Applications to strike off Articles from the Inventory Book.

WHEN it is necessary to strike off from the Inventory Book articles not exceeding Rs. 10 in value, application should be made to the Inspector-General of Police and his order filed as a voucher for the article struck off.

2. In case of articles exceeding Rs. 10, or any articles lost by theft or gross carelessness, a report should, as at present, be sent to the Hon. the Colonial Secretary through the Inspector-General.

Inventory Book.

WITH reference to Government Circular No. 77 of 1907 regarding the Inventory Book, receipt and issue vouchers must be kept in every station to support receipts and issues.

2. To ensure this every officer issuing stores will send despatch notes in duplicate to the receiving officer, who will file one copy and return the other copy duly perfected.

3. These receipt and issue vouchers will be numbered separately and filed separately, the number of the voucher being entered in the appropriate column of the Inventory Book and the number of the page of the Inventory Book entered on the vouchers. The stores can thus be readily checked.

Prosecution in Police Courts.

SUPERINTENDENTS and Assistant Superintendents of Police are hereby informed that in Police Courts where Station House Officers are not allowed to prosecute in summary cases on the ground that they are witnesses, they should instruct the Station House Officers to put themselves into the witness box first, and then obtain the Magistrate's permission to conduct the prosecution, to which there can be little or no objection.
