei bay.
