The examination under the Minute of December 12, 1898, and the *viva voce* examination in the native languages for officers in the Public Works Department, the Irrigation Department, the Forest Department, and the Railway Department, will be held at the same time and place.

Only the Police Magistrates who are not members of the Bar or of the Civil Service and those candidates who have been specially nominated by the Governor will be admitted to the examination under the Minute of December 12, 1898.

The examination in the Criminal Procedure Code prescribed under the Minute of March 26, 1900, for officers in the Fourth Class of the Civil Service, will also be held on October 20, 1908, as well as at the Kandy Kachcheri.

46. (a) *Invalid and Bath Chairs, Barrel and Piano Organs on Wheels, Ordinary Tricycles, and Jinrickshaws* will be conveyed at owner's risk by passenger train at four times the rates for bicycles. Minimum charge Re. 1, except on Uda Pussellawa Line, where minimum charge will be Rs. 5, as a whole truck is required for the conveyance of these articles.

Consignors are requested to remove the wheels of jinrickshaws where possible before tendering them for conveyance by train.

(b) *Perambulators, Mail Carts, Portable Harmoniums, and large Rocking Horses* will be conveyed at owner's risk by passenger train at double the rates for bicycles. Minimum charge 50 cents.

(c) *Children's Toy Bicycles, Tricycles, and Rocking Horses* will be conveyed at owner's risk by passenger train at ordinary parcels rates.

Seventeenth Annual Report of the Ceylon Public Service Mutual Guarantee Association, 1907-1908.

ON June 30, 1908, there were on the books of the Association 805 members, as against 789 on June 30, 1907, showing an increase in membership of 16.

2. The total amount of contributions received from members during the year was Rs. 8,183·44, as against Rs. 8,493·52 in the preceding year, a decrease of Rs. 310·08.

3. A sum of Rs. 5,993·04 in the aggregate was refunded to members on withdrawal from the Association or on account of over-remittances, as against Rs. 6,073·09 refunded during the previous year.

4. During the year the Association was not called upon to make good any claims in respect of defaulting associates.

5. The following statements of accounts for the period under review are annexed:—

Brief Report on the Ceylon Volunteer Force, being chiefly the result of Observations made in Camp at Diyatalawa between July 16 and 24, 1908.

The Ceylon Artillery Volunteers.—The general work was very good, and was carried out smartly and cheerfully, though hours were often very long. The discipline was very good, and one case of insubordination on the return journey was severely dealt with. Amongst a few men there was a tendency to slackness on account of minor ailments. The general physique is good, and when thoroughly fit the men would be capable of doing hard work.

A total of 144 rounds of shrapnel and 12 rounds of case were fired. All gun-layers, range-finders, and other specialists were employed. The fire effect was not good, but this, I believe, was partly due to a defect in elevating gear and to fault in the fuzes, which seem to have suffered from climate. These matters will be seen to. The fire discipline and drill were good, but battery commanders were at times slow.

The Ceylon Mounted Rifles are good and very keen. Their physique is excellent; they ride well, and are well mounted. Of course, I would like to see more of them turn out, but I think that their numbers may be regarded as satisfactory. They need practice in mounting and dismounting more rapidly, and they must learn to understand the importance of scouting as compared with fighting. I think that the corps owes much to Colonel Gordon Reeves.

The Ceylon Light Infantry.—On the whole, I was agreeably surprised by this unit, as I had thought them indifferent, but I consider that they deserve some frank remarks. Although for weight and other measurements they fall little short of British Infantry recruits, they are lacking in energy. At the same time it is only fair to say that they got through several big days with little falling out. The men seemed incapable of putting in a final spurt. Many of the officers and non-commissioned officers seemed

ignorant of their duties, and failed to maintain proper discipline in the field. Generally speaking, they were very slow, and straggled in the field. They were poor hands with pick and shovel, and never dug their trenches deep enough. I believe that there is some fairly good material in their ranks, but it wants a good deal of developing, especially among the officers. The men want route marching and physical training all the year round. To bring them into line with the other Volunteers, they require a greater number of parades to make them efficient.

The Ceylon Volunteer Medical Corps.—The number that turned out was good. Work was carried out in a satisfactory manner under the excellent supervision of Major Thomasz.

The Ceylon Planters Rifle Corps.—This corps was excellent, and has a first-rate Commanding Officer in Colonel Wright. They need improvement in many matters in their field work, but this would very soon come right with training and practice. I have, however, one great complaint against them, and that is that so few of them came to camp. Out of a strength of 509 we never had more than 137 in camp, and I am trying to find out the real cause of this with a view to improving matters.

Cadet Battalion, Ceylon Light Infantry.—They turned out in good numbers, and did fairly well, but I considered them slow in the field and inclined to be lazy. They want more physical drill and stricter discipline. I am in great hopes that we shall be able to improve them in these respects. I think that the existence of this corps must be a good thing for the school boys of Ceylon.

General.—I hope that in future years we may make training for the Volunteers generally more progressive, and be able to use all our time in camp for regimental and brigade training.

I enclose a statement showing attendance of men by units.

GOVERNMENT TRAINING COLLEGE, COLOMBO.

AN Entrance Examination for admission to the English Teachers' Course of Training (for men and women) during 1909 and 1910 will be held at the Training College on Monday, November 2, 1908, commencing at 10.30 A.M.

Ten studentships are offered for competition. Eight of these are worth Rs. 300 per annum, tenable for two years; the other two are worth Rs. 480, tenable for one year only. The latter are intended for candidates whose general attainments and teaching experience justify their admission to the second-year course of the College. Successful candidates will receive Rs. 25 and Rs. 40 per mensem respectively as long as their conduct, attendance, and progress be satisfactory. Students-in-training must devote the whole of their time to College work. A limited number of male students may reside in the College during session on the payment of the prescribed charge for board, &c. Those who do not go into residence must live within a convenient distance of the College, and must be able to satisfy the Principal that their places of residence afford proper facilities for study and conditions for the maintenance of general good health. Each selected candidate will be examined by a Medical Officer, whose report must state that the candidate is physically fit to take up the work of a teacher.

The subjects of the examination will include :—

- (1) English Language and Literature; Grammar; Composition; Reading aloud.
- (2) Arithmetic: general.
- (3) History and Geography: general questions on Ceylon and English History; general geography of Asia, Europe, and Africa, with map drawing.
- (4) Mathematics: Algebra to quadratic equations. Geometry: the subject-matter of Euclid's Books I. to III. Optional for women.
- (5) Latin: easy translations, grammar, and composition. Optional for women.
- (6) Drawing: freehand drawing from the flat.

No further information will be given concerning this syllabus.

In order to gain admission to this examination, intending candidates should apply to the Principal for an admission form, which will be available on September 15. This form must be returned on or before October 15. Applicants will then be informed whether they have been selected to appear at the examination.

Those students who complete the course successfully will be awarded a second class certificate, which entitles them to certain privileges as laid down in Articles 70, 71, and 72 of the Ceylon Code for Aided Schools, 1908. These Articles read as follows :—

"Students who have completed a two-years' course in the Government Training College, or any other Training College in Ceylon specially recognized by Government for that purpose, will, on passing the Final Examination of the Government Training College, receive a second class certificate, and will, after three successive years' satisfactory work in a Government or grant-in-aid school (either in the same school or in another school under the same management), be entitled to a first class certificate. The percentage recognized for satisfactory work will be in the case of head teachers 60 per cent., in the case of assistant teachers 70 per cent. in the primary standards and 60 per cent. in the middle standards. Applications for first class certificates shall in every case be accompanied by a report from the manager on the teacher's conduct and his success in maintaining discipline.

"A first class certificate will entitle its holder to receive from Government a result payment equal to one-third of his annual salary, if the following percentage of passes have been obtained :—

"Principal teachers of primary schools, 70 per cent.

"Principal teachers of middle schools, in which 15 children are presented in the middle standards, 65 per cent.

"Assistant teachers in Standards I. to III., 80 per cent.

"Assistant teachers in Standards IV. to V., 70 per cent.

"Assistant teachers in Standards VI. to VIII., 65 per cent.

"In schools exempted from individual examination, the Director will decide whether the teacher's work has been satisfactory, and whether it qualifies him for result payment after a consideration of a special report made by the Inspector."

VITAL STATISTICS.

COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended August 15, 1908.

Births.—The total births were 81. The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum was 23·5,* as against 21·7 in the preceding week and 26·0 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths were 108, including 2 deaths of town residents who died in the Infectious Diseases Hospital at Kanatta. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 34·9,† as against 45·8 in the previous week and 34·5 in the corresponding week of last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 108 total deaths, 20 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 31 in the corresponding week of the previous year.

Causes of Death.—Eleven deaths were registered from enteric fever (against 10, 9, and 17 in the three previous weeks), of which 3 were in Kollupitiya Ward (which includes Bambalapitiya and the bulk of the Cinnamon Gardens), 2 in Slave Island, and 1 each in St. Paul's and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals). Seven occurred in the Maradana hospitals (4 being patients from outside Municipal limits and 3 from other wards of the town), and 1 in the Infectious Diseases Hospital at Kanatta of a Sinhalese from Slave Island. In the week under review 31 cases of illness from enteric fever were reported to the Municipal authorities, against 37 in the previous week. Sixteen persons died of phthisis; 15 of bronchitis and pneumonia; 13 of diarrhoea and dysentery; and 6 of infantile convulsions. One person died of smallpox in the Infectious Diseases Hospital at Kanatta, the patient being a Sinhalese from Slave Island, making the fifth death from this cause since the beginning of last month in this locality. Three cases of illness from smallpox, 4 from chickenpox, and 10 from measles have been reported this week. Other details are given in the annexed tables.

* Calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1908, viz., 180,262.

† The rates given for this and the preceding week are the corrected rates, i.e., the rates calculated for the population of the town estimated on July 1, 1908, on the basis that its age- and sex-constitution is the same as for the Island. The rate shown for the corresponding week of last year is the crude rate.
