And whereas by section 34 of the said Ordinance it is enacted that, for the purpose of creating a fund from which the expenses of the police force payable by each town not created a Municipality are to be defrayed, a tax shall be payable on March 31, on June 30, on September 30, on December 31 in every year, for the quarters ending on the said days respectively, on all houses and buildings of every description and on all lands and tenements whatsoever within every such town, to an amount equal to such percentage on the bona fide annual value of such houses, buildings, lands, and tenements as the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, shall by Proclamation from time to time appoint, except in cases where such amount shall fall below the sum of 25 cents a quarter, in all which excepted cases 25 cents per quarter shall be assessed and payable. Provided that such tax shall not in the aggregate exceed the sum necessary for the maintenance of the force in such town except as aforesaid, and which sum it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice and consent aforesaid, from time to time to determine and appoint. Provided further that buildings appropriated to religious worship and such as are placed in charge of military sentries shall be exempted from the payment of such tax:

And whereas the town of Wellawatta and Dehiwala has not been created a Municipality, and whereas the Governor, with the advice and consent aforesaid, has determined and appointed that the sum necessary for the maintenance of the force in the said town of Wellawatta and Dehiwala is Rs. 15,241.50:

And whereas His Excellency the Governor, in exercise of the powers vested in him by section 34 of the said Ordinance and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, by Proclamation dated December 21, 1906, appointed that for the purposes aforesaid the tax payable on all houses and buildings of every description and on all lands and tenements whatsoever in the said town of Wellawatta and Dehiwala aforesaid, and within the limits specified in the schedule to the Proclamation dated December 14, 1906, shall, save in such excepted cases as aforesaid, and in the case of such buildings which are exempted from the payment of such tax as aforesaid, from and after January 1, 1907, be at the rate of 5 per cent. on the bona fide value of such houses, buildings, lands, and tenements aforesaid:

- 1. It shall be the duty of the owner or person in charge of every coconut tree which is dead or is attacked by the beetle secondly described in the schedule to Proclamation dated December 18, 1907, forthwith to uproot such tree and either to consume it with fire or to bury it in the ground at a depth of not less than 3 feet or to keep it completely submerged in water so that the beetle and all eggs and larvæ thereof may be totally destroyed, and that the tree may not serve as a breeding place for any or either of the beetles in the said schedule mentioned.
- 2. No owner or person in charge of any land or premises shall keep or permit to be kept on such land of premises dead coconut trees or stumps of coconut timber, rubbish heaps, or other accumulations of dung, vegetable refuse, or other matter which would be likely to harbour or become breeding places for the said beetles, or neglect or refuse to remove or destroy the same when required so to do by a notice in writing signed by the Government Agent of the Province, or the Assistant Government Agent of the District, or any Police Officer or Headman.
- 3. The Government Agent, the Assistant Government Agent, and every Police Officer and Headman shall have access at all reasonable times into and upon any land whereon any coconut tree is growing for the purpose of inspecting such tree, and also into and upon any land or premises where there is reason to suppose that there are kept any such things as in the preceding rule are referred to.

306 a. Period for which Batta is admissible.—Batta will be paid for the full period members of the Force are in Camp, not exceeding the duration of the Camp as sanctioned by Government. See paragraph 306 b.

In no case will batta be paid to an Officer, Non-Commissioned Officer, or Volunteer unless he is present in Camp for at least 72 consecutive hours, exclusive of the journeys to and from Camp. Should a member of the Force have to leave Camp owing to sickness or accident duly certified before he completes 72 hours' attendance, he will only receive batta for each complete 24 hours he is present in Camp. Batta will not be paid to any member who leaves with less than 72 hours' attendance, if he is recalled by his employer or the head of his department or for any other reason.

A Non-Commissioned Officer or Volunteer who draws rations in lieu of batta, and who leaves Camp for any reason, except sickness or accident duly certified before completing 72 hours' attendance, will pay to Government a sum of 60 cents for each day he has received rations in Camp.

306b. Batta to Members of the Staff.—Members of the staff who have to proceed in advance to make preliminary arrangements and to remain behind to close the Camp will receive batta on the scale laid down in paragraph 306 for the days they are necessarily employed in Camp in excess of the sanctioned duration of the Camp.

306 c. Batta to Advance Parties.—Advances parties consisting of not more than 1 Non-Commissioned Officer and 2 men from each Troop, Battery, or Company who proceed in advance to draw bedding, furniture, &c., and remain behind to hand over huts and stores, will receive batta at the following rates for not more than two days before Camp opens and one day after Camp closes, viz.—

306 d. Mileage, Ceylon Planters' Rifle Corps.—Mileage at 50 cents per mile when travelling to and from Camp will be paid to all ranks of the Ceylon Planters' Rifle Corps who live ten miles and more from the nearest Railway Station. Members who draw mileage will not receive batta under paragraph 306 for the days they travel.

306 e. Horse Allowance, Ceylon Mounted Rifles.—A horse allowance of Rs. 60 will be paid to each Officer, Non-Commissioned Officer, and Trooper of the Mounted Rifles who attends Camp for five clear days (120 hours), exclusive of journey, to and from Camp, provided he is in possession of a suitable horse, which must be his own property.

NOTICES CALLING FOR TENDERS.

CEALED Tenders, marked on the envelope "Tender for the Conveyance of Mails by Motor Car," will be received at the Postmaster-General's Office up to 12 noon on Monday, February 3, 1908, for the under-mentioned services from January 1, 1909, to December 31, 1913:—

(1) For the conveyance of mails between Colombo and Chilaw twice daily each way, and between Chilaw and Puttalam once daily each way, by motor car suitable for conveyance of passengers as well as mails.

(2) For the conveyance of mails between Colombo and Chilaw twice daily each way, and between Chilaw and Puttalam once daily each way, by a light motor car carrying mails only.

2. Government to have the option in each case, on giving three months' notice, to substitute for the service between Colombo and Chilaw a service between Negombo and Chilaw. This option will not be exercised until the Railway to Negombo is approaching completion. This railway is expected to be opened about the close of 1909.

3. Tenderers must state the rate of annual subsidy they will require during the period while the contract is between Colombo and Puttalam and the reduced amount they will require when the starting point is altered to Negombo as provided in paragraph 2 above.

4. The tenders must be made in duplicate, the original is to be forwarded by the tenderers direct to the Postmaster-General, while the duplicate shall be sent on the same day to the Hon. the Controller of Revenue.

5. The hours of arrival and departure of the motor cars to be fixed from time to time by the Postmaster-General.

6. The tenders must be made upon forms which will be supplied on application to the Postmaster-General, and no tender will be considered unless it is furnished on the recognized form, and unless the deposit mentioned in paragraph 8 below accompanies the tender.

7. Any alterations in a tender must bear the initials of the tenderer or tenderers, otherwise it will be rejected.

8. A deposit of Rs. 1,500 will be required at the time the tender is received; and the person whose tender is accepted will be required to make a further deposit of Rs. 1,500 within a fortnight of his being informed that his tender has been accepted. In the event of his failing to make such second deposit, he shall forfeit the first deposit of Rs. 1,500 which accompanied his tender.

9. He will also be required to sign a contract in Ceylon as soon as he has made the second deposit

above-mentioned, and both deposits will be liable to forfeiture for failure on his part either to sign the contract as herein provided or to commence his service at the time agreed on.

10. The total of the two deposits must be hypothecated as security by the contractor. From this sum the Postmaster-General will meet the cost of carrying on the service when he may deem it to be necessary to incur expenditure on account of the contractor's failure to comply with the conditions of the contract.

11. The contractor shall provide such a number of motor cars fully equipped as will, in the opinion of the Postmaster-General, be sufficient for the service.

12. No car shall be used which has not been first approved by the Postmaster-General or officer appointed by him in that behalf. Every car on approval shall be marked with a number ordered by the Government.

13. The cars provided for the service No. (1) in paragraph 1 above shall comply with the following conditions:—

(a) When fully equipped and loaded with a weight of a ton, in addition to equipment, there shall not be a weight of more than two tons on any one axle, nor shall the whole car when loaded and equipped weigh more than three tons.

(b) Each car shall be capable of carrying six passengers and three hundredweights of baggage at the rate of half a hundredweight to each passenger, in addition to the driver.

(c) The car shall have a special locked receptacle for the mails. This receptacle shall be capable of containing three hundredweights of mails, which would probably require a space of about thirty cubic feet.

(d) The car when loaded must be able to work easily at a pace of ten miles an hour on the flat, and be capable of ascending and descending gradients at a pace of eight miles an hour.

(e) It must be able to run thirty miles without renewing the supply of water, petrol, or other necessary.

(f) The car must be so covered as to give sufficient protection against sun or rain.

Conditions (c), (d), (e), and (f) to apply to cars for service (2) in paragraph 1, and there shall not be a weight of more than two tons on any one axle when the car is fully loaded and equipped.

14. Each tender to be accompanied by a design showing the accommodation in the car for passengers and mails.

15. Fines may be imposed by the Postmaster-General for all delays and irregularities.

16. In case of repeated delays or irregularities the contract may be cancelled.

17. The Government reserves to itself the right of rejecting, without question, any tender or any portion of a tender.

For the service of transporting 350,000 cwt. of salt more or less, collected at the maha manufacture of 1907, from the salt pans at Puttalam East, Puttalam West, Tillayadi, Kombimunai, Pachchakattimundel, and Palavi. and weighing and storing the same in the salt depots of Puttalam.

Tenderers will note the following requirements:-

- 1. Tenderers should tender separately (1) for transporting, weighing, and storing of salt from Kombimunai, Tillayadi, Pachchakattimundel, and Palavi; (2) for tansporting, weighing, and storing from Eastern and Western pans; (3) for transporting, weighing, and storing from both the above, i.e., Kombimunai, Tillayadi, Pachchakattimundel, Palavi, and Eastern and Western pans.
- 2. They should specify the rates per 1,000 cwt. r transporting the salt in sacks with mouths tied and eighing and storing the same.
- 3. If all the work is given to one tenderer, he must bring in, weigh, and deliver 37,000 cwt. per mensem.

The tenderers will be liable in case of failure to a fine, not exceeding Rs. 10 for each day of failure, to be imposed at the discretion of the Assistant Government Agent.

VITAL STATISTICS.

COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

THE weekly return of births and deaths in the Colombo town for the week ended December 28, 1907 is subjoined.

Births.—The total births were 70. The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum was 20.6,* as against 20.6 in the preceding week and 25.9 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths were 91. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 29 8,† as against 35.5 in the previous week and 55.7 in the corresponding week of last year.

Causes of death.—No person died from cholera, smallpox, or measles; 15 died from diarrhea and dysentery; 6 from phthisis; 13 from bronchitis and pneumonia; 4 from different kinds of fever; and 12 from infantile convulsions.

Infantile deaths.—Of the 91 total deaths, 30 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 33 in the corresponding week of the previous year.

* Calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1907, viz., 176,724.

† The rates given for this and the preceding week are the corrected rates, i.e., the rates calculated for the population of the town estimated on July 1, 1907, on the basis that its age- and sex-constitution is the same as for the Island. The rate shown for the corresponding week of last year is the crude rate.
