SIR,—I HAVE the honour to acknowledge the receipt of Sir H. Blake's Despatch No. 384 of the 2nd of July, enclosing a copy of his Farewell Address to the Legislative Council of Ceylon.

2. In this interesting Review Sir H. Blake traces the progress of the Colony from 1904-7 during the three and a half years of his government.

3. It is a record of hard work, accomplished under rather exceptional difficulties owing to changes of staff and the lamented deaths of such able officers as Sir Alexander Ashmore and Mr. Wace; and the result has been substantial improvement in various branches of the Administration and continued prosperity of the community as a whole.

4. In Sir Henry Blake Ceylon has had the benefit of an able and public-spirited Governor of unusually wide experience, and now that he is finally retiring from active service, after having been a Colonial Governor for the long term of over twenty-three years, it is right that on behalf of His Majesty's Government I should express appreciation of the value of his services in East and West alike, noting that his retirement in the fulness of years has been well earned by hard and successful work under varying conditions of climate, country, and race.

5. A copy of this Despatch will be communicated to Sir Henry Blake, and I will ask you to give it publicity in the *Government Gazette*.

Rules framed under the Irrigation Ordinance No. 16 of 1906 for the Batticaloa District of the Eastern Province to be observed by Proprietors and Cultivators of Irrigable Lands.

Interpretating clause.

Superinten. dence.

Payment of Irrigation Headmen.

Tanks

The term "Superintendent" when it occurs in these rules refers to the Irrigation Headman appointed by the Director of Irrigation to supervise the cultivation over a tract or series of tracts of fields. The Vaddai Vidane is the minor Irrigation Headman in charge of a subdivision of the above tracts or series of tracts.

2. The Vaddai Vidanes who shall be elected in the manner provided in the 13th section of the Ordinance shall have the entire supervision of all works of irrigation and paddy cultivation within their respective divisions, subject to instructions from and the control of the Irrigation Engineer in charge of the works. They shall enforce the following rules, and bring all breaches of the same before the Village Council for adjudication. The Vaddai Vidanes shall be supervised, when necessary, by Superin-tendents elected as prescribed by the Ordinance. Both the Vaddai Vidanes and the Superintendents shall be liable for any perfect of dura prepared to the catiofication of the Loring Target neglect of duty proved to the satisfaction of the Irrigation Engineer in charge as for a breach of rules.

The Vaddai Vidanes shall be entitled to receive from the cultivators one marakal of paddy for each avanum sown as Vaddai Vidane's share, and when a Superintendent has been appointed one marakal per avanum in addition shall be set apart for Superintendent's share ; if more than one Superintendent have been appointed, this share shall be divided porportionately between them.

Village tanks or other minor works shall be repaired or improved by all the proprietors whenever the majority shall decide on doing so. The work to be performed by each shall be in proportion to the extent of land dependent on the tank held by him.

5. But should the majority of the proprietors at any time refuse to consent to the repair or improvements of any-tanks, any proprietor may complain of such refusal to the Irrigation Engineer in charge of the works, who shall determine whether or not the work shall be proceeded with.

6. All channels or water-courses shall be kept open by all the proprietors in proportion to their respective shares.

7. Should any new channel be required inside the field of some of the proprietors, and should the majority of the proprietors admit or the Irrigation Engineer in charge of the works decide that it is necessary, it shall be made by all the proprietors interested in proportion to their respective shares.

8. Should any new channel be required outside the field of some of the proprietors, and should the majority of the proprietors or the Irrigation Engineer in charge of the works decide that it is necessary, it shall be executed by the joint labour of all or by the proprietors interested as may be prescribed by the Irrigation Engineer in charge of the works. The channel will be set out and the pegs put in under the orders of the Irrigation Engineer in charge.

9. No person shall widen or lessen the width of or obstruct any channel or water-course except by leave of the Vaddai Vidane, subject to appeal to the Irrigation Engineer in charge of the works.

10. No gap in any permanent dam shall be allowed to be cut, but wooden pipes (koddi) shall be inserted where necessary by the Vaddai Vidane, the cost of the insertion and upkeep of such pipes shall be borne by the owners of all lands dependent on the outlet in proportion to their respective shares, and any person refusing shall not only become liable for a breach of rules, but the Vaddai Vidane shall sue him for the share of expense due by him.

11. No new dam to divert water from any customary dam shall be constructed, nor shall any upper dam be broken down to make up for a deficiency of water below without the consent of the Irrigation Engineer in charge of the works. Should any dam be necessary for any new land, the Irrigation Engineer in charge of the works may order its construction and determine by whom it should be made.

12. No person shall in any way alter or injure any ridge (varampu) or boundary between two fields in the same tract. On information that such alteration or injury has been effected the Vaddai Vidane shall immediately proceed to the spot with witnesses and restore the dam to its original state, but this can only be done within eight days of the commission of the offence.

13. As the season for cultivation approaches, whether it be munmari or pinmari, a meeting of the Village Council shall be convened by the Irrigation Engineer in charge of the works to determine on what date cultivation shall be commenced and what description of grain shall be sown. The Vaddai Vidane should give due notice to all concerned by beat of tom-tom or otherwise of the date agreed upon at such meetings, and all proprietors and cultivators shall be bound to commence the cultivation of their fields on that day.

14. Each proprietor or mullaikaran shall deliver to the Vaddai Vidane not later than on the day fixed for the commencement of the cultivation a list of cultivators to be employed in his field. Cultivators guilty of neglect or default in respect to their cultivations without sufficient reason shall be liable to such penalty as the Village Council may decide.

15. Should any proprietor neglect or refuse to cultivate hisshare, the Vaddai Vidane shall submit the matter to the Village Council, and the Village Council may allow such to be cultivated by any other proprietor or cultivator, who shall not, however be liable to pay any ground share. But such persons shall be liable to furnish labour for any work to be carried out under these rules for that season's cultivation to the same extent as if he were the proprietor of the field thus apportioned to him.

16. No person shall be exempted from contributing his quota of labour for any work to which he is liable under these rules on the ground that he has not cultivated for the season unless his field may have been cultivated by some other person under rule 15 and then only if such quota labour be due for that season only.

17. Whenever it occurs that there is not sufficient water in any tank for the irrigation of the whole of that tract dependent thereon, the Irrigation Engineer in charge of the works shall, When Irrigation Engineer in charge of the work may compel repair of tanks, Channels:

Prevention of trespass by black cattle. after consultation with the Village Council, decide how much of that tract shall be cultivated, the cultivators generally shall cultivate such portion or portions without reference to ownership in the same proportion to the extent cultivated as the whole share of each bears to the whole tract dependent on the tank.

18. Should a portion of any tract ripened before the rest by the cultivation of seeneddi paddy or from any other cause, the cultivator shall be allowed to reap and store his crop, but he shall still continue to watch the field and preserve the fence until the crops of the remainder of the Vaddai have been reaped and stored. But should any shareholder cultivate any description of paddy other than what should be sown as decided under rule.13, and should his crops on that account or on account of default in sowing in proper time not ripen till after the reaping of the crops grown in accordance with the decision arrived at under rule 13, the other cultivators shall not be bound to continue watching the field still such cultivator's crop is ripened.

19. The fence round the whole Vaddai shall be measured by the Vaddai Vidane within three days of sowing being completed, and by him apportioned to each proprietor or to his tenant in proportion to the extent of his field without regard to whether the fence adjoins his field or not.

20. Each shareholder shall finish his fence which shall be constructed of stakes (katikals) within the time fixed by the Vaddai Vidane and shall erect a watch hut (purai) in the centre of his portion of fence, and shall keep both fence and watch hut in repair, shall keep regular watch, and the mullaikarans should accompany the Superintendents with *sul* lights on their rounds at night until the Vaddai Vidane announces that the crop of the whole Vaddai has been reaped and stored.

21. After the reaping is over the Vaddai Vidane shall order the removal of the fence, and shall cause the fence sticks to be heaped by the cultivators in such place as they may select. No one shall remove the fence sticks without the consent of the Vaddai Vidane.

22. The threshing-floor shall be cleared and fenced with a strong fence of stakes by the joint labour of all the cultivators for stacking paddy there, and the cultivators shall take their turn in watching the stacks.

23. Before the removal of paddy from the threshing-floor the Vaddai Vidane shall cause the cultivators to stack straw at the rate of fifteen bundles per avanum of land cultivated in such places as the podies or mullaikarans may determine, this straw to be used for feeding the cattle used in the cultivation of the land for the next crop and for no other purpose.

24. The distribution of water to the various vaddai and fields shall be regulated by the Vaddai Vidanes, provided it shall be competent to the Irrigation Engineer in charge of the works to order a different apportionment if necessary.

25. If any person shall wilfully prevent water from flowing to the field below his own, or shall obstruct the flow of surplus water from the field on a higher level, or shall in any other way interfere with the general distribution of water, the Vaddai Vidane shall proceed to the spot with witnesses and open the gaps (vakkadai) or remove the obstruction himself, and no person shall issue, distribute, cut off, divert, or use the water in any manner except in accordance with his instructions.

26. If owing to a drought or any unexpected accident to a dam or channel the quantity of water available be found insufficient for the season, the full volume of water shall be allowed to each subdivision for a limited time in turn, and the Irrigation Engineer in charge of the works shall determine in what order and for what time each subdivision shall be watered.

27. After cultivation has once commenced as fixed by rule 13 no cattle shall be allowed into the vaddai, except cattle engaged in ploughing or trampling the fields.

28. At the commencement of each cultivation season the Irrigation Engineer in charge, after consultation with Village Council, shall decide where the buffaloes of each village shall be driven to for pasture, and they shall be kept in the places so designated till the cultivation is over.

29. Black cattle may be folded at night in the neighbourhood of cultivation provided they are secured in such a manner as to prevent their breaking loose, and they be grazed during the day in the neighbourhood of cultivation provided that they are carefully tended whilst so grazing.

30. The owners and cultivators of all new land which may have been or may hereafter be bought from the Crown shall become liable for their joint share of labour when called on by the Vaddai Vidane of the division wherein their lands may be in like manner with the proprietors of old lands. They shall be entitled to secure water from any of the channels that may be most advantageous to their lands, and shall in all respects enjoy the privileges and rights that belong to the owners of new lands.

31. Trees or jungle likely to occasion damage by giving cover to wild animals or otherwise shall be removed by the proprietors and cultivators of the land whereon they may be growing when ordered by the Vaddai Vidane to do so.

32. Paths between cultivated places shall be kept open by the cultivators according to the limits prescribed by ancient custom and in proportion to their respective shares.

33. No paddy shall be removed from the threshing-floor at the termination of the harvest until the shares due to the Headmen under rule 3 and the wages due to all persons engaged in the harvest and the hire of cattle have been paid.

34. All previous rules are cancelled.

35. A Village Council may be convened by the Irrigation Engineer whenever he considers it desirable to do so for the purpose of obtaining their adviceor assistance in any matter concerning the welfare of the cultivation.

36. These rules are to be enforced by the officer in charge of the works and such Irrigation Officers or Headmen as may from time to time be appointed, and breaches of the rules are punishable as provided in the Irrigation Ordinance, No. 16 of 1906.

1. The occupant shall be considered as a tenant-at-will and shall be bound within one month after notice in writing by the Government Agent of the Central Province to give up entire possession of the said land to Government.

2. No building shall be erected on the said premises without the permission in writing of the Government Agent, and on such conditions as shall then be imposed; any building erected without such permission shall be deemed the property of the Crown.


3. The said occupant is hereby allowed to occupy the said premises on paymen^t of the annual rent of Rs. 2 per acre in advance on or before the 31st day of December in each year and of water-rate at the rate of Rs. 2.96 per acre and irrigation interest at the rate of 65 cents, such rates to be paid to the Assistant Government Agent, Nuwara Eliya, on or before the 30th day of June in each year.

4. The occupant shall have no claim against the Crown for compensation on any account whatever.

5. The occupant shall not assign, sub-let, or part with the benefit of this agreement , without the previous consent in writing of the grantor.

6. In the case of the occupant not performing any of the conditions above specified or any part thereof, the Government Agent of the Central Province shall be at liberty forthwith to enter upon the said premises and re-possess the same.

7. The grantor hereby covenants and agrees that the occupant shall have the option of purchasing the said premises when put up for sale at the rate of Rs. 26 per acre, provided that the occupant agrees to pay water-rate at the rate of Rs. 2.96 per acre for ten years from the date of purchase and irrigation interest at the rate of 65 cents in perpetuity.

Regulations for the Registration of Medical Practitioners.

The following diplomas and certificates will be entertained by the Council of the Ceylon Medical College in applications by persons to obtain certificates under section 13 of Ordinance No. 2 of 1905 :---

- (a) License in Medicine and Surgery (Ceylon).
- (b) Any medical qualification which is capable of being registered under the Medical Acts of Great Britain and Ireland, provided that this qualification has been obtained from one of the examining bodies of Great Britain or Ireland.

(c) The Medical Degrees and the License in Medicine and Surgery of-

- (1) Madras University.
- (2) Calcutta University.
- (3) Bombay University.
- (4) Allahabad University.
- (5) Punjab University.

(d) The Medical Degrees of the Universities of the British Colonies.

(e) In the case of persons who do not hold a Diploma or License to practise Medicine and Surgery, applications must be supported (1) by certificates from two practitioners already registered under the Ordinance and qualified for registration by possession of a Degree or Diploma which is accepted as a qualification for registration to the effect that the applicant possesses the requisite knowledge and skill for efficient practise as a Medical Practitioner; (2) by an affidavit that the applicant has practised Medicine and Surgery in Ceylon for not less than ten years. Applications by such persons will only be entertained if made on or before the 31st December, 1907, and certificates under section 13 of the Medical Registration Ordinance will only be granted in cases where the Council is satisfied that it is desirable in the interests of the public the same should be given.

MISCELLANEOUS DEPARTMENTAL NOTICES.

COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

THE weekly return of births and deaths in the Colombo town for the week ended August 17, 1907, is subjoined (A).

Births.—The total births were 88. The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum was 26.0,* as against 20.7 in the preceding week and 26.5 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths were 117. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 34.5,* as against 29.5 in the previous week and 38.5 in the corresponding week of last year.

Causes of death.—No persons died from cholera, smallpox, or measles; 13 died from diarrhœa and dysentery; 19 from phthisis; 15 from bronchitis and pneumonia; 8 from different kinds of fever; and 10 from infantile convulsions.

Infantile deaths.—Of the 117 total deaths, 31 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 33 in the corresponding week of the previous year.
