PROCLAMATIONS BY THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR.

IN the Name of His Majesty EDWARD THE SEVENTH, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency EVERARD FERDINAND IM THURN, Esquire, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Lieutenant-Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

EVERARD IM THURN.

WHEREAS by section 4 of "The Local Boards' Ordinance, 1898," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation to be for that purpose published in the *Government Gazette* to bring any town or towns under the operation of the said Ordinance, and to define the limits of such town or towns respectively for the purposes of the said Ordinance; and such Proclamation to amend, alter, or revoke, as and whenever the Governor shall with like advice determine:

And whereas by a Proclamation dated the Thirteenth day of August, One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-four, the town of Batticaloa in the Eastern Province was brought under the operation of the said Ordinance, and the limits of the said town were defined therein:

And whereas by another Proclamation dated the Twenty-eighth day of December, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-four, the said Proclamation of the Thirteenth day of August, One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-four was amended, and the limits of the said town of Batticaloa were redefined:

And whereas it is expedient to amend in certain respects the said Proclamation of the Twenty-eighth day of December, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-four.

Now know Ye that We, the Lieutenant-Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby amend the said Proclamation of the Twenty-eighth day of December, One thousand Eight

hundred and Ninety-four for the purposes of the said Ordinance, by excluding therefrom the village Karawappankerni specified in the schedule to the said Proclamation, as from and after the First day of October, 1902.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-fifth day of September, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Two.

WHEREAS by section 11 (1) of "The Irrigation and Paddy Cultivation Ordinance, 1889," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, upon the application of a reasonable number of the proprietors in any district, or if without such application it shall appear expedient, by Proclamation for that purpose to be published in the *Government Gazette*, to declare such district an Irrigation District for the encouragement and extension of paddy cultivation therein, and for the better enforcement of the ancient customs of such district in regard to the irrigation and cultivation of paddy lands, and the maintenance of the water rights of such proprietors.

And whereas it appears expedient to declare the districts specified in the annexed schedule Irrigation Districts for the purposes of the said Ordinance:

Now know Ye that We, the said Lieutenant-Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this Our Proclamation declare the several districts specified in the annexed schedule to be Irrigation Districts for the purposes of the said Ordinance as from and after the First day of October, 1902.
