THE following rules made by the District Committee of Matale under the provisions of section 12 of the Buddhist Temporalities Ordinance, No. 8 of 1905, and approved by His Excellency the Governor and the Executive Council, are hereby published for general information in pursuance of section 13 of the said Ordinance.

Rules made by the District Committee, Matale, under Section 12 of the Buddhist Temporalities Ordinance, No. 8 of 1905.

- 1. Two members of the Committee shall form a quorum.
- 2. In the absence of the President at any meeting, one of the other two members shall be elected as President for the occasion.
- 3.' The Committee shall appoint one of their members as Honorary Secretary for the working of the Ordinance, and shall employ a clerk and a messenger.
- 4. The Honorary Secretary shall enter in a book the business to be placed before each meeting, and shall record in another book the minutes of the proceedings of each meeting, and the minutes shall be read and confirmed at the subsequent meeting, the President signing such confirmation.
- 5. Every question coming before the Committee shall be decided by a majority of votes, and when the votes of members are equal, the President shall have a casting vote, beside his vote as a member.
- 6. The Committee Meetings shall be held at the office of the President at the time being in Matale on the last Saturday of every month at 2.30 r.m. The Committee shall have the power if necessary, to meet at any other time or place in the district upon three days' notice in writing being given to the members of the time and place of such meeting.
- 7. The President shall have the power to convene a special meeting of the Committee at any time or place for whatever purpose by giving the other members two days' notice thereof in writing, and he shall do so if and whenever the other two members by application in writing request him to convene such a meeting.
- 8. The Committee shall have the power to inspect and examine all the books and movable property and moneys of any temple and the accounts and papers of any trustee by themselves or by some person or persons authorized by them in writing to do so.
- 9. Every trustee shall within three months of his appointment furnish full and correct lists of lands belonging to the temple of which he is trustee.
- 10. No trustee or any incumbent priest shall on any pretext whatever sell or otherwise dispose of any movable or immovable property belonging to any temple without the sanction in writing of the Committee, and in case of such sanction being obtained the sale of movables shall be by public auction.
- 11. No trustee shall grant any lease of temple land without the sanction in writing of the Committee; and every trustee who with such sanction grant a lease of temple land shall furnish the Committee with a copy of such lease to be filed in their office.

- 12. All moneys received by trustees from any tenant of a temple in lieu of services to be performed by him to the temple, and receipts of all sums by them as rents and issues, shall be correctly entered in a book in counterfoil in a form to be issued by the Committee. A copy of such receipt shall be issued to the person from whom such moneys, rents, and issues have been received, and the counterfoil thereof shall be retained as a proof and produce when accounts are rendered.
- 13. All moneys received by trustees on account of any temple shall be deposited in the Post Office Savings Bank of the district in which such temple is situated in the name of the temple within a week from the date of such receipt.
- 14. No trustee shall draw any money in deposit in any bank on account of a temple therefrom without the sanction of the Committee in writing.
- 15. The Committee shall have the power, whenever they deem it necessary or expedient so to do, to authorize one or more of their members or any person or persons to be deputed by them in writing to inspect and report upon the condition and managements of any temple and the lands enough to be leased out, and the expenses of such inspection shall be paid out of the funds of that particular temple.
- 16. If any trustee of a temple, to whom due notice in writing of the charge or charges preferred against him has been given, fail without sufficient cause shown to answer such charge or charges, the Committee shall have the power to inquire into the same in his absence and deal with. The Committee shall have the power to re-open the question if necessary.
- 17. All repairs or all improvements to temples shall be effected by the trustees themselves or by giving the same on contract with the approval of the Committee.
- 18. All trustees shall half-yearly in each year make full returns (in the Form A hereto annexed) of all movable property and moneys in their hands and forward them to the Committee.
- 19. In the event of the property of a temple or vihare being given in charge of the trustee thereof, it shall be the duty of the member of the district to give charge of the same in the presence of two witnesses and the incumbent of the temple. The member shall fill up three forms (Form B hereto annexed), one of which shall be delivered to the incumbent of the temple, one to the trustee, and the other to the Committee. All the three forms shall be signed by the member, the trustee, and the two witnesses; and it shall be the duty of the trustee to deliver to the incumbent such property as may be required by him for the use of the temple and obtain two receipts from him, one of which shall be retained by the trustee and the other shall be forwarded by him to the Committee.
- 20. In the event of the property of a dewale being given in charge of the trustee thereof, it shall be the duty of the member of the district to give charge of the same in the presence of two witnesses. The member shall fill up two forms (Form B hereto annexed), signed likewise by the member, trustee, and the two witnesses, one of which shall be delivered to the trustee, and the other shall be forwarded to the Committee; and it shall be the duty of the trustee to deliver to the kapurala or kapuralas such property as may be required by him or them for the use of the dewale and obtain two receipts from him or them, one of which shall be retained by the trustee and the other shall be forwarded by him to the Committee.
- 21. It shall be the duty of the trustees to keep a book of receipts and disbursements and to make a statement in duplicate of such accounts at the close of every half-year (in the Form C hereto annexed), and the trustee shall sign a declaration at the foot thereof that the accounts are "true and correct." and shall forward the same within thirty days from the end of each half-year to the Committee. The Committee shall examine the statement, one of which shall be retained by the Committee and the other transmitted to the nearest District Court.
- 22. Every charge or charges preferred against any incumbent or Tewakarana Bhikku of any temple shall be referred through the District Committee to the Sangha Sabhawa of the College to which such incumbent or Tewakarana Bhikku belongs. The Sangha Sabhawa shall make a careful and full inquiry into the charge or charges, and forward all proceedings, together with their decision, to the District Committee, who shall have power either to adopt or reject such decision or institute a fresh inquiry. The District Committee shall have power either to suspend for a period not exceeding six months or to dismiss from any incumbancy any Bhikku found guilty of any offence which, in their opinion, disqualifies him from holding the incumbancy.
- 23. If any incumbent or Tewakarana Bhikku, to whom due notice in writing with a copy of the charge or charges preferred against him has been given, fail without showing sufficient cause to appear and answer such charge or charges, the District Committee shall have the power to inquire into the case in his absence and deal with. The Committee shall have the power to re-open the inquiry on sufficient cause shown for his default of appearance at the inquiry.
- 24. If cases required by the District Committee to the Sangha Sabhawa shall not be inquired into, decided, and reported to the District Committee within three

months from the date of such references were made without sufficient cause, the District Committee shall have the right of recalling the papers and holding the inquiry themselves, and act as provided for by rule No. 24.

- 25. No incumbent shall remove from office or interfere with the performance of duties or stop the maintenance of any Tewakarana Bhikku without first obtaining the permission in writing of the District Committee.
- 26. It shall be the duty of the trustee, on or before September 30 in each year, to prepare and transmit to the District Committee a statement, in duplicate, showing the nature and amount of the probable receipts and expenditure for the next ensuing year.
- 27. The District Committee shall have the power to revise, if necessary, such statement and the same after being revised and passed, one of which shall be returned to the trustee and the other shall be retained by the Committee. The trustee on no account exceed any item of expenditure specified in such statement without the previous sanction in writing of the District Committee.
- 28. Every temple shall contribute to the District Committee yearly 10 per cent. on its total annual income. The District Committee shall from such contribution pay to the trustee of such temple as remuneration for his services  $7\frac{1}{2}$  per cent., and the balance shall be retained by the District Committee for defraying the expenses already incurred or to be incurred by the Committee to carry out the provisions of this Ordinance.
- 29. The President of the District Committee shall have the power to receive the contribution of each temple, and he shall enter in a book the contribution paid to him by each temple separately and issue receipts for such money.
- 30. The President shall have power to keep the moneys he receives as contribution in his hand and pay out of same on receipts to the clerk, trustees, and messenger their monthly wages. The President shall have further power to defray out of such moneys other expenses, approved by the Committee, for carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance.
- 31. The President shall quarterly lay before the Committee a statement of receipts and expenditure during that quarter, and produce receipts for the payment of moneys by him during the above period.
- 32. The President shall at the end of each year deposit in a bank selected by the Committee the balance of all moneys in his hands and produce the bank book for inspection of the Committee at their first sitting after such deposit.
- 33. In the event of any incumbency becoming vacant, the Sangha Sabhawa shall elect a suitable person on their being called upon to do so by the District Committee, subject to the approval of the District Committee. In the event the Sangha Sabhawa fails to do so, the District Committee shall have power, in consultation with the Sangha Sabhawa, to elect one.
- 34. The President shall convene from time to time a meeting of the Committee for the election of a trustee or trustees for each temple or vihare under section 17 of the Ordinance. All candidates appointed at such elections shall hold certificates of recognition under the hand of the President, and such certificates shall be the only proof of appointments.

#### BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

# Chapter XII.—By-laws on Dogs.

- 8. Every dog kept within the limits of the Municipality shall wear a collar to be supplied by the owner, to which shall be affixed a metal badge bearing the Municipal stamp, the registered number, and year of registration stamped on it. A register of the stamping of the badges shall be kept in the Municipal Office.
- 9. The Chairman is hereby authorized to issue badges to any person applying for the same on a payment of twenty-five cents per badge. There will be no charge for stamping.
- 10. The shape of the badge, which shall be changed each year, shall be decided on by the Committee on Public Works.
- 13. The owner of the badge shall at the expiration of the period for which the badge has been granted, viz., on or before March 31 of each year, return the badge to the Municipal Office. Any person who fails to return the badge as aforesaid shall be guilty of an offence.

#### VITAL STATISTICS.

Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended January 2, 1909.

Births.—The total births registered were 83. The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum was 241,\* as against 16:5 in the preceding week and 23:8 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 141, including 2 deaths of town residents who died in the Infectious Diseases Hospital at Kanatta. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 45.5,† as against 52.9 in the previous week and 31.6 in the corresponding week of last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 141 total deaths, 33 were of infants under 1 year of age, as against 32 in the corresponding week of the previous year.

Causes of Death.—1. There was one death registered from Cholera, the patient being a pandit attached to the 98th Infantry, who died in the Military Hospital at Slave Island. Twenty-three deaths were registered in the town as due to Diarrhea and Dysentery.

- 2. Twelve deaths were registered from Phthisis (against 20 in the previous week), of which 4 each were in Maradana Hospitals (3 in the General Hospital of patients from outside the town and 1 in the Borella Convict Hospital of a prisoner) and Maradana Ward (exclusive of hospitals), and 2 each in St. Paul's and New Bazaar. Twenty-three deaths were registered from Bronchitis and Pneumonia.
- 3. Ten deaths were registered from Enteric Fever (against seven in the previous week and 10 each in the two preceding weeks), of which 2 each were in New Bazaar, General Hospital (of patients from outside the town), Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and 1 each in Pettah, St. Paul's, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya. During the week 51 cases of Enteric Fever were reported (as against 15 in the previous week).
- 4. Three deaths were registered from Smallpox in the Infectious Diseases Hospital at Kanatta, 2 of Colombo town residents (1 each from New Bazaar and Maradana) and the other from outside the town. Only the two former are here taken into account. There were reported during the week 3 cases of Smallpox (against 9 in the previous week), also 16 cases of Measles and 5 of Chickenpox.
