## BENGAL.-No. 184.

Africa—East Coast—Port Mombasu—Light established on Leading Beacon.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 304 of 1902) that on April, 10, 1902, a red fixed dioptric light, elevated 68 ft. above high water, and visible from a distance of 7 miles from the bearing of S. 60° W., through west and north to N. 20° E., would be exhibited from the front or south-eastern black and white pillar on Ras Serani, Port Mombasa.

This light in line with the white fixed light exhibited from the rear pillar, N. 51° W., leads through the

fairway into the port.

Approximate position: lat. 4° 4½′ S., long. 39° 41′ E. Variation, 8° westerly in 1902.

#### BENGAL,-No. 185.

Australia, West—Fremantle—Intended Alteration in Lights.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 305 of 1902) that it is proposed to make the following alterations in the lights exhibited on the north and south breakwaters, Fremantle:—

- (1) The white fixed light on the north breakwater will be altered to a green fixed light, elevated 46 ft. above high water, and visible in clear weather from a distance of 12 miles. The light will be of the fourth order, and shown from an iron cylindrical tower, painted white.
- (2) The light on the south breakwater will be altered to a white occulting light every five seconds, thus: light, three seconds; eclipse, two seconds; and it will be elevated 44 ft. above high water. The light will be dioptric of the fourth order, and shown from a cylindrical tower, painted white.

Approximate position: lat. 32° 3′ S., long. 115° 44′ E. Further notice will be given when these alterations are made.

#### BENGAL.-No. 186.

Korea-South Coast-Shadwell Gulf-A Rock in Approach.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 311 of 1902) of the existence of a rock, with a depth of 3 ft. over it off the southern coast of Shadwell peninsula, situated with the western extreme of the south-western island of the Cho Do group (352 ft.) bearing S. 11° W., distant 6 cables, and the island summit (365 ft.) S. 68° E. This rock is about 20 yards long, N. 11° W. and S. 11° E., and 5 yards broad.

Approximate position on Chart No. 2,972: lat. 34° 45' N., long. 128° 234' E. Variation, 4° westerly in 1902.

Africa, North-East-Red Sea, Arabian Coast-Yenbo Approach-Schermo and Thetis Reefs marked by Approach.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 324 of 1902) that beacons have been erected on Schermo and Thetis reefs in the approach to Yenbo.

The beacon on Schermo reef consists of an iron column on a masonry base, the whole surmounted by a ball 30

ft. above the sea.

(true) distant 4 cables from the wreck in 18 fathoms at low water. The position of the wreck is lat. 15° 27′ 45″ N., long. 94° 45′ E. Mariners are accordingly warned.

#### BENGAL.—No. 220.

Bay of Bengal-Andaman Islands-North Brother-Shoal reported to the North-Eastward.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 389 of 1902) that the R.I.M.S. Elphinstone reports having passed over a shoal patch on March 14, 1902, in approximately lat. 11° 1′ 15′ N., long. 92° 41′ E., with North Brother island, bearing S. 40° W., distant 2½ miles.

The shoal appeared to be in the shape of a crescent, extending in a westerly and south-westerly direction. The least depth obtained was 5 fathoms sand.

## BENGAL.-No. 221.

. Eastern Archipelayo—Sumatra, West Coast—Stort Reef— Its Position—Marion Reef—Its non-existence.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 392 of 1902) that a receit survey shows the position of the stort reef to be as follows :-

- (a) Stort reef, on which there is a depth of 34 fathoms, is about three-quarters of a mile long N. by E. and S. by W. Its south-eastern part is situated with Pulo Pië bearing N. 69° E., distant 61 miles, and Pulo Bando, N. 1° W., or about 3 cables south of the position shown on the Chart. The south-eastern side of the reef is steep-to. Approximate position: lat. 0° 54½′ S., long. 99°
- 594 E.

  (b) A sounding of 50 fathoms, no bottom, was obtained in the reported position of Marion reef under conditions so favourable that the discolouration of the water over Stort reef, distant 13 mile to the westward, could clearly be traced, no sign, however, of the Marion reef could be seen, and it is assumed that the vessel reporting it saw the Stort reef. This reef has therefore been expunged from the Chart.

## BENGAL No. 222.

Eastern Archipelago—Sumatra, West Coast—Pulo Lakotta—Non-existence of Coral Patch to the Eastward.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 393 of 1902) that a sounding of 28 fathoms has been obtained by the Netherlands Government ss. Condor in a position from which Pulo Lakotta bore S. 62° W., distant 7½ miles, and Pulo Panjang N. 11° E., and that no trace was seen of the coral patch shown on Chart No. 2,760 in that position. This danger has accordingly been expunged from the Admiralty Charts.

Africa, North-east-Red Sea, Western Shore-South Massawa Channel-Reef in Approach.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 395 of 1902) that information has been received from the Master of the British ss. Neghileh that at 6.45 P.M. on March 24, 1902, his vessel. drawing 9 ft. of water in clear calm weather, struck on a reef south-eastward of Mojeidi island in the eastern approach to South Massawa channel.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 399 of 1902) that information, dated June 6, 1902, has been received from the Board of Trade, that the wreck of the ss. Alexander, III. lies sunk in the inner anchorage Jidda. From it the white beacon on Abu Harit bears S. 67° W., distant  $4\frac{1}{10}$  cables, and the house on Bahri N. 66° W.

### Bengal.—No. 225.

New Zealand—North Island, East Coast—Doubtless Bay-Prohibited Anchorage.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 401 of 1902) that anchorage in the vicinity of the telegraph cable in Doubtless bay is prohibited.

The anchorage area within which the cable lies is contained between a line drawn from Coal bay to Knuckle point on the east, and an imaginary line drawn N. 45° W. from river Taipa entrance on the west.

Four small beacons will shortly be erected to mark the lines of direction which the cable takes to enable vessels

to keep clear of it.

Approximate position, Coal bay: lat. 35° 1′ S., long. 173° 32′ E.

## BENGAL.—No. 226.

#### China, South-east Coast—Mirs Bay—Rock.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 407 of 1902) of the existence of a rock in Mirs bay, with a depth over it of 1, fathoms at low water springs, situated with the eastern extremity of North Gau, bearing N. 43° W., distant 3 cables, and south-eastern extremity of Grass island S. 41° W.

This rock is steep-to on the eastern side, the ten-fathom contour line extending a distance of one cable to the north-eastward, half a cable to the eastward, and 1½ cables

to the south-eastward.
