Part I.—Departmental Orders.

1.—All Departmental Orders will in future be published in Part I. of the *Ceylon Police Gazette*, which should be filed separately from Part II., which will consist of the old "Hue and Cry."

2.—The Inspector-General's Circular Guard File is abolished.

3.—Entries in the Process Register.

At the close of every month the processes entered in the Process Register will be totalled up and an abstract in the following form will be entered:—

2. All warrants received and unexecuted during one month will be again entered in red ink in the Register of Processes for the next month, application being, if necessary, made to the Police Magistrate for their re-issue, and will be carried on so month after month until they have been executed or until the Magistrate has lettered the case. But warrants in cases lettered Fb are to continue to be shown month after month until they are executed, or sufficient proof is shown to enable the Superintendent of Police or Assistant Superintendent of Police to strike them off. Such proof will only be the death of the absconder or other circumstances rendering his arrest absolutely impossible. It is most important that no absconder should be allowed to escape justice. There is no objection to warrants in Fb cases remaining in the file in the Magistrate's court, but they will continue to be shown in the Station Process Registers until executed or struck off.

4.—Constable Clerks.

In future constables should on no account be employed as clerks without the sanction of Government, as such a course involves a double irregularity, that is, the number of constables actually required for constables' work is over-estimated, and the number of clerks is increased without the authority of Government by the employment of constables in clerical duties.—*Colonial Secretary's letter No. 184 of the 26th April, 1906.*
