PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir HENRY EDWARD MCCALLUM, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Aide-de-Camp to His Majesty the King, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

HENRY MCCALLUM.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor dated November 27, 1863, a police force was established under Ordinance No. 17 of 1844 in the town of Matara, and in pursuance of the said Ordinance the limits of the said town were defined by the said Proclamation :

And whereas by section 34 of Ordinance No. 16 of 1865 it is enacted that, for the purpose of creating a fund from which the expenses of the police force payable by each town not created a Municipality are to be defrayed, a tax shall be payable on March 31, on June 30, on September 30, and on December 31 in every year, for the quarters ending on the said days respectively, on all houses and buildings of every description and on all lands and tenements whatsoever within every such town to an amount equal to such percentage on the *bona fide* annual value of such houses, buildings, lands, and tenements as the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, shall by Proclamation

from time to time appoint, except in cases where such amount shall fall below the sum of 25 cents a quarter, in all which excepted cases 25 cents per quarter shall be assessed and payable. Provided that such tax shall not in the aggregate exceed the sum necessary for the maintenance of the force in such town except as aforesaid, and which sum it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice and consent aforesaid, from time to time to determine and appoint. Provided further, that buildings appropriated to religious worship and such as are placed in charge of military sentries shall be exempted from the payment of such tax :

And whereas the town of Matara has not been created a Municipality, and whereas the Governor, with the advice and consent aforesaid, has determined and appointed that the sum necessary for the maintenance of the force in the said town of Matara is Rs. 10,304.93 :

And whereas His Excellency the Governor, in exercise of the powers vested in him by section 34 of Ordinance No. 16 of 1865, and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, by Proclamation dated November 27, 1863, appointed that for the purposes aforesaid the tax payable on all houses and buildings of every description and on all lands and tenements whatsoever in the said town of Matara aforesaid, and within the limits specified in the schedule in the Proclamation dated November 27, 1863, shall, save in such excepted cases as aforesaid, and in the case of such buildings which are exempted from the payment of such tax as aforesaid, from and after November 27, 1863, be at the rate of 2½ per cent. on the *bona fide* value of such houses, buildings, lands, and tenements aforesaid :

And whereas it is expedient to increase the rate for the purposes aforesaid :

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, in exercise of the powers vested in Us as aforesaid, and with the advice and consent aforesaid, do hereby appoint that for the purposes aforesaid the tax payable on all houses and buildings of every description and on all lands and tenements whatsoever in the town of Matara aforesaid, within the limits specified in the schedule to the said Proclamation dated November 27, 1863, shall, save in such excepted cases as aforesaid, and in the case of such buildings which are exempted from the payment of such tax as aforesaid, from and after January 1, 1908, be at the rate of 5 per cent. on the *bona fide* value of such houses, buildings, lands, and tenements aforesaid.

Examination for the Local Division of the Civil Service of Ceylon.

1. An Examination for admission to the Local Division of the Civil Service will be held in Colombo in or about October next. The prospects and conditions of the Service are set out in the Minutes governing the Local Division of the Civil Service published in the *Government Gazette* of April 2, 1909. The number of persons to be selected at this Examination will be announced hereafter.

2. No person will be admitted to compete who has not received a nomination from His Excellency the Governor.

3. Applications for nominations should be sent to the Principal Assistant Colonial Secretary—the envelope to be marked “Local Division, Civil Service”—on or before May 31. No question as to the delay or loss in the post of any such application can be entertained.

4. Nominations will be limited to candidates who have passed the Senior Standard of the Cambridge Local Examination, the London Matriculation, or any other public examination which may be deemed to be of an equally high standard.

5. Every applicant must furnish satisfactory proof—

- (a) That he is a natural-born British subject born in Ceylon of parents permanently resident in the Island.
- (b) That he had attained the age of 19 and had not attained the age of 24 on January 1, 1909.
- (c) That he is of good moral character.

6. Applicants should attach to their applications—

- (1) Birth certificate.
- (2) A certificate of character from the head of the school at which the applicant was educated.
- (3) A statement showing where he was educated, examinations passed, degrees taken, &c., present occupation, and how he has spent the time since he left school.
- (4) A medical certificate that the applicant is of sound constitution, possessed of good sight, and otherwise physically qualified for the Service.
- (5) Particulars of property possessed by the applicant, showing the situation and nature of the land or property. It should also be stated in the case of landed property whether it is ancestral or recently acquired.
- (6) Any athletic distinctions obtained by the applicant should be stated, also whether the applicant is a Volunteer, and whether he is able to ride.

7. The list of candidates to whom nominations have been granted will be published in the *Government Gazette*. No communication with regard to nomination, unless made in reply to inquiries, will be entertained after May 31.

8. All candidates after nomination will be required to undergo a medical examination by a Board before the examination by the Civil Service Commissioners. The fee for the medical examination will be Rs. 10.50. The fee for the examination will be Rs. 25.

10. All candidates may offer subjects 1, 2, and 3 inclusive, with one of the languages 5, 6, 7, 8, and one of the subjects 9, 10, and 11. They may also offer one additional subject selected at pleasure from the list, i.e., not more than six subjects in all must be selected.

11. A syllabus is appended showing the range of the examinations in the various subjects.

12. No subjects are obligatory, nor will any text books be prescribed for any subject.

Syllabus of Subjects.

English Composition.—The standard of positive merit will be looked for in logical arrangement of thought and in accuracy and propriety of expression, but large deductions of marks will be made for faults of writing and spelling.

(Candidates are also warned that for similar faults in the use of the English language similar deductions will be made from the marks obtained in other subjects.)

Geography.—Simple questions in descriptive and general Geography.

English History.—The general paper in this subject will be confined to events subsequent to the Norman Conquest. It will test whether the candidates are accurately acquainted with the facts of English History, and also possess an intelligent knowledge of the meaning of the facts.

The paper on the fixed period will be confined to English History subsequent to the downfall of Walpole. It will require from the candidates more minute knowledge than the general paper, and will have special reference to our Colonies and Dependencies.

Mathematics I.—Arithmetic; Algebra, up to and including the Binomial Theorem; the theory and use of Logarithms; Euclid, Books I.—IV. and VI.; Plane Trigonometry, up to and including solution of triangles; Mensuration.

Mathematics II.—Further questions and problems on the syllabus of Mathematics I.; Elementary Solid Geometry, including Euclid, Book XI., Propositions 1 to 21, Book XII., Propositions 1 and 2; Geometrical Conic Sections; Statics, the equilibrium of forces acting in one plane and of parallel forces, the centre of mass, the mechanical powers; Dynamics, uniform and uniformly accelerated rectilinear motion, uniform circular motion, falling bodies and projectiles *in vacuo*; Hydrostatics, including the pressure of fluids, specific gravities, floating bodies, barometric heights. In Statics, Dynamics, and Hydrostatics a knowledge of the construction and use of the more simple instruments and machines will be expected.

Latin.—Passages selected from the authors usually read in schools will be set for translation into English. Passages from English authors will be given for translation into Latin prose and verse, but candidates will be allowed, in the place of verse composition, to answer questions of a simple character, which will test whether they possess a fundamental knowledge of the grammar of the language, and such an elementary acquaintance with Roman History as is required for the intelligent study of the books they have read.

French.—Translations of unseen passages from French into English and from English into French. The passages for translation will be taken mainly from standard authors, and a few simple questions may be asked on the passages set, as to the structure and character of the language, and allusions of obvious and general interest.

German.—The passages for translation will be taken mainly from standard authors, and in other respects the examination will proceed on the same lines as in French.

Natural Science Subjects.—The standard of examination in these subjects will be such as may be reasonably expected from the education given at schools possessing appliances for practical instruction, such as a laboratory, &c. A knowledge of the metric system will be expected.

Chemistry.—The laws of chemical combination and decomposition, and the preparation, classification, and properties of the principal metallic and non-metallic elements, and of such of their compounds as are treated of in inorganic chemistry.

Heat.—The elementary portion of the subject.

Physics.—The elementary properties of electricity, magnetism, light, and sound.

Physiography, i.e., Physical Geography.

Geology.—Chiefly economic, including the recognition of the more familiar minerals and rocks and their properties and uses.

Accession of German Protectorates to Berne Copyright Convention and Additional Act.

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, March 2, 1909.

Present:

The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS on September 9, 1886, a Convention (hereinafter called the Berne Convention) with respect to the protection to be given by way of copyright to the authors of literary and artistic works was concluded between Her late Majesty Queen Victoria and the foreign countries following, that is to say:—Belgium, Hayti, Switzerland, France, Italy, Germany, Spain, and Tunis:

And whereas on September 5, 1887, the ratifications of the said Convention were duly exchanged between Her late Majesty Queen Victoria and the aforesaid countries:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated November 28, 1887, and made under the authority committed to Her late Majesty Queen Victoria by the International Copyright Acts, 1844 to 1886, Her Majesty was pleased to make provision for giving rights of copyright throughout Her Majesty's dominions to the authors of literary and artistic works first produced in any of the said foreign countries (therein

referred to as the foreign countries of the Copyright Union) and otherwise giving effect throughout Her Majesty's dominions to the terms of the said Berne Convention, and an English translation of the said Convention was set out in the first schedule to the said Order in Council :

And whereas since the date of the said Order in Council the foreign countries following, namely :—Luxemburg, Monaco, Montenegro, Norway, and Sweden, have acceded to the said Berne Convention, and by Orders in Council dated respectively August 10, 1888, October 15, 1889, May 16, 1893, August 1, 1896, and December 12, 1904, and made under the authority aforesaid, the provisions of the said Order in Council of November 28, 1887, have been extended to the last-mentioned foreign countries respectively :

And whereas an Additional Act to the said Berne Convention was agreed upon between Her late Majesty Queen Victoria and the following foreign countries for the purpose of varying the provisions of the said Berne Convention, namely :—Germany, Italy, Switzerland, Belgium, Luxemburg, Spain, Monaco, Tunis, France, and Montenegro, and the ratifications of the said Additional Act were on September 9, 1897, exchanged between Her late Majesty Queen Victoria and the said foreign countries :

And whereas by an Order in Council dated March 7, 1898, and made under the authority aforesaid, Her late Majesty Queen Victoria was pleased to make provision for varying the hereinbefore recited Order in Council of November 28, 1887, and otherwise giving effect to the said Additional Act throughout Her Majesty's dominions so far as regards the foreign countries hereinbefore named as parties to the said Additional Act, and an English translation of the said Additional Act is set forth in the schedule to the Order in Council now in recital :

And whereas the Republic of Hayti having duly acceded to the said Additional Act, the said Order in Council of March 7, 1898, was, by Order in Council of May 19, 1898, extended to the said Republic :

And whereas the Empire of Japan, the Kingdom of Denmark and the Faro Islands, and the Republic of Liberia, having duly acceded to the said Berne Convention and the said Additional Act, the said Orders in Council of November 28, 1887, and March 7, 1898, were, by Orders in Council dated respectively August 8, 1899, and October 9, 1903, and December 21, 1908, extended to the said Empire of Japan, the said Kingdom of Denmark and the Faro Islands, and the said Republic of Liberia :

And whereas the principality of Montenegro having duly denounced the said Berne Convention, the said Order in Council of May 16, 1893, was revoked by an Order in Council of August 8, 1899, and the provisions of the said Orders in Council of November 28, 1887, and March 7, 1898, have ceased to apply to the said principality of Montenegro :

And whereas the foreign countries following, namely :—Luxemburg, Monaco, Norway, Japan, Denmark and the Faro Islands, Sweden, and Liberia, together with the foreign countries comprised in the said Order in Council of November 28, 1887, now constitute the foreign countries of the Copyright Union within the meaning of the said Order in Council of November 28, 1887 :

And whereas it has been intimated to His Majesty's Government that the Government of Germany have notified their accession for and on behalf of the German Protectorates to the said Berne Convention and the said Additional Act, such accession to take effect from January 1, 1909 :

And whereas His Majesty in Council is satisfied that the said Government of Germany has made such provisions as it appears to His Majesty expedient to require for the protection in the said German Protectorates of authors' works first produced in His Majesty's dominions :

Now therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to His Majesty by the International Copyright Acts, 1844 to 1886, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. From and after the commencement of this Order the hereinbefore recited Orders in Council of November 28, 1887, and March 7, 1898, shall extend to the German Protectorates.
2. This Order shall come into operation as from January 1, 1909, which date is hereinbefore referred to as the commencement of this Order.
3. And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary orders herein accordingly.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended April 24, 1909.

Births.—The total births registered were 84 (3 Europeans, 7 Burghers, 58 Sinhalese, 4 Tamils, 8 Moors, and 4 Malays). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1909, viz., 182,058) was 24.1, as against 18.0 in the preceding week, 27.3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.5 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 100 (1 European, 7 Burghers, 51 Sinhalese, 24 Tamils, 12 Moors, 2 Malays, and 3 Others), including the death of a town resident, who died in the Enteric Hospital at Kanatta. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 28.6, as against 30.4 in the previous week, 30.7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 36.5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 100 total deaths, 19 were of infants under one year of age, as against 22 in the preceding week, 28 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 31 the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of still births registered during the week was 3.

Selected Causes of Death.—Seven deaths were registered from *Diarrhœa* and 3 from *Dysentery*.

2. Seven deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 15 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year), of which 2 were in New Bazaar, 2 in Maradana Hospitals (a prisoner of the Welikada Jail and a patient whose residence was not known), and 1 each in Slave Island, Kollupitiya, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals). Three deaths were registered from *Bronchitis* and 12 from *Pneumonia*.

3. Six deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 4 in the previous week and 8, the weekly average for last year), of which 2 were in Kotahena, 2 in Maradana Hospitals (a prisoner of the Welikada Jail and a patient from outside the town), and 1 each in New Bazaar and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals). During the week 8 cases of *Enteric Fever* were reported, against 19 in the previous week.

4. There were no deaths registered from Smallpox. This is the second week since the commencement of this year in which no deaths from this cause were registered, the first week being the week ending March 13. Three cases of Smallpox were reported during the week (1 from the Segregation Camp and 2 from the port), against 1 in the previous week.

5. One death was registered from Measles (a Sinhalese from Maradana (exclusive of hospitals). Nineteen cases of Measles were reported, and 26 of Chickenpox.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 83.6°, against 82.6° in the preceding week and 84.0° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.882 in. against 29.933 in. in the preceding week and 29.916 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.23 in. against 0.53 in. in the preceding week and 2.79 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

IN the Name of His Majesty EDWARD THE SEVENTH, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir HENRY EDWARD MCCALLUM, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Aide-de-Camp to His Majesty the King, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

HENRY MCCALLUM.

WHEREAS the Midland Circuit comprises and is divided into five districts, that is to say, the districts of Kandy, Kegalla, Kurunegala, Badulla, and Anuradhapura, and it is expedient that the division of the said circuit into districts should be altered and amended so that the said circuit shall comprise and be divided into six districts, namely, the said districts of Kandy, Kegalla, Kurunegala, Badulla, and Anuradhapura, and a further district to be termed the district of Nuwara Eliya :

And whereas it is necessary for the said purpose that the present limits of the district of Kandy shall be altered and amended :

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in exercise of the power vested in Us by section 6 of the Courts Ordinance, No. 1 of 1889, and with the advice of the Executive Council, and after consultation with the Judges of the Supreme Court, do hereby declare that from and after May 10, 1909, the Midland Circuit shall comprise and be divided into the following districts, namely, the districts of Kandy, Kegalla, Kurunegala, Badulla, Anuradhapura, and Nuwara Eliya, and that the limits of the district of Nuwara Eliya shall be those set out in Schedule I. hereto ; and We do hereby further declare that from and after the said May 10, 1909, the limits of the said district of Kandy, as defined in Schedule II. of "The Courts Ordinance, 1889 and 1901," and by Proclamation dated August 13, 1904, shall be altered and amended by substituting therefor the limits set forth in Schedule II. hereto.

And We do hereby further, in exercise of the powers vested in Us by section 55 of the said Ordinance, establish a District Court within the said district of Nuwara Eliya, and appoint that the said District Court shall be holden respectively in the towns of Nuwara Eliya and Hatton in the said district of Nuwara Eliya, as from and after the said May 10, 1909.

Given at Nuwara Eliya, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-ninth day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Nine.

SCHEDULE I.

Limits of the District of Nuwara Eliya.

The revenue divisions of Uda Bulatgama, Uda Hewaheta, Walapane, Kotmale, except those parts of Ambagamuwa and Pasbage korales of the revenue division of Uda Bulatgama and Pallepone korale of Kotmale, which are contained within the following boundaries :—

North.—From Helboda trigonometrical station, commonly known as Helbodakanda, along the boundary between Udapalata and Kotmale and the northern boundary of Nugawela estate to the Kotmale-ganga up to where it falls into Mahaweli-ganga, thence along the Mahaweli-ganga to the 19th milepost, Nawalapitiya-Kandy road, thence from Getahadeniya to Polgolla trigonometrical station, the boundary between Udapalata and Uda Bulatgama divisions.

West.—From Polgolla trigonometrical station to Stenshall's trigonometrical station (boundary between Udapalata and Uda Bulatgama), along the northern boundary of Galamuduna estate to Polepatiya-ela, thence along the eastern boundary of Sembawatta and Ing-oya estates to Urugala trigonometrical station (boundary between Uda Bulatgama and Pata Bulatgama), thence in a straight line to Kalugala trigonometrical station, and from thence to Mudamanahela trigonometrical station, and thence to Kiripanagala trigonometrical station.

South.—From Kiripanagala trigonometrical station in a straight line to Kelweherakanda trigonometrical station.

East.—The road from Laxapana to Ginigathena to its crossing near Mahaweli-ganga, thence along the Mahaweli-ganga to the 7th milepost near Kenilworth, thence in a straight line to the northern boundary of Penrhos, thence to Dahanayaka trigonometrical station, and from thence to Kuruwaka-oya and along the Kuruwaka-oya to the southern boundary of Queensberry estate, from thence along the southern boundary of Queensberry estate to the Dimbula Gap, from Dimbula Gap along the

estate boundary of Queensberry, Gongala, Kolapotana, and Hunukotuwa estate to the eastern boundary of the Dombagastalawa, where it meets the boundary between the Udapone and Pallepone korales, from thence along the boundary between Udapone and Pallepone korales to Kotmale-ganga, from Kotmale-ganga along Katukitule-ela to Helboda trigonometrical station.

Those parts of Udapalata and Yatipalata of the division of Udukinda which are contained within the boundaries set out below :—

South-west and South.—Maha Eliya ridge between Calsay and Kelly Hill estates, the eastern boundary of Kelly Hill to its junction with the Dombagastalawa-oya, the Dombagastalawa-oya to the Railway Gorge, thence along the Sudugala ridge and Totupola ridge, thence following the Province of Uva boundary as far as the head of Nonpareil Valley, thence to the trigonometrical station called Horton Plains No. 1, and thence closely following the Bilihul-oya minor road, crossing it at a point half mile below Lands End No. 2, continuing thence along the southern edge of the Maha Eliya plateau to a point on the ridge where it joins the Central Province boundary between Yalagama and Bogawantalawa, two miles south-east of Kirigalpotta Peak.

East.—From Totupola ridge following the Province boundary to the Narabutgala trigonometrical station, thence a straight line to the Idampolakota trigonometrical station, and a straight line from thence to the 26th milepost on the road from Badulla to Nuwara Eliya.

North-east and East.—The Nuwara Eliya to Badulla road to the boundary of the Nuwara Eliya revenue district, thence along this boundary to the eastern boundary of Walapane.

SCHEDULE II.

Limits of the District of Kandy.

Those parts of Ambagamuwa and Pasbage korales of the revenue division of Uda Bulatgama and Pallepone korale of Kotmale which are contained within the boundaries :—

North.—From Helboda trigonometrical station, commonly known as Helbodakanda, along the boundary between Udapalata and Kotmale and the northern boundary of Nugawela estate to Kotmale-ganga up to where it falls into Mahaweli-ganga, thence along the Mahaweli-ganga to the 19th milepost, Nawalapitiya-Kandy road, thence from Getahadeniya to Polgolla trigonometrical station, the boundary between Udapalata and Uda Bulatgama divisions.

West.—From Polgolla trigonometrical station to Stenshall's trigonometrical station (boundary between Udapalata and Uda Bulatgama), along the northern boundary of Galamuduna estate to Palapatiya-ela, thence along the eastern boundary of Sembawatta and Ing-oya estates to Unugala trigonometrical station (boundary between Uda Bulatgama and Pata Bulatgama), thence in a straight line to Kalugala trigonometrical station, and from thence to Mudamanahela trigonometrical station, and thence to Kiripanagala trigonometrical station.

South.—From Kiripanagala trigonometrical station in a straight line to Kelweherakanda trigonometrical station.

East.—The road from Laxapana to Ginigathena to its crossing near Mahaweli-ganga, thence along the Mahaweli-ganga to the 7th milepost near Kenilworth, thence in a straight line to the northern boundary of Penrhos, thence to Dahanayaka trigonometrical station and from thence to Kuruwaka-oya and along the Kuruwaka-oya to the southern boundary of Queensberry estate from thence along the southern boundary of Queensberry estate to Dimbula Gap, from Dimbula Gap along the estate boundary of Queensberry, Gongala, Kolapotana, and Hunukotuwa estates to the eastern boundary of Dombagastalawa where it meets the boundary between the Udapone and Pallepone korales, from thence along the boundary between Udapone and Pallepone korales to Kotmale-ganga, from Kotmale-ganga along Katukitule-ela to Helboda trigonometrical station.

The rest of the Central Province, except the revenue divisions of Uda Hewaheta, Walapone, and those parts of Uda Bulatgama and Kotmale which are not included in the first paragraph of this schedule.

That portion of the Kadawat korale of the Province of Sabaragamuwa lying between Central Province boundary from Totupola, following the Province of Uva boundary as far as the head of Nonpareil Valley, thence to the trigonometrical station, Horton Plains No. 1, and thence closely following the Bilihul-oya minor road, crossing it at a point half a mile below Lands End No. 2, continuing thence along the southern edge of the Maha Eliya plateau to a point on the ridge where it joins the Central Province boundary between Galagama and Bogawantalawa, two miles south-east of Kirigalpotta Peak.
