MINUTES BY THE GOVERNOR.

IIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR has been pleased, with the authority of the Secretary of State, to direct the publication of the following regulations in supersession of those dated August 15, 1894:—

Regulations as to the Leave and Leave Pay of Temporary Employes of the Government of Ceylon serving under Contracts for definite terms of Years.

- · (1) Temporary employés of the Ceylon Government, whose contracts contain no stipulation as to leave, are not entitled to leave out of the Island, and will not be granted such leave unless the most exceptional reasons therefor are given to, and are approved by, the Governor.
 - (2) Leave out of the Island will never be granted on full pay, and will be limited to four months.
- (3) Half pay while on leave out of the Island will be paid at the rate of exchange allowed to ordinary Government officers at the date on which the temporary employé was engaged.
- (4) While in England any such employé who has not been distinctly and definitely sent home to work shall, as a condition of receiving half pay, be liable to give the Consulting Engineers or other advisers of Government the benefit of his assistance and advice without any further payment beyond out-of-pocket expenses.
- (5) In the case of illness, or on the certificate of the Head of the Department that the leave is deserved and desirable in the interests of the Department, leave to be spent in the Island may be granted for a period not exceeding six weeks in any one year. Such leave will be on full pay, unless additional expense is thereby caused to Government, in which case it will be on half pay

For the Southern Circuit, twice at least at Galle, and such other places in such circuit as the Governor, after previous consultation with the Judges, shall appoint; such Sessions commencing at Galle on April 25 and September 15 in every year:

And whereas it appears to Us expedient to order that a Criminal Session of the Supreme Court should be holden, on the day hereinafter mentioned, at Matara, a place included within the said Southern Circuit.

Now therefore know Ye that We, the said Governor, for sufficient reasons to Us appearing, and after previous consultation with the Judges of the Supreme Court, do order and appoint that a Criminal Session of the Supreme Court shall be holden at Matara, in the said Southern Circuit, on or about Thursday, the Twenty-fourth October, One thousand Nine hundred and Seven.

RULES.

- 1. No person licensed to carry on the trade of a butcher in the planting district of Urugala, Central Province, shall slaughter any cattle at any place other than the slaughter-house for cattle in Niyambekumburewatta, situated at Moragahamulla, in Watuliyadda Wasama of Medasiya pattu korale in Uda Dumbara; bounded on north by Menik Etana's garden, south by ditch, east by ela, and west by John Peiris' garden, referred to in Proclamation dated October 1, 1907.
- 2. The plot of land close to the Police Station at Urugala—bounded on the north and east by ela, south and west by road facing the Police Station—is hereby appointed as the spot in which the licensed butcher of Urugala shall, as required by section 12, sub-section (1), of the Ordinance No. 9 of 1893, expose to public view all cattle intended for slaughter for a period of not less than 24 hours immediately preceding the time of slaughter.
- 3. No cattle shall be slaughtered at the said slaughter-house except on such days and between such hours as may be determined by the Government Agent, Central Province, notice of which shall be posted at the said slaughter-house.
- 4. No animal shall be slaughtered for human food until after the animal has been inspected and approved by the Medical Officer at Teldeniya as fit to be slaughtered for human food. Animals rejected as unfit for slaughter shall be immediately removed.
- 5. The said District Medical Officer may prohibit the slaughter of any animal notwithstanding that it has been approved as aforesaid, if it should, before slaughter, be found to be diseased or otherwise unfit to be slaughtered for human food.
- 6. If on any animal which has been approved as aforesaid being slaughtered the carcase shall appear diseased or unfit for human food, the said District Medical Officer shall cause the meat to be immediately destroyed or disposed of, so as to prevent its being exposed for sale or used for human food.
- 7. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall not permit the slaughter of any animals which have not been approved as aforesaid as fit to be slaughtered for human food, or the slaughter of which the said District Medical Officer has prohibited as provided by rule 5.
- 8. No person shall remove from the slaughter-house, except under the directions of the said District Medical Officer, any meat which the latter has declared to be unfit for human food.
 - The fee for slaughtering shall be 75 cents for each head of cattle.
- 10. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall keep a register in the form annexed of all cattle brought to the slaughter-house.

REGULATION REFERRED TO.

The inspection and examination of the alleged lepers under section 7 of Ordinance No. 4 of 1901 may be held by two medical practitioners, one of whom shall be the Principal Civil Medical Officer or a Medical Officer appointed by the Governor as provided by Ordinance No. 17 of 1902, who shall report to the Governor the result of their observations, certifying, if such be their opinion, that the person examined is actually suffering from the disease of leprosy.

THE following copy of an Order of His Majesty the King in Council giving effect to an Agreement between the United Kingdom and Sweden, signed at London on the 2nd of July, 1907, confirming as regards Sweden the Treaty of Extradition between the United Kingdom and Sweden and Norway of June 26, 1873, and enlarging the list of offences contained in Article II. of that Treaty, is published for general information.

Sweden Extradition Order in Council, 1907.

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 12th day of August, 1907.

Present:

The King's Most Excellent Majesty.

Lord President. Lord Steward.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1906, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any Foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such Foreign State; and that His Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of His Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the Twenty-sixth day of June, One thousand Eight hundred and Seventy-three, between Her late Majesty Queen Victoria and His Majesty the King of Sweden and Norway, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, in the case of which Treaty the Extradition Acts of 1870 and 1873 were applied by Order in Council of the Thirtieth September, One thousand Eight hundred and Seventy-three:

And whereas an Agreement was concluded on the Second day of July, One thousand Nine hundred and Seven, between the British and Swedish Governments, providing that the said Treaty shall remain in force between the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the Kingdom of Sweden, in so far as its provisions apply to the Kingdom of Sweden alone; and also declaring that certain additions shall be made to the offences set out in Article II. of the said Treaty, which Agreement is in the terms following:—

The British and Swedish Governments, who agree that the Treaty signed at Stockholm on the 26th of June, 1873, between the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the Kingdoms of Sweden and Norway, for the mutual surrender of fugitive criminals, shall remain in force between the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the Kingdom of Sweden, in so far as its provisions apply to the Kingdom of Sweden alone, and who deem it desirable to make certain additions to the said Treaty, have authorized the undersigned to declare that the following additions should be made to the offences set out in Article II. of the said Treaty, for which, under the circumstances and conditions stated in the said Treaty, extradition is to be granted:—

- 19. Perjury and subornation of perjury.
- 20. Receiving any money, valuable security, or other property, knowing the same to have been stolen or embezzled.
 - 21. Malicious wounding or inflicting grievous bodily harm.
 - 22. Unlawful carnal knowledge of a girl under the age of fifteen years.
 - 23. Bigamy.
 - 24. Indepent assault.
- 25. Administering drugs or using instruments apt to procure the miscarriage of women, with intent to procure such miscarriage.
- 26. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the safety of any person travelling or being upon a railway.
- 27. Knowingly making, without lawful authority, any instrument, tool, or engine adapted and intended for the counterfeiting of the coin of the realm.
 - 28. Malicious injury to property, if such offence be indictable.

In witness whereof the undersigned have signed the present Agreement and have affixed thereto the seals of their arms.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to him by the said Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1906, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Twenty-sixth day of August, 1907, the said Acts shall apply in the case of Sweden under and in accordance with the said Treaty as supplemented by the said Agreement above set forth.

Provided always that the operation of the said Acts shall be and remain suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as an Act of the Parliament of Canada, being Part I. of chapter 155 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," shall continue in force there, and no longer.

Panama Extradition Order in Council, 1907.

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 12th day of August, 1907.

Present:

The King's Most Excellent Majesty.

Lord President. Lord Steward. Lord Chamberlain. Lord Denman. Lord Tweedmouth.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1906, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any Foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such Foreign State; and that His Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugutive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of His Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the Twenty-fifth day of August, One thousand Nine hundred and Six, between His Majesty and the President of the Republic of Panama, for the extradi-

tion of criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following:-

Extradition Treaty between the United Kingdom and Panama.

His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, and the President of the Republic of Panama, having determined, by common consent, to conclude a Treaty for the extradition of criminals, have accordingly named as their Plenipotentiaries:

His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British

Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India,

Claude Coventry Mallet, Esquire, Companion of His Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, and His Consul for the Republic of Panama, and

The President of the Republic of Panama,

His Excellency Ricardo Arias, Secretary of State for the Department of Government and Foreign Affairs;

Who, after having exhibited to each other their respective full powers and found them in good and due form, have agreed upon the following Articles:—

ARTICLE I.

The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other, under certain circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty, those persons who, being accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences enumerated in Article II., committed in the territory of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party.

ARTICLE II.

Extradition shall be reciprocally granted for the following crimes or offences:-

1. Murder, or attempt or conspiracy to murder.

Manslaughter.

3. Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of women.

4. Rape.

- 5. Carnal knowledge, or any attempt to have unlawful carnal knowledge of a girl under the age of 16 years, so far as such acts are punishable by the law of the State upon which the demand is made.
 - 6. Indecent assault.
 - 7. Kidnapping and false imprisonment, child stealing.
 - 8. Abandoning, exposing, or detaining children.

9. Abduction.

10. Bigamy.

11. Maliciously wounding or inflicting grievous bodily harm.

12. Assault occasioning actual bodily harm.

13. Threats by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort money or other things of value.

14. Perjury, or subornation of perjury.

15. Arson or attempt to commit arson.

Burglary or house breaking, robbery with violence, larceny, or embezzlement.

17. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, director, member, or public officer of any company.

18. Obtaining money, valuable security, or goods by false pretences; receiving any money, valuable security, or other property, knowing the same to have been stolen or unlawfully obtained.

19. (a) Counterfeiting or altering money, or bringing into circulation counterfeited or altered money.

(b) Knowingly making without lawful authority any instrument, tool, or engine adapted and intended for the counterfeiting of the coin of the realm.

20. Forgery, or knowingly uttering what is forged.

21. Crimes against bankruptcy law.

22. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the safety of any persons travelling or being upon a railway.

23. Malicious injury to property, if such offence be indictable.

24. Piracy and other crimes or offences committed at sea against persons or things which, according to the laws of the High Contracting Parties, are extradition offences.

25. Dealing in slaves in such manner as to constitute a criminal offence against the laws of

both States.

Extradition shall also be granted for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes, provided such

participation be punishable by the laws of both Contracting Parties.

Extradition may also be granted at the discretion of the State applied to in respect of any other crime for which, according to the law of both the Contracting Parties for the time being in force, the grant can be made.

ARTICLE III.

Neither Party is obliged to surrender its own subjects or citizens to the other Party.

ARTICLE IV.

Extradition shall not take place if the person claimed on the part of His Britannic Majesty's Government, or of the Government of Panama, has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is waiting trial in the territory of the United Kingdom or in the Republic of Panama respectively, for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed on the part of His Britannic Majesty's Government, or of the Government of Panama, should be awaiting trial or undergoing sentence for any other crime in the territory of the United Kingdom, or in the Republic of Panama respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until after he has been discharged, whether by acquittal or on expiration of sentence or otherwise.

ARTICLE V.

Extradition shall not be granted if exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applying or applied to.

Neither shall it be granted if, according to the law of either country, the maximum punishment

for the offence charged is imprisonment for less than one year.

ARTICLE VI.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender i, demanded is one of a political character, or if he proves that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

ARTICLE VII.

A person surrendered shall in no case be kept in prison or be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made for any other crime, or on account of any other matters, than those for which the extradition shall have taken place, until he has been restored, or has had an opportunity of returning to the State by which he has been surrendered.

This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition.

ARTICLE VIII.

The requisition for extradition shall be made through the Diplomatic Agents or Consuls-General

of the High Contracting Parties respectively.

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by a copy of the judgment passed on the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requi-

sition for extradition.

A sentence passed in contumaciam is not to be deemed a conviction, but a person so sentenced may be dealt with as an accused person.

ARTICLE IX.

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipu ations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

ARTICLE X.

A criminal fugitive may be apprehended under a warrant issued by any competent authority in either country, on such information or complaint, and such evidence, or after such proceedings, as would, in the opinion of the authority issuing the warrant, justify the issue of a warrant if the crime had been committed or the person convicted in that part of the dominions of the two Contracting Parties in

which the said authority exercises jurisdiction; provided, however, that in the United Kingdom the

accused shall, in such case, be sent as speedily as possible before a competent Magistrate.

He shall, in accordance with this Article, be discharged; as well in the Republic of Panama as in the United Kingdom, if within the term of sixty days a requisition for extradition shall not have been made by the Diplomatic Agent or Consul-General of his country in accordance with the stipulations of this Treaty. The same rule shall apply to the cases of persons accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences specified in this Treaty, and committed in the high seas on board any vessel of either country which may come into a port of the other.

ARTICLE XI.

The extradition shall take place only if the evidence be found sufficient according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime had been committed in the territory of the same State, or if extradition is claimed in respect of an offence of which the fugitive has been falready convicted, to prove that the prisoner is the person convicted, and that the crime of which he has been convicted is one in respect of which extradition could, at the time of such conviction, have been granted by the State applied to.

ARTICLE XII.

The extradition of fugitives under the provisions of this Treaty shall be carried out in His Britannic Majesty's Dominions and in the Republic of Panama, respectively, in conformity with the laws regulating extradition for the time being in force in the surrendering State.

ARTICLE XIII.

In the examinations which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the Authorities of the State applied to shall admit as valid evidence the sworn depositions or the affirmations of witnesses taken in the other State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, and certificates of, or judicial documents stating the fact of a conviction, provided the same are authenticated as follows:—

1. A warrant must purport to be signed by a Judge, Magistrate, or Officer of the other State.

2. Depositions or affirmations, or the copies thereof, must purport to be certified, under the hand of a Judge, Magistrate, or Officer of the other State, to be the original depositions or affirmations or to be true copies thereof, as the case may require.

3. A certificate of or judicial document stating the fact of a conviction must purport to be

certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or Officer of the other State.

4. In every case such warrant, deposition, affirmation, copy, certificate, or judicial document must be authenticated either by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice or some other Minister of the other State; but any other mode of authentication for the time being permitted by the law of the country where the examination is taken may be substituted for the foregoing.

ARTICLE XIV.

If the individual claimed by one of the High Contracting Parties in pursuance of the present Treaty should be also claimed by one or several other Powers on account of other crimes or offences committed upon their respective territories, his extradition shall be granted to the State whose demand is earliest in date.

ARTICLE XV.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within ninety days from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, or within such further time as the State applied to, or the proper Tribunal thereof, shall direct, the fugitive shall be set at liberty.

ARTICLE XVI.

All article seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery of such articles, be given up when the extradition takes place; and the said delivery shall extend not merely to the stolen articles, but to everything that may serve as a proof of the crime.

ARTICLE XVII.

All expenses connected with extradition shall be borne by the demanding State.

ARTICLE XVIII.

The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the Colonies and Foreign Possessions of His Britanic Majesty, so far as the laws in such Colonies and Foreign Possessions respectively will allow.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any of such Colonies or Foreign Possessions shall be made to the Governor or chief authority of such colony or possession by the chief Consular Officer of the Republic of Panama in such colony or possession.

Such requisition may be disposed of, subject always, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such Colony or Foreign Possession will allow; to the provisions of this Treaty, by the said Governor or chief authority, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender or to refer the matter to his Government.

His Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British Colonies and Foreign Possessions for the surrender of criminals from the Republic of Panama who may take refuge within such Colonies and Foreign Possessions, on the basis, so far as the law of such Colony or Foreign Possession will allow, of the provisions of the present Treaty.

Requisitions for the surrender of a fugitive criminal emanating from any Colony or Foreign Possession of His Britanic Majesty shall be governed by rules laid down in the preceding articles of the

present Treaty.

ARTICLE XIX.

The present Treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties by a notice not exceeding one year, and not less than six months.

It shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Panama as soon as possible.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and affixed thereto their respective seals.

Done in duplicate in the Spanish and English languages at Panama, the Twenty-fifth day of

August, Nineteen hundred and Six.

The following diplomas and certificates will be entertained by the Council of the Ceylon Medical College in applications by persons to obtain certificates under section 13 of Ordinance No. 2 of 1905:—

- (b) Any medical qualification which is capable of being registered under the Medical Acts of Great Britain and Ireland, provided that this qualification has been obtained from one of the examining bodies of Great Britain or Ireland.
- (c) The Medical Degrees and the License in Medicine and Surgery of-
 - (1) Madras University.
 - (2) Calcutta University.
 - (3) Bombay University.
 - (4) Allahabad University.(5) Punjab University.
- (d) The Medical Degrees of the Universities of the British Colonies.
- (e) In the case of persons who do not hold a Diploma or License to practise Medicine and Surgery, applications must be supported (1) by certificates from two practitioners already registered under the Ordinance and qualified for registration by possession of a Degree or Diploma which is accepted as a qualification for registration to the effect that the applicant possesses the requisite knowledge and skill for efficient practise as a Medical Practitioner; (2) by an affidavit that the applicant has practised Medicine and Surgery in Ceylon for not less than ten years. Applications by such persons will only be entertained if made on or before the 31st December, 1907, and certificates under section 13 of the Medical Registration Ordinance will only be granted in cases where the Council is satisfied that it is desirable in the interests of the public the same should be given.

VITAL STATISTICS.

COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

THE weekly return of births and deaths in the Colombo town for the week ended September 28, 1907. is subjoined (A).

Births.—The total births were 98. The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum was 28.9,* as against 20.9 in the preceding week and 27.7 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths were 104. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 34·1,† as against

35.1 in the previous week and 34.6 in the corresponding week of last year.

Causes of death.—1 person died from smallpox; 15 died from diarrhoea and dysentery; 12 from phthisis; 19 from bronchitis and pneumonia; 6 from different kinds of fever; and 11 from infantile convulsions.

Infantile deaths.—Of the 104 total deaths, 29 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 26 in the corresponding week of the previous year.

The numbers of births and deaths registered in nineteen other principal towns are shown in

list B.

† The rates given for this and the preceding week are the corrected rates, i.e., the rates calculated for the population of the town estimated on July 1, 1907, on the basis that its age- and sex-constitution is the same as for the Island. The rate shown for the corresponding week of last year is the crude rate.
