### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency EVERARD FERDINAND IM THURN, Esquire, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Lieutenant-Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

EVERARD IM THURN.

WHEREAS by section 44 of "The Forest Ordinance, 1885," as amended by section 14 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1892, it is enacted that the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, may make regulations respecting the transit of all forest produce by land or water: and whereas certain regulations were made under the provisions of the said section of the said Ordinance and published in the *Government Gazette* by a notification dated May 4, 1900:

And whereas by regulation 2 of such regulations it is provided that no forest produce shall be moved (a) in any district which has been proclaimed by the Governor, with the advice of the

Executive Council, from any land, except with a permit from the Government Agent, or from some officer duly authorized by the Government Agent to issue permits, nor when a permit has been obtained shall any forest produce be moved otherwise than in accordance with the conditions of such permit :

And whereas it is expedient to proclaim the Batticaloa District in the Eastern Province, set forth in the schedule hereto, under the said regulation 2.

Now know Ye that We, the Lieutenant-Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the Batticaloa District in the Eastern Province, set forth in the schedule hereto, under the said regulation 2, as from and after the First day of November, 1902.

WHEREAS by section 6 of "The Masters Attendant's Ordinance, 1865," it is enacted that the Governor may from time to time, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, frame and establish such port rules not inconsistent with the said Ordinance as he may think necessary for any of the purposes in the several sub-sections of the said section specified :

And whereas certain port rules were duly framed, established, and promulgated for the Port of Colombo for the purposes of the said Ordinance, by a Proclamation dated the Fifteenth day of June, One thousand Nine hundred :

And whereas by section 11 (1) (a) of the Ordinance No. 21 of 1901, it is enacted that any rule may be at any time amended, varied, rescinded, or revoked by the same authority and in the same manner by and in which it was made :

And whereas it is expedient that rule 3 of section 4 of the Colombo Port Rules dated the Fifteenth day of June, One thousand Nine hundred should be amended.

Now know Ye that We, the Lieutenant-Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby amend port rule 3 of section 4 of the Colombo Port Rules dated the Fifteenth day of June, One thousand Nine hundred, by adding thereto the words set out in the schedule hereto, and We do hereby promulgate the said port rule as amended to take effect as from and after the First day of December, 1902.

SCHEDULE.

Vessels inward bound requiring a pilot should display the Board of Trade pilot signal, and vessels outward bound requiring a pilot should hoist the jack at the fore by day, and by night two red lights 6 ft. apart hoisted well up where best seen.

The following signals will be made from the Pilot Station Tower (6° 56' N., 79° 50' E.) in answer to vessels' signals for a pilot at night time :—

(a) An electric light showing red and white flashes alternately in quick succession for a period of one minute indicates that the pilot will proceed to vessel making signal immediately.

(b) A fixed red light for the same period indicates that the pilot is engaged, but will proceed to vessel making signal when disengaged.

(c) A flashing bright light of about two minutes' duration signifies that the vessel should anchor well out or keep under weigh until daylight.

Vessels within the Port of Colombo making other signals to the Pilots' Tower should display the "Answering Penant" at the same time as such signals, in a conspicuous place, without which no notice will be taken at the Pilot Station Tower.

WHEREAS by section 37 of "The Ceylon Postal and Telegraph Ordinance, 1892," it is enacted that the respective rates of postage and fees for registration chargeable on postal packets to be transmitted in or beyond this Island, shall be determined from time to time by Proclamation issued by the Governor, acting with the advice of the Executive Council, and published in the *Government Gazette* :

And whereas it is expedient to determine the rates of postage for the conveyance of parcels to the United States of America :

Now know Ye that We, the Lieutenant-Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby determine that from and after the First day of November, 1902, the rates of postage chargeable shall be as set forth in the schedule hereto annexed :

It is further proclaimed that His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, with the aforesaid advice, has approved of the revised insurance fees and the limit of insured value specified in the said schedule, while the rules regarding insurance will remain as notified in *Gazette* No. 5,774 of April 11, 1901.

The above rates include Customs clearance and formalities due to the American Express Company, and also the "Sample office fee" or storage fee of the United States Government. Customs duty cannot be prepaid in Ceylon and will be recovered from the addressees.

The sender may, without extra charge, direct that a parcel be sent through the New York Custom-house in bond for Customs examination at any one of the "United States Ports of Entry," or Inland Custom-houses, of which a list is given below. This arrangement prevents delay at New York, where parcels are otherwise detained till the duty is remitted by the consignee; but on the other hand, the addressee will have to make arrangements for taking delivery of parcels so treated after they have been cleared at the Inland Custom-house.

The sender of a parcel intended to be forwarded in bond must mark it plainly "In bond to ....., naming the Inland Port of Entry chosen, and the same words must also appear in the same handwriting in the Customs declaration which accompanies the parcel.

In the United States, parcels are not in all cases delivered at the houses of the recipients. They will, however, except when sent in bond be delivered at all places within the delivery of any Express Company of the United States, and when they are not delivered, a notice of their arrival will be sent to the addressees, who must then arrange to obtain them at the point where they are lying.

The general regulations of the Foreign Parcel Post will apply to this service, but attention should be paid to the following points of difference :

Two Customs declaration forms are necessary, and if the parcel is to be sent in bond, it must be so endorsed. If the value of the goods in a parcel exceeds 100 dollars (Rs. 307.50) the declaration must be made before a United States Consul on forms supplied by him.

The smartness, soldierly bearing, and good behaviour of the Contingent was a matter for sincere congratulation.

His Majesty's Government are especially glad that it was found possible to prolong the visit beyond the unavoidably deferred date of the Coronation, as the representation of the local forces of almost every portion of the Empire on that day undoubtedly added greatly to the interest of the spectacle.

His Majesty's Government trust that the members of the Contingent will carry back with them a pleasant recollection of their stay in this country on an ever memorable occasion.
