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MINUTE BY THE GOVERNOR.

EXAMINATIONS FOR CLERKS IN THE NATIVE LANGUAGES AND ACCOUNTS.

1. Every clerk appointed on or after 1st January, 1906, to Class III. of the Clerical Service will be required to pass an examination in the subjects hereinafter specified, within three years from the date of his appointment. The term "clerk" includes interpreters and translators.

2. Should he fail to pass in all the subjects required of him within the period of three years, his further increments and promotion will be stopped until he passes, and should he fail to pass in all those subjects within six years from the date of his appointment it will be optional with the Government to dispense with his further services.

3. The subjects of the examination will be the two vernacular languages, Sinhalese and Tamil, and the system of accounts employed in Government Offices.

4. The examination in Sinhalese and Tamil will be divided into—

- (a) Conversation and interpretation;
- (b) Reading and writing.

5. Every clerk will be required to pass in conversation and interpretation in both languages.

6. Clerks of Sinhalese, Tamil, Malay, and Moor parentage will be further required to pass in reading and writing in both languages, but not in accounts.

7. Clerks of other parentage will be required to pass in accounts instead of in reading and writing the vernaculars.

8. In the examination under section 4 (a) above the candidate will be tested in conversation so as to satisfy the examiner as to his power of understanding natives of different classes, and of making himself understood by them both in common conversation and in the course of official business. He will also be required to act as interpreter between the examiner and natives perfectly ignorant of English, the interpretation to be on matters connected with ordinary official

business. The candidate will be required in this examination to obtain a minimum of 50 per cent. of the total marks in the vernacular which has been spoken by, or familiar to him as a child, and a minimum of 33 per cent. of the total marks in the other vernacular.

9. In the examination under section 4 (b) above the candidate will be required to write an English translation of two short Sinhalese or Tamil reports from headmen, written in different running hands, to translate a short English order to a headman into Sinhalese or Tamil, and to read and translate an extract from a Sinhalese or Tamil notarial deed and from the proceedings of a Gansabhawa case put into his hands for the first time. The candidate will be required in this examination to obtain a minimum of 50 per cent. of the total marks in the vernacular which has been spoken by or familiar to him as a child, and a minimum of 33 per cent. of the total marks in the other vernacular.

10. Candidates for the examination in the system of accounts employed in Government Offices will be required to obtain a minimum of 50 per cent. of the total marks in accounts.

11. The examination will be conducted on the above system of marks, and the time allotted to each subject will be fixed by the examiners.

12. The examination will be held half yearly in Colombo, and, subject to the limitation of time in section 2 above, a candidate may take up the various subjects, if he so desire, in three sections at three separate periods: section (a) consisting of Sinhalese, section (b) of Tamil, and section (c) of accounts.

13. The expenses of all clerks attending an examination will be paid by Government at the rates provided in the Minutes on Travelling Allowance, provided the examiners certify that the candidate was, with the knowledge exhibited by him, reasonably justified in presenting himself for examination.

In Continuation of Chapter VI.

Recovery of rents, &c.—60 a. The several tolls, rents, or fees payable in respect of any public market shall be paid from time to time on demand to the Council or their lessee, or other person authorized by the Council or their lessee to receive the same.

Greater rent than authorized cannot be recovered.—60 b. Every person who shall demand or receive a greater rent, toll, or fee than that authorized to be levied by the Council shall be guilty of an offence.

Recovered by distress.—60 c. If any person liable to the payment of any rent, toll, or fee authorized as aforesaid do not pay the same when demanded, the Council or their lessee; or any person authorized by the Council or their lessee to collect the same, may levy the same by distress of all or any of the articles in the market belonging to the person liable to pay such rent, toll, or fee.

Obstruction of authorized agents.—60 d. Every person who shall resist, obstruct, hinder, or molest any person appointed by the Chairman to superintend any public market, or to collect the tolls, rents, and fees thereof, or to enforce order and cleanliness therein, or any person authorized by the Council or their lessee to collect any rent, toll, or fee, under the provisions of the by-laws in that behalf contained, whilst in the execution of their duties respectively, shall be guilty of an offence.

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COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

THE weekly return of births and deaths in the Colombo town for the week ended January 20, 1906 is subjoined (A).

Births.—The total births were 80. The birth-rate per 1,000 was 24.1,* as against 24.7 in the preceding week and 29.7 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths were 127. The death-rate per 1,000 was 38.2,* as against 37.9 in the previous week and 30.4 in the corresponding week of last year.

Causes of death.—1 person died from measles 14 died from diarrhoea and dysentery; 37 from phthisis, bronchitis, and pneumonia; 5 from different kinds of fever; and 12 from infantile convulsions.

Infantile deaths.—Of the 127 total deaths, 30 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 31 in the corresponding week of the previous year.
