## VITAL STATISTICS OF TOWNS IN CEYLON IN THE MONTH OF MARCH, 1909.

## REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL.

This report deals with the Vital Statistics of the 31 principal towns of the Island proclaimed under sections 31 to 36 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1895. The Registrars of these towns are qualified medical men. No death occurring there is registered unless the cause is ascertained by the Registrar's personal inspection of the deceased, or certified by a qualified medical man in attendance on the deceased, and no dead body is buried or cremated without registration being effected.

- 2. Table I in the Appendix shows the population at the last decennial Census of 1901, and the present estimated population\* and the births and deaths registered during the month, their rates, and the infantile mortality in each town together with the average birth- and death-rates and infantile mortality from July, 1907, to December, 1908, and the mean temperature and rainfall of each town observed in the month.
- 3. Table III. gives similar information as regards each ward in the Colombo Municipality, the mean rates shown here are for January-December, 1908, that being the period for which monthly statistics are available for the wards.
- 4. The estimated population of the 31 towns is 484,240, or more than one-ninth of the total population of the Island. The population of Colombo (183,872) is a little over three-fifths of the population of all the other towns taken together (300,368).
- 5. The death-rate for all towns this month (29.75) is a great improvement on that of the previous month (35.87) and also on the mean-rate (32.47) for the 18 months July, 1907, to December, 1908. The improvement on the mean-rate is noticeable in 18 out of the 31 towns, the principal exceptions being Mullaittivu, Tangalla, Mannar, Kurunegala, Anuradhapura, Kandy, Matara, and Jaffna. The Mullaittivu rate, which in February last rose to 100.63 or double the mean-rate (49.91) and the rate for the previous month (45.44), continues to be high (99.98). The death-rate of Tangalla this month (69.81) is about double the average (87.96) and four times the rate for February (15.46). The improvement referred to in my last report in the Kurunegala rate has been maintained. It now stands at 75.08, showing an improvement of 22.83 over the previous month's rate, but still above the mean-rate (57.49). The Anuradhapura rate which has been abnormal since November last, and attained a maximum of 119.11 last month, has declined to 64.55. The rate is, however, about fifteen per cent. above the mean-rate (56.16).

## Births.

- 6. The births registered in the 31 towns during the month numbered 1,311—of which 682 were of males and 629 of females—and corresponded to an annual birth-rate per 1,000 of 31·87, as against 32·38 during the preceding month, 34·23 in the corresponding month of last year, and 30·53 the average for the eighteen months July, 1907 (when monthly statistics were first published), to December, 1908. Of the towns (excluding Vavuniya, which has a population under 1,000), the highest birth-rate was in Mulaittivu (58·12, average 29·40), and the lowest in Nuwara Eliya (9·67, average 21·39), while there were no births registered in Lunugala. In the other towns the birth-rate ranged from 52·91 in Mannar (average 34·99), 49·59 in Hambantota (average 35·82), 46·14 in Panadure (average 35·97), 44·56 in Weligama (average 10·99), 44·06 in Tangalla (average 33·81), 43·45 in Jaffna (average 42·58), and 40·60 in Negombo (average 43·92) to 27·14 in Matara (average 39·93), 27·12 in Kegalla (average 29·39), 24·25 in Badulla (average 24·03), 23·97 in Trincomalee (average 28·47), 22·80 in Nawalapitiya (average 26·24), 20·41 in Ratnapura (average 31·60), and 15·33 in "Hatton and Dikoya" (average 17·69).
- 7. The town of Colombo, where the births registered numbered 440—of which 229 were of males and 211 of females—records a birth-rate of 28·17, as against 25·17 in the preceding month, 27·51 in the corresponding month of last year, and 25·23 the average for the eighteen months (July, 1907, to December, 1908). The highest birth-rate was in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals, (27·90, average 22·36), and the lowest in Pettah 19·34, average 5·94), while there were no births recorded in Fort and Galle Face Wards. In the other wards the birth-rate ranged from 24·95 in Slave Island (average 26·57) to 19·41 in St. Paul's (average 18·83). The low birth-rates in the Fort and Galle Face and Pettah Wards are due to their population being mainly male adult and floating.

<sup>\*</sup> The population of Mannar and Trincomalee towns at the Census of 1891 not being available, no estimate can be made of the rate of growth 1891-1900 or 1901-1909. Their population estimated for 1909 is the Census population of 1901, less (in the case of Trincomalee) the Military who are no longer stationed there. The population of Lunugalatown (as now constituted) was not enumerated at the Census of 1901. The figure given is of the population estimated at the beginning of October, 1907.

#### Deaths.

The number of deaths registered in the 31 towns during the month was 1,454, of which 828 were of males and 626 of females, and corresponded to an annual death-rate of 29.75 per mille, as against 35.87 during the preceding month, 31.11 in the corresponding month of last year, and 32.47 average for the eighteen months, July, 1907, to December, 1908. 478 of the total deaths or almost one-third occurred in hospitals, (and 15 deaths in jails), and exaggerated the normal mortality of the towns.

- 9. Corrected death-rates as well as crude death-rates are shown in Table I.\* By a corrected rate is meant the rate calculated for the population of each town on the basis that its age- and sex-constitution is the same as for the Island, and also excluding from the total deaths those in hospitals of estate coolies and other persons who are not town residents. The corrected rate should thus furnish a more satisfactory test of the comparative health of the towns than the crude rate. For the wards of the town of Colombo only crude death-rates are available.
- 10. Of the towns excluding Vavuniya and Lunugala, the highest death-rate was in Mullaittivu (as high as 99.98, or double the average 49.91), and the lowest in Kegalla (4.71, average 22.70). In the other towns the death-rate ranged from 75.08 in Kurunegala (average 57.49), 69.81 in Tangalla (average 37.96), 64.55 in Anuradhapura (average 56.16), 56.37 in Mannar (average 33.14), and 52.63 in Gampola (average 52.64) to 23.96 in Hambantota (average 31.92), 19.98 in Kalutara (average 31.52), 15.94 in Badulla (average 22.36), 13.59 in Nawalapitiya (average 24.37), 11.53 in Panadure (average 28.31), and 10.87 in Nuwara Eliya (average 15.14).
- 11. In the town of Colombo the deaths registered numbered 450—of which 272 were of males and 178 of females—corresponding to an annual corrected death-rate of 27.22 per 1,000 per annum as against 36.85 during the preceding month, 37.47 in the corresponding month of last year, and 35.71 the average for the eighteen months, July, 1907, to December, 1908. The city has thus been much healthier than in the preceding month, and than usual. Omitting the Fort and Galle Face Wards, and the Pettah Ward, which contain a population mainly adult and floating, Kollupitiya shows this month the lowest crude death-rate (13.46, average 24.15), and St. Sebastian the highest rate (27.48, average 24.31). In the other wards the death-rate ranged from 15.53 in Kotahena (average 26.50), 19.04 in New Bazaar (average 33.02) to 26.96 in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals (average 31.67).

#### Infantile Mortality.

- 12. The infantile mortality of the 31 towns was equal to a rate of 230 per 1,000 births registered, as against 253 in the previous month, 211 in the corresponding month of last year, and 254, the average for the eighteen months, July, 1907, to December, 1908. In the towns having an estimated population of 5,000 or more, the mortality ranged from 455 in Kurunegala (average 347), 429 in Nuwara Eliya (average 334), 423 in Batticaloa (average 338), and 333 in Anuradhapura (average 395) to 214 in Badulla (average 232), 187 in Puttalam (average 275), 160 in Moratuwa (average 152), 128 in Weligama (average 155), and 75 in Kalutara (average 171).
- 13. The infantile mortality in the town of Colombo was 223 per 1,000 births registered, as against 296 in the previous month, 295 in the corresponding month of last year, and 336 the average for the eighteen months, July, 1907, to December, 1908. The infantile mortality given in Table III. for each ward enables a comparison to be made of the health of the various wards. The lowest mortality was in Kollupitiya (98 per 1,000 births, average 331), followed by Kotahena (167, average 351), and the highest mortality was in St. Sebastian (364, average 339), followed by St. Paul's (325, average 417).

#### Causes of Deaths.

- 14. Table II. in the Appendix gives for each town and race the principal causes of deaths registered during the month, and shows the infantile mortality separately from the mortality for one year and over.
  - 15. Table IV. gives similar information for each ward and race of the Colombo Municipality.
- 16. Infants.—Out of the 1,454 deaths from all causes in the 31 towns, 301 or a little less than one-fifth were among infants under one year. Of these, the chief causes were 109 Convulsions (of which 30 in Colombo. 18 in Galle, 10 in Kandy, 7 in Matara, 6 in Negombo, 5 each in Batticaloa and Kurunegala); 60 Debility (of which 16 in Colombo, 12 in Jaffna, 5 each in Negombo, Kandy, and Batticaloa); 29 Premature Birth (of which 8 in Jaffna, 4 each in Colombo, Mullaittivu, and Galle); 17 Diarrhea (of which 5 in Colombo, 4 in Galle, 2 each in Kandy and Gampola); 15 Tetanus (of which 11 in Colombo, 2 in Jaffna); 13 Pneumonia (of which 8 in Colombo 3 in Moratuwa); and 13 Bronchitis (of which 7 in Colombo, 2 in Jaffna).
- 17. In the town of Colombo also Convulsions accounted for the highest mortality, viz., 30, which were distributed as follows:—14 in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals, 4 in St. Paul's, 3 each in Kotahena and Kollupitiya, and 2 each in St. Sebastian, New Bazaar, and Slave Island. The next highest mortality (16) was from Debility (8 in Maradana hospitals, 4 in Slave Island), followed by Tetanus 11 (4 each in St. Sebastian and St. Paul's), Pneumonia 8 (2 each in St. Sebastian and Kotahena), and Bronchitis 7 (3 in Maradana hospitals).
- 18. General Mortality (one year and over).—Out of the 1,153 deaths of persons one year and over in age, there were 223 due to Diarrhea and Dysentery, of which 42 were in Colombo, 18 in Kandy, 16 in Kurunegala, 14 in Galle, 13 in Negombo, 12 in Badulla, 11 in Ratnapura; 132 due to Pneumonia, of which 50 were in Colombo, 10 in Kurunegala, 9 in Kandy, 7 in Negombo, 6 each in Moratuwa and Galle; 111 due to Phthisis, of which 52 were in Colombo, 10 in Kandy, 9 in Galle, 7 each in Moratuwa and Kurunegala, 6 in Jaffna; 61 to Dochmius Duodenalis, of which 45 were among Tamils, almost all of whom were coolies; 53 to Malarial Cachexia, of which 13 were in Matale 6 in Kurunegala; 41 to Remittent Fever, of which 12 were in Jaffna, 7 in Tangalla, 5 in Galle; 32 to Enteric Fever, of which 20 were in Colombo, 8 in Moratuwa; 22 to Simple Fever, of which 7 were in Jaffna, 6 in Anuradhapura, 4 in Kandy; 18 to Bronchitis, of which 8 were in Colombo, 3 in Jaffna; 15 to Anæmia, of which 6 were in Colombo, 5 in Negombo, and 4 in Jaffna; 15 to Bright's Disease and Nephritis, of which 7 were in Colombo, 3 in Galle, 2 in Mullaittivu; and 7 to Smallpox in Colombo.

<sup>\*</sup> I am unable to give the corrected death-rates for "Hatton and Dikoya," Weligama, Kalpitiya, and Lunugala towns, their population at the Census of 1901 not being available by age- and sex-sonstitution, as they are newly created registration districts. The death-rates given for those four towns are crude rates. In the case of Weligama and Lunugala, the average rates are based on the figures from October, 1907, and July, 1908, respectively, these being the dates on which the registration divisions were created.

- 19. In the town of Colombo the highest mortality was for *Phthisis* (58), of which 16 were in Maradana hospitals, 13 in Maradana exclusive of hospitals, 7 in Kollupitiya, followed by *Pneumonia* 50 (16 in Maradana hospitals, 9 in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals, 7 in Kotahena), *Diarrhea* 22 (9 in Maradana hospitals, 4 in Kotahena), and *Enteric Fever* 20 (11 in Maradana hospitals, 2 each in St. Paul's and Kotahena, and 1 each in St. Sebastian, New Bazaar, Maradana exclusive of hospitals, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya. Altogether in this and the two preceding months over 296 cases of Enteric Fever were reported to the Municipal authorities, and 99 deaths were registered from this cause.
- 20. In the month under review 7 deaths (the same number as in the preceding month, against 8 in the month previous) were registered in the town of Colombo as due to Smallpox, all of which occurred in the Infectious Diseases Hospital at Kanatta (2 each from Kotahena and Maradana, exclusive of hospitals, and 1 each from St. Paul's, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya). Altogether in this and the two preceding months over 86 cases were reported to the Municipal authorities, and 22 deaths were registered from this cause.
- 21. The other chief causes of death in the town of Colombo were *Dochmius Duodenalis* 10 (9 in Maradana hospitals and 1 in Kollupitiya); *Bronchitis* 8 (2 each in St. Sebastian, New Bazaar, and Maradana exclusive of hospitals); and *Bright's Disease* and *Nephritis* 7 (3 in St. Paul's, 2 in Kotahena).
- 22. Percentage of Principal Causes of Death at all Ages.—Of the total number of deaths at all ages in the towns, Diarrhea and Dysentery accounted for nearly 17 per cent., Bronchitis and Pneumonia more than 12 per cent., Infantile Convulsions more than 9 per cent., Phthisis nearly 8 per cent., Debility more than 7 per cent., and various kinds of fever nearly 7 per cent.
- 23. Of the total number of deaths at all ages in the town of Colombo, Bronchitis and Pneumonia accounted for more than 16 per cent., Phthisis nearly 13 per cent., Diarrhea and Dysentery nearly 11 per cent., Infantile Convulsions more than 9 per cent., various kinds of fever more than 5 per cent., and Debility more than 4 per cent.
