And whereas the said rules were not objected to by the said Legislative Council then in session within forty days after their having been so laid before the said Council.

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, in exercise of the power vested in Us by sub-section (3) of section 10 of the said Poisons Ordinance, No. 11 of 1901, do hereby proclaim the rules set forth in the schedule hereto, and declare that the same shall take effect as from and after the date hereof:

SCHEDULE.

- 1. In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires, the term "cocaine" shall include all preparations of cocaine and salts of cocaine and their preparations, and the term "doctor" shall mean a medical practitioner registered as such under Ordinance No. 2 of 1905.
- 2. In issuing any license under section 4 of the Ordinance the Government Agent may in express terms exempt from the rights granted by such license the right to sell cocaine, and it shall not be lawful for the licensee on a license containing such an exemption to sell or expose or offer for sale cocaine in any quantity.
- 3. No person licensed to sell poisons, including cocaine, by retail, shall sell cocaine by retail to any person other than a person known to him or introduced by some person known to him.
- 4. No licensed person shall sell by retail more than six grains of cocaine in a dry state or any solution containing more than ten grains of the active drug to the same person on the same day, unless the buyer is a qualified medical practitioner or a chemist or druggist licensed to sell poisons.
- 5. No person licensed to sell poisons, including cocaine by retail, shall keep in stock more than one ounce of cocaine.
- 6. None of the foregoing regulations shall apply to cocaine when forming part of the ingredients of any medicine dispensed by an apothecary or chemist and druggist on a doctor's prescription; but all prescriptions, if containing cocaine, shall be entered in a book kept for that purpose, to be called the Prescription Book, with the name of the person to whom it was sold and the name of the doctor prescribing. The name and address of the seller shall be attached to the receptacle containing the medicine prescribed.
- 7. No person licensed to sell poisons, including cocaine, by wholesale, shall sell cocaine by wholesale, except—
 - (a) To persons licensed to sell poisons, including cocaine, by wholesale or retail.

(b) To a qualified medical practitioner.

- 8. No person licensed to sell poisons, including cocaine, by wholesale-
 - (a) Shall sell to any person whomsoever cocaine in less quantities than one ounce of dry cocaine.
 - (b) Shall sell cocaine to retail dealers or to qualified medical practitioners, save in quantities of one ounce.
 - (c) Shall sell cocaine in quantities exceeding one ounce, except to persons licensed to sell poisons, including cocaine by wholesale.
- 9. All cocaine arriving in the Island consigned to any wholesale dealer shall be declared at the Customs premises as cocaine, and shall only be removed from the Customs or Post Office with a permit on the following form:—

WHEREAS by section 53 of "The Courts Ordinances, 1889 and 1901," it is inter alia enacted that it shall be lawful for the Judges of the Supreme Court, or any three of them, of whom the Chief Justice shall be one, from time to time to frame, constitute, and establish such general rules and orders of courts as to them shall seem meet for the pleading, practice, and procedure where not specially provided for by "The Civil Procedure Code, 1889," or the Criminal Procedure Code, upon all actions, suits, prosecutions, and other matters, civil and criminal, to be brought to the Supreme Court and in all courts subordinate to it:

And whereas, in exercise of the aforesaid power and of the power vested in them by "The Foreign Tribunals Evidence Act, 1856," the Judges of the Supreme Court have framed, constituted, and established the rules set forth in the schedule hereto for the purpose of regulating the form of procedure to be observed in this Island in any case where it has been made to appear to the Supreme Court by means of Commission Rogatoire, or Letter of Request, or other evidence that the examination of witnesses is desired by a court or tribunal of a foreign country in relation to any civil or commercial matter or any criminal matter pending before such court or tribunal:

And whereas the said rules were in pursuance of the said section of the said Ordinances duly laid before the Legislative Council then in session and not objected to within forty days of their being so laid before the Council:

It is hereby proclaimed in terms of the said section of the said Ordinances that the said rules shall come into force from the date of the publication hereof.

SCHEDULE.

Rules of Court.

In exercise of the power vested in Us by "The Courts Ordinances, 1889 and 1901," and by "The Foreign Tribunals Evidence Act, 1856," and of every other power enabling Us, We hereby make the following rules:—

Court on request of foreign tribunals may make order for taking evidence.

Where under "The Foreign Tribunals Evidence Act, 1856," or "The Extradition Act, 1870," section 24, any civil or commercial matter or any criminal matter is pending before a court or tribunal of a foreign country, and it is made to appear to the court by Commission Rogatoire, or Letter of Request. or other evidence as hereinafter provided, that such court or tribunal is desirous of obtaining the testimony in relation to such matter of any witness or witnesses within the jurisdiction, the court may, on the ex parte application of any person shown to be duly authorized to make the application on behalf of such foreign court or tribunal, and on production of the Commission Rogatoire, or Letter of Request, or of a certificate signed in the manner and certifying to the effect mentioned in section 2 of "The Foreign Tribunals Evidence Act, 1856," such other evidence as the court may require, make such order or orders as may be necessary to give effect to the intention of the Acts above mentioned in conformity with section 1 of "The Foreign Tribunals Evidence Act, 1856."

Form of order.

2 An order made under the preceding rule shall be in form numbered 1 in the schedule to these rules, with such variations as circumstances may require.

Before whom the examination may be taken. 3 The examination may be ordered to be taken before any fit and proper person nominated by the person applying, or before such qualified person as to the court may seem fit.

Depositions, how to be dealt with. 4 Unless otherwise provided in the order for examination, the Examiner before whom the examination is taken shall, on its completion, forward it to the Registrar of the Supreme Court, and on receipt thereof the Registrar shall append thereto a certificate, in form numbered 2 in the schedule to these rules, with such variations as circumstances may require, duly sealed with the seal of the said court, and shall forward the depositions so certified, and the Commission Rogatoire, or Letter of Request, if any, to the Colonial Secretary for transmission to the foreign court or tribunal requiring the same.

Manner of taking the examination. 5 An order made under rule 1 may, if the court shall think fit, direct the said examination to be taken in such manner as may be requested by the Commission Rogatoire or Letter of Request from the foreign court, or therein signified to be in accordance with the practice or requirements of such court or tribunal, or which may, for the same reason, be requested by the applicant for such order. But in the absence of any such special directions being given in the order for examination, the same shall be taken in the manner prescribed in chapter XXIX. of "The Civil Procedure Code, 1889."

Taking evidence on request of British tribunal out of the jurisdiction. 6 Rules 1 to 5 shall apply, as far as may be, to applications under the Evidence by Commission Act, 1859 (22 Vict. c. 20), for the purpose of giving effect to any Commission or Letter of Request from any British tribunal out of the jurisdiction.

Compliance with request of foreign tribunal without application of parties.

7 Where a Commission Rogatoire or Letter of Request, as mentioned in rule 1, is transmitted to the court by the Colonial Secretary with an intimation that it is desirable that effect should be given to the same without requiring an application to be made to the court by the agents in Ceylon of any of the parties to the action or matter in the foreign country, the Registrar shall transmit the same to the Attorney-General, who may thereupon make such applications and take such steps as may be necessary to give effect to such Commission Rogatoire or Letter of Request, in accordance with rules 1 to 5.

Interpretation.

8 In these rules "the court" means the Supreme Court or any Judge thereof.

Short title.

9 These rules may be cited as the "Rules under the Foreign Tribunals Evidence Act, 1856."

And it is further ordered that the said Examiner do take down in writing the evidence of the said witness or witnesses, according to the rules and practice of the court pertaining to the examination and cross-examination of witnesses (or as may be otherwise directed); and do cause each and every such witness to sign his or her depositions in the said Examiner's presence; and do sign the depositions taken in pursuance of this order, and when so completed, do transmit the same, together with this order, to the Registrar of the Court for transmission to the President of the said Tribunal desiring the evidence of such witness or witnesses.

THE following rules and orders made by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under Ordinance No. 13 of 1896, entitled "An Ordinance relating to Pilgrimages," for the conduct of the Kataragama pilgrimage and festival, where special precautions have been and are necessary, are published for general information, in lieu of the rules promulgated annually for several years.

RULES.

- 1. For sanitary reasons the duration of the Kataragama festival and of the stay of pilgrims at Kataragama shall be and it is hereby limited to two days, namely, December 6 and 7, 1908, inclusive. Pilgrims arriving before the day first named or staying beyond the period here prescribed shall be guilty of an offence.
- 2. It shall be lawful for the Police authorities or any Police Magistrate at any place on the line of march to prohibit from proceeding all persons who, by reason of disease, infirmity, weakness, advanced age, youth, want of supplies, or other sufficient cause, are considered unfit to undertake the journey, or who appear likely to fall ill and endanger the health of others; and to require such persons to find security to ensure their obedience to the orders so given. In default of such security being found, it shall be lawful for the said Police authorities or Police Magistrate to detain such persons in custody for a period not exceeding three days.
- 3. In the event of an epidemic breaking out at Kataragama during the festival, it shall be lawful for the officers appointed to enforce the observance of orders to declare the festival at an end, and to direct pilgrims at once to leave the village and proceed to their homes, and to prescribe the roads they have to travel.
- 4. The officers appointed to enforce the observance of orders shall have power on the line of march to and from Kataragama and at Kataragama—
 - (a) To appoint particular places to be exclusively used by the pilgrims for washing and bathing, for drawing water and drinking, and for natural offices;
 - (b) To appoint places for the occupation of each class of pilgrims;

(c) To prescribe routes for the journey of any body of pilgrims; (d) To regulate the distribution of all food given to pilgrims;

(e) To fix separate places of abode for pilgrims who fall ill, to prohibit communication with them, and to detain them if unfit to travel.

Any person disobeying an order given by the appointed officers shall be guilty of an offence.

- 5. The Police are empowered and required to seize and destroy all food condemned as unwholesome on the march or in camp by the Medical Officer, or, if there be none, by the Chief Officer of Police; and any person resisting or obstructing the Police in the discharge of this or of any other duty prescribed by these rules shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
- 6. Any person tethering or keeping cattle in any place other than that assigned by the Police shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
- 7. Any person selling meat in camp in any other place than that assigned for the purpose by the officer in charge of the camp, and any other person selling food condemned as unwholesome by the Medical Officer, or in his absence by the Chief Officer of Police, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
- 8. Any person who shall, during the occupation of the camp, use any other place for offices of nature than that provided for the purpose by Government, or failing to cover the deposit with earth or sand, and any person who shall during the same period bathe in or enter the river above the spot appointed by the officer in charge of the camp, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

- 9. Any person suffering from an infectious or a contagious disease, and not reporting the same to the Medical Officer, or in his absence to the Chief Officer of Police, and any person abetting or assisting in the concealment of such disease, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
- 10. All persons shall take up to quarters assigned to them by the Chief Officer of Police at the halting places and in the camp, and any pilgrim declining or neglecting to do so shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
- 11. The number of pilgrims for the pilgrimage of the year 1908 is restricted to 183.
- 12. No person shall proceed on the pilgrimage in the year 1908 without having first obtained a ticket from the Government Agent of the Western Province for the Colombo band, or from the Government Agent of the Central Province for the Kandy band, or from the Government Agent of the Southern Province for the Galle band, or from the Government Agent of the North-Western Province for the Kurunegala band, or from the Government Agent of the Eastern Province for the Batticaloa band, or from the Government Agent of the Northern Province for the Jaffna band, or from the Government Agent of the Province of Uva for the Badulla band.
- 13. Every person proceeding on the pilgrimage shall show his ticket when required to do so by any officer of Police, or by any officer appointed to enforce the observance of orders under the Ordinance aforesaid.
- 14. The transfer of a ticket by the person named in it and the use of it by any other person are forbidden.

THE following Order made by the Judges of the Supreme Court under section 53 of "The Courts Ordinances, 1889 and 1901," for regulating the mode of prosecuting Civil Appeals in the Supreme Court, has been laid before the Legislative Council, and unless annulled by the Council within forty days, it will be proclaimed in the Government Gazette and come into force accordingly.

Order for Regulating the mode of Prosecuting Civil Appeals in the Supreme Court, made by the Judges under Section 53 of "The Courts Ordinances, 1889 and 1901."

WE, the Honourable Sir Joseph Turner Hutchinson, Knight, Chief Justice of the Island of Ceylon, and the Honourable Henry Lorenz Wendt, Puisne Justice of the Supreme Court of the Island of Ceylon, and the Honourable Alexander Wood Renton, Puisne Justice of the said Court, and the Honourable Joseph, Grenier, Acting Puisne Justice of the said Court, do hereby, in pursuance and execution of the powers given by "The Courts Ordinances, 1889 and 1901," and all other powers and authorities enabling Us in this behalf, order and direct in manner following:—

- 1. "The Civil Appellate Rules of 1900" are hereby annulled, and the following rules shall stand in lieu thereof:—
 - (1) (a) In every civil appeal preferred after December 31, 1908, the appellant shall furnish to the Registrar, for use of each of the Judges who shall sit on the hearing of the appeal, a printed or typewritten copy of so much of the record of the case as may be necessary for the decision of the appeal.
 - (b) The costs of such copies shall be costs in the appeal, and shall be dealt with accordingly.
 - (2) The Registrar of the Supreme Court shall, upon the application in writing of any party to the action or proceeding, supply him with typewritten copies of the whole or such part of the record as may be specified in such application, upon payment according to the scale in the schedule. Provided that it shall be competent for such Registrar, where the record is exceptionally voluminous, to require for such copies payment of a higher charge not exceeding by more than one-half the rates set forth in such schedule. Provided also that in the event of a party applying for more than one copy, it shall be competent for the Registrar to charge for each such additional copy at the higher rate in the last proviso mentioned. Such payment shall be made by judicial stamps to be affixed to the application, and every such application shall state the value of the application is made.
 - (3) If the appellant shall not lodge with the Registrar the copies of the record for the use of the Court, or duly make application under rule 2 for copies of the record, within one month from the date of the receipt of the petition of appeal in the Supreme Court Registry, or within such further time as the Court or a Judge shall in the circumstances consider reasonable, the Court or a Judge may order the appeal to be dismissed.

- (4) All petitions of appeal which are drawn and signed by an advocate or proctor shall be printed or typewritten, or written in good round clerk's hand, on machine-made creamlaid foolscap paper of 14 pounds weight per mill ream or thereabouts.
- 2. This Order may be cited as "The Civil Appellate Rules of 1908," and shall come into operation on the First day of January, One thousand Nine hundred and Nine.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended November 7, 1908.

Births.—The total births registered were 93. The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum was 27.0,* as against 24.3 in the preceding week and 19.4 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 170, including 6 deaths of town residents, who died in the Infectious Diseases Hospital at Kanatta. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 51.9,† a great increase on 43.3 of the previous week, and 28.9 in the corresponding week of last year, and the highest rate reached this year. In only two other weeks, viz., week ended October 10 and August 1, was a rate approaching this (50.7) recorded.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 170 total deaths, 36 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 27 in the corresponding week of the previous year.

Calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1908, viz., 180,262.

These are the corrected rates, i.e., the rates calculated for the population of the town estimated on July 1, 1908, on the basis that its age- and sex-constitution is the same as for the Island.

Causes of Death.—As many as 21 persons died of Phthisis (against 12 in the previous week), of which 5 were from Slave Island, 4 from St. Paul's, 3 each from Maradana (exclusive of hospitals) and Kollupitiya, 2 each from Pettah and New Bazaar, and 1 each from St. Sebastian and Kotahena. In only one other week of this year, viz., week ended August 1, was so high a mortality recorded. 30 died of Diarrheea and Dysentery, 28 of Bronchitis and Pneumonia, and 14 of Infantile Convulsions.

Eleven deaths were registered from Enteric Fever (against 8 in the previous week and 7 and 3 in the two preceding weeks), of which 3 each were in St. Paul's and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 in Kollupitiya, 1 each in Pettah and Kotahena, and 1 in the General Hospital of a patient from Peliyagoda, beyond Municipal limits. During the week 33 cases of illness from Enteric Fever (the same number as in the previous week) were reported to the Municipal authorities.

Four persons died of Smallpox in the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Kanatta (against 5 in the previous week and 4 in the week preceding), of which 2 were from Maradana (exclusive of hospitals) and 1 each from St. Sebastian and Kollupitiya. During the week 25 cases of Smallpox were reported (against 18 in the previous week), also 32 cases of Measles and 7 of Chickenpox.
