REGULATIONS REFERRED TO.

- I. All leave is granted or withheld subject to the necessities of the Municipal service, and leave once granted may be recalled at any time by the Chairman if such a step be deemed necessary for the Municipal service. If the leave has been granted by the Council, the Chairman shall at once report his action recalling the leave to the Council.
- 2. Officers temporarily employed by the Municipal Council are not entitled to any leave beyond that (if any) which may be mentioned in their respective written contracts with the Municipal Council. Provided that the Chairman may grant them such full or half-pay leave, not exceeding thirty days in any year, as he may think fit, and that the Municipal Council may, in case of sickness, grant such further leave as it thinks fit.
- 3. An officer may not absent himself from Kandy without the permission of the Chairman.
- 4. When an application for leave or an extension of leave is based on the ground of ill-health a certificate from a qualified medical practitioner should invariably be sent in.
- 5. All applications for full pay leave must state the amount of previous full pay leave granted to the applicant during the current and preceding years.
- 6. Vacation reave on full pay may be granted by the Municipal Council for periods not exceeding six weeks in respect of any one calendar year's service, or three months in respect of any two successive calendar years' service; such leave may be accumulated in respect of two years only. The Chairman may grant leave of absence, whether on account of illness duly certified or any other cause, not exceeding thirty working days in the aggregate for any one year as he thinks fit. Such leave when granted on full pay shall be counted as part of the period of six weeks or three months which officers may be granted under this rule. Provided that proper arrangements are made for the performance of their duties, which it is expected will be carried on by the other officers of the Department.
- 7. Vacation leave may be granted to an officer to be followed numed:ately by leave on half pay.
- 8. After a period of six years' service with the Conneil or, in the case of seconded officers, a period of six years' total service with the Government and the Council, leave of absence on the half pay of an officer's appointment may be granted. It may be given before the expiration of that period in cases of serious indisposition or of urgent private affairs, if the Council is satisfied that the indulgence is indisposable. Provided that this rule shall not prevent an absent officer being placed on half pay at any time under the provisions of rule 10. All applications for half-pay leave must state the total amount of half-pay leave granted to the applicant since the date of his first appointment under the Municipal Council—if a seconded officer, the date of his first appointment under Government.
- 9. When an officer seeks to obtain vacation leave only, he must, in ordinary cases, make such arrangements as may be approved by the Chairman for the adequate discharge of his duties without expense or inconvenience to the Council. Provided that it shall be competent for the Chairman, with the approval of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment, in cases where it appears desirable to do so to engage a substitute and pay him from the Municipal fund from such period as may be thought fit, and that in the case of an officer drawing a salary of over Rs. 1.000 per annum the permission of the Council shall be first obtained for doing so.
- 10. When it is found impossible to make satisfactory arrangements for the discharge of the duties of an officer absent on full pay leave only, by the other officers of the Department, the absent officer may be placed on half pay and a substitute engaged to perform his duties on the available half pay or on such pay as the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment may approve.
- 11. Except in very special cases no officer on leave will be allowed to receive half salary at any one time for more than one year, nor for a period which, added to his previous absences on similar leave, would exceed by six months one-sixth of his total resident service.
- 12. In case of applications to the Council for extended leave on grounds other than of ill-health, half salary will not be granted unless and until the Chairman is satisfied that continued absence can be conveniently allowed.

- 13. Any leave in excess of one month can only be granted by the Municipal Council, provided that in cases of urgency the Chairman may grant such leave and report it for confirmation to the Municipal Council. This rule shall apply to the grant of both full and half-pay leave.
- 14. Where full pay leave is to be followed by half pay leave the arrangements for the discharge of the officer's duties will be made by the Council, and every officer is liable and required to act without any increase of pay in an office ranking as high as, or higher than, his fixed appointment during the period of full pay leave thus granted.
- 15. In the case of half-pay leave being granted, half the period granted only can be reckoned as service.
- 16. An officer who has obtained leave of absence must not leave Kandy until he has handed over to the officer who has been appointed to act for him or to some officer authorized by the Chairman thereto.

6. Examinations will be held at Colombo and Jaffna only, in the places and under the supervision of the officers specified in Schedule B. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications to present themselves for examination have been returned to them approved by the Director of Public Listruction, leave to present themselves at the most conve-

niently situated station at which the examination is to be held.

7. The examination will be competitive. The number of places assigned for competition will be thirty.

8. The successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical

fitness for service in any part of the Island.

9. The subjects for examination are those set out in Schedule C to this notice. The examination shall be held in two parts: the first part, a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, and Arithmetic. Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting and half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively shall be excluded from the remainder of the examination. Special attention will be paid to Handwriting, and candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be rigorously excluded. The kind of writing preferred will be that generally known as the "Civil Service" hand. The second part of the examination shall be in the remaining subjects in Schedule C. Should a candidate obtain less than one-third of the aggregate marks for the three subjects-Composition, General Paper, Pricis Writing-or less than one-fourth marks in any other subject, or, if he be a Sinhalese or Tamil, less than one-half of the marks in his native language, such marks shall not be counted in his favour. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.

 Clerks of the description given in section 3 above, who have served Government continuously for over six years, will be allowed to compete amongst themselves, and will be eligible, if they obtain a minimum of 66 per cent. in Writing and 33 per cent. in the other compulsory subjects, for seven of the appointments offered for competition. Three of the appointments will be reserved as prizes for deserving clerks of the same description, who have served Government continuously for ten years and upwards, to be selected irrespective of examination. No service under the age of sixteen years will be reckoned for

COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

THE weekly return of births and deaths in the Colombo town for the week ended 16th June, 1906, is subjoined (A).

Births.—The total births were 80. The birth-rate per 1,000 was 24:1,* as against 28:9 in the preceding week and 19.6 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths were 160. The death-rate per 1,000 was 48.2,* as against 49.9 in the

previous week and 36.5 in the corresponding week of last year.

Causes of death.—No persons died from cholers, smallpox, or measles; 49 died from diarri œa nd dysentery; 23 from ohthisis bronchitis, and pneumonia; 11 from different kinds of fever; and 13 from infantile convulsions.

Intuntile deaths.—Of the 160 total deaths, 41 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 25 in the corresponding week of the previous year.

The numbers of births and deaths registered in nineteen other principal towns are shown in list B.
