SCHEDULE.

By-laws framed under Section 19 of Ordinance No. 9 of 1901.

1. It shall be the duty of every owner and of every driver of a vehicle, other than a jinrickshaw, which plies for hire, to see that the plate issued by the proper authority to denote the number of the license issued for the vehicle is at all times clearly visible, and that it is affixed as hereinafter provided.

(a) In the case of carts the plate shall be screwed, as far forward as possible,

(a) In the case of carts the plate shall be screwed, as far forward as possible, on to the right-hand side of the frame. If the frame is too narrow for the plate to be screwed on to it, the plate shall be screwed on to a board which shall be fixed in the same position on the frame.

(b) In the case of hackeries the plate shall be screwed on to the right-hand side of the seat above the axle.

(c) In the case of carriages or coaches the plate shall be screwed on to the right-hand side of the body of the coach or carriage.

- 2. In the case of jinrickshaws it shall not be necessary to affix a plate, but the number and year of the license shall be painted on the back of the vehicle in such manner and by such person as the proper authority may direct.
- 3. In the case of carts it shall be the duty of the owner and of the driver to see that a board bearing the name of the owner legibly painted in white letters on a black ground is affixed to the right-hand side of the tent or the frame.

SCHEDULE.

BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

Chapter XII.—By-laws on Dogs.

- 8. Every dog kept within the limits of the Municipality shall bear a collar to be supplied by the owner, to which shall be affixed a metal badge bearing the Municipal stamp, the registered number, and year of registration stamped on it. A register of the stamping of the badges shall be kept in the Municipal Office.
- 9. The Chairman is hereby authorized to issue badges to any person applying for the same on a payment of twenty-five cents per badge. There will be no charge for stamping.

10. The shape of the badge which shall be changed each year shall be decided on by the Committee on Public Works.

13. The owner of the badge shall at the expiration of the period for which the badge has been granted, viz., on or before March 31 of each year, return the badge to the Municipal Office. Any person who fails to retutrn the badge as aforesaid shall be guilty of an offence.

The examination in the Criminal Procedure Code prescribed under the Minute of March 26, 1900, for officers in the Fourth Class of the Civil Service, will also be held on April 20, 1909, as well as at the Kandy Kachcheri.

It is also hereby notified that candidates will be given the option of using Codes in the examination in the Criminal Procedure Code and the Penal Code; they must, however, state when sending in their names what their decision is, as the character of the papers set for those who use Codes and those who do not will be different.

IS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR, in exercise of the power vested in him by section 21 of "The Forest Ordinance, 1907," and with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to make the following rules for the regulation of hunting in certain up-country forests.

By His Excellency's command,

RULES REFERRED TO.

- 1. In these rules-
 - "Deer" includes ambur (elk), spotted deer, and red deer.
 - "Government Agent" includes the Assistant Government Agent of the district.
 - "Up-country forest" means any forest (as defined by "The Forest Ordinance, 1907") situated at an elevation of 4,000 ft. or upwards above sea level. "Country" means the area allotted, on registration, to the master of a
 - registered pack of hounds.
 - "Hunting season" means the period between November 1 and April 30, inclusive.
- 2. No person shall set or lay any trap, snare, pitfall, or spring gun for deer in any up-country forest.
- 3. No person shall kill or take or pursue or attempt to kill or take any deer in any up-country forest in any other manner than by hunting with a pack of hounds which has been duly registered in accordance with these rules.
- 4. Any master of a pack of hounds who desires to have his pack registered in respect of any country must apply in writing to the Government Agent specifying. the country for which he desires his pack registered.
- 5. The registration of a pack of hounds shall remain in force only for one hunting season.
- 6. A fee of Rs. 100 shall be payable annually on the registration of a pack of hounds for any hunting season.
- 7. When any pack is registered at the date when these rules come into operation, such pack shall be deemed to have been duly registered for the hunting season ending on April 30, 1909. After that date, the master, if he desires to carry on the pack, must apply for registration in accordance with these rules.
 - 8. Not more than one pack of hounds will be registered for the same country.
- The Government Agent may, in his discretion, refuse to register any pack of hounds for any country.

- 10. In deciding whether a pack of hounds should be registered for any country, the Government Agent will have regard to the custom which has previously prevailed; and will not register a pack of hounds for a country which has been regularly hunted by another pack without special reasons.
- 11. Where the master of a registered pack ceases to hunt the country assigned to him and arrangements have been made by another master to the satisfaction of the Government Agent for hunting the country, the Government Agent will cause the pack to be registered under the name of the new master. When such change takes place during any hunting season, the new master may carry on the hunt to the end of the season without payment of further registration fee.
- 12. Any person who is aggrieved at any decision of the Government Agent under these rules may appeal to the Governor in Executive Council, whose decision shall be final.

IT is hereby notified that His Excellency the Governor, in exercise of the power vested in him by section 24 (1) of the Forest Ordinance No. 16 of 1907, and with the advice of the Executive Conucil, has been pleased to make the following regulations.

REGULATIONS REFERRED TO.

The following timber export depôts or "outbays" are prescribed as such for the accumulation of timber and other forest produce removed under a permit issued by a Forest Officer or properly authorized headman for shipment to the Coast:—

- (1) Valaichchenai, (2) Mankeni, (3) Panichchankoni, (4) Tirukkovil, and (5) Arugam Bay, in the Batticalea District of the Eastern Province.
- (1) Kumburupitti and (2) Muthur in the Trincomalce District of the Eastern Province.
- 2. Such depôts or outbays (dopôts) will be demarcated by posts at prominent corners, and accumulated logs, timber, and forest produce must be stacked within such limits. At the time of stacking, the permits, description, and the numbers affixed to logs will be checked by a Forest Officer, who will countersign and date such permits if correct. Where inaccuracies are discovered, the timber shall be detained pending inquiry. Only properly marked timber covered by a permit may be stacked in such depôts, and intimation of intention to stack should be furnished to the Divisional Forest Officer, Subivisional Forest Officer, or Forest Ranger in charge of the Range.
- 3. No such timber, &c., may be stacked in such depôts for a period exceeding three months, unless on payment of 50 cents per log per week or portion of a week, nor will removal be permitted till such dues are paid. No payment will be required for the first three months' period of stacking.
- 4. Any extension granted must be under the authority of the Divisional or Subdivisional Forest Officer, and the circumstances should be exceptional for seeking such extension, and is only admissible on payment of 25 cents per log per week or portion of a week.
- 5. Timber or other forest produce not removed after three months, where no extension has been applied for, or not removed after the period of extension granted, may be removed by the Forest Department inland for half a mile at the owner's expense. Such expenses if not paid within a month shall be recovered by the sale of the timber or other produce at owner's risk, and the Government dues shall be a first charge on such sale.
- 6. "Outbay epôts" will be inspected monthly by a Forest Officer not under the rank of Forest Ranger, who will verify all accumulated stock.
- 7. The property of different owners must be stacked separately for easy identification, as must supplies covered by the different permits of one owner, and if this is not done, the Department will do it at the expense of the owner, not permitting removal till such expenses are paid.
- 8. No timber shall be removed from outbay depôts for transport by sea, unless covered by a shipping permit obtained from the Customs authorities. Such permit must contain, or have attached to it, a list giving the description of timber or other produce to be removed with the individual numbers stamped on the same, and must be submitted to the Divisional Forest Officer ten days before shipment.

- 9. On receipt of such permit the Divisional Forest Officer will depute an officer, not under the pank of Forest Ranger, to superintend such shipment and to endorso the particulars of the shipping permit on the removal permit first obtained. The shipping permit will be counter-signed by him if found by him to be accurate and removal may then be commenced, the shipping permit being sent direct to the Customs.
- 10 In case of stress of weather or other untoward circumstance after shipping a coastwise permit may be obtained from the Customs ; uthorities, but when timber is landed under such permit, the fact should be promptly reported to the Divisional Forest Officer to enable him to check irregularities.
- 11. Forest Ramers are granted powers referred to in rule 6 of the constwise regulations of January 5, 1870.

BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

- 1. A registration too of 25 cents per amum shall be paid upon each dog kept within the said villages
- 2. Such registration fee shall be due on and after June 1, 1909, and shall be paid in advance before June 1 in each year.
- 3. To facilitate the recovery of such registration fee, the occupier of every house within the said villages shall, on or before June 1 in each year, furnish to an officer authorized by the Government Agent, Rathapura, to demand the same a list in the form in schedule annexed of the dog or does kept in such house and the names of the owners thereof.
- 4. On payment of the registration fee on any dog the Government Agent shall, unless the owner provides his own collar to be stamped, furnish the owner with a stamped collar to be worn by such dog on payment of a fee of twenty-five cents.
- 5. Every inhabitant within the said villages becoming possessed of any dog or dogs after the furnishing of the list referred to in by-law 3 shall furnish the officer appointed by the Government Agent mentioned in the said by law with an additional list of such dog or dogs which shall become liable to the registration fee for the current year within tifteen days after the list required by this by-law becomes due,
- 6. It shall be lawful for the officer appointed by the Government Agent to require the production of any dog for which registration is applied for, and to decline to issue a certificate of registration until it is produced.
- 7. It shall be lawful for the Government Agent to refuse to issue a certificate of registration or to cancel a certifiacte already issued for any dog, which in his opinion is so mainted or disposed as to be unfit to live, or which is habitually ill-treated or continually neglected by its owner.
- The owner of every dog for which a certificate has been refused or cancelled shall, on being noticed to do so, produce the dog at the house of the officer appointed by the Government Agent at a time to be stated in the notice and deliver it to the said officer, and every such dog may be destroyed or otherwise disposed of as the Government Agent shall think fit
- 9. It shall be lawful for the officer appointed by the Government Agent to seize all stray dogs and deal with them in terms of sub-sections (1) and (2) of section 10 of the Ordinance No. 25 of 1901.

By-laws reffered to.

- 1. The Chairman when specially empowered thereto by resolution of the Board may by notice in writing require the owner or occupier of any house or building or land (a) having a cesspool on his premises to close the same, or (b) disposing of night soil by burial or otherwise upon his premises to desist therefrom and to provide a dry-earth closet instead.
- 2. Permission may be granted in writing by the Chairman to any householder to have night soil from his own premises buried or otherwise disposed of thereon; any householder who shall permit any night soil to be buried or otherwise disposed of on his premises without permission in writing from the Chairman shall be guilty of an offence.
- 3. Every householder who has been served with notice under by-law No. 1 hereof or who has not received permission under by-law No. 2 shall permit the Board to cause night soil to be removed from his premises to a depôt appointed by the Board for the disposal of night soil.

WITH reference to the Regulations dated November 24, 1900, made by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under the provisions of Ordinance No. 3 of 1897, and published in the Gazette of November 30, 1900, it is hereby declared that the Port of Hong Kong is a plague-infected port.

Commercial Certificates.

CERTIFICATES will be granted by the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce on the results of examinations conducted from time to time conjointly by the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce and the Department of Public Instruction.

Candidates for these examinations must (1) be not under 14 years of age nor over 20 on the last day of the month preceding that fixed for the examination; (2) have been for not less than nine months preceding the date fixed for the examination in the Commercial Class of a school which has previously satisfied the Director of Public Instruction that there is suitable provision for training candidates.

The first examination will be held in Colombo on February 14 and following days.

The subjects of examination will be (1) Handwriting, (2) Arithmetic, (3) English, (4) Geography, (5) Bookkeeping, (6) Shorthand, (7) Typewriting.

Every candidate must satisfy the examiners in the first four subjects and in any two of the last three subjects. He may enter for all the subjects. The subjects in which a candidate satisfies the examiners will be specified on his certificate.

1. Handuriting.—Including tests in round, text, and small hand. Special attention is drawn to this subject as a high standard of proficiency will be insisted upon, and no certificate will be granted to any candidate who fails to reach the standard fixed. The characteristic most desired is legibility. Each letter should be clearly and accurately formed so that its identity may be distinguished apart from its position in the word—the u's distinguished from the n's, &c.—and the turning should be round and not angular. Particular attention should be paid to the junction of the letters in a word. The writing should be of moderate thickness and regular, and the loops and tails of letters should be short and full.

Handwriting may be tested in one or more of the following ways:--

Addressing envelopes of various sizes, copying a draft letter, manuscript, a tabular statement, or printed matter, &c. Copying and ruling up, where necessary, a receipt or other commercial form or document in general use, and the displaying of headings or other matters by different sizes of writing.

Handwriting will be taken into consideration in all the answer papers.

2. Arithmetic.—Two papers will be set in this subject: (1) Tots; (2) a general paper in Arithmetic. No candidate will be granted a certificate who fails in either paper.

The general paper will include simple and compound rules, weights and measures in ordinary use, vulgar and decimal fractions including approximations, the metric system of weights and measures, percentages, simple interest, exchange. In setting questions a knowledge of ordinary commercial terms will be expected.

- 3. English.—(1) Orthography and Dictation, (2) Composition, (3) Précis and Indexing, (4) Reading and Oral Composition.
 - (1) Spelling will be taken into account in all the papers.
 - (2) Composition.—(a) To write a letter or theme on a prescribed subject.
 - (b) To correct ordinary faulty sentences and phrases.
 - (c) To re-draft a badly constructed letter.
 - (3) Précis and Indexing.—The candidate will be expected to make a précis in the form of a narrative of one or of a number of letters and documents dealing with a particular subject, so that any one who had not time to read the original might by reading the précis be put in possession of all the main features. The merits of such a précis are (a) to contain all that is of importance in the letter or documents, and nothing that is unimportant; (b) to present this in a consecutive and readable shape, expressed as distinctly as possible and as succintly as is compatible with completeness and distinctness. Attention should be paid to handwriting, spelling, grammar, and style.
 - (4) Reading.—To read with distinct and clear expression a prescribed passage from a standard prose author or from a newspaper or other periodical. Questions will be put on matters arising out of the passage read to test the candidate's ability in oral expression and conversation.

No. 1 service 28 horses and 63 bulls.

No. 2 service: 35 horses.

- 4. For services 3 and 4 the contractor must provide such number of motor cars fully equipped as will, in the opinion of the Postmaster-General, be sufficient for the services.
- 5. No car shall be used which has not been first approved by the Postmaster-General or officer appointed by him in that behalf. Every car on approval shall be marked with a number ordered by the Government.
- 6. The cars provided for service No. 3 shall comply with the following conditions:—
- (a) When fully equipped and loaded with a weight of a ton in addition to equipment there shall not be a weight of more than two tons on any one axle, nor shall the whole car when loaded and equipped weigh more than three tons.
- (b) Each car shall be capable of carrying six passengers and three hundredweights of baggage, at the rate of a half hundredweight to each passenger, in addition to the driver.
- (c) The car shall have a special locked receptacle for the mails. This receptacle shall be capable of containing three hundredweights of mails, which would probably require a space of about thirty cubic feet.
- (d) The car when loaded must be able to work easily at a pace of twelve miles an hour on the flat, and be capable of ascending and descending gradients at a pace of eight miles an hour.
- (e) It must be able to run thirty miles without renewing the supply of water, petrol, or other necessary.

(f) The car must be so covered as to give sufficient protection against sun or rain.

Conditions (o), (d), (e), and (f) to apply to cars for service 4, and there shall not be a weight of more than two tons on any one axle when the car is fully loaded and equipped.

- 7. Each tender for motor car service to be accompanied by a design showing the accommodation in the car for passengers and mails.
- 8. The hours of arrival and departure of the coaches and motor cars are to be fixed from time to time by the Postmaster-General.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended March 20, 1909.

Births.—The total births registered were 88 (8 Burghers, 47 Sinhalese, 17 Tamils, 12 Moors, and 4 Malays). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1 1909, viz., 182,058) was 25.3, as against 27.5 in the preceding week, 25.2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.5 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 104 (4 Burghers, 39 Sinhalese, 32 Tamils, 20 Moors, 4 Malays, and 5 Others), including 2 deaths of town residents who died in the Infectious Diseases Hospital t Kanatta. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 29.7, as against 31.2 in the previous week, 37.7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 36.5 the weekly average for last year

Injantile Deaths.—Of the 104 total deaths, 27 were of infants under one year of age as against 21 in the preceding week, 33 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 31 the average for last year.

Still Births.-The number of still births registered during the week was 7.

Selected Causes of Death. - Eight deaths were registered in the town from Diarrhea and 7 from Dysentery.

- 2. Eleven deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 17 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year), of which 2 were in Kotahen, New Bazaar, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Slave Island, and 1 each in Pettah, St. Sebastian, and St. Paul's. Two deaths were registered from *Bronchitis* and 11 from *Pneumonia*
- 3. Four deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 6 in t e previous week and 8 the weekly average for last year), of which 1 each was in Kotahena, New Bazaar, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and the General Hospital (a patient from outside the town). During the week 11 cases of Enteric Fever were reported, against 21 in the previous week.
- 4. There was one death registered from Smallpox (against nil in the previous week). This was a Tamil patient from Kollupitiya Ward, who died in the Inf ctious Diseases Hospital at Kanatta. During the week 6 cases of Smallpox were reported (against 10 in the previous week), of which 3 were from the Colombo Harbour.
- 5. One death was registered in the Infectious Diseases Hospital at Kanatta as due to Measles, the patient being from St. Paul's Ward During the week 22 cases of Measles were reported, also 36 of Chickenpox.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 81.7°, against 81.9° in the preceding week and 82.5° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.964 in., against 29.912 in. in the preceding week and 30.003 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.75 in., against 0.16 in. in the preceding week, and 0.97 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir Henry Edward McCallum, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Aide-de-Camp to His Majesty the King, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WHEREAS it is expedient to frame and establish additional port rules for the port of Colombo:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in exercise of the power vested in Us by section 6 of the Masters Attendant's Ordinance, No. 6 of 1865, as amended by Ordinance No. 30

of 1908, and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby frame and establish for the port of Colombo the additional port rules set forth in the schedule hereto.

And We do promulgate that the said rules shall take effect as from and after May 1, 1909.

Given at Nuwara Eliya, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-sixth day of March, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Nine.

ADDITIONAL PORT RULES.

SECTION IX.

- 1. Steam boilers on water boats, barges, lighters, and similar vessels and on launches as defined by "The Lauaches Ordinance, 1907," in which steam is generated for the purpose of driving machinery or transmitting motive power of any kind, shall be inspected annually prior to being licensed by the Government Examining Engineer of steam boats or as often as that officer shall deem it necessary; and it shall be the duty of the owners, tindals, and other persons in charge of such vessels to have the steam boilers on board thereof inspected annually prior to being licensed or as often as required.
- 2. It shall not be lawful for the owner, tindal, or other person in charge of any such vessel on board of which there is a steam boiler, or for any person having charge of or control over such boiler, to use or work any such boiler, unless the same has been duly inspected and certified to be in safe, good, and efficient working order by the Government Examining Engineer of steam boats.
- 3. A fee of Rs. 21 in the case of launches and Rs. 10·50 in the case of other vessels shall be paid for each inspection made of such steam boilers, each visit made for the purpose counting as a separate inspection; and the inspecting officer shall have power to withhold the granting of the certificate until the fees due him shall have been paid.
- 4. Every driver or other person in charge of, or having control over, a steam boiler on water boats, barges, lighters, and similar vessels (except on launches as defined by and coming under the provisions of "The Launches Ordinance, 1907") shall hold a certificate of competency in the form set forth in the chedule hereto under the hand of the Master Attendant, who shall grant such certificate to every person who is reported by one of the Examiners indicated in rule 6 to be a suitable and capable person to have control of steam boilers.
- 5. It shall not be lawful for any person to have charge of or control over a steam boiler on board any such vessel without possessing such certificate of competency, nor shall it be lawful for any person to employ, permit, or allow any uncertificated person to have charge of or control over any such steam boiler.
- 6. The Examiners for the time being appointed under "The Launches Ordinance, 1907," shall be the Examiners for the purposes of these rules, and shall examine applicants subject to the rules framed under that Ordinance as regards the qualifications required and the fees payable.
