IN the Name of His Majesty EDWARD THE SEVENTH, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith.

### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir HENRY ARTHUR BLAKE, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation dated the 31st day of May, 1906, and published in the *Government Gazette* No. 6,124 dated the 1st day of June, 1906, a police force was established at Wellawatta, Dehiwala, and Sedawatta, in the District of Colombo, Western Province, under the provisions of section 8 of the Police Ordinance of 1865:

And whereas by section 8 of the said Ordinance it is further enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, such Proclamation to revoke:

And whereas it is expedient to revoke the said Proclamation of the 31st day of May, 1906, with effect as from and after the First day of January, 1907:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the said Proclamation of the 31st day of May, 1906, as from and after the First day of January, 1907.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Seventh day of December, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Six.

Circular.

SIR,—WITH reference to my Circular Despatch of the 20th of September, 1905, I have the honour to transmit to you, for your information, copies of a notice issued by the Nobel Committee of the Norwegian Parliament with regard to the nomination of candidates for the Nobel Peace Prize of 1907.

I have to request that you will take such action with reference to this document as may seem calculated to make the conditions of the Prize known to those bodies and persons who are qualified to nominate candidates.

It will be noted that names of candidates should be received by the Committee before the 1st of February next.

#### Nobel Peace Prize.

ALL proposals of candidates for the Nobel Peace Prize, which is to be distributed December 10, 1907, must, in order to be taken into consideration, be laid before the Nobel Committee of the Norwegian Parliament by a duly qualified person before the first of February of the same year.

Any one of the following persons is held to be duly qualified: (a) Members and late members of the Nobel Committee of the Norwegian Parliament, as well as the advisers appointed at the Norwegian Nobel Institute; (b) Members of Parliament and Members of Government of the different States, as well as Members of the Interparliamentary Union; (c) Members of the International Arbitration Court at The Hague; (d) Members of the Commission of the Permanent International Peace Bureau; (e) Members and Associates of the Institute of International Law; (f) University Professors of Political Science, and of Law, of History, and of Philosophy; and (g) persons who have received the Nobel Peace Prize.

The Nobel Peace Prize may also be accorded to institutions or associations.

According to the Code of Statutes, section 8, the grounds upon which any proposal is made must be stated, and handed in along with such papers and other documents as may therein be referred to.

According to section 3, every written work, to qualify for a prize, must have appeared in print.

For particulars, qualified persons are requested to apply to the office of the Nobel Committee of the Norwegian Parliament, Drammensvei 19, Kristiania.

IT is hereby notified that an examination under the Regulations of August 26, 1891, for gentlemen in the Civil Service will be held in the Council Chamber on Monday, January 14, 1907, at 10.30 A.M., and following days, namely:—

Monday, January 14	.. Sinhalese	Thursday, January 17	.. Law
Tuesday, January 15	.. Law	Friday, January 18	.. Accounts
Wednesday, January 16	.. Law	Saturday, January 19	.. Tamil

The examination under the Minute of December 12, 1898, and the *viva voce* examination in the native languages for officers in the Public Works Department and the Forest Department will be held at the same time and place.

Only the Police Magistrates who are not members of the Bar or of the Civil Service and those candidates who have been specially nominated by the Governor will be admitted to the examination under the Minute of December 12, 1898.

The examination in the Criminal Procedure Code prescribed under the Minute of March 26, 1900, for officers in the Fourth and Fifth Classes of the Civil Service will also be held on January 15, 1907, as well as at the Kandy Kachcheri.

It is also hereby notified that candidates will be given the option of using Codes in the examinations in the Criminal Procedure Code and the Penal Code; they must, however, state when sending in their names what their decision is, as the character of the papers set for those who use Codes and those who do not will be different.

Candidates are required to send in their name not later than December 20, 1906.

Gentlemen in the Civil Service should state in their applications whether they are presenting themselves for the first or second examination, and whether they intend taking up Sinhalese or Tamil.

## COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

THE weekly return of births and deaths in the Colombo town for the week ended 1st December, 1906, is subjoined (A).

*Births.*—The total births were 100. The birth-rate per 1,000 was 30·1,\* as against 27·7 in the preceding week and 26·7 in the corresponding week of last year.

*Deaths.*—The total deaths were 148. The death-rate per 1,000 was 44·5,\* as against 40·9 in the previous week and 34·7 in the corresponding week of last year.

*Causes of death.*—No persons died from cholera, smallpox, or measles; 30 died from diarrhoea and dysentery; 46 from phthisis, bronchitis, and pneumonia; 9 from different kinds of fever; and 15 from infantile convulsions.

*Infantile deaths.*—Of the 148 total deaths, 35 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 33 in the corresponding week of the previous year.
