WHEREAS under the provisions of section 22 of the Butchers' Ordinance, No. 9 of 1893, a building was erected at Vetakepotehena in Udispattu, in the Central Province, for the purposes of a public slaughter-house, and such building has been certified to the Governor by the "proper authority," to wit, the Government Agent of the Central Province, as sufficient for the purposes of a public slaughter-house:

Now know Ye that We, the said Officer Administering the Government, in exercise of the power vested in Us by section 22 of the said Ordinance, do hereby declare and proclaim the said building to be a public slaughter-house for Udispattu, in the Central Province, as from and after the date hereof.

Given at Galle, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Seventeenth day of June, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Nine.

WHEREAS by the 5th section of the Prisons Ordinance, No. 16 of 1877, as amended by section I of Ordinance No. 24 of 1890, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, to establish any prison for this Island or for any part thereof :

And whereas it is expedient to establish an additional prison at Jaffna :

Now know Ye that We, the Officer Administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise of the powers vested in Us as aforesaid, do by this Our Proclamation establish the building known as " House of Observation " as an additional prison at Jaffna aforesaid for the reception of prisoners of every description committed or remanded under the authority of the several courts of the Island, as from and after June 25, 1909.

Given at Diyatalawa, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-third day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand Nine hundred and Nine.

BY-LAW.

221 A.—*Sitting, &c., on Lake Bund Wall prohibited.*—It shall not be lawful for any person to stand, sit, squat, or recline on the parapet wall along the western and northern bunds of the lake.

RULES.

1. No person licensed to carry on the trade of a butcher in the planting district of Udispattu shall slaughter any cattle at any place other than the slaughter-house for cattle at Vetakepotehena in Udispattu; bounded on the east by high road, south by Kadura, west by Seeni Mudalali's land, north by Kuppa's hena.

2. The shed on the land called Etabagahawatta—bounded on the east by the wall of the cart shed, south by garden fence, west by Malkotuwe fence, north by high road to Rangala—is hereby appointed as the shed in which, as required by section 12, sub-section (1), of Ordinance No. 9 of 1893, the butchers at Udispattu shall expose to public view all cattle intended for slaughter for a period not less than 24 hours immediately preceding the time of slaughter.

3. No cattle shall be slaughtered at the aforesaid slaughter-house, except on such days and between such hours as may be determined by the Government Agent, Central Province, notice of which shall be posted at the said slaughter-house.

4. No animal shall be slaughtered for human food until after the animal has been inspected and approved by the Medical Officer at Udispattu as fit to be slaughtered for human food. Animals rejected as unfit for slaughter shall be immediately removed.

5. The said Medical Officer may prohibit the slaughter of any animal, notwithstanding that it has been approved as aforesaid, if it should before slaughter be found to be diseased or otherwise unfit to be slaughtered for human food.

6. If on any animal which has been approved as aforesaid being slaughtered the carcass shall appear diseased or unfit for human food, the said Medical Officer shall cause the meat to be immediately destroyed or disposed of so as to prevent its being exposed for sale or used for human food.

7. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall not permit the slaughter of any animals which have not been approved as aforesaid as fit to be slaughtered for human food, or the slaughter of which the said Medical Officer has prohibited as provided by rule 5.

8. No person shall remove from the slaughter-house, except under the directions of the said Medical Officer, any meat which the latter has declared to be unfit for human food.

9. The fee for slaughtering shall be 75 cents for each head of cattle.

10. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall keep a register in the form annexed of all cattle brought to the slaughter-house:—

Tenders, properly sealed, may either be posted, addressed to the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, marked "Arrack Rent Tender," or delivered personally by the tenderer to the Board.

Forms of conditions of sale with lists of taverns can be obtained at any Kacheheri in the Island. Any further information required will be supplied by the Hon. the Controller of Revenue on application made to him either personally or by letter.

Tenderers who cannot speak English and wish to communicate with the Board must bring their own interpreters.

No tender will be considered unless the tenderer is present in person or by his authorized agent at the Council Chamber, and is prepared to deposit forthwith the amount of one month's rent as tendered by him.

In the event of two or more tenders being for an equal amount, the Board shall have the option of forthwith offering the rent for sale by public auction, the bidding to be restricted to the tenderers in question, or of calling for fresh tenders.

Purchasers of these rents will be allowed to sell arrack at any price not below Rs. 4.50 per gallon.

And notice is hereby further given that the purchasers of the Arrack Rents of the Central Province and of the Four Gravets of Galle will be required to pay in terms of the provisions of the Ordinance No. 9 of 1892 a stamp duty of Rs. 500 for each and every license issued under the Ordinance No. 13 of 1891 to sell arrack by retail at each and every tavern situated within the limits of the Municipalities of Kandy and Galle.

It is also hereby notified that candidates will be given the option of using Codes in the examination in the Criminal Procedure Code and the Penal Code; they must, however, state when sending in their names what their decision is, as the character of the papers set for those who use Codes and those who do not will be different.

The examination for officers in the Police Department, and the *viva voce* examination in the native languages for officers in the Public Works Department, the Irrigation Department, the Forest Department, and the Railway Department, will be held at the same time and place.

Candidates are required to send in their names not later than **June 30, 1909.**

Gentlemen in the Civil Service should state in their applications whether they are presenting themselves for the first or second examination, and whether they intend taking up Sinhalese or Tamil, and whether they wish to have the option of using Codes.

Examination for the Local Division of the Civil Service of Ceylon.

1. An Examination for admission to the Local Division of the Civil Service will be held in Colombo in or about October next. The prospects and conditions of the Service are set out in the Minutes governing the Local Division of the Civil Service published in the *Government Gazette* of April 2, 1909. The number of persons to be selected at this Examination will be announced hereafter.

2. No person will be admitted to compete who has not received a nomination from His Excellency the Governor.

3. Applications for nominations should be sent to the Principal Assistant Colonial Secretary—the envelope to be marked "Local Division, Civil Service"—on or before June 30. No question as to the delay or loss in the post of any such application can be entertained.

4. Nominations will be limited to candidates who have passed the Senior Standard of the Cambridge Local Examination, the London Matriculation, or any other public examination which may be deemed to be of an equally high standard.

5. Every applicant must furnish satisfactory proof—

- (a) That he is a natural-born British subject born in Ceylon of parents permanently resident in the Island.
- (b) That he had attained the age of 19 and had not attained the age of 24 on January 1, 1909
- (c) That he is of good moral character.

6. Applicants should attach to their applications—

- (1) Birth certificate.
- (2) A certificate of character from the head of the school at which the applicant was educated.
- (3) A statement showing where he was educated, examinations passed, degrees taken, &c., present occupation, and how he has spent the time since he left school.
- (4) A medical certificate that the applicant is of sound constitution, possessed of good sight, and otherwise physically qualified for the Service.
- (5) Particulars of property possessed by the applicant, showing the situation and nature of the land or property. It should also be stated in the case of landed property whether it is ancestral or recently acquired.
- (6) Any athletic distinctions obtained by the applicant should be stated, also whether the applicant is a Volunteer, and whether he is able to ride.

7. The list of candidates to whom nominations have been granted will be published in the *Government Gazette*. No communication with regard to nomination, unless made in reply to inquiries, will be entertained after June 30.

8. All candidates after nomination will be required to undergo a medical examination by a Board before the examination by the Civil Service Commissioners. The fee for the medical examination will be Rs. 10.50. The fee for the examination will be Rs. 25.

9. The examinations will be conducted by the Civil Service Commissioners, and the following is a list of the subjects in which candidates will be examined:—

10. All candidates may offer subjects 1, 2, and 3 inclusive, with one of the languages 5, 6, 7, 8, and one of the subjects 9, 10, and 11. They may also offer one additional subject selected at pleasure from the list. *i.e.*, not more than six subjects in all must be selected.

11. A syllabus is appended showing the range of the examinations in the various subjects.

12. No subjects are obligatory, nor will any text books be prescribed for any subject.

Syllabus of Subjects.

English Composition.—The standard of positive merit will be looked for in logical arrangement of thought and in accuracy and propriety of expression, but large deductions of marks will be made for faults of writing and spelling.

(Candidates are also warned that for similar faults in the use of the English language similar deductions will be made from the marks obtained in other subjects.)

Geography.—Simple questions in descriptive and general Geography.

English History.—The general paper in this subject will be confined to events subsequent to the Norman Conquest. It will test whether the candidates are accurately acquainted with the facts of English History, and also possess an intelligent knowledge of the meaning of the facts.

The paper on the fixed period will be confined to English History subsequent to the downfall of Walpole. It will require from the candidates more minute knowledge than the general paper, and will have special reference to our Colonies and Dependencies.

Mathematics I.—Arithmetic; Algebra, up to and including the Binomial Theorem; the theory and use of Logarithms; Euclid, Books I.—IV. and VI.; Plane Trigonometry, up to and including solution of triangles; Mensuration.

Mathematics II.—Further questions and problems on the syllabus of Mathematics I.; Elementary Solid Geometry, including Euclid, Book XI., Propositions 1 to 21, Book XII., Propositions 1 and 2; Geometrical Conic Sections; Statics, the equilibrium of forces acting in one plane and of parallel forces, the centre of mass, the mechanical powers; Dynamics, uniform and uniformly accelerated rectilinear motion, uniform circular motion, falling bodies and projectiles *in vacuo*; Hydrostatics, including the pressure of fluids, specific gravities, floating bodies, barometric heights. In Statics, Dynamics, and Hydrostatics a knowledge of the construction and use of the more simple instruments and machines will be expected.

Latin.—Passages selected from the authors usually read in schools will be set for translation into English. Passages from English authors will be given for translation into Latin prose and verse, but candidates will be allowed, in the place of verse composition, to answer questions of a simple character, which will test whether they possess a fundamental knowledge of the grammar of the language, and such an elementary acquaintance with Roman History as is required for the intelligent study of the books they have read.

French.—Translations of unseen passages from French into English and from English into French. The passages for translation will be taken mainly from standard authors, and a few simple questions may be asked on the passages set, as to the structure and character of the language, and allusions of obvious and general interest.

German.—The passages for translation will be taken mainly from standard authors, and in other respects the examination will proceed on the same lines as in French.

Natural Science Subjects.—The standard of examination in these subjects will be such as may be reasonably expected from the education given at schools possessing appliances for practical instruction, such as a laboratory, &c. A knowledge of the metric system will be expected.

Chemistry.—The laws of chemical combination and decomposition, and the preparation, classification, and properties of the principal metallic and non-metallic elements, and of such of their compounds as are treated of in inorganic chemistry.

Heat.—The elementary portion of the subject.

Physics.—The elementary properties of electricity, magnetism, light, and sound.

Physiography, i.e., Physical Geography.

Geology.—Chiefly economic, including the recognition of the more familiar minerals and rocks and their properties and uses.

SIR,—WITH reference to Lord Elgin's circular despatch of January 25, 1907, I have the honour to transmit to you, for publication or for such action as may be considered desirable, a copy of revised regulations for the Matriculation Examination of the University of London, and to call attention to the regulations with regard to the optional languages which may be taken by candidates for that examination.

The External Registrar states that the following languages have been accepted by the Matriculation Board :—

Starred under old Regulations.—Spanish, Portuguese, Italian, Modern Dutch, Arabic, Sanskrit, Hebrew, Chinese;

By the Matriculation Board, January 25, 1909.—Burmese, Gaelic (Irish, Scottish, or Welsh), Hindustani, Persian, Russian, Tamil, Urdu—

and that the special fee referred to in the regulations is £1 in the case of either Spanish or Hebrew, and £2 in the case of any other of the languages named. This special fee must be paid by candidates taking such languages at the same time as the ordinary fee for the examination, and should be forwarded with the application for the examination.

The regulation comes into force so far as the Colonies are concerned in January next.

REGULATIONS FOR MATRICULATION.

IMPORTANT NOTICES.

The attention of all students who matriculate is directed to the following extract from Statute No. 120 :—

"No student shall be admitted to the Final Examination for a degree until the expiration of at least three years after Matriculation, unless the Senate in special cases otherwise determine."

MATRICULATION.

Candidates for any degree in this University, unless admitted under Statute 113,* or under the second clause of Statute 116,† must have passed the Matriculation Examination either in its ordinary form or in the form of the School Examination (Matriculation or Higher Standard for the School-leaving Certificate) at least three years previously to the Final Examination for a First Degree.‡

Students admitted under Statute 113, or under Statute 116, upon a qualification other than the Matriculation Examination, must pay a registration fee of £2 to the appropriate Registrar.

The Matriculation Examination and all other examinations of the University are open to men and women alike.

There shall be three examinations for Matriculation in each year, one commencing on September 15 if that day be a Monday, or if not, on the Monday next preceding the 15th; one on the second Monday in January; and the third on the second Monday in June (or July, as may be hereafter determined).§

† See Appendices to these Regulations, No. II.

‡ The Medical and Surgical Degrees of this University are registrable qualifications, and it is not necessary for students to register as Medical Students in order to qualify for the examinations for these degrees. Compliance with the University Regulations is sufficient. For the diplomas of certain other licensing bodies, however, registration as a Medical Student by the General Medical Council is a necessary preliminary, and under the present regulations of the Council, those desiring to use the Matriculation Examination of this University as a qualification for registration must show that they have passed in Latin and in Greek or a modern foreign language.

§ The examinations in January and June (or July), but not that in September, may be held not only at the University, but also under special arrangements in other parts of the United Kingdom or in the Colonies. Neither Botany nor Drawing can be taken in the Colonies.

Every candidate entering for the Matriculation Examination must pay a fee of £2. If a candidate withdraws his name before the last day of entry to the examination the fee shall be returned to him. If he fails to present himself at the examination, he shall be allowed to enter again within eight months for the Matriculation Examination on payment of a fee of £1. If he retires after the commencement of the examination, or fails to pass it, the full fee of £2 shall be payable upon every re-entry.*

Candidates who have matriculated in the University by examination, whether it be by the Matriculation Examination or by the School Examination (Matriculation Standard), will not be admitted to any subsequent Matriculation Examination as a whole; but they can enter any subsequent Matriculation Examination with a view to passing in one or more additional subjects on payment of a fee of £1 for a single subject and of £2 for two or more subjects.

Matriculated students of the University who have been registered under Statute 116 and members of the University who have proceeded to any Intermediate Examination in any Faculty or to the Preliminary Scientific Examination will not be admitted to any subsequent Matriculation Examination in whole or in part. Nevertheless, candidates who have so proceeded after passing the Matriculation Examination may, for the special purpose (which must be declared) of satisfying the requirements of a Public Authority, and on the conditions stated above, enter for one or more subjects of the Matriculation Examination. The names of such candidates will not appear on the pass list, nor will they receive certificates; but the University will on their behalf, notify their success to the Public Authority concerned.

The examination shall be conducted by means of printed papers; but the Examiners shall not be precluded from putting, for the purpose of ascertaining the competence of the candidates to pass, *viva voce* questions to any candidate in the subjects in which they are appointed to examine.

Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown at one and the same examination a competent knowledge in each of the following five subjects, according to the details specified under the several heads:—

- (1) English. One paper of three hours.
- (2) Elementary Mathematics. Two papers of three hours each.
- (3) Latin, or Elementary Mechanics, or Elementary Physics—Heat, Light, and Sound—or Elementary Chemistry, or Elementary Botany. One paper of three hours in each subject.
- (4) and (5) Two of the following subjects, neither of which has already been taken under section (3). One paper of 3 hours in each subject. If Latin be not taken, one of the other subjects selected must be another language either ancient or modern:—

A candidate desirous of offering any language or languages other than those named above should submit his proposal for the consideration of the Matriculation Board. The normal notice of such proposal is six months before the beginning of the Matriculation Examination for which he enters. Candidates giving less than six months' notice are advised that it may not be possible to make arrangements for papers to be set at the next Matriculation Examination, even though the language be approved.

Proposals to take a particular language, other than those mentioned above, must be accompanied by a special fee, additional to the regular Matriculation fee. This fee will be returned should the proposed language not be accepted by the Matriculation Board, but in no other case. The amount of this additional fee varies with the language selected, and can be ascertained on application to the External Registrar.

* Candidates who entered for the Matriculation Examination in or before January, 1902, will for the present be admitted to subsequent Matriculations upon payment at every such entry of a fee of £1, provided that they comply with the above Regulations. Colonial Candidates who withdraw their names after having entered for, or who fail to present themselves at, an examination will be required to pay the full fee of £2 upon every re-entry.

† Candidates who take the combined paper in History and Geography will not be allowed to take, whether in the general examination or for supplementary certificate, either the Modern History paper or the paper in Physical and General Geography; but candidates who have taken either of those subjects separately will be allowed to take the combined paper for a supplementary certificate.

‡ This subject cannot be taken in the Colonies.

§ In this examination special stress is laid on competence in Drawing. This subject cannot be taken in the Colonies.

¶ Candidates for examination in these subjects must give notice and pay their fee at least two months before the commencement of the examination.

¶¶ Candidates for examination in this subject must give notice and pay their fee at least six months before the commencement of the examination.

The following are the particulars of the foregoing subjects of examination :—

I.—ENGLISH.*

The paper will include :—

- (a) A subject for an essay to be chosen by each candidate from several subjects set. Those proposed may include some having reference to Geography and History, and some involving an acquaintance with English Authors, as well as more abstract subjects, the main object being to test power of expression, thought, and arrangement, general reading, and knowledge. (All candidates will be expected to attempt the essay, to which special importance is attached.)
- (b) Questions testing knowledge and command of English. These may include questions on precis writing, paraphrase, and analysis of sentences.
- (c) Questions testing general reading and knowledge of English books.

II.—ELEMENTARY MATHEMATICS.

Arithmetic.—The principles and processes of Arithmetic applied to whole numbers and vulgar and decimal fractions.

The Metric System.

Approximation to a specified degree of accuracy.

Contracted methods of multiplication and division of decimals.

Ratio and proportion ; percentage. Averages.

Practical applications of Arithmetic.

Algebra.—Symbolical expression of general results in Arithmetic.

Algebraic laws and their applications.

Factors of simple binomial or quadratic expressions.

Equations of the first or second degree, and problems leading thereto.

Square root. Graphs of simple rational integral algebraic functions.

Arithmetic and harmonic progression.

Geometric progression.

Geometry.—The subjects of Euclid I.-IV., with simple deductions, including easy loci and the areas of triangles and parallelograms, of which the bases and altitudes are given commensurable lengths. (Euclid's proofs will not be insisted upon.)

III.—OPTIONAL LANGUAGES.

Latin.—The paper shall contain passages to be translated into English from Latin books not previously prescribed, together with questions on Grammar and simple and easy sentences of English to be translated into Latin.†

Candidates who take Latin may also take an additional paper on Latin prose, if they give notice on their Entry forms. This paper will not be a part of the Matriculation Examination, and marks gained on it will not be credited to the candidate. Two hours will be allowed for this paper, which will be of about the same difficulty as the corresponding paper in Responsions at Oxford.‡

Greek.—The paper shall contain passages to be translated into English from Greek books not previously prescribed, together with questions on Grammar and simple and easy sentences of English to be translated into Greek.§

French.—The paper shall contain (1) passages for translation from French, (2) a piece of easy translation into French, or, as an alternative, an essay of a simple character to be written in French, (3) questions on Grammar limited to Accidence and Elementary Syntax.

German.—The paper shall contain (1) passages for translation from German, (2) a piece of easy translation into German, or, as an alternative, an essay of a simple character to be written in German, (3) questions on Grammar limited to Accidence and Elementary Syntax.

Other Languages.||—The paper in any other language approved for the Matriculation Examination shall be drawn up as nearly as may be practicable in conformity with the following syllabus :—

The paper shall contain (1) an easy passage or easy passages for translation from the language in question, (2) an easy piece for translation into the language in question, or, as an alternative, an essay of a simple character to be written in the language in question, (3) questions in Grammar limited to Accidence and Elementary Syntax.

IV.—HISTORY.

Ancient.—The general course of Greek and Roman History, from an outline of the earlier monarchies.

The questions will be framed to test the general conceptions of history and historical development rather than technical detail.

Modern.—The general course of English history from 1485 to the death of Queen Victoria, with some reference to the contemporary history of Europe and Colonial developments.

The questions will be framed to test the general conception of history and historical development rather than technical detail.

§ Changes in the details of this order may be found necessary from time to time, but in all such cases due notice will be given to candidates.

Except in the case of Elementary Mathematics, candidates will only be allowed to take one paper in each subject. Two papers will be set in many other subjects in order to compress the examination into as short a period as possible, but no candidate will be allowed to take more than one of these papers. No option is allowed as to the order in which they are taken, and if the candidate does not present himself for examination in a given subject at the right time, he will on no account whatever be allowed to take a paper which may be set later on the same subject. It is, therefore, of the greatest importance that candidates should attend to the following rule :—

Candidates, having selected their subjects in accordance with the regulations, will be examined in these subjects in the numerical order in which they occur in the above list, and must take each subject on the first possible occasion accordingly.

Thus, a candidate who offers, in addition to English and Mathematics (Elementary), Botany, Mechanics, and French, must take Botany (No. 5) on the afternoon of the third day, Mechanics (No. 7) on the morning of the fourth day, and French (No. 9) on the afternoon of the fourth day. Again, a candidate who offers Latin, German (10), and Greek (11), must take German in the morning and Greek in the afternoon of the fourth day.

Candidates who take any of the subjects for which two months' notice is required will be informed when the examinations in these subjects will take place.

A pass certificate, signed by the Principal and setting forth the subjects of examination taken by the candidate, shall be delivered to each successful candidate after the report of the Examiners shall have been approved by the Senate.*

CERTIFICATES IN ENGLISH.

Any person will be admitted to take the English paper and *viva voce* test at the Matriculation Examination on payment of a fee of £2 for each entry, and subject to the General Regulations affecting that examination.

A certificate will be issued to each successful candidate stating that he has submitted himself to an oral and written test in English and has shown an adequate knowledge of the subject.

Any person who has obtained the foregoing certificate will be admitted to take the English papers at the Intermediate Examination in Arts (Pass) for External Students and a *viva voce* test on payment of a fee of £3, and subject to the General Regulations affecting that examination.

A certificate will be issued to each successful candidate stating that he has shown an adequate knowledge of the English Language, and of the period of English literature and of the texts prescribed for that examination.

* Certificates are generally ready for issue about a month after the publication of the Past List, and, in the absence of any request to the contrary, will be posted to the addresses given by the candidates in their Forms of Entry.

SCHEDULE.

THE COPYRIGHT REGULATIONS, 1909.

1. These regulations may be cited as "The Copyright Regulations, 1909."
2. In these regulations "the Ordinance" means "The Copyright Ordinance, 1908."
3. The fees to be paid under the Ordinance and these regulations shall be those specified in the First Schedule, and shall be paid by means of stamps bearing the words "Ceylon Stamp Duty" only, and affixed to the documents to which they relate.
4. The forms contained in the Second Schedule may, so far as they are applicable, be used in any proceeding under the Ordinance or these regulations to which they are appropriate.
5. Every application for the registration of a copyright or lecturing right must be left at or sent by prepaid letter through the post to the Copyright Office in Colombo.
6. Where an application for registration is made by an owner of a copyright or lecturing right, other than the author of the book, lecture, or artistic work, he shall, in his application, trace the devolution of title from the author to himself, and shall attach thereto the assignment or assignments by virtue of which he derives his title to the copyright or lecturing right with an attested copy of each assignment.
7. Every application for the registration of a copyright or lecturing right shall be accompanied by a statement of the applicant's address, or by the appointment, if any, of his agent; and all notices, requisitions, and communications of every kind in connection with an application may be sent by the Registrar to such address or agent.
8. (1) Declarations for the purpose of the Ordinance and these regulations, may be taken or made before any of the following persons :—
 - (a) *In Ceylon*.—The Registrar, a District Judge, a Commissioner of Requests, a Police Magistrate, a Justice of the Peace, or a Notary Public.

- (b) *In British Dominions other than Ceylon.*—Any Judge, Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, Notary Public, Commissioner for Oaths or Affidavits, or a person lawfully authorized to administer oaths or take declarations.
- (c) *In Foreign Countries.*—Any Judge of a Superior Court, British Consul, or Consular Officer, or a Notary Public.

(2) The Registrar may take notice of the signature to any declaration and of the signature of the person before whom it purports to have been declared without proof of those signatures or any other evidence relating thereto.

9. (1) When any person becomes entitled to any copyright or lecturing right or to any interest therein, by virtue of an assignment or transmission, a request for the entry of his name in the register shall be left at or sent by post to the Copyright Office.

(2) The request may be in the Form E or F in the Second Schedule, as the case requires, and shall be made and signed by the person claiming to be registered as owner or licensee or by his agent, and shall be accompanied by the deed or document upon which he bases his request for registration.

(3) An attested copy of every deed and document affecting the ownership of the copyright or lecturing right, or of any license thereunder, shall accompany the request.

(4) The Registrar, if satisfied with the request, shall register the assignment, transmission, or license by entering particulars thereof in the proper register.

10. The certificate of registration issued by the Registrar in respect of an application may be in accordance with such of the forms in the Second Schedule as is appropriate to the case.

11. The registers of copyrights may be altered or amended by the Registrar in the following cases :—

(a) Where the error in entry has been made purely through the fault of the office ;

(b) Where the error in entry has been made through accident on the part of an applicant or his agent, and not from wilful default.

In the latter case, however, no amendment shall be made unless the owner of the copyright or lecturing right lodges at the Copyright Office a written request to amend duly stamped.

12. Any document for the amendment of which no special provision is made by the Ordinance may be amended, and any irregularity in procedure, which in the opinion of the Registrar may be obviated without detriment to the interests of any person, may be corrected if, and on such terms as, the Registrar thinks fit. An application to amend shall be in writing duly stamped.

13. Any notice of address for service or of appointment of agent left at or sent to the Copyright Office shall be binding on the person giving the notice until notice of revocation or of the appointment of some other address for service or of some other agent has been furnished by him to the Registrar.

14. (1) An application to the Governor under section 25 of the Ordinance shall be in accordance with Form I, and shall be lodged by being left together with a copy of the book to which it relates at the Copyright Office under cover of a Request to Transmit addressed to the Registrar and duly stamped.

(2) There shall be attached to the application a statement showing particulars of the applicant's capacity to perform the work of translation.

(3) Thereupon the Registrar shall examine the contents of the application, and shall ascertain whether the correct name and address of the registered owner of the copyright have been inserted in the application form, also whether, to the best of his knowledge, the other particulars in the form are correct. He shall then forward the application to the Governor, accompanied by such remarks as may appear to him suitable, and by the copy of the book which has been lodged by the applicant.

(4) After decision by the Governor the documents and book shall be returned to the Copyright Office, and there shall be inserted in the register, opposite the entry of the registration of the copyright, a note of the application and of the decision of the Governor.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended June 19, 1909.

Births.—The total births registered were 72 (7 Burghers, 31 Sinhalese, 10 Tamils, 17 Moors, 6 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1909, viz., 182,058) was 20·6, as against 23·8 in the preceding week, 19·4 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25·5 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 135 (1 European, 7 Burghers, 65 Sinhalese, 35 Tamils, 21 Moors, 3 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 38·7, as against 34·4 in the previous week, 38·0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 36·5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 135 total deaths, 27 were of infants under one year of age, the same number as in the preceding week, as against 32 in the corresponding week of the previous year and 31 the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of still births registered during the week was 4.

Selected Causes of Death.—Twenty-four deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* and 7 from *Bronchitis*. The mortality from *Pneumonia* continues to be high. It is double the mortality from any other cause. Of the deaths from *Pneumonia* in the week, 6 were in Kotahena, 5 in Maradana Hospitals, and 5 in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 3 in Slave Island, 2 in St. Paul's, and 1 each in Pettah, New Bazaar, and Kollupitiya.

2. Twelve deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (the next most fatal cause), showing an improvement on the previous week (15) and the weekly average for last year (13). Of the total deaths in the week from this cause, 3 each were in the wards of St. Paul's and Kotahena, 2 each in New Bazaar and the General Hospital, and 1 each in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals) and Slave Island.

3. Ten deaths were registered from *Infantile Convulsions*, 8 from *Old Age*, 6 each from *Worms* and *Debility*, and 5 from *Tetanus*.

4. Seven deaths were registered from *Dysentery*, 5 from *Diarrhoea*, 4 from *Enteritis*, and 39 from other causes.

5. Two deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever*, which is a great improvement on the previous week (12) and the weekly average for last year (8). Of the 2 deaths, 1 occurred in New Bazaar and 1 in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals). However, during the week as many as 22 cases of Enteric Fever were reported, against 19 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 82·2°, the same as in the preceding week, against 81·5° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·964 in., against 29·892 in. in the preceding week and 29·937 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0·80 in., against 0·29 in. in the preceding week and 0·16 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
