SYLLABUS OF CLASSES.

1.---Chemistry.

(1) Elementary (for Apothecary Students):

(a) Lecture.—Thursdays at 11 A.M.

(b) Practical.—Tuesdays at 10.30 A.M.

This course provides elementary instruction in Theoretical and Practical Chemistry.

(2) Intermediate (for First-Year Medical Students).

(a) Lectures.—Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Fridays at 1 P.M.
(b) Practical.—Daily at 2 P.M.

This course covers the ground required by the Preliminary Scientific Examination of the London University, with some additional Lectures on Elementary Organic'Chemistry.

(3) Advanced

Lectures and Practical work twice a week at times to be arranged later.

This course will deal with the subjects required for Part II. of the Preliminary Scientific and the Bachelor of Science Examinations of the London University.

2.—Physics.

(a) Lectures.--(1) Elementary: The class meets on Mondays and Thursdays at 1 P.M., and Tuesdays at 10.30 A.M., and the work is divided up approximately as follows :-- May to July, Properties of Matter and Sound ; October to December, Heat and Light ; January to March, Magnetism and Electricity. This course is intended to meet the requirements of the First Professional Examination, and must be taken by all students desiring to enter for the Intermediate Course.

(2) Intermediate : The class meets on Wednesdays and Fridays at 1 P.M. The subjects are taken in the same order as in the Elementary Course. The class is designed to meet the requirements of the Intermediate Arts and Science Pass Examination and Part I. of the Preliminary Scientific Examination of the University of London.

(3) Advanced : This class will be formed if required.

(b) Practical.--(1) Elementary : The class meets in the Laboratory on Mondays and Thursdays at 2 P.M. The work is conducted so as to illustrate the lectures.

(2) Intermediate : The class meets for Laboratov work on Wednesdays and Fridays at 2 p.m., and the work is taken as nearly as possible in conjunction with the lectures. (3) Advanced : This class will be formed if required.

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3.-Rules for Students.

The following rules apply to all Students of both sexes :---

1. All fees have to be paid into the account of the Ceylon Government at the Bank of Madras, Colombo, and a receipt obtained, which must be given to the Registrar personally.

2. Students desirous of communicating with the Principal or with the Council of the College must do so through the medium of the Registrar.

3. The Registrar is in attendance daily in his office from 11 A.M. to 12 noon to give advice to Students, their parents or guardians.

4. On entering the College for the first time Students must obtain from the Registrar proper forms to be filled up for registration as a Medical Student by the General Medical Council in London, and must eventually obtain from that Council a sealed certificate of registration.

5. Students will receive from the Registrar at the commencement of each Session a card on which his signature is placed against the courses of instruction which they are to attend during that Session.

6. This card is to be taken to the Lecturer in that subject, and by him signed, as evidence that the Student has been entered in his roll.

7. Students must attend 66 per cent. of every course in order to be given permission to go up for an examination.

8. Irregularity in attendance may be reported to their parents.

9. No allowance whatever, except for illness certified by a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, will be made for non-attendance upon Lectures.

10. Students suffering from any infectious or contagious disease are not allowed to attend the College. 11. No allowance is made for attendances missed through illness unless they exceed 33 per cent. of

the lectures delivered, and no allowance even for illness if 50 per cent. of the lectures is missed. 12. It is within the power of the Principal to suspend any Student for misbehaviour pending reference

of his case to the Council, which may infict such punishment, including dismissal from the College, as it may consider necessary.

13. Apparatus lost or broken by a Student must be replaced or paid for within fourteen days of the occurrence, otherwise he will not be allowed to attend the class at which the damage was done. In the case of valuable apparatus the time of payment may be extended. In any case payment must be made before a certificate of attendance is issued. Payment should be made to the Lecturer who will give a receipt for it.

14. Students failing to pass their Second Professional at the end of their fifth year render themselves liable to dismissal from the College.

15. Students are particularly warned to see that bank receipts for all fees and applications are brought to the Registrar personally at least twenty-four hours before the last day mentioned in the Calendar.

16. If a Student fail to present personally the certificates required on or before the last day at 4 P.M. precisely, he shall on no consideration be allowed to proceed with his examination.

17. The onus of producing the certificates of attendance upon lectures rests with the Student. If a certificate is lost, another may be obtained on payment of Rs. 5.

Method of payment.—All fees are to be paid into the account of the Ceylon Government, in the Bank of Madras, and a receipt obtained.

RULES AND REGULATIONS WITH REGARD TO EXAMINATIONS.

A.---Examination Rules.

1. Students not sitting for the examinations are warned that they are not allowed access to the College and College grounds during the examination.

Candidates must present themselves for all the subjects of an examination at one and the same time.
 On no consideration whatever must the candidate write his name on the answer books. A Candidate so doing is liable to be disqualified at the discretion of the Examiners.

4. Any Candidate more than fifteen minutes late shall not be allowed to enter the Examination Room.

5. No Candidate shall be allowed to leave the Examination Room before the expiration of half an hour

6. A Candidate coyping from the papers of other Candidates or obtaining assistance from other Candidates or from persons outside the Examination Room, or introducing books, manuscripts, or papers of any kind into the Examination Room will be at once dismissed from the examination. His case shall be brought before the next Meeting of the Council, and if his offence is considered grave he shall not be admitted to any future examination of the College.

7. Candidates must bring to the Practical Examination their note books containing the record of the work done by them in the Laboratory Classes which they have attended. 8. At the discretion of the Examiners in any subject on consultation with the Registrar of the College,

a Candidate may be informed that he has not obtained sufficient marks in the written examination to enable him to proceed with the practical.

Q Any Candidate failing to satisfy the Examiners in any one subject of an examination shall be rejected in the whole examination.

10. Examination fees will not be refunded for any cause whatever, and Candidates failing to present themselves at any examination will be required to pay the usual examination fee before again being admitted to an examination.

11. The re-admission fee is the same as the original fee.

NOTE.-Rule 7 above applies only to Elementary Experimental Science, Chemistry, Physics, Zoology, Botany, Physiology, and Pathology.

Results of the Examination.

The results of examinations will be posted on the Notice Board of the College about the end of March or July (for exact date for the year see Calendar), and the next morning will be published in the local papers of Colombo. Candidates who pass the examination will receive a certificate to that effect.

In publishing the results the names of the Candidates will be placed in two classes-First and Second ; those in the First, in order of merit ; and those in the Second, alphabetically, except in the Third Professional, Part I., where the Candidates are placed in alphabetical order.

The rejected Candidate shall be informed in which subject or subjects he failed to satisfy the Examiners, and at the same time shall be informed which courses of instruction he must attend before being again admitted to the examination.

B .-- Examinations for the License of the Ceylon Medical College in Medicine, Surgery, and Midwifery.

The following examinations have to be passed in order to obtain the license in Medicine, Surgery, and Midwifery :-

(1) The Preliminary Examination.*

(2) The First Professional.

(3) The Second Professional

(4) The Third Professional : Parts I. and II.

1.---The Preliminary Examination.

Regulations with regard to the Examination.

This examination is held once a year in the third week in March. Before admission to the examination the Candidate must present to the Registrar, not later than March 1, the following certificates :

1) Certificate of having attained 16 years of age.

(2) Certificate from one of his other teachers of being of good character.

At the same time the Candidate must pay the examination fee of Rs. 20.† The Candidate will then receive a ticket bearing a number, which will admit him to the examination.

This examination is in strict accord with the Regulations of the General Medical Council of the United Kingdom.

Subjects of the Examination.

1. English Language, including Grammar; Paraphrasing; Composition questions on English History; and Geography. 2.

Latin, including Grammar; translation from unspecified Latin books; translation of a continuous English passage into Latin and of short idiomatic English sentences.

3. Mathematics, comprising (1) Arithmetic, (2) Algebra as far as Easy Quedratic Equations inclusive, (3) Geometry, the subject-matter of Euclid, Books I., II., III., and simple deductions.§

- 4. One of the following subjects : Greek, French, German, Italian, Sinhalese, and Tamil-
 - (a) Greek (Grammar: translation into English from unprescribed Greek books; translation into Greek of short idiomatic English sentences); or

(b) A modern Language (Grammar: translation into English from unprescribed books, translation of a continuous English passage and of short idiomatic English sentences).

Candidates will be asked easy questions on the following subjects, and they must show in their answers that they have seen and performed many experiments in illustration of them :----

- (a) Measurement of length, area and volume, determination of mass, density, and force.

No knowledge will be required of chemical theory or formulæ.

In the Fractical Examination, Candidates will be required to perform simple experiments in connection with the subjects enumerated above.

In both papers Candidates will be expected to illustrate their answers, wherever possible, with carefully drawn diagrams.

Intending Candidates are warned that they will not be able to follow the courses of study without some knowledge of Freehand Drawing, and it is hereby intimated that in the year 1911 this subject will be introduced as a compulsory subject in the Medical Preliminary Examination.

2.---The First Professional Examination.

The First Professional Examination is held twice a year, in March and July, beginning the third week of each month.

Before admission to the First Professional Examination, the Candidate must present to the Registrar not later than March 9 or July 12, the following certificates :-

- (1) Of having been a Registered Medical Student+ for one year (by one year is meant an academical year consisting of one Long and one Short Session).
 - (2) Of having attended, subsequent to registration, at least 66 per cent. of the classes of the following courses of instruction in the Ceylon Medical College.

(a) Chemistry.

- (1) Lectures on Inorganic Chemistry, one course of six months.
- (2) Lectures on Organic Chemistry, one course of three months.
- (3) Practical Instruction in Inorganic and Organic Chemistry, one course of six months and one course of three months respectively.

(b) Physics.

(1) Lectures on Properties of Matter, Heat, Sound, Light, Magnetism, and Electricity; one course of nine months.

(2). Practical Instruction on the subject matter of the lectures, one course of nine months.

(c) Zoology.

- (1) Lectures on Zoology, one course of nine months.
- (2) Practical Instruction in Zoology, one course of nine months.

(d) Botany.

- (1) Lectures on Botany, one course of nine months.
- (2) Practical Instruction on Botany, one course of nine months.

SUBJECT OF THE EXAMINATION.

(a) Chemistry.

(1) Two Written Papers.-Inorganic Chemistry, Organic Chemistry, tested in an elementary manner.

(2) Practical Examination.

PRACTICAL EXAMINATION.

(1) Qualitative Analysis : Inorganic and Organic.

The candidates may be required to perform the analysis of a simple salt or of a mixture of two metals and one acid selected from the substances included in the following lists :---

Metals.-Sodium, Potassium, Ammonium, Calcium, Barium, Magnesium, Zine, Iron, Aluminium, Copper, Silver, Lead, Mercury, Bismuth, Tin, Antimony, and Arsenic. Acids.-Hydrochloric, Hydrobromic, Hydrodic, Nitric, Carbonic, Sulphuric, Phosphoric, Acetic,

Oxalic, Tartaric, and Hydrocyanic Acids. The substances may be present as element, oxide, sulphide, a simple salt, or a mixture. The acids may be present in the free state, or as a simple salt.

Candidates may be required to give equations illustrating the Chemical re-actions involved in testing for the above substances and if requested to explain the same. ់ រដ. ក្នុ .

(2) Simple Volumetric Analysis.

The estimation of the strenght of solutions of Potassium or Sodium hydrates by stendard sulphuric acid, and of dilute Hydrochloric or Nitric acids by standard sodium hydrate.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended July 3, 1909.

Births.—The total births registered were 95 (2 Europeans, 11 Burghers, 49 Sinhalese, 16 Tamils, 15 Moors, and 2 Malays. The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1909, viz., 183,872) was 26.9, as against 30.1 in the preceding week, 24.1 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.5 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 137 (5 Burghers, 62 Sinhalese, 38 Tamils, 22 Moors, 6 Malays, and 4 Others), including 2 deaths of town residents, one of whom died in the Infectious Diseases Hospital and the other in the Enteric Hospital. both at Kanatta. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 38.8, as against 37.8 in the previous week, 34.2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 36.5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 137 total deaths, 37 were of infants under one year of age, as against 33 in the preceding week, 28 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 31 the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of still births registered during the week was 5.

Selected Causes of Death.—Twenty deaths were registered from Phthisis (against 15 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year), of which 6 were in Maradana hospitals, 3 each in St. Paul's, New Bazaar, and Slave Island, 2 each in Kotahena and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and 1 in Kollupitiya.

2. Twenty deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* (against 17 in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year), of which 5 were in St. Paul's, 4 in Maradana hospitals, 3 each in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals) and Slave Island, 2 each in Pettah and Kotahena, and 1 in St. Sebastian; and 3 deaths were registered from *Bronchitis*.

3. Fifteen deaths were registered from Infantile Convulsions, 7 each from Dysentery, Enteritis (of which 4 infants under one year), and Old Age, and 6 each from Diarrhœa (2 infants) and Worms (2 infants), and 5 from Debility (3 infants), and 34 from other causes.

4. Seven deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 8 in the previous week and the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Maradana hospitals and 1 each in St. Sebastian, Kotahena, New Bazaar, and Kollupitiya. During the week 22 cases of *Enteric Fever* were reported, against 13 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was $82 \cdot 1^{\circ}$, against $81 \cdot 4^{\circ}$ in the preceding week, and $81 \cdot 3^{\circ}$ in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospherio pressure was $29 \cdot 914$ in., against $29 \cdot 834$ in. in the preceding week and $29 \cdot 898$ in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was $0 \cdot 43$ in., against $1 \cdot 53$ in. in the preceding week and $0 \cdot 37$ in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
