Part I.—Departmental Orders.

- 1.—All Departmental Orders will in future be published in Part I. of the *Ceylon Police Gazette*, which should be filed separately from Part II., which will consist of the old "Hue and Cry."
- 2.—The Inspector-General's Circular Guard File is abolished.

Order No. 23.

Transfer of Sergeants or Constables.

WHEN an order is made transferring a Sergeant or Constable from any division or Province he should leave within seven days from the date specified in the order. If he is unable to leave within that period, owing to his presence being required at the Courts or otherwise, the reason should be communicated to my office.

2. The Superintendents and Assistant Superintendents of Provinces or divisions must see that the Sergeant or Constable transferred to their Provinces or divisions reports himself after seven days. If not, they should report it to my office.

3. The dates of departure from and arrival at a station on transfers made by me should be reported to my office.

4. No leave in excess of three days should be given to a Sergeant or Constable under orders of transfer.

Travelling Allowances to Police Officers.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR has been pleased to sanction the following train and coach fares and rates of batta to the following Police Officers, with effect from 1st March :—

Station House Officers and Native Police Sergeants of 1st Class	..	Re. 1.50 batta per diem and 2nd Class train fare.
Native Police Sergeants of 2nd Class	..	Re. 1 batta per diem and 3rd Class train fare.
European Police Sergeants	..	Double the rates of 1st Class Native Police Sergeants and 2nd Class train fare.
European Police Constables	..	Double the rates of 2nd Class Native Police Sergeants and 2nd Class train fare.

The other rules and rates regarding the Travelling Allowances to Officers of the Police Department as given in pages 262 and 263 of the Civil List for 1907 stand.
