# Examination for the Local Division of the Civil Service of Ceylon.

- 1. An Examination for admission to the Local Division of the Civil Service will be held in Colombo in or about October next. The prospects and conditions of the Service are set out in the Minutes governing the Local Division of the Civil Service published in the Government Gazette of April 2, 1909. The number of persons to be selected at this Examination will be announced hereafter.
- 2. No person will be admitted to compete who has not received a nomination from His Excellency the Governor.
- 3. Applications for nominations should be sent to the Principal Assistant Colonial Secretary—the envelope to be marked "Local Division, Civil Service"—on or before June 30. No question as to the delay or loss in the post of any such application can be entertained.
- 4. Nominations will be limited to candidates who have passed the Senior Standard of the Cambridge Local Examination, the London Matriculation, or any other public examination which may be deemed to be of an equally high standard.
  - 5. Every applicant must furnish satisfactory proof-
    - (a) That he is a natural-born British subject born in Ceylon of parents permanently resident in the Island.
    - (b) That he had attained the age of 19 and had not attained the age of 24 on January 1, 1909.
    - (c) That he is of good moral character.
  - Applicants should attach to their applications—
    - (1) Birth certificate.
    - (2) A certificate of character from the head of the school at which the applicant was educated.
    - (3) A statement showing where he was educated, examinations passed, degrees taken, &c., present occupation, and how he has spent the time since he left school.
    - (4) A medical certificate that the applicant is of sound constitution, possessed of good sight, and otherwise physically qualified for the Service.
    - (5) Particulars of property possessed by the applicant, showing the situation and nature of the land or property. It should also be stated in the case of landed property whether it is ancestral or recently acquired.
    - (6) Any athletic distinctions obtained by the applicant should be stated, also whether the applicant is a Volunteer, and whether he is able to ride.

- The list of candidates to whom nominations have been granted will be published in the Government Gazette. No communication with regard to nomination, unless made in reply to inquiries, will be entertained after June 30.
- All candidates after nomination will be required to undergo a medical examination by a Board before the examination by the Civil Service Commissioners. The fee for the medical examination will be Rs. 10.50. The fee for the examination will be Rs. 25.
- The examinations will be conducted by the Civil Service Commissioners, and the following is a list of the subjects in which candidates will be examined :-

- All candidates may offer subjects 1, 2, and 3 inclusive, with one of the languages 5, 6, 7, 8, and one of the subjects 9, 10, and 11. They may also offer one additional subject selected at pleasure from the list. i.e., not more than six subjects in all must be selected.
  - A syllabus is appended showing the range of the examinations in the various subjects.
  - 12. No subjects are obligatory, nor will any text books be prescribed for any subject.

#### Syllabus of Subjects.

English Composition.—The standard of positive merit will be looked for in logical arrangement of thought and in accuracy and propriety of expression, but large deductions of marks will be made for faults of writing and spelling.

(Candidates are also warned that for similar faults in the use of the English language similar deductions

will be made from the marks obtained in other subjects.)

Geography.—Simple questions in descriptive and general Geography.

English History.—The general paper in this subject will be confined to events subsequent to the Norman Conquest. It will test whether the candidates are accurately acquainted with the facts of English History, and also possess an intelligent knowledge of the meaning of the facts.

The paper on the fixed period will be confined to English History subsequent to the downfall of Walpole It will require from the candidates more minute knowledge than the general paper, and will have special

reference to our Colonies and Dependencies.

Mathematics I.—Arithmetic; Algebra, up to and including the Binomial Theorem; the theory and use of Logarithms; Euclid, Books I.—IV. and VI.; Plane Trigono etry, up to and including solution of triangles; Mensuration.

Mathematics II.—Further questions and problems on the syllabus of Mathematics I.; Elementary Solid Geometry, including Euclid, Book XI., Propositions 1 to 21, Book XII., Propositions 1 and 2; Geometrical Conic Sections; Statics, the equilibrium of forces acting in one plane and of parallel forces, the centre of mass, the mechanical powers; Dynamics, uniform and uniformly accelerated rectilineal motion, uniform circular motion, falling bodies and projectiles in vacuo; Hydrostatics, including the pressure of fluids, specific gravities, floating bodies, barometric heights. In Statics, Dynamics, and Hydrostatics a knowledge of the construction and use of the more simple instruments and machines will be expected.

Latin.—Passages selected from the authors usually read in schools will be set for translation into English. Passages from English authors will be given for translation into Latin prose and verse, but candidates will be allowed, in the place of verse composition, to answer questions of a simple character, which will test whether they possess a fundamental knowledge of the grammar of the language, and such an elementary acquaintance

with Roman History as is required for the intelligent study of the books they have read.

French.—Translations of unseen passages from French into English and from English into French. The passages for translation will be taken mainly from standard authors, and a few simple questions may be asked on the passages set, as to the structure and character of the language, and allusions of obvious and

German.—The passages for translation will be taken mainly from standard authors, and in other respects

the examination will proceed on the same lines as in French.

Natural Science Subjects.—The standard of examination in these subjects will be such as may be reasonably expected from the education given at schools possessing appliances for practical instruction, such as a laboratory, &c. A knowledge of the metric system will be expected.

Chemistry.—The laws of chemical combination and decomposition, and the preparation, classification,

and properties of the principal metallic and non-metallic elements, and of such of their compounds as are treated

of in inorganic chemistry.

Heat.—The elementary portion of the subject.

Physics.—The elementary properties of electricity, magnetism, light and sound. Physiography, i.e., Physical Geography.

Geology. - Chiefly economic, including the recognition of the more familiar minerals and rocks and their properties and uses.

#### RITLES

- 1. For sanitary reasons the duration of the Kataragama festival and of the stay of pilgrims at Kataragama shall be and it is hereby limited to seventeen days, namely, from July 17 to August 2, 1909, inclusive. Pilgrims arriving before the day first named or staying beyond the period here prescribed shall be guilty of an offence.
- 2. It shall be lawful for the Police authorities or any Police Magistrate at any place on the line of march to prohibit from proceeding all persons who, by reason of disease, infirmity, weakness, advanced age, youth, want of supplies, or other sufficient cause, are considered unfit to undertake the journey, or who appear likely to fall ill and endanger the health of others; and to require such persons to find security to ensure their obedience to the orders so given. In default of such security being found, it shall be lawful for the said Police authorities or Police Magistrate to detain such persons in custody for a period not exceeding three days.
- 3. In the event of an epidemic breaking out at Kataragama during the festival, it shall be lawful for the officers appointed to enforce the observance of orders to declare the festival at an end, and to direct pilgrims at once to leave the village and proceed to their homes, and to prescribe the roads they have to travel.
- 4. The officers appointed to enforce the observance of orders shall have power on the line of march to and from Kataragama and at Kataragama—
  - (a) To appoint particular places to be exclusively used by the pilgrims for washing and bathing, for drawing water and drinking, and for natural offices;
  - (b) To appoint places for the occupation of each class of pilgrims;
  - (c) To prescribe routes for the journey of any body of pilgrims;
  - (d) To regulate the distribution of all food given to pilgrims;
  - (e) To fix separate places of abode for pilgrims who fall ill, to prohibit communication with them, and to detain them if unfit to travel.

Any person disobeying an order given by the appointed officers shall be guilty of an offence.

- 5. The Police are empowered and required to seize and destroy all food condemned as unwholesome on the march or in camp by the Medical Officer. or, if there be none, by the Chief Officer of Police; and any person resisting or obstructing the Police in the discharge of this or of any other duty prescribed by these rules shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
- 6. Any person bringing any cattle or cart bulls within three miles of the camp shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
- 7. Any person selling meat in camp in any other place than that assigned for the purpose by the officer in charge of the camp, and any other person selling food condemned as unwholesome by the Medical Officer, or in his absence by the Chief Officer of Police, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
- 8. Any person who shall, during the occupation of the camp, use any other place for offices of nature than that provided for the purpose by Government, or failing to cover the deposit with earth or sand, and any person who shall during the same period bathe in or enter the river above the spot appointed by the officer in charge of the camp, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
- 9. Any person suffering from an infectious or a contagious disease, and not reporting the same to the Medical Officer, or in his absence to the Chief Officer of Police, and any person abetting or assisting in the concealment of such disease, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
- 10. All persons shall take up the quarters assigned to them by the Chief Officer of Police at the halting places and in the camp, and any pilgrim declining or neglecting to do so shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
- 11. The number of pilgrims for the pilgrimage of the year 1909 is restricted to 2,000.

- No person shall proceed on the pilgrimage in the year 1909 without having first obtained a ticket from the Government Agent of the Western Province for the Colombo band, or from the Government Agent of the Central Province for the Kandy band, or from the Government Agent of the Southern Province for the Galle band, or from the Government Agent of the North-Western Province for the Kurunegala band, or from the Government Agent of the Eastern Province for the Batticaloa band, or from the Government Agent of the Northern Province for the Jaffna band, or from the Government Agent of the Province of Uva for the Badulla band.
- Every person proceeding on the pilgrimage shall show his ticket when required to do so by any officer of Police, or by any officer appointed to enforce the observance of orders under the Ordinance aforesaid.
- 14. The transfer of a ticket by the person named in it and the use of it by any other person are forbidden

# VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended June 12, 1909.

Births.—The total births registered were 83 (7 Burghers, 49 Sinhalese, 12 Tamils, 14 Moors, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1909, viz., 182,058) was 23.8, as against 26.1 in the preceding week, 24.7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.5 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 120 (3 Burghers, 66 Sinhalese, 31 Tamils, 13 Moors, 3 Malays, and 4 Others), including the death of a town resident who died in the Enteric Hospital at Kanatta. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 34.4, as against 35.5 in the previous week, 34.5 in the corresponding week of last year, and 36.5 the weekly average for last year.

Injuntile Deaths.—Of the 120 total deaths, 27 were of infants under one year of age, as against 30 in the preceding week and in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 31 the average for last year.

Still Births. The number of still births registered during the week was 6.

Selected Causes of Death.—Sixteen deaths were registered from Pneumonia and 2 from Bronchitis.

- 2. Fifteen deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 17 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 each were in the wards of St. Paul's, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Slave Island, and in the General Hospital, 2 in New Bazaar, and 1 in Kollupitiya.
  - 3. Thirteen deaths were registered from Enteritis and 5 each from Diarrheea and Dysentery.
- 4. Twelve deaths were registered from Enteric Fever (against 6 in the previous week and 8 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and 2 each in St. Sebastian, St. Paul's, and 1 each in Kotahena, New Bazaar, Kollupitiya and the General Hospital. During the week 19 cases of Enteric Fever were reported, against 12 in the previous week.
- 5. Eleven deaths were registered from Infantile Convulsions, 6 from Tetanus, and 35 from other causes.

  State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 82·2°, against 82·4° in the preceding week, and 81·1° in the corresponding week, of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29 892 in.,

The total rainfall in the week was 0.29 in., against 1.13 in. in the preceding week, and 3.43 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
