## PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

In the Name of His Majesty EDWARD THE SEVENTH, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith.

### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir HENRY ARTHUR BLAKE, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

HENRY A. BLAKE.

WHEREAS by section 4(1) of "The Pearl Fishery Ordinance, 1906," it is enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time, by Proclamation, declare that it shall be unlawful for any person within the limits named in such Proclamation to fish or dive for, or to collect, or to use or employ any boat, canoe, raft, or vessel whatsoever for collecting pearl oysters or any specified kind of pearl oysters without having first obtained a license in that behalf from the Government Agent or from some person duly authorized by him to grant licenses:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor in Council, in exercise of the power in Us vested as aforesaid, do hereby declare that it shall be unlawful for any person within the limits named in the Schedule hereto to fish or dive for, or to collect, or to use or employ any boat, canoe, raft, or vessel whatsoever for collecting oysters of the kind scientifically known as *Placuna placenta*, and commonly called "window oyster," without having first obtained a license in that behalf from the Government Agent or from some person duly authorized by him to grant licenses.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-sixth day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Seven.

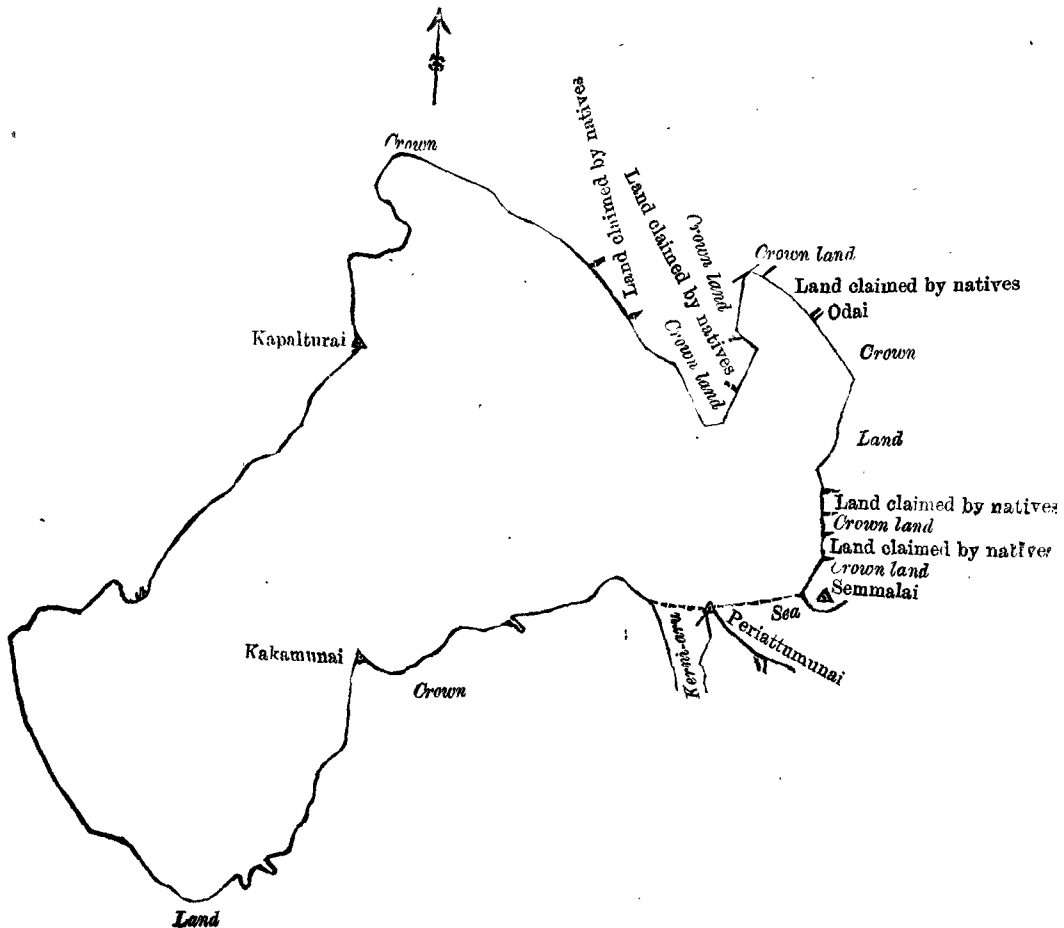

### *"The Quarantine and Prevention of Diseases Ordinance, 1897."*

IT is hereby notified that His Excellency the Governor, in exercise of the powers in him vested by section 4 of the above-named Ordinance, and with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to vary Regulation No. 19, Part I., dated the 1st June 1906, published in the *Government Gazette* of 1st June, by substituting therefor the following regulation, and the same shall take effect as from and after the 1st March, 1907.

### PART I.

*Regulation 19.*—No person or goods coming in or brought from any port or place in India by a coasting vessel shall land or be landed anywhere on the coast of the Northern Province of this Island, or on any Island adjacent thereto, or on the west coast of this Island between Colombo and the southern limit of the Northern Province, or on any Island adjacent to such west coast; provided that nothing in this regulation shall be taken as prohibiting the landing of goods and passengers from any such vessel or boat at the port of Kayts or of goods at Kankesanturai after due medical examination and, if necessary, segregation.

Any goods landed in contravention of the provisions of this regulation, and any vessel or boat, from which any person or goods may land or be landed in contravention of the provisions of this regulation, shall be liable to forfeiture, and may be seized by any Police or Customs officer, and may be destroyed or otherwise disposed of as the Principal Collector of Customs shall direct.

IT is hereby notified for general information that His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise of the powers vested in him by section 5 of "The Ceylon Railways Ordinance, 1902," has been pleased to substitute for rule 42 (b) of the rules relating to the conveyance of traffic by passenger trains dated 26th September, and published in the *Government Gazette* of 27th October, 1899, the following rule, which shall take effect as from and after the 8th day of March, 1907.

42 (b). Ice, and fish, poultry, game, and fresh meat packed in ice will be conveyed at owner's risk at one-fourth parcel's rate; provided that not less than one pound weight of ice for each pound weight of fish, poultry, game, or fresh meat is provided at the time the consignment is tendered for conveyance by the railway. The freight on these consignments must be prepaid. Minimum charge 10 cents.

The examination under the Minute of December 12, 1898, and the *viva voce* examination in the native languages for officers in the Public Works Department and the Forest Department, will be held at the same time and place.

Only the Police Magistrates who are not members of the Bar or of the Civil Service and those candidates who have been specially nominated by the Governor will be admitted to the examination under the Minute of December 12, 1898.

The examination in the Criminal Procedure Code prescribed under the Minute of March 26, 1900, for officers in the Fourth and Fifth Classes of the Civil Service, will also be held on April 16, 1907, as well as at the Kandy Kachcheri.

It is also hereby notified that candidates will be given the option of using Codes in the examinations in the Criminal Procedure Code and the Penal Code; they must, however, state when sending in their names what their decision is, as the character of the papers set for those who use Codes and those who do not will be different.

Candidates are required to send in their names not later than March 20, 1906.

Gentlemen in the Civil Service should state in their applications whether they are presenting themselves for the first or second examination, and whether they intend taking up Sinhalese or Tamil.

#### RULES.

1. No person licensed to carry on the trade of a butcher in the planting district of Pundalu-oya shall slaughter any cattle and sheep at any place other than the respective slaughter-houses for cattle and sheep in the South Pundalu-oya estate.
2. The plot of land in front of the Pundalu-oya Police Station is hereby appointed as the spot in which the licensed butchers of the planting district of Pundalu-oya shall, as required by section 12, sub-section (1), of the Ordinance No. 13 of 1893, expose to public view all cattle intended for slaughter for a period of not less than twenty-four hours immediately preceding the time of slaughter.
3. No cattle or sheep shall be slaughtered at the said slaughter-house, except on such days and between such hours as may be determined by the Assistant Government Agent, Nuwara Eliya, notice of which shall be posted at the said slaughter-houses.
4. No animals shall be slaughtered for human food until after they have been inspected and approved of by the Medical Officer at Pundalu-oya as fit to be slaughtered for human food. Animals rejected as unfit for slaughter shall be immediately removed.
5. The said District Medical Officer may prohibit the slaughter of any animal notwithstanding that it has been approved as aforesaid, if it should before slaughter be found to be diseased or otherwise unfit to be slaughtered for human food.
6. If on any animal which has been approved as aforesaid being slaughtered the carcass shall appear diseased or unfit for human food, the said District Medical Officer shall cause the meat to be immediately destroyed or disposed of so as to prevent its being exposed for sale or used for human food.
7. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall not permit the slaughter of any animals which have not been approved as aforesaid as fit to be slaughtered for human food, or the slaughter of which the said District Medical Officer has prohibited as provided by rule 5.
8. No person shall remove from the slaughter-house, except under the directions of the said District Medical Officer, any meat which the latter has declared to be unfit for human food.
9. The fee for slaughtering shall be 75 cents for each head of cattle and 25 cents for each head of sheep.

10. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall keep a register of all cattle brought to the slaughter-house:—

## RULES.

1. No person licensed to carry on the trade of a butcher in the planting district of Ragalla shall slaughter cattle and sheep at any place other than the slaughter-house at Ragalla estate.
2. The exposure shed adjoining the Ragalla Police Station is hereby appointed as the spot in which the licensed butchers of the planting district of Ragalla shall, as required by section 12, sub-section (1), of the Ordinance No. 9 of 1893, expose for public view all cattle intended for slaughter for a period of not less than twenty-four hours immediately preceding the time of slaughter.
3. No cattle or sheep shall be slaughtered at the slaughter-house, except on such days and between such hours as may be determined by the Assistant Government Agent, Nuwara Eliya, notice of which shall be posted at the said slaughter-house.
4. No animals shall be slaughtered for human food until after they have been inspected and approved by the Medical Officer, Uda Pussellawa, as fit to be slaughtered for human food. Animals rejected as unfit for slaughter shall be immediately removed.
5. The said District Medical Officer may prohibit the slaughter of any animal notwithstanding that it has been approved as aforesaid if it should before slaughter be found to be diseased or otherwise unfit to be slaughtered for human food.
6. If on any animal which has been approved as aforesaid being slaughtered the carcass shall appear diseased or unfit for human food, the said District Medical Officer shall cause the meat to be immediately destroyed or so disposed of as to prevent its being exposed for sale or used for human food.
7. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall not permit the slaughter of any animals which have not been approved as aforesaid as fit to be slaughtered for human food, or the slaughter of which the said District Medical Officer has prohibited as provided by rule 5.
8. No person shall remove from the slaughter-house, except under the directions of the said District Medical Officer, any meat which the latter has declared to be unfit for human food.
9. The fee for slaughtering shall be 75 cents for each head of cattle and 25 cents for each head of sheep.



10. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall keep a register in the form annexed of all cattle brought to the slaughter-house :—

## RULES.

1. No person licensed to carry on the trade of a butcher in the planting district of Deltota shall slaughter cattle at any place other than the public slaughter-house on Galaha estate, referred to in the Proclamation dated January 6, 1901.
2. The building situated 175 feet to the south-east of the said slaughter-house is hereby appointed as the spot in which the licensed butchers of the planting district of Deltota shall, as required by section 12, sub-section (1), of the Ordinance No. 9 of 1893, expose to public view all cattle intended for slaughter for a period of not less than twenty-four hours immediately preceding the time of slaughter.
3. No cattle shall be slaughtered at the slaughter-house, except on such days and between such hours as may be determined by the Government Agent, notice of which shall be posted at the slaughter-house.
4. No animals shall be slaughtered for human food until after they have been inspected and approved by the District Medical Officer at Deltota as fit for human food. Animals rejected as unfit for slaughter shall be immediately removed.
5. The said District Medical Officer may prohibit the slaughter of any animal notwithstanding that it has been approved as aforesaid, if it should before slaughter be found to be diseased or otherwise unfit to be slaughtered for human food.
6. If on any animal which has been approved as aforesaid being slaughtered the carcass shall appear diseased or unfit for human food, the said District Medical Officer shall cause the meat to be immediately destroyed or so disposed of as to prevent its being exposed for sale or used for human food.
7. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall not permit the slaughter of any animals which have not been approved as aforesaid as fit to be slaughtered for human food, or the slaughter of which the said District Medical Officer has prohibited as provided by rule 5.
8. No person shall remove from the slaughter-house, except under the directions of the said District Medical Officer, any meat which the latter has declared to be unfit for human food.
9. The fee for slaughtering shall be 75 cents for each head of cattle.

10. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall keep a register in the form annexed of all cattle brought to the slaughter-house :—

IT is hereby notified for general information that His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council has been pleased to confirm the amendments to Rules 3, 15, and 16, and Clause 6 of the Rules for Investment of the Surplus Funds, passed at the Twenty-third Annual General Meeting of the Public Service Mutual Provident Association held on August 25, 1906. The rules as amended will read as follows :—

Rule 3.—Every member shall be provided with a Pass Book, in which shall be entered, on the book being sent in to be written up, his account in detail as recorded in the Ledger.

The Pass Books shall be annually verified by a member of the Committee of Management with the Account Books of the Treasurer, and shall be initialled by such member in proof of such verification.

Rule 15.—Loans granted under Rule 12 shall be repaid by regular monthly instalments of not less than 1/40th of the amount of the loans, except in the case of pensioners, who may make repayments at the rate of not less than 1/50th of the amount borrowed, provided that the minimum instalment be not less than Rs. 2. But nothing herein contained shall prevent the earlier repayment of such loans.

Rule 16.—Instalments due on account of loans and advances made under Rules 12 and 14, and the interest due thereon, as well as the calls falling due under Rule 10, shall be deducted from the salaries of members on pay day by the Pay Clerk; but the responsibility of seeing that the amounts due on these accounts as well as the monthly contributions are duly deducted and remitted to the Treasurer shall nevertheless rest on the members themselves. Should any amount due by a member as monthly contribution or as instalment or interest on account of such loans be not remitted to the Treasurer within 15 days after it shall fall due, such member shall be liable to and shall pay a fine not exceeding one-fourth of his monthly contribution for each default, and if he shall make default for six consecutive months or neglect to pay the fine or fines imposed on him, he shall *ipso facto* cease to be a member of the Association. The amount to his credit, less sums due to the Association, shall thereupon be transferred to Suspense Account, which will earn no dividend, and shall be payable at his death to his legal heirs as provided by Rule 8.

*Clause 6 of Rules for Investment of Surplus Funds.*—One per cent. of the interest so recovered shall form a Reserve Fund to cover any losses; but it shall be lawful to the Corporation at any General Meeting, when the amount to the credit of the Reserve Fund shall exceed one-tenth of the amount outstanding on loans, to authorize the transfer of any portion of such excess to Profit and Loss Account.

WHEREAS by section 4 of the Domicile Act, 1861, it is enacted that whenever a Convention shall be made between His Majesty and any Foreign State, whereby His Majesty's Consuls or Vice-Consuls in such Foreign State shall receive the same or the like powers and authorities as are hereinafter expressed, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, to direct, and from and after publication of such Order in the *London Gazette* it shall be and is hereby enacted, that whenever any subject of such Foreign State shall die within the dominions of His Majesty and there shall be no person present at the time of such death who shall be rightfully entitled to administer to the estate of such deceased person, it shall be lawful for the Consul, Vice-Consul, or Consular Agent of such Foreign State within that part of His Majesty's Dominions where such Foreign subject shall die to take possession and have the custody of the personal property of the deceased, and to apply the same in payment of his or her debts and funeral expenses, and to retain the surplus for the benefit of the persons entitled thereto; but such Consul, Vice-Consul, or Consular Agent shall immediately apply for and shall be entitled to obtain from the proper court letters of administration of the effects of such deceased person, limited in such a manner and for for such time as to such court shall seem fit.

And whereas a Convention between His Majesty the King and His Majesty the Emperor of Japan was made on the 26th April, 1900, and ratified on the 25th October, 1900, whereby it is provided—

I.—That whenever a subject of one of the High Contracting Parties shall die within the dominions of the other and there shall be no person present at the time of such death who shall be rightly entitled to administer the estate of such deceased person, the following rules shall be observed :—

- (1) When the deceased leaves, in the above-named circumstances, heirs of his or her own nationality only, or who may be qualified to enjoy the civil status of their father or mother, as the case may be, the Consul-General, Consul, Vice-Consul, or Consular Agent of the country to which the deceased belonged, on giving notice to the proper authorities, shall take possession and have custody of the property of the said deceased, shall pay the expenses of the funeral, and retain the surplus for the payment of his or her debts, and for the benefit of the heirs to whom it may rightly belong. But the said Consul-General, Consul, Vice-Consul, or Consular Agent shall be bound immediately to apply to the proper court for letters of administration of the effects left by the deceased, and these letters shall be delivered to him with such limitations and for such time as to such court may seem right.

- (2) If, however, the deceased leaves in the country of his or her decease and in the above-named circumstances any heir or universal legatee of other nationality than his or her own, or to whom the civil status of his or her father or his or her mother, as the case may be, cannot be granted, then each of the two Governments may determine whether the proper court shall proceed according to the law, or shall confide the collection and administer to the respective Consular Officers under the proper limitations. When there is no Consul-General, Consul, Vice-Consul, or Consular Agent in the locality where the decease has occurred (in the case contemplated by the first rule of this Article) upon whom devolves the custody and administration of the estate, the proper authority shall proceed in these acts until the arrival of the respective Consular Officers.

II.—That the stipulations of the Convention shall be applicable, so far as the laws permit, to all the Colonies and foreign possessions of His Majesty, excepting to those hereinafter named, that is to say, except to India, the Dominion of Canada, Newfoundland, the Cape, Natal, New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, Tasmania, South Australia, Western Australia, and New Zealand; \*provided always that the stipulations of the Convention shall be made applicable to any of the above-named Colonies or foreign possessions, on whose behalf notice to that effect shall have been given to the Japanese Government by His Majesty's Representative at Tokyo, within two years from the date of the exchange of ratifications of the Convention.

III.—That the Convention shall remain in force until the 17th July, 1911.

And whereas within the period prescribed by Article II. the stipulations of the Convention have been made applicable to the Colonies of the Cape, New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, Tasmania, South Australia, and Western Australia, and to India :

Now therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that whenever any subject of His Majesty the Emperor of Japan shall die during the currency of the Convention within any of the dominions of His Majesty the King to which the stipulations of the Convention are applicable, and there shall be no person present at the time of such death who shall be rightfully entitled to administer to the estate of such deceased person, it shall be lawful for the Consul, Vice-Consul, or Consular Agent of the Japanese Government within that part of His Majesty's Dominions where such Japanese subject shall die to take possession and have the custody of the personal property of the deceased, and to apply the same in payment of his or her debts and funeral expenses, and to retain the surplus for the benefit of the persons entitled thereto; but such Consul, Vice-Consul, or Consular Agent shall immediately apply for and shall be entitled to obtain from the proper court letters of administration of the effects of such deceased person, limited in such manner and for such time as to such court shall seem fit.

## COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

THE weekly return of births and deaths in the Colombo town for the week ended February 23, 1907, is subjoined (A).

*Births.*—The total births were 67. The birth-rate per 1,000 was 19·8,\* as against 32·2 in the preceding week and 47·3 in the corresponding week of last year.

*Deaths.*—The total deaths were 129. The death-rate per 1,000 was 38·1,\* as against 36·0 in the previous week and 28·0 in the corresponding week of last year.

*Causes of death.*—No person died from cholera, smallpox, or measles; 16 died from diarrhoea and dysentery; 39 from phthisis, bronchitis, and pneumonia; 17 from different kinds of fever; and 5 from infantile convulsions.

*Infantile deaths.*—Of the 129 total deaths, 18 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 18 in the corresponding week of the previous year.

## GOVERNMENT TRAINING COLLEGE.

### ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS.

ENTRANCE Examinations for admission to the English, Anglo-Vernacular, and Vernacular Classes will be held at the Training College, Colombo, commencing at 10.30 a.m., on the second Monday in October, 1907. In order to gain admission to these examinations, intending candidates must apply to the Principal of the Training College during the month of August for an admission form. These forms must be returned on or before August 31st. Candidates will then be informed whether they have been selected to appear at the examination.

#### I.—ENGLISH CLASS (MEN).

The students of this class will be trained for masterships in Grant-in-Aid English Schools. Twelve studentships are open for competition. Each is worth Rs. 300 a year, tenable for two years. Successful candidates will receive Rs. 25 monthly as long as their attendance, conduct, and progress are satisfactory. Students in training must devote the whole of their time to College work.

A limited number of students may reside in the College on payment of the prescribed charge for board. Those who do not go into residence must live within a convenient distance of the College, and must be able to satisfy the Director of Public Instruction that their places of residence afford proper facilities for study and conditions for the maintenance of general good health.

Each selected candidate will be examined by the College Medical Officer, who must be able to report that the candidate is physically fit before taking up the course.

The following will be the subjects for the Entrance Examination :—

- (1) English Language : Grammar and Idiom.  
English Composition.
- (2) Arithmetic : generally.
- (3) Mathematics : (a) Algebra, to quadratic equations ; (b) Geometry, the subject matter of Euclid's Books 1 to 3.
- (4) Latin : easy translations, grammar, and composition.
- (5) History and Geography : general knowledge of English History, general Geography of the World.
- (6) Reading : reading aloud a passage not previously prepared.

N.B.—No further information will be given concerning this syllabus. Other considerations being equal, preference will be given to those candidates who are already employed as teachers in Grant-in-Aid schools.

Those students who complete the course successfully will be awarded a second class certificate which entitles them to certain privileges as laid down in Articles 67, 68, and 69 of the Ceylon Code for Aided Schools, 1906. These Articles read as follows :—

“ Students who have completed a two-years' course in the Government Training College, or any other Training College in Ceylon specially recognized by Government for that purpose, will, on passing the Final Examination of the Government Training College, receive a second class certificate, and will, after three successive years' satisfactory work in a Government or Grant-in-Aid school (either in the same school or in another school under the same management), be entitled to a first class certificate. The percentage recognized for satisfactory work will be in the case of head teachers 60 per cent., in the case of assistant teachers 70 per cent. in the primary standards, and 60 per cent. in the middle standards. Applications for first class certificates shall in every case be accompanied by a report from the manager on the teacher's conduct and his success in maintaining discipline.

" 69. A first class certificate will entitle its holder to receive from Government a result payment equal to one-third of his annual salary, if the following percentage of passes have been obtained :—

" Principal teachers of Primary Schools, 70 per cent.

" Principal teachers of Middle Schools in which 15 children are presented in the Middle Standards, 65 per cent.

" Assistant teachers in Standards I. to III., 80 per cent.

" Assistant teachers in Standards IV. to V., 70 per cent.

" Assistant teachers in Standards VI. to VIII., 65 per cent.

" 70. In schools exempted from individual examination the Director will decide whether the teacher's work has been satisfactory, and whether it qualifies him for result payment after a consideration of a special report made by the Inspector."

#### II.—ANGLO-VERNAACULAR CLASS (MEN).

The students in this department will be trained for masterships in Government English Schools and Grant-in-Aid Schools on a Sinhalese basis. Twelve studentships are open for competition, and preference will be given to candidates who are already in service as teachers, and who are under 30 years of age.

Anglo-Vernacular students will receive free board and lodging at the Training College during session. Text books will be provided. The period of training will extend over two years, and at the end of this period, six of those who pass the Final Examination will receive certificates of the second or third class in accordance with their performance in the examination, and will be eligible for appointments in Government English schools. When serving as assistants they will be paid according to the scale of salaries assigned to third and second class masters in English schools in clause 8 of the Departmental Code, viz., Third Class, Rs. 480 and Second Class, Rs. 600; when appointed to head teacherships they will be eligible for salaries at the following rates, viz., Third Class, Rs. 600; Second Class, Rs. 900; First Class, Rs. 1,200. The first class certificate will be awarded after ten years' satisfactory work as head teacher. The remainder of the class will be eligible for second and third class certificates equivalent to those awarded at the English Teachers' Certificate Examination if their work reaches a sufficiently high standard, but will not be entitled to first class certificates.

In the case of teachers who already hold appointments under the Department, the period of training will not be counted as a break of service.

The following will be the subjects for the Entrance Examination :—

##### *English.*

#### IV.—TAMIL CLASS (MEN).

The students in this class will be trained for masterships in Government Tamil schools. Twelve studentships will be open for competition.

Tamil students will receive free board and lodging at the College during session and text books will be provided. The period of training will extend over two years, and at the end of that period those who pass the Final Examination will receive certificates of the second or third class in accordance with the record of their work during their course and their performance at the Final Examination.

Certificates of the first class will be issued only to trained teachers in the service of the Department who hold second class certificates after an uninterrupted service of ten years as head teacher in a school of the class corresponding to the certificate, provided that their conduct and efficiency be approved by the Director. When serving as head teachers they will be paid according to the scale of salaries assigned to third and second class masters in vernacular schools in clause 8 of the Departmental Code, viz., Third Class Certificated Teachers, Rs. 240; Second Class Certificated Teachers, from Rs. 240 to Rs. 420; First Class Certificated Teachers, from Rs. 432 to Rs. 600. The increments will depend on the success of the teachers in maintaining an efficient and well attended school. All certificated head teachers will be entitled to result payments accordingly to the scale set forth in clause 9 of the Departmental Code, and to pensions in accordance with clause 11.
