## Payment from the Compassionate Fund to the Widows, &c., of deceased Officers.

Instances have occurred where prompt payment from the Compassionate Fund could not have been made to the widows or next of kin of deceased officers owing to the great delay on the part of Police Officers internishing Form 44 recommending a donation. Such delays generally cause great hardship to the widows or the next of kin. Superintendents and Government Agents (Police) are therefore requested to see that Form 44 is prepared and sent to the Inspector-General of Police as soon after the death of the officer as possible.

## Stretcher for Wounded Men sent to Colombo by Train.

In all cases where wounded people are sent to Colombo by the Police or Headmen by train the Station Master of the Station, where the patient entrains, should be requested to telegraph to the Station Master, Maradana, that the stretcher provided by the Railway Department at Maradana Junction will be required on the arrival of the train. The Station Master, Maradana, will then have the stretcher ready, and the patient can be removed to hospital at once.
