By-laws referred to.

1. The Chairman may from time to time, in his discretion, cause any place which shall appear to him to be properly constructed and with a due regard to the preservation of the public health and the comfort and convenience of the inhabitants, to be licensed as a private slaughter-house.

2. No sheep, goats, or pigs shall be slaughtered except by the special permission of the Chairman or some officer authorized in writing by him at any other place than a public or private slaughter-house and subject to such conditions as the Board may from time to time impose.

3. The proprietor or lessee of any private slaughter-house shall keep the fences round it in good order and shall at all times keep the buildings and drains as well as the grounds within the licensed area clean and thoroughly scavenged and disinfected.

4. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or Inspector of the Local Board or any sergeant of Police or other officer of the Police of higher rank to inspect such slaughter house at any time.

RULES REFERRED TO.

1. The owner of any ox, horse, sheep, or goat found straying on any public road shall be guilty of an offence.
2. The beds of village tanks shall not be cultivated without a permit from the Government Agent or Assistant Government Agent. Such permit shall be in form annexed to Government Circular No. 42 of 28th April, 1902, and will be issued free of charge to the owners of fields irrigated by such tanks. Such permits shall not be issued to persons other than those whose fields are irrigated by the tank in respect of which the permit is issued.
3. The beds of tanks which have been restored by Government shall not be cultivated without the permit mentioned in rule 2. Such permits will be issued on payment of a fee of Re. 1 for each acre for which permission is given. Permits will only be issued to the owners of lands which are irrigated by the tank in respect of which the permit is issued.

MISCELLANEOUS DEPARTMENTAL NOTICES.

COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

THE weekly return of births and deaths in the Colombo town for the week ended 9th June, 1906, is subjoined (A).

Births.—The total births were 96. The birth-rate per 1,000 was 28·9,* as against 23·5 in the preceding week and 19·0 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths were 166. The death-rate per 1,000 was 49·9,* as against 37·0 in the previous week and 33·8 in the corresponding week of last year.

Causes of death.—No persons died from cholera, smallpox, or measles; 43 died from diarrhoea and dysentery; 32 from phthisis, bronchitis, and pneumonia; 13 from different kinds of fever; and 9 from infantile convulsions.

Infantile deaths.—Of the 165 total deaths, 38 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 25 in the corresponding week of the previous year.

THE OXFORD AND CAMBRIDGE SCHOOLS EXAMINATION BOARD TO THE DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION, CEYLON.

SIR,—We are instructed to send you the following report on the Examination for the English University Scholarship recently held at Colombo under the authority of the Oxford and Cambridge Schools Examination Board.

The subjects of examination were :—

- Mathematics and Physics.
Examiner: R. E. Baynes, M.A., Christ Church, Oxford.
- English (3 candidates).
Examiner: E. DE Sélincourt, M.A., University College, Oxford.
- History (3 candidates).
Examiner: E. Barker, M.A., Merton College, Oxford.
- Chemistry (1 candidate).
Examiner: N. V. Sidgwick, M.A., Lincoln College, Oxford.

On the whole examination E. A. Lewis Wijeyewardene is recommended for election to the Scholarship. M. L. Munesinghe showed special merit in Mathematics.

The examiner report as follows :—

(a) *Mathematics*.—E. A. Lewis Wijeyewardene showed very special merit and M. L. Munesinghe showed special merit in this examination. The work throughout was good and in many cases excellent, and the first-named candidate exhibited considerable neatness and ingenuity in his methods. The third candidate was weaker, but rather in range and power than in accuracy.

Physics.—E. A. Lewis Wijeyewardene again showed special merit in the examination, doing equally good work in all its four branches. The other candidate showed a fair knowledge of the subject, but was weaker in his calculations.

(b) *English*.—The answers as a whole reached a very fair standard of excellence. The best work of each candidate was extremely good, but no candidate did well in every paper, and a different one did best in each. The best general impression was made by Wijeyewardene, despite a somewhat weak essay; Munesinghe, however, deserves mention for a good language paper. The essays were rather below the standard reached last year, their general tendency was to be slipshod in construction and rather too flowery in style.

(c) *History*.—The candidates showed a very fair amount of knowledge: It was in their use of what they knew, and in their method of expression that defects were traceable. There was a tendency to a loose fluency, which both hurried the writer away from the point, and—in the matter of style—encouraged slipshod English.

(d) *Chemistry*.—The answers to the theoretical paper showed a very satisfactory acquaintance with the fundamental theory of the subject, and were clearly and intelligently written. The knowledge of particular substances was on the other hand deficient. It was fairly correct as far as it went, but it did not go very far.

The practical work was less satisfactory. The ordinary qualitative analysis was carried out with moderate success: but the attempt to solve the problem was a complete failure. The candidate relied too much on the methods he had learnt for qualitative analysis, and showed no power of adapting them to the particular case.

As only one paper was sent in, it is difficult to say how far this may be the fault of the particular candidate.

Detailed Report.

(a) Mr. Baynes says:—

I examined three candidates for Scholarships, of whom all took papers in Mathematics, viz., on Arithmetic, Euclid, Algebra, Trigonometry, Geometrical Conic Sections and Algebraic Geometry, Mechanics of Solids and Fluids, with a Problem Paper, and two further offered work in Heat and Light, Magnetism, and Electricity.

In *Mathematics* E. A. Lewis Wijewardene showed very special merit and M. L. Munasinghe special merit: the former obtained 78½ per cent. of the full marks for all the papers, his whole work being very good; the latter obtained 65 per cent. of the full marks with work that was quite good throughout. The third candidate fell very distinctively behind his standard, obtaining 42 per cent. of full marks, but this was due rather to deficiency in range and power than to inexactness in work. No special points for detailed criticism presented themselves except that weakness was shown in attempting the riders in Geometrical Conic Sections; otherwise the general character of the work sent up was good in all its departments, including the Mechanics and Problems.

In *Physics* E. A. Lewis Wijewardene's work again was of special merit; it obtained 81 per cent. of full marks, equally good work being shown up in each of the four subjects of the paper. The other candidate, S. Thambyah, did good work of its kind, which obtained 52 per cent. of full marks; this was of lower standard than that of the other candidate, but adequate knowledge of the subject matter was shown though the calculations were not in general attempted with success.

(b) *English*.—Mr. de Selincourt says:—

The *Shakespeare* and the *Burke*, as was the case last year, were far better known than the other set literature books. The answers on *Shakespeare* done by Wijewardene were of a really high quality and deserve special commendation; and his literature work as a whole was considerably the best thing in the examination. He did the language paper also very fairly. Munasinghe's language paper showed both intelligence and good work; his literature was disappointing. He showed some knowledge, but often failed to see the drift of the question, and wrote off the point. Thambyah wrote a very intelligent essay, but in his other work showed neither the knowledge nor the understanding of his competitors.

(c) *History*.—Mr. Barker says:—

Munasinghe wrote—on the whole—the best set of answers. He distributed his answers well over the paper, and kept to the point of each question. The defect of his work (apart from the tendency to loose writing, was a failure to understand the working of English political life. The Cabinet was by no means understood; and the party system was very imperfectly grasped. This suggests that more attention should be paid to the constitutional side of history.

Wijewardene deserves commendation, less for the whole paper, than for three separate answers, which contained the best work done in the examination. Unhappily two of these three answers were inordinately long; and the other seven were correspondingly thin. What might have been the best paper was spoiled by lack of generalship.

It can hardly be said that any of the candidates showed special merit in the examination; but they all showed industry and knowledge.

(d) Mr. Sidgwick says:—

The *Theoretical Paper* was on the whole very satisfactory. Munasinghe's knowledge of the elementary theory of atoms and molecules and of the simpler deductions was very thorough. The answers to this part of the paper were clearly expressed, and conveyed the impression that he quite understood what he was saying. The gas analysis problem was correctly answered, and so was the question on qualitative analysis. The questions on the properties of particular elements and compounds were not so well answered. There were not many serious mistakes, but his knowledge here was evidently deficient, and there were a good many omissions.

The *Practical work* was less satisfactory. In the analysis of the mixture the acid radicle and one metal were found, but the other metal was missed. In the problem (question 2) Munasinghe altogether failed. He was not able to detect any of the three gases evolved. This was largely owing to the method adopted: but he ought to have seen that it was not succeeding, and that gases were passing through the test-solution without producing any effect. He should also have known that his method would fail to detect several of the most probable gases.

In view of this failure in the practical part of the examination, I cannot say that Munasinghe has shown special merit in his work, although I think that his knowledge of the more elementary theory of the subject is distinctly good.
