REVISED CLAUSE 8 OF COACHING REGULATIONS.

Naval and Military baggage, camp equipage, and provisions are carried at the following rates:—

Free Allowance.

All baggage, camp equipage, and provisions in excess of the quantity allowed free, as shown above, will be convoyed at owner's risk at 6th class ordinary goods rates if sont in lots of 2 tons or more over and above the free allowance, irrespective of whether the excess charges are to be paid by the Naval and Military authorities or by the mon themselves.

If less than 2 tons over and above the free allowance are conveyed, the charges (at owner's risk) for baggage, &c., in excess of the free allowance will be at 3rd class ordinary goods rates on actual weight, or as for 2 tens at 6th class ordinary goods rates, whichever is lower.

These reduced rates are granted subject to the conditions that the assistance of the forces is given in loading and unloading baggage, &c., and that when baggage, &c., between Colombo and Up-country stations is loaded into or unloaded from

railway vehicles opposite the Echelon Barracks, Colombo, the rates charged for the same shall be as between Wharf Goods Station and the Up-country Station concorned.

Baggage, &c., preceding or following Naval or Military parties and belonging to those parties will be treated as if it actually accompanied the parties, and will be subject to the reductions and conditions above-mentioned.

The reduced rates apply to baggage, camp equipage, and provisions proper, and not to field guns, Military wagons and carts, and ammunition, which are charged for at ordinary rates.

Addition to Clause 17 of Coaching Regulations.

Roturn tickets issued to sailers and soldiers (and their wives and children) on warrants are available on the return journey without any limitation of time.

Addition to Clause 26 of Coaching Regulations.

Single journey tickets are issued to sailors and soldiers (and their wives and children) on production of warrants, at half return fares.

RULES.

- 1. No person licensed to carry on the trade of a butcher in the planting district of Ragalla shall slaughter cattle and sheep at any place other than the slaughter-house at Ragalla estate.
- 2. The exposure shed adjoining the Ragalla Police Station is hereby appointed as the spot in which the licensed butchers of the planting district of Ragalla shall, as required by section 12, sub-section (1), of the Ordinance No. 9 of 1893, expose for public view all cattle intended for slaughter for a period of not less than twenty-four hours immediately preceding the time of slaughter.
- 3. No cattle or sheep shall be slaughtered at the said slaughter-house except on such days and between such hours as may be determined by the Assistant Government Agent, Nuwara Eliya, notice of which shall be posted at the said slaughter-house, nor until after they have been inspected and approved of by the Medical Officer, Uda Pussellawa, as fit to be slaughtered for human food.
 - 4. Cattle rejected as unfit for slaughter shall be immediately removed.
- 5. The said Medical Officer may prohibit the slaughter of any animal, notwithstanding that it has been approved as aforesaid, if it should before slaughter be found to be diseased or otherwise unfit to be slaughtered for human food.
 - 6. If on any animal which has been approved as aforesaid being slaughtered the carcases shall appear diseased or unfit for human food, the said Medical Officer shall cause the most to be immediately destroyed or so disposed of as to prevent its being exposed for sale or used for human food.
 - 7. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall not permit the slaughter of any cattle which have not been approved as aforesaid as fit to be slaughtered for human food or the slaughter of which the said Medical Officer has prohibited as provided for by rule 5.
 - 8. No person shall remove from the slaughter-house, except under the directions of the said Medical Officer, any meat which the latter has declared to be unfit for human food.
 - 9. The fee for slaught shall be fifty cents for each head of cattle and twenty-five cents for each head of
 - 10. The person in charge of laughter-house shall ep a register in the form annexed of all cattle brought to the ghter-house.

COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

THE weekly return of births and deaths in the Colombo town for the week ended February 17, 1906, is subjoined (A).

Births.—The total births were 125. The birth-rate per 1,000 was 37.6,* as against 36.4 in the preceding week and 22·1 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths were 108. The death-rate per 1,000 was 32·5,* as against 40·3 in the

previous week and 32.5 in the corresponding week of last year.

Causes of death.—No persons died from cholera, smallpox, or measles 13 died from diarrhea and dysentery; 27 from phthisis, bronchitis, and pneumonia; 10 from different kinds of fever; and 5 from infantile convulsions.

Infantile deaths.—Of the !08 total deaths, 23 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 25 in the corresponding week of the previous year.
