IN the Name of His Majesty EDWARD THE SEVENTH, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir HENRY ARTHUR BLAKE, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

HENRY A. BLAKE.

WHEREAS by section 28 of "The Courts Ordinance, 1889," it is amongst other things enacted that Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be holden by one of the Judges thereof, or by a Commissioner of Assize duly appointed under the provisions of the said Ordinance, for each of the Circuits into which the Island is divided for the hearing, trying, and determining all prosecutions which shall be commenced against any person for or in respect of any crime or offence or alleged crime or offence—

For the Western Circuit, four times at least in each year at Colombo, and such other places in such Circuit, as the Governor, after previous consultation with the Judges, shall appoint; such Sessions commencing at Colombo on January 10, on March 20, on July 10, and on October 10 in every year:

And whereas it appears to Us expedient to order that a Criminal Session of the Supreme Court should be holden, on the day hereinafter mentioned, at Negombo, a place included within the said Western Circuit :

Now therefore, know Ye that We, the said Governor, for sufficient reasons to Us appearing, and after previous consultation with the Judges of the Supreme Court, do order and appoint that a Criminal Session of the Supreme Court shall be holden at Negombo, on or about Monday, the Twenty-sixth day of August, One thousand Nine hundred and Seven.

20. The shareholders shall not out the bund nor block up the spill of their tank without the permission of the Assistant Government Agent, the Chief Irrigation Inspector, or his Assistant, nor shall they carry out any work upon the bund, spill, or channels contrary to the orders of any of these officers.

SCHEDULE REFERRED TO.

(1) For rule No. 2 of section VII. of the said rules dated the 15th June, 1900, the following rule is substituted, namely:—

2. Tindals or persons in charge of boats other than those actually engaged in landing or shipping coal shall not allow their boats to communicate with the shore within the limits of the port, except at the authorized jetties within the Customs premises, unless specially authorized by the Master Attendant or the Collector of Customs. No tindal or person in charge shall allow his boat to land or ship cargo of any description or embark or disembark any class or description of passengers except at such jetties as may be from time to time set apart for that purpose by the Master Attendant or Collector of Customs.

(2) There shall be added to the rules in the said section the following rules, namely:—

20. It shall be the duty of every tindal or person in charge of a licensed boat to see that his boat when under weigh is manned by the full complement of crew specified in the license.

21. The tindal or person in charge of a licensed boat shall not allow his boat to be used for any purposes other than those specified in the license.

22. Every tindal or person in charge of a licensed boat shall keep painted on a conspicuous part of the boat the number of passengers which the boat is licensed to carry, and shall not allow a greater number of passengers to be carried or to embark in such boat.

23. Tindals or persons in charge of cargo boats and coal boats shall not allow their boats to lie alongside any vessel within the port in such a way as to obstruct the approaches to and from the gangway ladders.

WHEREAS by section 3 of "The Plant Pests Ordinance, 1907," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Executive Council, by Proclamation to be for that purpose published in the *Government Gazette*, to publish schedules specifying the insects, parasitic plants, or fungi which are declared to be pests for the purposes of this Ordinance, and the measures which it shall be within the power of any Board as hereinafter constituted to require to be taken for the prevention, arrest, or eradication of such pests:

Now Know Ye that We, in exercise of the power in Us vested by the said Ordinance, do hereby declare that the insects named in the first column of the Schedule appended hereto shall be pests for the purposes of the above-named Ordinance. And We do further declare that the measures which it shall be within the power of any Board constituted under the said Ordinance to require to be taken for the eradication of the said insects shall be the measures specified in the second column of the said schedule.

WITH reference to the Proclamation dated July 12, 1907, declaring that the red coconut beetle and the black coconut beetle are pests for the purposes of "The Plant Pests Ordinance, 1907," and reciting the measures which the Plant Pests Board may require to be taken for the eradication of the pests named, it is hereby notified that the Plant Pests Board established for the Revenue District of Batticaloa has been authorized on behalf of Government to pay within the area affected by the recent cyclone a reward of 25 cents for every entire tree destroyed before October 31, 1907, payable as to 10 cents on the destruction of the head and cabbage of the tree before October 31, 1907, and as to 15 cents for the destruction of the trunk.

Fallen or dead trees, of which the heads and cabbages have not been destroyed by October 31, 1907, will be treated as trunks, and will be paid for at the rate of 15 cents only each.

Fallen or dead trees which have not been destroyed before August 31, 1908, will be destroyed by Government, and the cost of such destruction will be recovered from the owners.

The above-mentioned rewards will be paid upon certificates furnished after inspection by persons to whom this duty may be delegated by the Board.

“THE DOG REGISTRATION ORDINANCE, 1901.”

THE following by-laws made by the proper authority, to wit, the Chairman of the Local Board of Jaffna, under section 5 of the Ordinance No. 25 of 1901, for the town of Jaffna, in substitution for those made by the Government Agent of the Northern Province and dated March 4, 1904, are hereby published for general information.

By-laws under Section 5 of Ordinance No. 25 of 1901.

1. A registration fee of 25 cents per annum shall be paid upon each dog kept within the Jaffna Local Board limits.
2. Such registration fee shall be due on and after April 1, and shall be paid in advance before May 1 in each year.
3. To facilitate the recovery of such registration fee the occupier of every house within the Local Board limits shall, on or before March 1 in each year, furnish to an officer authorized by the Chairman to demand the same a list in the form in schedule annexed of dog or dogs kept in such a house, and the names of the owners thereof.
4. Every dog within the Jaffna Local Board limits shall at all times wear a collar stamped with a number by the Local Board. On payment of the registration fee on any dog the Chairman shall, unless the owner provides his own collar to be stamped, furnish the owner with a stamped collar to be worn by such dog on payment of a fee of 25 cents.
5. Every inhabitant within the Local Board limits becoming possessed of any unregistered dog or dogs after the furnishing of the list referred to in by-law 3 shall

forthwith furnish the officer appointed by the Chairman mentioned in the said by-law with an additional list of such dog or dogs, and the owner of such dog or dogs shall become liable to the registration fee for the current year within fifteen days after the list required by this by-law becomes due.

6. It shall be lawful for the officer appointed by the Chairman to require the production of any dog for which registration is applied for, and to decline to issue a certificate of registration until it is produced.

7. It shall be lawful for the Chairman to refuse to issue a certificate of registration or to cancel a certificate already issued for any dog, which in his opinion is so maimed or diseased as to be unfit to live, or which is habitually ill-treated or continually neglected by its owner.

8. The owner of every dog for which a certificate has been refused or cancelled shall, on being noticed to do so, produce the dog at the house or office of the officer appointed by the Chairman at a time to be stated in the notice and deliver it to the said officer, and every such dog may be destroyed or otherwise disposed of as the Chairman shall think fit.

MISCELLANEOUS DEPARTMENTAL NOTICES.

COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

THE weekly return of births and deaths in the Colombo town for the week ended July 6, 1907, is subjoined (A).

Births.—The total births were 85. The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum was 25·1,* as against 15·9 in the preceding week and 22·3 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths were 104. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 30·7,* as against 30·4 in the previous week and 55·4 in the corresponding week of last year.

Causes of death.—No persons died from cholera, smallpox, or measles; 16 died from diarrhoea and dysentery; 11 from phthisis; 14 from bronchitis and pneumonia; 10 from different kinds of fever; and 11 from infantile convulsions.

Infantile deaths.—Of the 104 total deaths, 27 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 47 in the corresponding week of the previous year.

NOTICES CALLING FOR TENDERS.

SEALED Tenders, marked on the envelopes "Tender for supply of Ballast to the Railway at Galgamuwa for the year 1908," will be received up to 12 noon on Tuesday, August 13, 1907, from persons willing to contract for the supply of ballast as follows.

2. The contractor shall supply all labour and materials necessary, exclusive of stone crusher and engine, which will be supplied and worked by Government, who will also provide a narrow gauge siding and tip wagons for bringing stone from the working face to the side of the crusher.

3. The contractor shall take upon himself all risks, including theft, and shall be responsible for looking after all materials, tools, &c.

4. The ballast shall be composed of clean gneiss rock, broken so as to pass through a 1½-inch ring, and shall be taken out of the quarry where pointed out by the Engineer and deposited in wagons, or stacked alongside the main line siding, as may be directed, so as to be conveniently picked up by the ballast train.

5. In getting the ballast the contractor must remove all top dirt at the working face, and on no account must any dirt be mixed with the ballast.

6. The contractor must undertake to supply a minimum quantity of ballast amounting to 500 cubic yards per month, and he must be prepared to supply a further quantity of 200 cubic yards per month if asked to do so by the Engineer, who will give a fortnight's notice of his intention to remove the extra quantity.

7. The expression "Engineer" shall mean the Engineer of Way and Works, Ceylon Government Railway, or any representative authorized by him to superintend the work. Should it appear at any time to the Engineer that the contractor is not performing the work in a satisfactory manner, or is not using sufficient diligence in carrying on the work, the Engineer shall have the power to take possession of the whole of the works, and the contractor shall be held to have totally failed in his contract, and shall forfeit the amount of his deposit to the General Manager of the Railway.

8. Payments shall be made to the contractor monthly by the General Manager for the quantity of ballast removed.

9. The contractor in sending in his tender shall state the price per cubic yard of ballast, which shall include everything required for carrying out the work, such as labour, tools, or powder required for blasting.

10. Tenders must be submitted in duplicate, the original being forwarded to the General Manager of the Railway and the duplicate direct to the Hon. the

Controller of Revenue, both being required to be forwarded at the same time.

11. The tenders are to be made on forms which will be supplied upon application at the office of the General Manager, and no tender will be considered unless it is furnished on the recognized form.

12. A deposit of Rs. 25 will be required before any form of tender is issued; and should any person decline to enter into the contract and bond after he has tendered, or should he fail to furnish the required security, such deposit of Rs. 25 will be forfeited to the Crown. All other deposits will be returned upon signature of a contract.

13. The security required will be Rs. 100 in cash, and any further information required can be obtained at the office of the General Manager.
