But, before formal application is made by the Governor to the University through the Colonial Office, the Candidate must—

- (1) Satisfy the Colonial Authorities that he will have completed his sixteenth year on or before the first day of the examination, that day being computed to fall as late as the Regulations will allow, viz., January 14th and June 14th in any year, and that he is of a character to be admitted to the examination (Regulation 2 of Appendix I.);
- (2) Pay (if a Candidate for the Matriculation Examination) a fee of £2 to the Colonial Authorities for transmission to the University (Regulation 8 of Appendix I.);
- (3) Furnish the Colonial Authorities, for transmission to the University, with a list of the subjects in which he intends to present himself for examination, chosen (as stated above) according to the Regulations given in Appendix III.

When this is done, and when the Candidate has assured himself that the examination will be held in the Colony, and when and where it will take place, he will have done all that is necessary before presenting himself to take the papers.

If he withdraw his name after having entered for, or if he fails to pass or to appear at, the examination, he can enter again at a subsequent examination; for this he must again pay a fee of £2, and make application through the Governor as above described.

(c) *Exemption from the Matriculation Examination in accordance with Statute 116.**

A Candidate who has already obtained a degree in one or other of the various Universities "approved" by the Senate for this purpose (a term which includes most of the principal Colonial Universities) need not pass the Matriculation Examination.†

In order to be thus excused, he must send to the External Registrar‡ satisfactory proof that he is a graduate of an "approved" University, together with a registration fee of £2. He will then be registered as though he had passed the Matriculation Examination immediately preceding the date at which his claim is received. He is in fact excused the Matriculation Examination. Such graduates have other privileges, but for the moment it is necessary to consider only persons who wish to take the examination for the Bachelor's Degree after having matriculated either by examination or by registration as exempt therefrom.†

II.—DEGREE EXAMINATIONS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF LONDON IN THE COLONIES.

Two more examinations at least must be passed after Matriculation before the Student can obtain a Bachelor's Degree of the University of London. They are called the Intermediate and Bachelor's Degree Examinations respectively. The Intermediate Examination cannot be taken by a Candidate unless he has matriculated not later than the preceding January, nor can the First Degree Examination be taken less than three years after Matriculation. The only examinations which are held in the Colonies are the Intermediate and Bachelor's Degree Pass Examinations in Theology, Arts, Laws, and Economics. Under certain circumstances also the University is prepared to consider applications for holding in the Colonies the examinations in scientific subjects§ which involve practical work and which lead to Degrees in Arts or Science. But such examinations, especially when the applications for them are made for the first time, are necessarily the subject of somewhat protracted negotiations between the University and the Colonial authorities; and Students must not assume that, in any particular Colony such examinations can always be held.

Extracts from the Regulations for these examinations are given in Appendices IV., V., VI., VII., and VIII., respectively; but these extracts show only the dates and the outline of the scope of the several examinations, and, as the Regulations are liable to alteration (sometimes in essential points), intending Candidates should apply in good time for the latest editions, which will be supplied gratis and post free. All responsibility in this respect must rest upon the Candidates themselves.

The procedure with regard to entry for these examinations is in all respects the same as that for the Matriculation Examination. Application must be made through the Governor of the Colony in the same way. The fee payable on every entry or re-entry, is Six Pounds for each Intermediate and Six Pounds|| for each Bachelor's Degree Examination. These fees and the list of the subjects chosen by the Student in accordance with the Regulations must be forwarded through the Governor in the same way as for the Matriculation Examination.

A Candidate who withdraws his name after having entered for, or who fails to present himself at, or who fails to pass, the examination, may enter again as often as he pleases, but must on each occasion pay the full fee.

Having passed the requisite examinations, he can thus obtain in his own Colony the Degree of Bachelor of Divinity (B.D.), Bachelor of Arts¶ (B.A.), Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.), or Bachelor of Science in Economics (B.Sc.). The examination for the Degree of Bachelor of Science (B.Sc.) in the Faculty of Science and the examination in the Scientific subjects which involve practical work for the Bachelor of Arts Degree may also, under exceptional circumstances, be held in certain Colonies wherein the necessary arrangements have been found practicable.¶

III.—DEGREE EXAMINATIONS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF LONDON IN ENGLAND.

In the first place it is necessary to explain that the Under-graduates of the University are now divided into two classes, called "External" and "Internal" Students respectively.

The same Matriculation Examination is held for admission to either class and the conditions on which that examination is excused are the same for both. Neither class of Student can take a Bachelor's Degree (B.A., LL.B., &c.), till three years have elapsed from the date of Matriculation, and both classes have to pass an Intermediate Examination during that interval.

(a) *Internal Students.*

A Candidate can only graduate as an Internal Student by spending subsequently to Matriculation at least three years in London, during which period he must follow, in all the subjects he offers for the Intermediate Examination and the examination for the Bachelor's Degree, Courses of Study approved by the Senate in a "School" of the University, or in some public Educational Institution associated with the University, under Teachers "recognized" by the Senate. Full particulars of these courses and of the Institutions in which they are given are set forth in Volume II. of the University Calendar (see Note under Preface on page 288 above).

Some of the information given below will be useful to persons who contemplate spending three years in London and graduating as Internal Students, but this pamphlet is intended chiefly for those who wish to spend as short a time as possible in England in order to complete a course already begun in the Colonies. Such persons will therefore be External Students, as will those who pass all their examinations in the Colonies.

(b) *External Students.*

No conditions whatever are laid upon an External Student in Faculties other than those of Medicine and Engineering (Mining) except that he must enter for and pass certain examinations. As these are not necessarily the same as for Internal Students, an intending Candidate must be careful to assure himself that he is preparing for the right examination.

All the subjects of study detailed in the Appendices to this pamphlet are those for External Students, but to give the syllabuses of all the University Examinations would enlarge it unduly. Those which are not found in the Appendices will be found in Vol. III. of the University Calendar (see Note under Preface on page 288 above).

(c) *External Colonial Candidates for Honours or for Pass.*

Candidates in any Faculty who present themselves for Honours in any examination must take that examination in England. Candidates in the corresponding Pass Examinations may, as stated above, take them in a Colony or in England, as they please.

(d) *External Colonial Students in the Faculties of Music, Engineering, and Science (Agriculture and Veterinary Science).*

All the examinations in the Faculties of Music, Engineering, and Science (Agriculture and Veterinary Science), and the examination for the "Teacher's Diploma" (other than the Matriculation Examination) must be taken in England.

(e) *Colonial Students in the Faculty of Medicine.*

Colonial Students desiring to take a Degree in Medicine can do so either as External or as Internal Students. If they elect to be External Students, they must take all their examinations subsequent to the Matriculation, viz., (1) the Preliminary Scientific; (2) the Intermediate Examination in Medicine, (3) the M.B., B.S. Examination in England, though they may pursue their Course of Study where they like for the Preliminary Scientific Examination, and may take their medical training subsequent to that examination at one of the Colonial Medical Institutions specified in Appendix IX., instead of at one of the British Medical Schools named in the Regulations, if they prefer to do so. The Degrees of M.B., B.S. cannot be taken under five years from Matriculation.

It is however possible for a Colonial Student desiring to graduate in Medicine in London to proceed in another way. He can, as before, pass the Matriculation Examination in his Colony; or, if he holds a degree of his Local University (provided that it is on the list of those "approved" by the University for this purpose*) can be excused therefrom, and be registered as a Student of the University of London. He can then take a Course of Study in Chemistry, Physics, Biology, Anatomy, Physiology, and Pharmacology at any one of the Medical Institutions specified in Appendix IX. This course must extend over not less than two years, and, provided that the course and the examinations passed thereon satisfy the University of London, the Candidate will be excused the Preliminary Scientific Examination; he can then come to London, and, after passing the Intermediate Examination in Medicine and completing in London a Course of Medical Study extending over at least three years and superintended by recognized Teachers of the University, he will be eligible to enter for the Final Examination for the Degrees of M.B., B.S. as an Internal Student. The full course of professional study pursued subsequently to Matriculation would in this case, as in that of the Colonial Student graduating as an External Student, be five years, but only three of these, viz., the last three, need be spent in London.

The difference between the two courses may be summed up as follows:—

The External Student in Medicine can complete his studies in "approved" Institutions in the Colonies, but must take the Preliminary Scientific as well as the Intermediate and the Degree Examinations in England; this will involve three visits if the Candidate returns home after each examination.

Under exceptional circumstances, similar to those which govern the holding of Science Examinations, it may be possible to hold the Preliminary Scientific Examination in a Colony. (See page 289).

The intending Internal Student in Medicine may (under the conditions above described) be excused the Preliminary Scientific Examination, but must take a Course of Study under the superintendence of recognized Teachers of the University in a London Medical School and extending over three years, during which he will pass his Intermediate and Degree Examinations.

* Information on this point can be obtained on application to the External Registrar, University of London, South Kensington, London, S.W., England.

(f) Minimum Time between the Intermediate and the Bachelor's Degree Examinations.

An External Student may, if he pleases, leave England in the interval between any two examinations. If however he desires to pass the interval in this country, he may wish to know how long that interval will be.

Between Matriculation and the examination for a Bachelor's Degree not less than three years must elapse. This period the Student may divide into one year for the Intermediate and two for the Final, or two for the Intermediate and one for the Final. If a Colonial Candidate who has matriculated and desires to take the remaining examinations in England elect the latter alternative, the shortest necessary interval between the two examinations is shown in the following table :—

In the Faculty of Medicine three examinations instead of two have to be passed subsequently to Matriculation in order to qualify for the Degree.† The interval between the Preliminary Scientific, Part I., and the Intermediate must be two years, and that between the Intermediate and the M.B., B.S. Degrees Examination is twenty-one months—about four years in all. For the conditions under which Students may in some cases be excused the Preliminary Examination, reference is made to the Regulations for Degrees in Medicine. (See also page 290 above.)

If the Candidate fails in one or other or both of the examinations, the interval which must elapse before he can obtain his degree on this basis will be prolonged. For instance, if he fails in the Intermediate Examination in any Faculty except Medicine, he will have to wait for a year before he can enter for it again, and another year must elapse before he can enter for his degree. The examinations in the Faculty of Medicine being held twice a year, failure in any one of them involves a loss of about six months only.

IV.—FACILITIES FOR STUDY IN LONDON.

(a) Schools of the University.

As has been stated, an External Student may spend the interval between the examinations as he pleases ; but if he chooses not only to stay in this country, but also to study in London, he can attend one or other of the " Schools " or other Institutions associated with the University.

The cost of a course of study varies so much with the subjects taken that it is impossible to indicate this in a summary. Volume II. of the University Calendar (see Note under Preface on page 288 above) contains a list of all the classes recognized by the University, together with the fees. It may be stated generally that a full year's course of study in Science at a school of the University, including attendance at laboratories &c., would cost about £40. A good Arts course would probably cost between £20 and £30 *per annum*. In both cases the cost is estimated exclusive of the price of books.

(b) *Polytechnics.*

Day classes are also held in the various Polytechnics. These institutions are open to both men and women. The following is a list of those in which classes are recognized by the University, together with their addresses and the titles of the Officers to whom communications should be addressed :—

Evening Classes preparatory to the University Examination, are held at these and other Institutions at fees of from 10s. *per term* (three terms to the year); these are specially designed for persons engaged in business during the day.

A Student whose whole time is at his own disposal would do wisely to take the more complete Day Classes. If he is an Internal Student, it is much easier to complete the approved courses in three years as a Day Student. Indeed, it is impossible to do this in the evening unless the Student can produce evidence that he is engaged in business for twenty-five hours a week. In that case the number of hours of attendance at lectures and in the laboratories is reduced; but even then most of the Evening Courses are planned on the assumption that four years will elapse between Matriculation and the Degree.

(c) *Residence in London.*

Some of the above Institutions, especially the Theological and Women's Colleges, are residential; others have "Halls of Residence" attached to them, or keep lists of lodgings which they recommend. Information on this point must in each case be obtained from the authorities of the Institution at which the Candidate intends to study.

V.—THE HIGHER DEGREES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF LONDON.

The highest degree of the University of London, *i.e.*, the Doctorate in the various Faculties, can be obtained both by persons who already hold a Bachelor's Degree of the University, and by graduates of any other University approved by the Senate for this purpose.

(a) *Conditions for Graduates of the University of London.*

In all the Faculties except Arts the degree of Doctor is open to those who have obtained a Bachelor's Degree of the University without any intervening examination, and in some cases without the necessity for any further examination at all.

In these latter cases the Candidate has to present a Thesis or publication embodying an account of some research of his own, or of work which he regards as qualifying him for the degree. The Examiners may or may not require him to undergo a further examination at their discretion; the examination, if required, must be conducted in England.

In the Faculty of Arts a Candidate who is already a graduate must pass the examination for the M.A. Degree before entering for that of Doctor of Literature; but the examination for the M. A. is subsidiary to a Thesis to be presented by the Candidate.

(b) *Conditions for Persons who have taken a First Degree in this University for Graduates of other Universities and for others desirous under the terms of Statutes 113 and 129* of prosecuting a Course of Advanced Study or Research, and of proceeding to a Higher Degree.*

Graduates of this or of other "approved" Universities, or persons who have passed the examinations required for the degrees of such Universities, may be allowed to proceed to the higher degrees of the University of London as Internal Students in any Faculty except that of Medicine.

For this purpose the Candidate must study in London for two years under conditions approved by the University as set forth below. In order to obtain the certificate required under Regulation 1 (c) below, it will be desirable for a person who has not previously studied in London to obtain full testimonials from his previous teachers as to his rank and attainments.

The Regulations adopted for persons who have taken a Bachelor's Degree in this University and for graduates of other Universities desirous under the terms of Statute 113 of prosecuting a course of advanced study or research, and of proceeding to a higher degree, are as follows:—

[The following Regulations in so far as they affect Internal Graduates have reference only to those who desire to study for a Higher Degree in a Faculty other than that in which they have graduated.]

1. Every graduate of the University, and every Student who has graduated or passed the examinations for a degree in a University approved by the Senate for that purpose under Statute 113, and every Student who has fulfilled the requirements of sub-section (3) or sub-section (4) of the same Statute (*see footnote below*), must before entering on a course of study or research in order to qualify for a higher degree as an Internal Student, under the terms of Statutes 113 and 129—

(a) Produce evidence that he has taken a first degree of the University of London, or that he has graduated or has passed the examinations for a degree in a University approved by the Senate for the purpose, or has complied with the conditions of sub-section (3) or sub-section (4) of Statute 113.

(b) State what higher degree of the University of London he selects as the object of his studies, and declare that he is willing to study for that degree as an Internal Student for such period and under such general supervision as the Senate may appoint.

(c) Produce a certificate from the governing body of a school of the University, or from a Teacher or Teachers of the University, as defined below, stating that the Candidate is, in their opinion a fit person to undertake a course of study or research with a view to the degree he has selected, and that the School or Teacher is willing to take the responsibility of supervising the studies or research work of the Candidate, and of reporting to the Senate three times in the year, at least, whether the Candidate is *bona fide* pursuing a course of study in the School or other institution suitable as a preparation for the higher degree which he has selected as the object of his studies or research.

Each Student shall submit to the University, through the authorities of the Institution where he is pursuing his course of study, or through the teacher of the University as defined below, a Terminal Report stating the nature and amount of the supervision exercised by the Teacher or Teachers with whom he is working, and setting forth the details of his work, including the Courses of Instruction (if any) that he is taking.

[The Certificate of an Appointed or Recognized Teacher may by special resolution of the Academic Council be accepted in place of that of a School of the University; or such a Teacher may be granted for one or more periods, not exceeding five years each, the power to issue such Certificates.]

(d) Present, should the Student intend to proceed to the degree of M.A., on entering for the examination for that degree, a Certificate showing that he has completed a course of instruction consisting of a minimum number of Lectures and Classes to be determined in each case upon the report of the appropriate Board of Studies.

2. Persons admitted as Candidates for a higher degree under Statutes 113 and 129 may enter for any examination preparatory to that degree, other than the examination for that degree, at any time during their period of study under the control of the University. The lower degree will, however, not be granted to such persons.

3. The examination for the degree itself shall not be taken by such persons until they have studied under the conditions laid down in Regulation 1 for a minimum period to be prescribed by the University in the case of each degree.

4. Persons admitted as Candidates for a Higher Degree under Statutes 113 and 129, after having studied to the satisfaction of the authorities of the School, or in the case of an Institution other than a School, of the Recognized Teacher or Teachers, concerned, for the minimum period prescribed by the University under the foregoing Regulation, shall be exempted from the requirements as to attendance set forth in Sections i.-v. of the Note on page 294, and may be admitted at any time subsequently to the examination for the Degree

* Statutes 113 and 129 are as follows:—

113. Provided also that the Senate may admit as Internal Students and as Candidates for any of the higher degrees (except in Medicine and Surgery) without their having previously taken any lower degree the following persons (that is to say):

- (1) Graduates of Universities approved by the Senate for this purpose;
- (2) Persons who have passed the examinations required for a degree in some University approved as aforesaid;
- (3) Persons who have obtained from the University of Cambridge a certificate stating that they have satisfied the examiners in a Tripos Examination qualifying as a Final Examination for a first degree;
- (4) Persons who have passed or obtained Honours at the Second Public Examination of the University of Oxford, provided that they have also either passed or obtained Honours at the First Public Examination or have passed such other Examination or Examinations as under the provisions of the University of Oxford are accepted as statutorily equivalent thereto.

129. Any Graduate of the University who has taken a degree as an External Student may be admitted to the examination for the next higher degree as an Internal Student on completing a prescribed course of study in a School or Schools, or under a Teacher or Teachers of the University, or may in place of the whole or any part of such examinations submit the results of study or research subject to the provisions hereinbefore contained.

provided that (i.) they shall, during the interval, present reports terminally from the authorities of the School or from the recognized Teacher or Teachers of an Institution other than a School, concerned, to the effect that they are pursuing their studies satisfactorily, and that (ii.) they shall pay a fee of £2 *per annum* to the authorities of such School or Institution.

5. The prescribed periods of study shall be as follows :—

M.A. (two years).

D.Lit. (at any time after the M.A. on presenting sufficient evidence; or, if that examination be specially excused, two years).

D.D., D.Sc., LL.D., and D.Mus. (two years).

NOTE.

(i.) In the case of Students in the Faculty of Arts, Regulation 1 shall be interpreted as follows :—

Whilst it may not be necessary or desirable for them to attend any of the formal lectures of the School or Institution* at which Teachers are recognized by the University, it is essential that they should work in the Libraries of the School or Institution, or in some other approved Library in London.

They shall be members of the Seminar or Conference Class (if any) of the School or Institution in the subject in which they are working.

(ii.) In the case of Students in the Faculty of Economics, the Student shall comply with one at least of the following conditions :—

(a) The Student shall have an interview for the purposes of his work with the Teacher directing his studies not less frequently than once in each week, except in so far as this is modified by Regulation (iv.) below.

(β) The Student shall be attending regular lectures in the School or Institution.

(γ) The Student shall be a member of the Conference Class or Seminar (if any) of the School or Institution in which he is working, in the subject of his Thesis.

(δ) The Student shall be working in the Library of his School or Institution or in some other approved Library in London.

(iii.) In the case of Students in the Faculty of Music, the Student shall comply with the following conditions :—

The Student shall have an interview for the purposes of his work with the Teacher directing his studies not less frequently than once in each week, except in so far as this is modified by Regulation (iv.)

(iv.) Where the material for the work of a Student exists elsewhere, the Student may under proper conditions be allowed leave of absence from London, if such absence do not exceed one term in each Session.

(v.) It is essential that the Student shall reside within the 30 mile radius, or shall attend for study in a School or Institution during the ordinary terms not less often than three times a week.

(vi.) The Student shall be required to pay a fee to the School or Institution in which he is working.

(vii.) In the event of the Student having other occupations, the University must be informed of their precise nature.

(viii.) The bulk of the work submitted as a Thesis or Musical Exercise for a Degree must have been done since the Student was registered as an Internal Student of the University.

(ix.) The work submitted as a Thesis or Musical Exercise for a Degree in this University must not have been previously submitted as a Thesis or Musical Exercise for a Degree in another University.

VI.—EXEMPTIONS FROM AND IN RESPECT OF THE MATRICULATION EXAMINATION.

REGULATION FOR THE ADMISSION OF STUDENTS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE TERMS OF STATUTES, SECTION 116, WITHOUT PASSING THE MATRICULATION EXAMINATION.

Statute 116 runs as follows :—

116. Every Candidate for admission as a Student of the University shall pass such entrance or Matriculation Examination or fulfil such other tests of fitness to be admitted as a Student as may be from time to time prescribed.

REGULATIONS AS TO EXEMPTION FROM THE MATRICULATION EXAMINATION.

Graduates of such British, Colonial, and Foreign Universities, as are approved by the Senate for that purpose, and those who have passed all the examinations required for a degree in those Universities, also women who have obtained Tripos Certificates granted by the University of Cambridge, and women who have obtained certificates showing that, under the conditions prescribed by the Delegacy for Local Examinations at Oxford, they have passed the Second Public Examination of that University or have obtained Honours in the Oxford University Examination for Women in Modern Languages, may on application be registered as Matriculated Students on payment of the Registration fee of £2 without passing the Matriculation Examination.

[Oxford and Cambridge Graduates in First or Second Class Honours can be admitted to their Degree Examination after two years from their Registration. See Extract from Statute 120 on page 295.]

Students who hold the Scotch School leaving Certificate, having passed on one and the same occasion, in the Higher or Honours Grade in all the subjects required by the Regulations for the Matriculation Examination, and Students who have obtained the *Baccalaureat* of a French University or at an *Abiturienten Examen* the *Zeugnis der Reife* from a Gymnasium or Real-Gymnasium within the German or Austrian Empire, or who hold a *Maturitäts-Zeugnis* of a Gymnasium or Oberrealschule or an *Eidgenössische Maturitäts-Zeugnis* of Switzerland, or the *Certificat du Baccalaureat* of the Lycee of Belgrade, Servia, also Students who hold the leaving Certificate of a Gymnasium of the Russian Empire, or the *Leaving Certificate* of a Gymnasium of the Kingdom of Greece, or the *Leaving Certificate of the Lycee* of Jassy, Roumania, or who hold a *School-leaving Certificate* of a Finnish Secondary School together with a certificate of admission to the University of Helsingfors will be registered on the same conditions as the graduates above referred to

* In the following paragraphs the word "Institution" is to be interpreted as meaning an Institution which Teachers are recognized by the University.

CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH THE OXFORD SENIOR LOCAL EXAMINATION WILL GIVE EXEMPTION
FROM THE LONDON MATRICULATION EXAMINATION.

A Student holding a Senior Local Certificate of the University of Oxford is entitled to exemption from the Matriculation Examination of the University of London, if he or she has at one and the same examination passed in (1) English Language and Literature including the English Essay, or History together with the English Essay, or Geography together with the English Essay, (2) Arithmetic, Geometry and Algebra, and (3) three of the following subjects or combinations of subjects, not counted under (1) above:—Latin, Greek, French, German, Spanish, Italian, Greek or Roman History, English History or Foreign History, two subjects in Mathematics other than those mentioned above, Chemistry (Theoretical and Practical), Mechanics, Heat, Sound, and Light, Electricity and Magnetism, Botany, Zoology; provided (a) that either Latin, or Mechanics, or Heat, Sound, and Light, or Chemistry, or Botany, is included, (b) that one language is included.

CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH THE HIGHER CERTIFICATE OF THE OXFORD AND CAMBRIDGE SCHOOLS
EXAMINATION BOARD WILL GIVE EXEMPTION FROM THE LONDON MATRICULATION
EXAMINATION.

A Student will be exempted from the Matriculation Examination of the University of London if he or she has at one and the same examination for Higher Certificates of the Oxford and Cambridge Schools Examination Board passed (1) in English including the English Essay, or in History together with the English Essay, (2) in Elementary Mathematics (together with the Geometry and Algebra of the Additional Mathematics), and (3) in three of the following:—Latin, Greek, French, German, Additional Mathematics, History (provided it has not been counted under (1) above), Geography, Natural Philosophy (Mechanical Division), Natural Philosophy (Physical Division), Natural Philosophy (Chemical Division), Physical Geography and Elementary Geology, Biology; provided (a) that either Latin or one of the divisions of Natural Philosophy is included, (b) that one Language is included, and (c) that, if Latin and Greek are among the selected subjects, the Student shall, for the purposes of this Regulation, be held to have passed if he has shown sufficient merit to be qualified for exemption from the examination in stated Subjects at Responsions or from Part I. of the previous examination, and that, if he has taken Latin or Greek, he has reached in that language the standard required for the above exemption.

CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH THE PREVIOUS EXAMINATION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF CAMBRIDGE
WILL GIVE EXEMPTION FROM THE LONDON MATRICULATION EXAMINATION.

A Student who has passed Parts I. and II. of the previous examination is entitled to exemption from the Matriculation Examination of the University of London, provided that Parts I. and II. are taken at the same time, and provided also that either Logic has been taken in Part II., or, if the Candidate has taken Paley's *Evidences* in place of Logic in Part II., he has passed in one of the Additional Subjects.

CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH THE CAMBRIDGE SENIOR LOCAL EXAMINATION WILL GIVE EXEMPTION
FROM THE LONDON MATRICULATION EXAMINATION.

A Student holding a Senior Local Certificate of the University of Cambridge is entitled to exemption from the Matriculation Examination of the University of London, if the Candidate has at one and the same examination passed (1) in English Language and Literature including English Composition, or History together with English Composition, or Geography together with English Composition, (2) in Arithmetic, Geometry, and Algebra, and (3) in three of the following subjects or combinations of subjects, not counted under (1) above:—Latin, Greek, French, German, Spanish, Greek History or Roman History, English History or History of the British Empire, Physical Geography, Logic, two subjects in Mathematics other than those mentioned above, Chemistry (Theoretical and Practical), Mechanics, Heat together with Sound and Light, Electricity and Magnetism, Botany, Zoology, provided that either Latin, or Mechanics, or Heat, Sound, and Light, or Chemistry, or Botany is included, and provided further that one Language is included.

CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH THE SENIOR GRADE CERTIFICATE OF THE INTERMEDIATE EDUCATION
BOARD FOR IRELAND WILL GIVE EXEMPTION FROM THE LONDON
MATRICULATION EXAMINATION.

A Student holding a Senior Grade Certificate of the Intermediate Education Board for Ireland is entitled to exemption from the Matriculation Examination of the University of London, if he has at one and the same examination passed (1) in English Literature and Composition, (2) in Arithmetic, Algebra, and Geometry, and (3) in three of the following subjects:—Latin, Greek, French, German, Italian, Spanish, History, and Geography, Physics, Chemistry, Mechanics, Botany, provided that either Latin or an Experimental Science is included, and provided further that one language is included.

The standing of Registered Students shall date, for the purposes of External Examinations, from the Matriculation Examination immediately preceding the date of registration. (See Extract from Statute 120 below.) To secure that a registration under Statute 116 shall date from any Matriculation Examination, such registration must be completed before the commencement of the next Matriculation Examination.

N.B.—Applications for registration must be accompanied by a registration fee of two Pounds, together with official documentary evidence of qualification in accordance with the above conditions. Cheques must be made payable to the "University of London" and crossed "London and Westminster Bank, South Kensington Branch." The fee and evidence must be forwarded together by registered post and addressed to "The External Registrar, University of London, S.W."

EXTRACT FROM STATUTE 120.

"No Student shall be admitted to the final examination for a degree until the expiration of at least three years after Matriculation, unless the Senate in special cases otherwise determine."

CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH THE MATRICULATION EXAMINATION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF LONDON, WHETHER TAKEN IN ITS ORDINARY FORM OR IN THE FORM OF THE SCHOOL EXAMINATION (MATRICULATION STANDARD) FOR THE SCHOOL-LEAVING CERTIFICATE, WILL GIVE EXEMPTIONS FROM RESPONSIONS IN THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD.

A Student holding a Matriculation Certificate of the University of London, whether the Matriculation Examination has been taken in its ordinary form or in the form of the School Examination (Matriculation Standard) for the School-leaving Certificate, will be exempted from examination in Stated subjects at Responsions, provided that the certificate includes Latin, Greek, and Mathematics, and provided further that the Candidate has passed either at the same or at a subsequent Matriculation Examination in an additional paper in Latin Prose Composition.

Candidates who, under the provisions of the Regulation, claim exemption from Responsions, shall, on or before giving in or transmitting their names (through their Tutor) to the Secretary to the Boards of Faculties as Candidate for examination, produce to him a Certificate or Certificates of qualifications which entitle them to such exemption, and shall at the same time pay to the University Chest, through the Secretary, the sum of one pound.

CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH THE MATRICULATION EXAMINATION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF LONDON, WHETHER TAKEN IN ITS ORDINARY FORM OR IN THE FORM OF THE SCHOOL EXAMINATION (MATRICULATION STANDARD) FOR THE SCHOOL-LEAVING CERTIFICATE, WILL GIVE EXEMPTION FROM THE CAMBRIDGE PREVIOUS EXAMINATION.

1. A Student holding a Matriculation Certificate of the University of London, whether the Matriculation Examination has been taken in its ordinary form, or in the form of the School Examination (Matriculation Standard) for the School-leaving Certificate, will be entitled to exemption from Part I. of the previous examination with the exception of the paper on the Greek Gospel or its substitute, provided that the Certificate includes Latin and Greek.

2. A Student holding a Matriculation Certificate of the University of London, whether the Matriculation Examination has been taken in its ordinary form, or in the form of the School Examination (Matriculation Standard) for the School-leaving Certificate, will be entitled to exemption from Part II. of the previous examination, provided that the Certificate includes Elementary Mathematics, Logic, and English.

3. A Student holding a Matriculation Certificate of the University of London, whether the Matriculation Examination has been taken in its ordinary form, or in the form of the School Examination (Matriculation Standard) for the School-leaving Certificate, will be entitled to exemption from Part II. of the previous examination, with the exception of Paley's *Evidences* or its substitute (Logic), provided that the Certificate includes Elementary Mathematics and English.

4. A Student holding a Matriculation Certificate of the University of London, whether the Matriculation Examination has been taken in its ordinary form, or in the form of the School Examination (Matriculation Standard) for the School-leaving Certificate, will be entitled to exemption from the additional subjects of the previous examination, provided that the Certificate includes either French or German or Mechanics.

5. A Student who has satisfied the conditions specified in Regulation 1 will be admitted to the paper on the Greek Gospel or its substitute in Part I. of the previous examination on payment of a fee of five shillings.

6. A Student who has satisfied the conditions specified in Regulation 3 will be admitted to the paper on Paley's *Evidences* or its substitute in Part II. of the previous examination on payment of a fee of five shillings.

7. An under-graduate claiming exemption under any of the foregoing Regulations will be required to present to the Registry in his first term of residence a Certificate of statement signed by one of the Registrars of the University of London and countersigned by the Secretary of the Local Examinations and Lectures Syndicate showing that he has fulfilled the specified conditions; for the registration of such certificate or statement a fee of £1 must be paid at the same time to the Registry in respect of exemption from each part of the previous examination. Any certificate, statement, or other evidence entitling a Student to exemption from the previous examination may be accepted for registration at a time later than that above specified, provided that in every such case an additional fee of £1 shall be paid to the Registry.

VII.—PRIVILEGES AND EXEMPTIONS GRANTED BY OTHER BODIES.

[As the exemptions here set forth depend on the Regulations of other Bodies and are liable to change, Candidates are advised to make their own inquiries respecting them from the authorities of the various bodies in question.]

The following privileges and exemptions are allowed by the various bodies named to Candidates who have passed the Matriculation Examination of this University:—

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Persons over 18 years of age who have passed this examination may be recognized as uncertificated teachers. (Code of Regulations for Day Schools. Schedule I., uncertificated teachers 1, vi. (2).)

The authorities of a Training College may propose to the Board for admission as a Two-year Student any Candidate over 18 years of age on October 1st who has passed his examination within two years and six months preceding the date of admission to the Training College, viz., August 1st. (Regulations for the Training of Teachers. Regulations 12 (a), 13 (b), and Appendix A 4.)

THE INSTITUTE OF CHEMISTRY OF GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

The Council of the Institute will accept the Matriculation Examination of this University as an approved preliminary examination provided that in addition to the compulsory subjects English and Mathematics, Candidates pass at one and the same examination in Latin, and in one of the following:—French, German, Italian, any other modern language approved by the Council, Greek, or Logic.

LAW SOCIETY.

Accepts the Matriculation Examination unconditionally.

ROYAL INSTITUTE OF BRITISH ARCHITECTS.

Accepts the Matriculation Examination unconditionally.

SURVEYORS' INSTITUTION.

Accepts the Matriculation Examination unconditionally in lieu of the Preliminary Examination of the Institution.

VI.—APPENDICES.

Appendix I.

CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH EXAMINATIONS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF LONDON ARE HELD IN THE COLONIES.

Examinations for Matriculation and for the Degrees of B.D., B.A., and LL.B. are appointed by the Senate from time to time, upon the application of the Governor of any Colony desiring that one or more places in the Colony may be named as a centre or centres for one or more examinations. Every such application must be forwarded to the Senate through the Colonial Office at Home.

In order that the examinations may be conducted as nearly as possible in the same way as the examinations carried on at the University, it is essential that the following conditions and regulations be strictly observed :—

1. Each examination shall be under the superintendence of a responsible Sub-Examiner, who shall be nominated by the Governor of the Colony, and who shall be altogether independent of the authorities of any College or Institution at which such examination may be held.
2. The examinations shall be open to all Candidates who can prove to the Colonial Authorities that they are of proper age and character to be admitted. The Sub-Examiner is required to see that the Certificates produced by the Candidates are such as to satisfy the Regulations of the University; and he should be furnished with a list of the Candidates who have sent in their names to the Colonial Authorities.
3. The examination papers for each examination (which will be sent out through the Colonial Office to the Governor of the Colony) must be delivered unopened to the Sub-Examiner.
4. The examination shall be held simultaneously with the corresponding examination in London, or, in the event of accident or unavoidable delay, as soon as possible after the arrival of the mail by which the papers are transmitted; and immediately on its conclusion the Sub-Examiner shall place the answers of the Candidates in the custody of the Governor of the Colony, to be by him transmitted under seal (see 8, below), by the next mail, through the Colonial Office, to the External Registrar of the University.
5. The External Registrar, on receiving the answers, will distribute them to the Examiners, who will make a supplemental report thereon, classing the Candidates according to the Regulations, but in a list by themselves.
6. The results of each examination will be communicated, through the Colonial Office, to the Governor of the Colony in which it was held, as soon as possible after the reports of all the Examiners have been received and tabulated at the University.
7. Neither the Matriculation Examination in Botany or in Drawing, nor the Honours Examinations in Arts and Laws, nor any examinations in the Faculty of Medicine, can be held out of the United Kingdom.
8. Candidates are required to select their optional subjects and to pay their fees to the Colonial Authorities when moving those authorities to apply for the several examinations; and those authorities are requested, when forwarding the application, to inform the University of the optional subjects selected; and at the same time to transmit the fees* to the University through the Colonial Office or the Crown Agents in London (see also 4, above).

Applications for the institution of Colonial Examinations should be forwarded through the Colonial Office so as to reach the University *not less than three months* before the commencement of the examinations to which the applications refer.

Notice to Candidates.

Applications are not received from Individual Candidates. Any person desiring to be examined at a Colonial centre should apply, not to the University of London, but to the Government of the Colony wherein he resides, to ascertain (a) whether any arrangement has been already made for holding an examination in the Colony, or, if not, (b) whether the Government will make the necessary application to the Senate in order that such arrangement may be made.

Candidates desirous of entering at a Colonial centre should be careful to provide themselves with the *latest* Regulations for the examination at which they propose to present themselves, as the examinations can only be held under the rules for the time being in force for examinations at the University.

In and after 1907, Colonial Candidates will be required to pay a fee of six pounds upon every entry or re-entry to an Intermediate or First Degree Examination.

* Colonial Candidates who withdraw their names after having entered for, or who fail to present themselves at, an examination, will be required to pay the full fee upon every re-entry.

EXTRACT FROM A LETTER FROM THE UNIVERSITY OF LONDON TO THE COLONIAL OFFICE, DATED 21st JANUARY, 1907.

In the Faculty of *Arts*, entirely new regulations have been adopted by the Senate. The result of the changes is that, while every avenue of access to the B.A. Degree which was open to Candidates under the old regulations remains open to them under the new, a considerable number of additional options will now be at their disposal. These additional options largely consist of scientific subjects, and it will not always be possible, as in the past it has not always been possible, to arrange for such subjects to be taken in the Colonies; but in cases in which the Colonial Government felt itself in a position to take up these examinations as a settled policy, and with reasonable prospect of a fair number of Candidates, it is possible that arrangements might be made for extending these wider options to the Colonies.

In the Faculty of *Laws*, the Preliminary Examination has been entirely withdrawn by the Senate. This has had the effect of reverting to the former plan, by which the LL.B. Degree was obtainable by two examinations subsequently to Matriculation.

In the Faculty of *Economics and Political Science, including Commerce and Industry*, the regulations have been amended, and an abstract of them in their revised form is included in the pamphlet, page 301. These changes are not very drastic, but in this, as in all such cases, Candidates will do well to keep themselves acquainted with the latest regulations, which are always supplied gratis and post free.

Finally the fee for any Intermediate or Final Degree Examination in the Colonies is now £6.

COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

THE weekly return of births and deaths in the Colombo town for the week ended April 13, 1907, is subjoined (A).

Births.—The total births were 68. The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum was 20·1,* as against 27·7 in the preceding week and 30·1 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths were 98. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 28·9,* as against 29·2 in the previous week and 33·7 in the corresponding week of last year.

Causes of death.—1 person died from suspected cholera, 15 died from diarrhoea and dysentery; 28 from phthisis, bronchitis, and pneumonia; 7 from different kinds of fever; and 6 from infantile convulsions.

Infantile deaths.—Of the 98 total deaths, 19 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 31 in the corresponding week of the previous year.
