## MINUTE BY THE GOVERNOR.

THE following amended Minute by the Governor, dated the 26th January, 1906, is substituted for the Minute dated 14th January, 1902, published in the Gazette of 17th January, 1902.

His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to sanction the following rates of batta and travelling expenses to European Inquirers into Deaths appointed under chapter XII., section 120, of the Criminal Procedure Code (Ordinance No. 15 of 1898):-

- European Inquirers into Deaths will in future receive a fee of Rs. 10 for every inquest held, and a further sum of 50 cents per mile when the distance travelled either way exceeds 5 miles.
- 2. In cases in which no inquest is actually held, but an inquiry is made, or a dying deposition is taken, a fee of Rs. 5 will be allowed.
- 3. Batta at the rate of Rs. 7:50 will be granted for each night the Inquirer is necessarily detained from home when on inquest duty or attending the Supreme Court to give evidence in respect to such The claim in all instances shall be supported by a certificate on honour that the detention was actually necessary.
  - 4. Batta and mileage are not grantable for the same day.

#### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir Henry Arthur Blake, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

HENRY A. BLAKE.

WHEREAS by section 28 of "The Courts Ordinance, 1889," it is amongst other things enacted that Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be holden by one of the Judges thereof, or by a Commissioner of Assize duly appointed under the provisions of the said Ordinance, for each of the Circuits into which the Island is divided, for the hearing, trying, and determining all prosecutions which shall be commenced against any person for or in respect of any crime or offence or alleged crime or offence—

For the Midland Circuit, three times at least at Kandy, and any other sessions at such other places in such Circuit as the Governor after previous consultation with the Judges, shall appoint; such sessions commencing at Kandy on March 10, on August 1, and on December 1 in every year:

And whereas it is further enacted by the said Ordinance that it shall be competent for the Governor, for sufficient reason to him appearing, after previous consultation with the Judges, to alter the dates above-mentioned and to fix any other date for the commencement of the sessions at any place:

And whereas it appears to Us expedient to alter as hereinafter ordered, the date fixed by the said Ordinance for holding the first Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court at Kandy:

Now, therefore, know Ye that We, the said Governor, for sufficient reason to Us appearing, and after previous consultation with the Judges, do hereby order that the first Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court appointed to be holden at Kandy on the Tenth day of March shall this year be holden, instead of on that date, on Wednesday, the Twenty-first day of February, 1906.

WHEREAS by section 6 of the Masters Attendant's Ordinance, No. 6 of 1865, as am inded by subsection 1 of section 3 of Ordinance No. 20 of 1905, it is enjected that the Governor may, from time to time, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, frame and establish such port rules not inconsistent with the said first-mentioned Ordinance as he may think necessary for any of the purposes in the several sub-sections of the said section specified:

And whereas the Port of Colombo was brought within the operation of the said Ordinance No. 6 of 1865, by a Proclamation dated the 6th day of January, 1866, and certain port rules were from time to time duly framed, established and promulgated for the said port for the purposes of the said Ordinance:

And whereas it is expedient that rule 12 of section VII. of the rules proclaimed on June 15, 1900, should be revoked and another rule be framed instead thereof for the said port of Colombo:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, in exercise of the powers in Us vested, and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke port rule 12 of section VII. of the rules proclaimed on June 15, 1900, and do frame and establish the port rule set forth in the schedule hereto

for the said port of Colombo: And We do hereby promulgate the said port rule to take effect as from and after the First day of March, 1906.

SCHEDULE.

Section VII.

12. All licensed boats engaged in the passenger traffic, except hotel boats and steam launches of Steamship Companies, shall be employed strictly in rotation, and the order of rotation shall be regulated by serangs appointed for that purpose by the Master Attendant.

#### ADDITIONAL RULE REFERRED TO.

In the event of the Municipal Council being satisfied that the death of an officer has been the direct result of injuries or disease contracted in the actual discharge of his duty, and without his own default, it shall be competent for the Municipal Council, if it shall see fit, to grant to the widow and children of such officer a gratuity on the following scale:—

Gratuity to widow not exceeding double that which may be granted under rule 20 published in the Government Gazette of March 30, 1900.

Gratuity to children not exceeding Rs. 10, multiplied by the total number of their years, starting from their ages at the time of their father's death and ending with fifteen years, the total gratuity not to be less than Rs. 100 or more than Rs. 500.

In the case of motherless children the gratuity may be twice the usual rate.

If the deceased does not leave a widow, and if his mother or other near relative was wholly dependent upon him for her support, the gratuity which might have been made to a widow may be made to the mother or other such dependent relative.

Where a gratuity has been awarded under this rule, no further gratuity shall be awarded under rule 20, and in the event of an award under rule 20 having already been made the amount of such award shall be deducted from the amount awarded under this rule.

I is hereby notified that from and after January 1, 1906, two officers of the Civil Medical Department will be selected annually to undergo a three months' course of tuition at the London or Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine. ## MISCELLANEOUS DEPARTMENTAL NOTICES.

### COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

THE weekly return of births and deaths in the Colombo town for the week ended January 27, 1906, is subjoined (A).

Births.—The total births were 83. The birth-rate per 1,000 was 25.0,\* as against 24.1 in the preceding week and 25.8 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths were 126. The death-rate per 1,000 was 37.9,\* as against 38.2 in the

previous week and 32 2 in the corresponding week of last year.

Causes of death.—No persons died from cholera, smallpox, or measles: 20 died from diarrhoea and dysentery; 33 from phthis s, bronchitis, and pneumonia; 9 from different kinds of fever; and 10 from infantile convulsions.

Infantile deaths.—Of the 126 total deaths, 24 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 34 in the corresponding week of the previous year.
