India-East Coast-Cuddalore.

With reference to this office Notice to Mariners, No. 45 of August 1, 1902, it is hereby notified that the new light at Cuddalore was exhibited on October 1, 1902.

## BENGAL.-No. 297.

Africa, North-East—Red Sea, Eastern Shore—Shoals reported.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 643 of 1902) of the existence of the following shoals off the eastern shore of the Red Sea:—

(1) A bank exists off Ras el Humar in approximately lat. 19° 41' N., long. 40° 37' E.

(2) In the channel between the peninsula of Ras el Humar and the islets east of Jinnabiyat, numerous shoals exist lying east and west and blocking the passage entirely.

Approximate position: lat. 19° 46′ 30″ N., long. 40° 37′ E.

(3) A bank about three-quarter of a mile in length east and west, was observed in approximately lat. 19° 0′ 30″ N., long. 41° 6′ 30″ E.

(4) Shoal water extends for a distance of about 3

(4) Shoal water extends for a distance of about 3 cables off the north and south extremes of Towak Island, north-west of Ras Musaghib.

Approximate position: lat. 16° 18′ N., long. 42° 37½′ E. (5) Shoal water extends for a distance of about one and a half mile north-west of Urmek Island approaches to Loheiya.

Approximate position: lat. 15° 39' N., long. 42° 33' E.

#### BENGAL.-No. 298.

Korea, West Coast—Chemulpho Anchorage—Existence and non-existence of certain Shoals.

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 178, dated September 12, 1896, issued by this office, the British Admiralty has given further notice (No. 645 of 1902) that a recent survey reveals the existence of the following shoals in Chemulpho anchorage, and the non-existence of others previously charted:—

- (1) A sandy shoal, with a depth of 4½ fathoms over it, exists in a position from which the Observation spot on So Wolmi bears N. 61° E., distant 11 cables, and Muttchi summit bearing N. 12° E.
- (2) A shoal, with a depth of 4½ fathoms over it, sand and shells, is situated with the Observation spot on So Wolmi, bearing N. 66° E., distant 10½ cables, and Muttchi summit bearing N. 13° E.
- (3) A shoal, with a depth of  $2\frac{1}{4}$  fathoms over it, is situated with the Observation spot on So Wolmi, bearing S. 65° E., distant  $3\frac{1}{3}$  cables, and Kheum Wolmi clump bearing N. 42° E.

This shoal extends for two-thirds of a cable, N. 14° W., from this position.

- (4) A rock, with a depth of 2½ fathoms over it, is situated with the Observation spot on So Wolmi, bearing S. 55° E., distant 5 cables, and Kheum Wolmi clump bearing N. 59° E.
- (5) A rock, with a depth of 3 fathoms over it, is situated with the north extreme of Kheum Wolmi, bearing S. 89° E., distant 9 cables, and the Observation spot on So Wolmi bearing S. 37° E.
- (6) The 3-fathom shoal charted  $4\frac{e}{10}$  cables N. 89° W. from the Observation spot on So Wolmi, the 3-fathom shoal charted S. 80° W., 12} cables from the Observation spot on So Wolmi, and the 2½-fathom shoal charted S. 52° W., 22 cables from So Wolmi Observation spot could not be found, and have been expunged from the Admiralty charts.

Approximate position: So Wolmi, lat. 37° 27¾ N., long. 126° 36′ E. Variation, 5° westerly in 1902.

#### Bengal.—No. 299.

New Zealand—North Island, West Coast—Manukau Harbour—Leading Mark.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 648 of 1902) that as an additional leading mark for the main channel, Manukau harbour, a white patch 25 feet long and 10 feet wide, has been painted on the hillside about 40 feet above and behind the lighthouse on the north side of the harbour. This patch kept just open of Paratutai, N. 27° E., now leads over the bar and up the centre of the channel as far as Paratutai.

Approximate position: lat. 37° 2′ S., long. 174° 33′ E.

#### BENGAL. -- No. 300.

New Zealand—North Island, East Coast—Wharariki Point—Rock off.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 649 of 1902) that the steamship Tutanekai reports having touched a sunken rock while at anchor off Wharariki Point, situated with the extreme of East Cape, bearing N. 11° E., distant 10 miles, and the south extreme of the reef off Wharariki Point, bearing S. 51° W. The Tutanekai was drawing 13 feet at the time, and the danger has been inserted in the Admiralty Charts as a rock with less than 6 feet of water.

Approximate position: lat. 37° 48\frac{37}{29}' S., long. 178°

Variation, 14° easterly in 1902.
