## GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS.

## Goods Rates on the Northern Line.

W ITH reference to the Notification published in Government Gazette No. 6,100 of January 19, 1906, the following additional concessions made by HIS EXCELLENCY THE OFFICER ADMINISTERING THE GOVERNMENT, with the advice of the Executive Council, under section 5 of the Ceylon Railways Ordinance, No. 9 of 1902, will come into operation from Monday, September 2, 1907:—

- 1. In order to obtain advantage of the special reduced rates for 4-ton lots from stations in the Jaffna peninsula to Colombo, it will not be necessary for the consignments to be only from one consignor to one consignee.
- 2. Returned empty gunny bags in which copra has been transported by rail for stations in the Jaffna peninsula to Colombo will be conveyed at the special reduced rate of Rs. 10 per ton (50 cents per cwt.), subject to the usual conditions governing the transport of returned empties.
- 3. As an experiment for six months, the rate from Colombo to stations in the Jaffna peninsula for mixed consignments of 2nd, 3rd, and 4th class goods in minimum consignments of 4 tons will be reduced to 8 cents per ton per mile throughout, viz., the ordinary 6th class rate.
- 4. As an experiment for six months, the rate for grain and tobacco from Vavuniya to Jaffna in 4-ton lots will be reduced to the ordinary 6th class rate of 8 cents per ton per mile, viz., Rs. 7:37.

## Belgium Extradition Order in Council, 1907.

At the Court of Buckingham Palace, the 6th day of July, 1907.

### Present:

The King's Most Excellent Majesty.

Lord President. Lord Chamberlain. Lord Shuttleworth.. Mr. McKenna. Sir W. Brampton Gurdon. Mr. Eugene Wason. Mr. R. Spence Watson.

W HEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1906, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any Foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such Foreign State; and that His Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of His Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the Twenty-ninth day of October, One thousand Nine hundred and One, between Us and His Majesty the King of the Belgians, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, in the case of which Treaty the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1895, were applied by Order in Council of the Sixth March, One thousand Nine hundred and Two:

And whereas a Supplementary Convention was concluded on the Fifth day of March, One thousand Nine hundred and Seven, between Us and His Majesty the King of the Belgians, for the purpose of completing Article XIV. of the said Treaty of the Twenty-ninth October, One thousand Nine hundred and One, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Supplementary Convention is in the terms following:—

The Government of His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, and the Government of His Majesty the King of the Belgians, having deemed it necessary to complete Article XIV. of the Treaty of Extradition between Great Britain and Belgium of the 29th October, 1901, relative to the application of the stipulations of the Treaty to the extra-European Colonies and Foreign Possessions of the two States, the undersigned, duly authorized to that effect by their respective Governments, have agreed as follows:—

## ARTICLE I.

In the relations of each of the High Contracting Parties with the extra-European Colonies and Foreign Possessions of the other, the periods fixed by Articles IV., paragraph 1, and V. of the Treaty of the 29th October, 1901, shall be extended as follows:—

1. A fugitive criminal arrested under the terms of Article IV. shall be discharged in the dominions of His Brittanic Majesty if, within the period of two months from the date of his arrest, a request for his extradition shall not have been made by the Government of the requisitioning State.

The fugitive criminal may be discharged in the dominions of His Majesty the King of the Belgians if, within the same period, a request for his extradition has not been made by the Government of the requisitioning State; he shall be released if, within seven days following the expiration of this period, the warrant issued by the competent authority shall not have been communicated to the fugitive criminal.

2. The person arrested shall be set at liberty if, within the three months counting from the date of arrest, sufficient evidence in support of the demand for extradition shall not have been produced.

## ARTICLE II.

3 The present Convention shall be ratified and the ratifications shall be exchanged at London as soon as possible. It shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the laws

of the High Contracting Parties, and it shall have the same force and duration as the Treaty of Extradition to which it relates.

In witness whereof the undersigned have signed the present Convention, and have affixed their seals thereto.

And whereas the ratifications of the said Supplementary Convention were exchanged at London on the Seventeenth day of April, One thousand Nine hundred and Seven.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to him by the said Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1906, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Nineteenth day of July, One thousand Nine hundred and Seven, the said Acts shall apply in the case of Belgian, under and in accordance with the said Treaty as supplemented by the said Convention above set forth.

Provided always that the operation of the said Acts shall be and remain suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as an act of the Parliament of Canada, being Part I. of chapter 155 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," shall continue in force there, and no longer.

## Regulations for the Registration of Medical Practitioners.

The following diplomas and certificates will be entertained by the Council of the Ceylon Medical College in applications by persons to obtain certificates under section 13 of Ordinance No. 2 of 1905:—

- (a) License in Medicine and Surgery (Ceylon).
- (b) Any medical qualification which is capable of being registered under the Medical Acts of Great Britain and Ireland, provided that this qualification has been obtained from one of the examining bodies of Great Britain or Ireland
- (c) The Medical Degrees and the License in Medicine and Surgery of-
  - (1) Madras University.
  - (2) Calcutta University.(3) Bombay University.
  - (3) Bombay University.(4) Allahabad University.
  - (5) Punjab University.
- (d) The Medical Degrees of the Universities of the British Colonies.
- (e) In the case of persons who do not hold a Diploma or License to practise Medicine and Surgery, applications must be supported (1) by certificates from two practitioners already registered under the Ordinance and qualified for registration by possession of a Degree or Diploma which is accepted as a qualification for registration to the effect that the applicant possesses the requisite knowledge and skill for efficient practise as a Medical Practitioner; (2) by an affidavit that the applicant has practised Medicine and Surgery in Ceylon for not less than ten years. Applications by such persons will only be entertained if made on or before the 31st December, 1907, and certificates under section 13 of the Medical Registration Ordinance will only be granted in cases where the Council is satisfied that it is desirable in the interests of the public the same should be given.

IT is hereby notified that an examination under the Regulations of August 26, 1891, for gentlemen in the Civil Service will be held in the Council Chamber on Monday, October 21, 1907, at 10.30 A.M., and following days, namely:—

Only the Police Magistrates who are not members of the Bar or of the Civil Service and those candidates who have been specially nominated by the Governor will be admitted to the examination under the Minute of December 12, 1898.

The examination in the Criminal Procedure Code prescribed under the Minute of March 26, 1900, for officers in the Fourth Class of the Civil Service, will also be held on October 22, 1907, as well as at the Kandy Kachcheri.

It is also hereby notified that candidates will be given the option of using Codes in the examinations in the Criminal Procedure Code and the Penal Code; they must, however, state when sending in their names what their decision is, as the character of the papers set for those who use Codes and those who do not will be different.

Candidates are required to send in their names not later than September 30, 1907.

Gentlemen in the Civil Service should state in their applications whether they are presenting themselves for the first or second examination, whether they intend taking up Sinhalese or Tamil, and whether they wish to have the option of using Codes.

## VITAL STATISTICS.

## VITAL STATISTICS OF TOWNS IN CEYLON.

## Report of the Registrar-General for the Month of July, 1907.

The object of this report—the first of a series to be issued monthly—is to deal with the Vital Statistics of the several towns of the Island proclaimed under sections 31 to 36 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1895. The Registrars of these towns are qualified medical men. No death occurring there is registered unless the cause is ascertained by the Registrar's personal inspection of the deceased or certified by a qualified medical man in attendance on the deceased; and no dead body is buried or cremated without registration being effected. This system, commenced on the 1st January, 1893, in Colombo Town under the Ordinance No. 20 of 1891, and gradually extended till it now embraces 29 towns, is unique in the East and has few parallels in the West.

- 2. We have now complete and trustworthy information as to the mortality in the towns and its causes, and the figures deserve to be considered separately from the statistics of the rest of the Island, in which the registration is not so effective nor the causes of death certified by experts. A separate treatment of the town statistics, especially if made by monthly reports, should be of use to all interested in the promotion of the public health. No information connected with Vital Statistics is of greater value than that obtained by the registration of the causes of death. Where it has been made accurately for a series of years, you have public documents from which may be derived an accurate knowledge of the comparative prevalence of various diseases, the localities in which they prevail, the sex, age, and condition of life which they attack. You can compare the mortality from each cause in successive years, and test in some measure the effect of sanitary interference, of climatic differences, and of other agencies by which the prevalence of diseases may be affected. It is thus an invaluable aid to the medical practitioner and the sanitary reformer.
- 3. Table I. in the Appendix shows the population at the last decennial Census of 1901 and the present estimated population, and the births and the deaths registered during the month, their rates, and the infantile mortality in each town.
- 4. The estimated population of the 29 towns is 460,532, or about one-ninth of the total population of the Island. The population of Colombo (176,724) is nearly two-hirds of the population of all the other towns together (283,808).
- 5. The births registered in the towns numbered 1,065—of which 570 were of males and 495 of females—and corresponded to an annual birth-rate per 1,000 of 27·23. The highest birth-rate for the month was in Batticaloa (55 64), and the lowest in Hatton and Dikoya (3·29). In the other towns the birth-rate ranged from 50·32 in Jaffna to 7·31 in Kalpitiya. Colombo town records a rate of 22·12.
- 6. The number of deaths registered was 1,342—of which 765 were of males and 577 of females—and corresponded to a an annual death-rate of 32.50. 466 of the total deaths, or more than one-third occurred in hospitals (with 12 deaths in jails), and exaggerated the normal mortality of the towns.
- 7. I have for the first time given (in Table I.) the corrected death-rates in addition to the crude death-rates. By a corrected rate is meant the rate calculated for the population of each town on the basis that its age- and sex-constitution is the same as for the Island, and excluding the deaths of estate coolies, who must be regarded as foreigners in the towns. The corrected rate should furnish a more satisfactory test of the comparative health of towns than the crude rate hitherto given. I am unable to give the corrected rates for "Hatton and Dikoya" and Kalpitiya, because the age- and sex-constitution of their populations was not ascertained at the last Census.
- 8. The lowest mortality was in Nuwara Eliya (10·26 per mille per annum), and the highest in Vavuniya (239·70). Colombo town shows 34·92. Next to Nuwara Eliya were Moratuwa (14·61) and Chilaw (18·80).
- 9. The infantile mortality for all the towns was equal to a rate of 223 per 1,000 births registered. In the towns having a population of 5,000 or more the mortality ranged from 408 in Batticaloa to 91 in Nuwara Eliya and 61 in Kalutara.
- 10. Table II. in the Appendix shows for each town and race the principal causes of deaths registered during the month, and gives the infantile mortality separately from the other mortality. Out of 1,342 deaths from all causes, 237 or about one-six h were among infants under one year. Out of the 1,105 deaths of persons 1 year and over in age, there were 269 due to Diarrhea and Dysentery, of which 7 were in Colombo; 116 Pneumonia, of which 40 in Colombo and 13 in Kurunegala; 101 Phthisis, of which 62 in Colombo; 52 Enteric Fever, of which 31 in Colombo; 25 Remittent Fever, of which 7 in Jaffna; 22 Malarial Cachexia; 20 Simple Fever; 49 Dochmius Duodenalis, of which 41 were of Tamil coolies. There were two deaths from Smallpox among residents of Colombo town, which occurred in the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Kanatta (outside the town), and were registered by an extra-urban Registrar. There was also a death from Cholera reported for registration from the Kollupi iya ward. This was of a Burgher infant of eleven months old.
