Railway Warrants.

In order to keep a check upon the issue of railway warrants, officers should, at their inspections, compare the Railway Warrant Book kept in the station with the entries in the Information Book, and satisfy themselves that the warrants were issued on good grounds. To facilitate reference the number of the Information Book paragraph referring to the issue of each railway warrant should be entered on the back of the warrant counterfoil.

Order No. 49.

Pay, Batta, &c., of Men quitting the Police Force.

All men quitting the Force should leave an address to which any communications regarding pay, batta, &c., may be sent.

2. Every officer in charge of a station will read this order out to his men at three successive parades.
3. A book where such addresses can be entered will be opened in each station.
