WHEREAS by section 34 (1) of "The Ceylon Railways Ordinance, 1902," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time to declare, by Proclamation, any road or path which the railway may cross to be a "minor crossing," and whether such "minor crossing" shall be closed by gates or not:

And whereas it is expedient to declare the crossing hereinafter described to be a "minor crossing" for the purposes of the said Ordinance:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, in exercise of the power in Us vested as aforesaid, do hereby declare the crossing where the Ceylon Government Railway crosses the road between the stations of Hikkaduwa and Dodanduwa in the Southern Province, at a point 61 miles 7 chains distant from Colombo, to be a "minor crossing" for the purposes of the said Ordinance, as from and after the date of this Proclamation, and that such "minor crossing" be not closed by gates.

W HEREAS by section 19 of The "Vehicles Ordinance, 1901," it is enacted that the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, may, for any town, place, district, or province of this Island, from time to time make such by-laws as may seem necessary or expedient for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the said Ordinance:

And whereas by sub-section (2) of section 20 of the said Ordinance it is enacted that the by-laws when so made shall be published in the Government Gazette and shall thereupon become as legal, valid, binding, and effectual as if the same had been inserted in the said Ordinance, and that all courts, judges, and magistrates shall take judicial notice thereof; and it is further enacted that the Proclamation publishing the by-laws shall set out and define the limits of the town to which such by-laws are to apply:

And whereas for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the said Ordinance certain by-laws were made and published for the town of Colombo, and the limits of the said town were defined by a Proclamation dated the 26th day of January, 1903:

And whereas it is expedient to make further by-laws for the town of Colombo for the purposes aforesaid:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, in exercise of the powers in Us vested as aforesaid, and with the ad ice of the Executive Council, have, for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the said Ordinance, made the by-laws set out in the Schedule A hereto for the town of Colombo, and do define the limits of the said town to be those set out in the Schedule B hereto.

By-laws referred to.

- 1. Any tram car in which the hand brakes, the electric brakes, the motors, or controllers are, or any one of them is, out of order, shall be considered to be a disabled car.
 - 2. No passengers shall be allowed to ride in a disabled tram car.
- 3. Any disabled tram car propelled by another tram car shall be attached thereto securely and as rigidly as practicable.
- 4. No disabled tram car shall be self-propelled in any public thoroughfare. But this rule is not to apply to the self-propulsion of a disabled tram car without passengers for the purpose of taking it into the car shed only, where one brake, motor, or controller only is out of order; so long as the remaining brake, motor, or controller is in perfect working order and the defective brake, motor, or controller is not used or relied upon for use.

SCHEDULE B.

Limits of the Town of Colombo.

Bounded on the north by the sea and Kelani river; east by the Kelani river, St. Sebastian canal, Urugodawatta road, North and South Base Line road as far as the Bacteriological Institute, by a cart track eastwards to the grass fields following the edges of these grass fields and turning southwards along the Yakbedda road, westwards along Kotte road, and then following Buller's road, Bambalapitiya road as far as Dickman's road, then eastwards along a cart road for a distance of 761 yards, and southwards along another track for a distance of 345 yards to the north bank at the junction of the Kalutara and Kirillapana canals; and on the west by the sea and harbour.

In cases where the journey on the day of return is performed wholly or in part by private conveyance for which no charge is made, and should no mileage be claimed, full batta will be allowable for the day of return to station, provided that the distance travelled by private conveyance exceeds five miles."

- 1. The proper authority shall, by notification in the Government Gazette, declare for the information of the public what are the burial grounds situated within the Province, and shall specify the areas which are to be served by each such burial ground.

The examination in the Criminal Procedure Code prescribed under the Minute of March 26, 1900, for officers in the Fourth and Fifth Classes of the Civil Service will also be held on July 17, 1906, as well as at the Kandy Kachcheri.

The examination · shall be held in two parts: the first part, a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, and Arith-Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting and half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively shall be excluded from the remainder of the examination. Special attention will be paid to Handwriting, and candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be rigorously excluded. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.

10. Clerks of the description given in section 3 above, who have served Government continuously for over six years, will be allowed to compete amongst themselves, and will be eligible, if they obtain a minimum of 66 per cent. in Writing and 33 per cent. in the other compulsory subjects, for seven of the appointments offered for competition. Three of the appointments will be reserved as prizes for deserving clerks of the same description, who have served Government continuously for ten years and upwards, to be selected irrespective of examination. No service under the age of sixteen years will be reckoned for

this purpose.

MISCELLANEOUS DEPARTMENTAL NOTICES.

COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

THE weekly return of births and deaths in the Colombo town for the week ended 2nd June, 1906, is subjoined (A).

Births.—The total births were 78. The birth-rate per 1,000 was 23.5,* as against 24.1 in the preceding week and 17.2 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths were 123. The death-rate per 1,000 was 37.0,* as against 37.3 in the previous week and 33.5 in the corresponding week of last year.

Causes of death.—No persons died from cholera, smallpox, or measles; 31 died from diarrheea and dysentery; 23 from phthisis, bronchitis, and pneumonia; 13 from different kinds of fever; and 10 from infantile convulsions.

Infantile deaths.—Of the 123 total deaths, 25 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 23 in the corresponding week of the previous year.
