Assistant Inspectorship of Mines.

A PPLICATIONS for the above post, to be created from January 1, 1908, will be received by the Hon. the Controller of Revenue on or before November 30, 1907. A statement of the applicant's previous experience and copies of testimonials, if any, should be forwarded with the application.

2. The duties of the Assistant Inspector will be to assist in making periodical inspection of mines, as defined by Ordinance No. 2 of 1896, throughout the Island, and to furnish reports to the Inspector of Mines. He will also be required to make underground surveys of mines and to assist in office work and to attend court in connection with cases instituted for breach of rules.

- 3. The appointment will, in the first instance, be on probation for six months, and the officer appointed will receive a salary of Rs. 2,400 per annum, with a travelling allowance of Rs. 5 per diem to cover all expenditure incurred by him in connection with the discharge of his duties.

Regulations for the Registration of Medical Practitioners.

- (a) License in Medicine and Surgery (Ceylon).
- (b) Any medical qualification which is capable of being registered under the Medical Acts of Great Britain and Ireland, provided that this qualification has been obtained from one of the examining bodies of Great Britain or Ireland.
- (c) The Medical Degrees and the License in Medicine and Surgery of-
 - (1) Madras University.
 - (2) Calcutta University.
 - (3) Bombay University.
 - (4) Allahabad University.
 - (5) Punjab University.
- (d) The Medical Degrees of the Universities of the British Colonies.
- (e) In the case of persons who do not hold a Diploma or License to practise Medicine and Surgery, applications must be supported (1) by certificates from two practitioners already registered under the Ordinance and qualified for registration by possession of a Degree or Diploma which is accepted as a qualification for registration to the effect that the applicant possesses the requisite knowledge and skill for efficient practise as a Medical Practitioner; (2) by an affidavit that the applicant has practised Medicine and Surgery in Ceylon for not less than ten years. Applications by such persons will only be entertained if made on or before the 31st December, 1907, and certificates under section 13 of the Medical Registration Ordinance will only be granted in cases where the Council is satisfied that it is desirable in the interests of the public the same should be given.

(As to candidates from the Chartered Universities in the Colonies, see "Regulations under which commissions in the Army may be obtained by University Candidates," to be purchased in the same manner as these Regulations.)

(N.B.—Officers appointed to commissions in the Regular Forces may, in case of voluntary retirement from the Regular Forces, be called upon, as a condition of receiving the full rates of retired pay, to serve for a time in the Militia or Imperial Yeomanry).

1. To whom granted.—Commissions in the Regular Forces will be granted to officers of the Militia* of certain Colonies under the conditions hereinafter prescribed, which, stated generally, are as follows:-

Candidates who possess the qualifications specified in paragraph 3 may be nominated by the authority specified in paragraph 2. After such nomination they will be examined by a Medical Board (see paragraph 17), and will undergo an examination in military subjects (see paragraph 21.)

In the total of 16 will be included one commission in the Royal Artillery, which will be awarded to the candidate desirous of such an appointment who obtains highest marks at the examination in military subjects (see paragraphs 3 (d) and 11).

- 3. Qualification of candidates.—A candidate to be eligible for nomination must—
 - (a) Be unmarried.
 - (b) Have attained the age of 20, and not have attained the age of 25 on the 1st of April if nominated for a March Military Examination, or on the 1st of October if nominated for an October Military Examination.

(c) Have obtained a "leaving" or "qualifying" certificate, or have passed one of the examinations accepted in lieu thereof (see paragraphs 4 to 12).

(d) Have served as an officer in the Militia of the Colony from which he is nominated, and have attended two annual trainings, each training in a distinct year, or have seen active service in the field. A candidate for a commission in the Royal Artillery must be an officer of the Militia Artillery.

(e) Have been attached to a British Regular Unit, or to a unit of the Permanent Military Force of the Colony, for a period of two months in accordance with paragraph 13, and have obtained a satisfactory certificate as laid down in Appendix IV.

II .- "Leaving" and "Qualifying" Certificates.

- 4. In order to show that they have attained a fair standard of general education, all candidates will be required to produce either-

(a) A "leaving" certificate;(b) A "qualifying" certificate; or

(c) Proof of having passed one of the examinations laid down in paragraph 12.

Leaving certificate.—A "leaving" certificate is a certificate including the subjects stated in paragraph 11 and granted in Scotland and Wales by a central body to candidates, not less than 17 years of age, who have attended three years' continuous teaching, with satisfactory conduct, in one or more properly inspected schools.

^{*} For the purposes of these Regulations Militia should be defined as "a partially paid and annually trained force, as shown in the Annual Return of Naval and Military Resources, and controlled by the Colonial Government."

† Excluding Malta and Bermuda, the Militia of which are dealt with in the "Regulations under which commissions in the Regular Forces may be obtained by officers of the Militia and Imperial Yeomanry" of the United

In England and Ireland (until such time as a system of "leaving" certificate granted by a central body is instituted) this certificate, which must fulfil the above conditions as regards subjects, age, teaching, &c., will be granted by one of those bodies mentioned in paragraph 6 to a candidate at a school* approved by the Army Council.

The examination for the "leaving" certificate will be held at the School by the body which inspected

it and recommended it for approval.

6. For the present the following is a list of the bodies whose "leaving" certificate for Army purposes is accepted :-

For Schools in Scotland.

(1) The Scotch Education Department.

For Schools in Wales.

(2) The Central Welsh Board for intermediate education.

For Schools in England and Ireland.

(3) Oxford and Cambridge Schools Examination Board.

(4) The University of London.

(5) The University of Birmingham.

(6) The Oxford Local Examination Delegacy (7) The Cambridge Local Examination Syndicate.

7. Qualifying certificate.—A "qualifying "certificate is a certificate, including the subjects mentioned in paragraph 11, granted by the Army Qualifying Board to a candidate not less than 17 years of age.

8. Examinations will be held, commencing on or about "the first Tuesday in March and the third Tuesday in September, at which candidates who wish to obtain "qualifying" certificates may present themselves, provided they have completed their seventeenth year before the first day of the month in which the examination is held.

The examination will be held in the Colony. The fee for the examination will be £3.

9. Mode of application.—A candidate who is desirous of attending one of these examinations must apply to his Commanding Officer at such date as will allow of the nominating authority forwarding the application so as to reach the War Office not later than the 1st of January or the 1st of July for the March and September examinations respectively. The nominating authority, in forwarding the application, will certify that the candidate is, having regard to the limits laid down in paragraph 3 (b), eligible in point of age, and that he will be prepared, when necessary, to recommend him in the manner prescribed in paragraph 15. The necessary papers will then be sent to the nominating authority.

10. Candidates must clearly understand that the fact of their obtaining a "leaving" or "qualifying"

certificate, or of having passed one of the examinations laid down in paragraph 12, does not entitle them to

nomination unless they are eligible in other respects as laid down in paragraph 3.

11. Subjects to be covered by leaving or qualifying certificate.—The subjects covered by a "leaving" or "qualifying" certificate (see Syllabus in Appendix II.) are divided into classes, as follows:-

CLASS I.

(1) English.

- (2) English History and Geography.
- (3) Mathematics (elementary).

N.B.—A candidate must take up and qualify in each of the subjects of Class I. If he is a candidate for the Royal Artillery, he must in addition take up and qualify in Mathematics I.

Cuass II.

(4) Science.

- (5) French or German.
- (6) Latin or Greek.

N.B.—A candidate must take up and qualify in any two of the three subjects, (4), (5), and (6), of

(Science in a "leaving" certificate means such combination of experimental or natural science as the Army Council may approve, provided always that the sciences recognized shall have been taught in a sufficiently extended course, including a due amount of laboratory and field work.)

(Any "leaving" certificate accepted as exempting from the qualifying examination must certify that the candidate has taken a sufficient course of elementary geometrical drawing and practical geometry and also an elementary course of practical measurements as specified in the syllabus of elementary mathematics for the qualifying examination, and must also certify that the candidate has passed in these subjects; but it will be in the condidate to take these these passed in these subjects. be in the option of the candidate to take those subjects separately in the qualifying examination.)

12. Examinations which exempt from the qualifying examination.—A candidate will be exempt from

attending a qualifying examination-

(a) If he has qualified for admission to the Royal Military Academy or Royal Military College at a competitive examination held under the regulations in force up to and including June, 1905; or if he has attained a similar standard in one of the following examinations held by the Civil Service Commissioners up to and including June, 1905:-

The examination of candidates for the India Forest Service.

The examination of candidates for the India Police Service.

The examination of candidates for junior appointments in the Supply and Accounting Departments of the Admiralty

The examination of candidates for junior appointments in the Royal Ordnance Factories of the War Office.

The examination of Officers of the Militia and Imperial Yeomanry and Colonial Military Forces for commissions in the Regular Forces.

^{*} For a list of approved schools see " Monthly Army List."

- (b) If he has, at a competitive examination of Militia and Imperial Yeomanry Officers, held by the War Office, under the regulations in force up to March, 1904, attained such a standard in the literary portion of the examination as may be determined by the Army Council.
- (c) If he has passed the examination for the degree of B.A., or M.A., at one of the following Universities :-

Aberdeen. Oxford. The Royal University, Ireland. Cambridge. Dublin. Victoria University, Manchester. Liverpool. Durham. Leeds. London. Edinburgh. Birmingham. Wales. St. Andrews Glasgow.

Or for the degree of B.Sc. at the Universities of Edinburgh, St. Andrews, Glasgow, or Aberdeen. Or one of the following University Examinations:-

Oxford—The First Public Examination.

Cambridge-One of the parts of the General Examination, or Part I. of any Tripos Examination.

Dublin-The Final Examination of the Senior Freshman year; or the Final Examination of the School of Engineering.

Durham-The First Year's Examinations.

London-The Intermediate Examinations in Arts, Law, Science, or Medicine.

Scottish Universities-The Examination of Candidates for the Army; or the Preliminary Examination and the First Science Examination.

The Royal University, Ireland—The Second University Examination in Arts, or the Second

Professional Examination in Engineering.
Victoria University, Manchester—The Intermediate Examination.
The University of Wales—Completion of three "Intermediate" courses in the Faculty of Science, or of four courses in the Faculty of Arts.

Birmingham-The Intermediate Examination in Arts or Science.

Liverpool-The Intermediate Examination in Arts, Science, or Engineering.

Leeds—The Intermediate Examination in Arts or Science.

Or some other test which is accepted by the University as exempting from the above examinations. A certificate that the examination is accepted by the authorities concerned must be produced. An equivalent examination at one of the chartered Colonial Universities will likewise be accepted as a sufficient ground for exemption.

[A candidate for the Royal Artillery must-

In the case of (a) have attained the Royal Military Academy Standard in Methematics I. and II.

In the case of (b) have qualified in Higher Mathematics.

In the case of (c) have attained such a standard in Mathematics as may be certified as equal to Mathematics I. of the syllabus in Appendix II.]

III.—Attachment to Regular Forces or Permanent Local Forces.

13. Commencing with the nomination of 1st July, 1908, a candidate to be eligible for nomination. must have been attached to a Regular Unit or to a unit of the Permanent Military Forces of the Colony for two consecutive months at any time after the completion of his first annual training, and must have obtained a satisfactory certificate as set forth in Appendix IV.

During the attachment a candidate will be instructed in drill, discipline, and interior economy, musketry, semaphore signalling, and practical tactics (including Sections 124–150 inclusive, and 169. Part IV., Infantry

Training).

The attachment will be arranged by the General Officer commanding the Regular or Permanent Forces in the Colony, who will cause a candidate who has qualified to be furnished with a certificate as set forth in Appendix IV

No charges will be admissible against Imperial Funds in connection with this attachment.

IV .- Nomination.

15. Notification by the nominating authority.—The nominating authority mentioned in paragraph 2 will notify to the War Office, through the Secretary of State for the Colonies, each half-year, the names of any duly qualified candidates he is desirous of nominating for examination in Military Subjects.

This notification must reach the War Office by the 1st July for an October Examination, and by the lst January for a March Examination, and should be accompanied by-

- (a) An extract from the register of the candidate's birth; or, in default, a certificate of his baptism or other documentary evidence accompanied by a declaration made by one of his parents or guardians before a magistrate, giving his exact age.
- (b) A certificate of having served the required number of annual trainings (each training in a distinct year).
- (c) A certificate as to attachment to a unit of the Regular or Permanent Military Forces in accordance with paragraph 13 and Appendix IV.
- (d) A certificate from the nominating authority that he is satisfied that the candidate is a bond fide Colonial resident, that he is of good moral character, unmarried, and, in all other respects a fit and proper person to hold a commission in His Majesty's Army.
- (e) One of the certificates as to literary qualification mentioned in paragraph 4.

16. Should the number of candidates nominated exceed the number of commissions allotted to the Colony for the half-year, the commissions will be awarded to those candidates who obtain highest marks in the examination. Commissions not taken up by one Colony may be awarded to candidates from other Colonies if the exigencies of the Service permit.

V.—Medical Examination.

17. Inspection by Medical Board.—A nominated candidate will be required to undergo examination by a Medical Board, to be convened by the Governor of the Colony, or other proper authority, and will not be allowed to proceed with his examination in military subjects unless pronounced by this Board to be physically fit for His Majesty's Service.

18. Medical Examination .- The general conditions as to height, weight, chest measurement, eye-

sight, &c., are given in Appendix I.

The Board has power-

(a) To pass the candidate as physically fit.

(b) To report the candidate as unfit; but-

(1) In a case in which a defect can be cured by operation, to recommend that he be

re-examined by a Medical Board after such operation.*

- (2) In a case in which the candidate is slightly below one or other of the conditions as to height, chest girth, &c., enumerated in Appendix I., and in which the Board consider that he will fulfil them within six months, to recommend that he be re-examined at the end of that period. A candidate so recommended will be re-examined at the end of six months, and will not be granted a commission unless he has then attained the standard required according to his age.
- (c) To reject a candidate as physically unfit.

No relaxation of the eyesight test can ever be allowed. The decision of the board will, in all cases, be absolutely final.

A candidate who is rejected by that Board can under no circumstances be medically re-examined unless he be again nominated.

VI.-Preliminary Medical Examination.

19. It is suggested that a candidate before commencing his course of study should undergo a thorough medical examination. By such an examination any serious physical discalification would be revealed, and the candidate probably spared expense and the mortification of rejection.

20. Candidates may undergo a preliminary examination by a Military Medical Board, not more than

two years before they compete. under the following conditions:-

(a) Applications must be addressed to the nominating authority, accompanied by a fee to be assessed by the Colonial Authorities.

(b) Instructions will be issued for the examination to take place at the station nearest the candidate's residence, where a Medical Board can be held. The result will be notified to candidates by the Board.

(c) The Board will be constituted by the nominating authority, and will be composed of military medical officers or, when this is not practicable, of civil medical practitioners of recognized professional standing.

(d) Candidates must pay their travelling expenses.

(e) Candidates found unfit by the preliminary Board are not bound to accept its finding, but may, at their own risk, continue their studies, and if nominated may then submit themselves

for medical examination by the final Medical Board.

(/) It must be distinctly understood that passing such preliminary Medical Board is solely for the candidate's information, and would give him no sort of claim to be accepted as physically fit when he presents himself as a candidate. His acceptance will depend entirely upon the report of the final Medical Board. Candidates may be fit for the service at the preliminary medical examination, but may become disqualified by some subsequent physical deterioration.

VII.—Examination in Military Subjects.

21. Examinations in Military Subjects of candidates nominated under paragraph 15 will be held in March and October in each year. The subjects† and the maximum marks obtainable in each subject will be as follows :-

- 22. Marks required.—To qualify, a candidate will be required to obtain not less than · 4 of the marks in each paper, and . 5 of the aggregate.
- 23. Publication of list.—The successful candidates will be placed in order of merit, according to the total marks obtained. Each candidate will be informed of his place on the list, and the marks obtained by him in each subject.

APPENDIX 1.—PHYSICAL AND MEDICAL EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR COMMISSIONS IN THE ARMY.

1.—A candidate for a Commission in His Majesty's Army must be in good mental and bodily health and free from any physical defect likely to interfere with the efficient performance of military duty.

II .- The attention of the Board will be directed to the following points :-

(a) That the correlation of age, height, and chest girth is not less than that which is given in the following table :--

(b) Measurement of height.

The candidate will be placed against the standard, with his feet together, and the weight thrown on the heels, and not on the toes or outside of the feet. He will stand erect without rigidity, and with the heels, calves, buttocks, and the shoulders touching the standard; the chin will be depressed to bring the vertex of the head level under the horizontal bar, and the height will be noted in parts of an inch to eighths.

(c) Measurement of chest.

The candidate will be made to stand erect, with his feet together, and to raise his arms over his head The tape will be carefully adjusted round the chest, with its posterior upper edge touching the inferior angles of the shoulder blades, and its anterior lower edge the upper part of the ripples. The arms will then be lowered to hang loosely by the side, and care will be taken that the shoulder are not thrown upwards or backwards so as to displace the tape. The candidate will then be directed to take a deep inspiration several times, and the maximum expansion of the chest will be carefully noted. It is often attempted to conceal the true minimum measurement, but it can be obtained by a little manipulation and by drawing off attention from the examination. nation by a few questions.

The maximum expansion rarely exceeds the average minimum by more than 2 to 2½ inches.

The minimum and maximum will then be recorded thus. 33/35, 34/36½, &c. In recording the measurements fractions of less than half an inch should not be noted.

(d) The candidate will also be weighed, and his weight recorded on the proceedings of the Board. (e) Eyesight.

The regulations regarding the examination of eyesight are as follows:-

Snellen's Optotypi (1902 edition) will be used for the determination of the visual acuteness. If a candidate can read D = 6 at 6 metres (20 English feet) and D = 0.6, at any distance selected by himself, with each eye without glasses, he will be considered fit.

If a candidate can only read D = 24 at 6 métres (20 English feet) with each eye without glasses his visual deficiency being due to faulty refraction, which can be corrected by glasses which enable him to read D=6 at 6 metres (2) English feet) with one eye, and D=12, at the same distance, with the other eye, and can also read D - 0.8 with each eye without glasses, at any distance selected by himself, he will be considered

If a candidate can read D = 6 at 6 métres (20 English feet) with one eye a higher defect than D = 24 will be accepted in the other, and if he can read D = 36 with the defective eye, at the required distance, the defect being due to error in refraction which can be remedied by glasses so that he can read, at least, D = 12, he will be considered fit.

If a candidate cannot read D=24 at 6 metres (20 English feet) with each eye without glasses, notwithstanding he can read D = 0.6, he will be considered unfit.

The candidate must be able to read the tests without hesitation in ordinary daylight, and the eyes must be wide open.

Squint, or any other morbid condition, subject to the risk of aggravation or recurrence, in either eye, will cause the rejection of a candidate.

Inability to distinguish the principal colours will not be regarded as a cause for rejection, but the fact will be noted in the report, and the candidate will be informed.

The degree of acuteness of vision of all candidates for commissions (including preliminary examinations) will be entered in their reports in the following manner:-

No relaxation of the standard of vision will ever be allowed. The following additional points will then be observed :-

(f) That his hearing is good.

(g) That his speech is without impediment.
(h) That his teeth are in good order. Loss or decay of ten teeth will be considered a disqualification. Decayed teeth, if well filled, will be considered as sound.

(j) That his chest is well formed and that his lungs and heart are sound.

(k) That he is not ruptured.

(l) That he does not suffer from a severe degree of varicocele* or varicose veins. A candidate .. ho has been successfully operated on will be accepted.

(m) That his limbs are well formed and developed.

That there is free and perfect motion of all the joints.

(o) That his feet and toes are well formed.

(p) That he does not suffer from any inveterate skin disease.

(q) That he has no congenital malformation or defect.

(7) That he does not bear traces of previous acute or chronic disease pointing to an impaired constitution.

(s) If the candidate is not of pure European descent the fact should be recorded by the Board.

APPENDIX II .- SYLLABUS OF SUBJECTS FOR A LEAVING CERTIFICATE AND FOR THE QUALIFYING EXAMINATION.

(See paragraph 11).

CLASS 1.

1.-ENGLISH

(1) Dictation.

(2) Short "pass" essays on a limited number of questions (three to be done of a larger number set).

(3) One short précis.

(4) A paper to test general intelligence and power of expression.

2.—ENGLISH HISTORY AND GEOGRAPHY.

History.—English; general outlines.

The paper in this subject will be divided into three parts, covering the following periods:-1066 to 1485, 1485 to 1688, 1688 to 1832, but candidates will be allowed to choose questions from two consecutive parts only.

Geography.—(1) General. Main physical features of the world. Elementary principles of map con-Elementary political geography.

(2) British Empire; rather more in detail.

3.—ELEMENTARY MATHEMATICS.

Arithmetic.—The ordinary rules, with applications more especially to the mensuration of plane figures and solids. The metric system and the use of decimals in approximative calculation, with contracted methods. will be specially insisted upon.

Neither the extraction of the cube root nor the use and theory of recurring decimals is required.

Neatness and accuracy of working are expected, and the methods of solution employed must be clearly indicated. There will be no objection to the intelligent use of algebraic formulæ and symbols.

Geometry.—The elements of geometrical drawing and practical geometry.

^{*} A definition of severe varicocele may be obtained from the Director-General, Army Medical Service, War Office, London, S. W.

The substance of Euclid, Books I., II., III., and a working knowledge of as much of the properties of similar figures as is necessary for plan-making, map-drawing, and simple problems in mensuration.

Algebra.—To simple quadratic equations; the elementary use of graphs, particularly in connection with linear and quadratic functions.

The papers will be set to test knowledge of fundamental principles and readiness in application to simple practical problems. The solutions of equations must be worked out to a few significant figures, and candidates must be accustomed to test the accuracy of solutions by substitution. Skill in elaborate analysis, such as the simplification of complicated fractions, will not be looked for.

Practical Measurements.

Measurement of length-verniers, calipers, micrometer, screw-gauge, spherometer.

Measurement of angles—use of protractor, &c.

Measurements of areas—by dimensions, by squared paper, by weighing; area of cross-sections of a tube, calibration of a tube.

Measurement of volume-by dimensions, by graduated jar or burette.

Measurement of weight—use of balance.
Principle of Archimedes—volume by weighing.

Specific gravity.

The examination will deal with the first three paragraphs in the above schedule, with a possibility of questions for written answers on the other four.

Mathematics I.

(For candidates for appointment to the Royal Artillery only.)

Arithmetic.—As in elementary mathematics, with more difficult questions and exercises involving the use of four-figure logarithms. Use of the slide rule.

Geometry. -Geometrical drawing and practical geometry of plane figures, including the use of Marquois

and other scales.

The substance of Euclid, Books 1. to VI.* The special treatment of incommensurables will not be required. Proportion may be treated algebraically and the complications of Euclid's definitions and nomenclature

Algebra.—As in elementary mathematics, together with indices and the simple properties of surds; graphs of the simpler algebraic functions; quadratic equations; use of graphs in solving equations, and in illustrating and solving practical questions; rate of variation of a function and gradient of a graph; graphic interpolation.

Grasp of elementary principles and readiness in practical application will be looked for, but great skill in

analytical transformations will not be demanded.

Trigonometry.--Up to and including solution of plane triangles; graphs of trignometrical functions; use of four-figure tables.

Readiness in straightforward practical applications, but no great analytical skill will be demanded.

Dynamics.—Graphical proofs of formulæ for uniformly accelerated motion-impact, work, energy. circular motion.

Statics.—Composition and resolution of forces; parallel forces; centre of gravity: three force problems; friction; mechanical powers, e.g., lever, wedge, pulleys, &c.

Practical Work.

Experimental verification of the above theoretical work, such as the measurement of velocity, impact. work, energy, &c. Exercises in drawing useful graphical demonstrations. Construction of the mechanical powers.

CLASS II.

-EXPERIMENTAL SCIENCE.

Mensuration.—Properties of matter with regard to mass and volume. Measurement of lines, areas, volumes, mass, time.

Light.—Rectilinear propagation. Shadows. Velocity of light. Photometry. Laws of reflection—plane, concave, and convex mirrors. Laws of refraction. Prism. Convex lens. Explanation of simple p'ienomena.

Magnetism.—Magnets and their properties. Permanent and induced magnetism. Methods of magnetisation. Molecular theory. Magnetic fields and lines of force. Terrestial magnetism.

Statical electricity.—Electrification. Induction. Gold leaf electroscope. Electrophorus. Elementary

notions of potential and distribution of charge.

Current electricity.—Construction of batteries. Magnetic field due to current. Simple galvanometers. Ohm's Law with simple applications. Chemical action of the current. Heating effects of currents. formations of energy.

Practical Work.

APPENDIX V.--FIRST APPOINTMENTS TO LINE REGIMENTS.

The appointment of qualified candidates to particular regiments of the Line will be made on the following principles:—

1. A candidate having a special family or territorial connection with a regiment may, when attending the examination in military subjects, apply on a form, which will be supplied to him, to be appointed to that regiment and such consideration as can be afforded will be given to his application.

2. If desirous of waiting for a particular regiment he must state this when making application, but he must clearly understand that he will only be allowed to wait if his claim be a very strong one, and if the conditions at the time are such as to allow of this without detriment to the Service. The period for which he will be allowed to wait will in no case exceed six months, but may be determined at any moment if the needs of the Army so require. After a candidate has once been gazetted on first appointment no application for a transfer, will be entertained.

3. Candidates without special claims are at liberty to apply for particular regiments (not exceeding three in all), but will in no case be allowed to wait.

4. Where the claims of different candidates for the same regiment are evenly balanced the first consideration will be given to those highest on the list in their final examination.

5. All candidates must clearly understand that while their wishes will be met as far as possible they will be posted to vacancies as demanded by the interest of the Service.

N.B.-All applications for Regiments must be made on the form which is supplied to each candidate for this purpose.

THE following copies of regulations and other papers issued by the Civil Service Commissioners respecting the Examination for the Civil Service of India to be held in August, 1908, are published for general information.

EXAMINATIONS FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA.

An Open Competitive Examination for admission to the Civil Service of India will be held in London, under the subjoined regulations, commencing on August 1, 1908.

The number of persons to be selected at this Examination will be announced hereafter.

No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received on or before July 1, 1908, an application on the prescribed form, a copy of which is sent herewith. No question as to the delay or loss in the post of any such Application Form can be entertained. Candidates who delay their applications until the last days will do so at their own risk.

Acknowledgments of such Application Forms are sent, and any Candidate who has filled up and returned the printed Application Form but has not received an acknowledgment of it within four complete days should at once write to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, Burlington Gardens, London, W. Failure to comply with this provision will deprive the Candidate of any claim to consideration.

The order for admission to the Examination will be posted on July 20, 1908, to the address given on the Form of Application. It will contain instructions as to the time and place at which Candidates will be required to attend and as to the manner in which the fee (£6) is to be paid.

REGULATIONS.

- ** The following Regulations, made by the Secretary of State for India in Council, are liable to alteration from year to year.
- 1. An Examination for admission to the Civil Service of India, open to all qualified persons, will be held in London in August of each year. The date of the Examination and the number of appointments to be made for each Province will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners.
 - 2. No person will be deemed qualified who shall not satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners:
 - That he is a natural-born subject of His Majesty.
 - (ii.) That he had attained the age of twenty-two, and had not attained the age of twenty-four on the first day of August of the year in which the Examination is held.
 - (N.B.-In the case of Natives of India it will be necessary for a Candidate to obtain a certificate of age and nationality issued under Notification of the Government of India, No. 2,252, dated August 21, 1888, as amended by Notification No. 404, dated May 19, 1898, and signed, should he be a resident in British India, by the Secretary to Government of the Province, or the Commissioner of the Division within which his family resides, or should he reside in a Native State, by the highest Political Officer accredited to the State in which his family resides.)
 - (iii.) That he has no disease, constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity, unfitting him, or likely to unfit him, for the Civil Service of India.
 - (iv.) That he is of good moral character.
- 3. Should the evidence upon the above points be prima facie satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the Candidate, on payment of the prescribed fee, will be admitted to the Examination. The Commissioners may, however, in their discretion, at any time prior to the grant of the Certificate of Qualification hereinafter referred to, institute such further inquiries as they may deem necessary; and if the result of such inquiries in the case of any Candidate should be unsatisfactory to them in any of the above respects, he will be ineligible for admission to the Civil Service of India, and, if already selected, will be removed from the position of a Probationer
 - 4. The Open Competitive Examination will take place only in the following branches of knowledge*:-

Candidates are at liberty to name any of these branches of knowledge, with the proviso that the maximum number of marks that can be obtained from the subjects chosen is limited to 6,000. If this maximum is exceeded by a Candidate's selection, he will be required to indicate one of his subjects, the marks for which should, in his case, be reduced so as to bring his maximum marks within the prescribed limit. The marks so reduced will be subject to a correspondingly reduced deduction under clause 6.

5. The merit of the persons examined will be estimated by marks (a); and the number set opposite to each branch in the preceding regulation denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it.

6. The marks assigned to Candidates in each branch will be subject to such deduction as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary (b) in order to secure that no credit be allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

 The Examination will be conducted on paper and viv^d voce, as may be deemed necessary.
 The marks obtained by each Candidate, in respect of each of the branches in which he shall have been examined, will be added up, and the names of the several Candidates who shall have obtained, after the deduction above-mentioned, a greater aggregate number of marks than any of the remaining Candidates will be set forth in order of merit, and such Candidates shall be deemed to be Selected Candidates for the Civil Service of India, provided they appear to be in other respects duly qualified. Should any of the Selected Candidates become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled up or not. In the former case the Candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a Selected Candidate.

9. Selected Candidates, before proceeding to India, will be on probation for one year, at the end of which time they will be examined, with a view of testing their progress in the following subjects (c):-

In Hindustani the Candidate will be required to be acquainted with both the Persian and the Nagari character; and in the case of the last two Provinces mentioned above, a Candidate whose Vernacular Language is either of the languages shown against his Province, must offer the other for examination.

In this Examination, as in the Open Competition, the merit of the Candidates examined will be estimated by marks (which will be subject to deductions in the same way as the marks assigned at the Open Competition), and the number set opposite to each subject denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it. The examination will be conducted on paper and viva voce, as may be deemed necessary. The Examination will be held at the close of the year of probation, and will be called the "Final Examination."

(a) Considerable deductions will be made for bad handwriting.
(b) No deductions will be made under clause 6 from the marks assigned to Candidates in Mathematics or English Composition.

⁽c) Instructions, showing the extent of the examination, will be issued to Selected Candidates as soon as possible after the result of the Open Competition is declared.

If any Candidate is prevented by sickness or any other adequate cause from attending such Examination the Commissioners may, with the concurrence of the Secretary of State for India in Council, allow him to appear at the Final Examination to be held in the following year, or at a special Examination.

10. The Selected Candidates will also be tested during their probation as to their proficiency in Riding. The examinations in riding will be held as follows :-

> (1) Shortly after the result of the Open Competitive Examination has been declared, or at such time or times as the Commissioners may appoint during the course of the probationary year.

- (2) Again, at the time of the Final Examination. Candidates who may then fully satisfy the Commissioners of their ability to ride well and to perform journeys on horseback will be awarded from 100 to 200 marks, according to the degree of proficiency displayed, to be added to their marks in the Final Examination. Candidates who fail to obtain 100 marks but are reported by the Civil Service Commissioners to have reached a minimum standard of proficiency in riding, and are certified by the said Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India, will, on their arrival in India, be subjected to such further tests in riding as may be prescribed by their Government, and shall receive no increase to their initial salary until they have passed such tests to the satisfaction of that Government.
 - A Candidate who fails at the end of the year of probation to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that he has eached the minimum standard of proficiency in riding, will be liable to have his name removed from the list of Selected Candidates

11. The Selected Candidates who, on examination, shall be found to have a competent knowledge of the subjects specified in Regulation 9, and who shall have satisfied the Civil Service Commissioners of their eligibility in respect of nationality, age, health, character, conduct during the period of probation, and ability to ride, shall be certified by the said Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India, provided they shall comply with the regulations in force, at the time, for that Service.

12. Persons desirous to be admitted as Candidates must apply on Forms, which may be obtained from "The Secretary to the Civil Service Commissioners, London," at any time after December 1 in the year previous to that in which the Examination is to be held. No person will be admitted to the Examination from whom the Secretary to the Civil Service Commissioners has not received on or before July 1 (or, if that date should fall upon a Sunday or public holiday, then on or before the first day thereafter on which their office is open), in the year in which the Examination is to be held, an application, in the handwriting of the Candidate,

on the prescribed form.

The Civil Service Commissioners are authorized by the Secretary of State for India in Council to make

the following announcements:-

(i.) Selected Candidates will be allotted to the various Provinces upon a consideration of all the circumstances, including their own wishes; but the requirements of the Public Service will rank before every other consideration.

(ii.) An allowance amounting to £150 will be given to any Candidate who passes his probation at one of the Universities or Colleges which have been approved by the Secretary of State, viz., the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Dublin, Glasgow, Edinburgh, St. Andrews, Aberdeen, and London (University College or King's College); Victoria University, Manchester.

This allowance will be paid to the Selected Candidate in four instalments on the following dates respectively: - December 24, after his selection, March 25, June 24, and the date of his

signing his covenant on being finally appointed to the Service.

With the final instalment an allowance on account of passage to India will be paid to each newly appointed civilian to the amount of £37. 10s. for passage to Calcutta, Madras, or Bombay, and £43 for passage to Rangoon, the officer then making his own arrangements for his

The payment of each of the first three instalments will be conditional, on the receipt, by the Secretary of State through the Civil Service Commissioners, of a certificate that the Candidate has fulfilled up to date the requirements of the authorities and shown satisfactory conduct at the authorized University or College; the fourth and final instalment will be pand as soon as the Selected Candidate has signed his covenant, and for its payment no Certificate from College authorities will be required.

The whole probation must ordinarily be passed at the same institution. Migration will not be permitted except for special reasons approved by the Secretary of State.

- (iii.) Each Candidate will be required before receiving the first instalment of his allowance to execute an agreement binding himself to refund all moneys he may have received from the Secretary of State for India in the event of-
 - (1) His failure to pass the Final Examination within the time prescribed by the regulations, and to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners of his fitness for admission to the Civil Service of India; or
 - (2) His subsequent failure to execute the usual covenant, and to proceed to India as and when he shall be directed by the Secretary of State for India.
- (iv.) All Candidates obtaining Certificates will be also required to enter into covenants, by which, amongst other things, they will bind themselves to make such payments as under the rules and regulations for the time being in force they may be required to make towards their own pensions or for the pensions of their families. The stamps payable on these covenants amount to £1.

(v.) The seniority in the Civil Service of India of the Candidates obtaining Certificates will be determined according to the order in which they stand on the list resulting from the combined marks of the Open Competitive and Final Examinations.

(vi.) Candidates obtaining Certificates will be required to report their arrival in India within such period after the grant of their Certificates of Qualifications as the Secretary of State may in each case direct.

(vii.) Candidates who fail to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners at the Final Examination held in any year will be definitely rejected, and will not be allowed to present themselves for re-examination, unless it shall appear to the Secretary of State in Council, after reference to the Civil Service Commissioners, that such failure is due to circumstances wholly exceptional and beyond the control of the Candidate.

If Open Competitive Examinations for the following services, viz.:-

Eastern Cadetships in the Colonial Service; Clerkships (Class I.) in the Home Civil Service;

should be held in 1908 concurrently with the Open Competitive Examination for the Civil Service of India, Candidates duly eligible in respect of age will be admitted to compete for any two or all three of these Services, subject to the following conditions:-

(1) They must enter and return to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, within the time limited by the several regulations, an application on the form prescribed for each of the respective services.*

(2) Every successful Candidate who may have been admitted to compete for either the India or the Colonial Service (or both), as well as for the Home Service, will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of Candidates for the India or Colonial Service, or on the list of Candidates for Clerkships in the Home Civil Service.

The name of any Candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed

from the list of Candidates for Clerkships in the Home Civil Service.

(3) Every successful Candidate, who may have been admitted to compete for both the India and Colonial Services, will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions. whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of Candidates for the Civil Service of India, or on the list of Candidates for Eastern Cadetships in the Colonial Service.

The name of any Candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of Candidates for Eastern Cadetships.

(4) All declarations of choice are irrevocable.

(5) Candidates for all three or any two of the above-mentioned services will be required to pay a consolidated fee of £6.

VITAL STATISTICS.

COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

THE weekly return of births and deaths in the Colombo town for the week ended September 21, 1907, is subjoined (A).

Births.—The total births were 71. The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum was 20.9,* as against 29.8 in the preceding week and 18.7 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths were 107. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 35·1,† as against 34.2 in the previous week and 28.9 in the corresponding week of last year.

Causes of death.—No persons died from cholera, smallpox, or measles; 11 died from diarrhœa and dysentery; 13 from phthisis; 14 from bronchitis and pneumonia; 11 from enteric fever; and 10 from infantile convu sions

Infantile deaths.—Of the 107 total deaths, 25 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 9 in

the corresponding week of the previous year.

2. The numbers of births and deaths registered in nineteen other principal towns are shown in
