SCHEDULE.

By-laws made under Section 19 of the Rural Schools Ordinance, No. 8 of 1907, for the Area described in Schedule B hereto, by the School Committee for the Kurunegala District.

1. In these by-laws—

The terms "boy," "girl," and "child" mean a boy, or a girl, or a child residing in the area described in the Schedule A hereto.

The term "Code" means the Code for Aided School for the time being sanctioned

by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council.

The term "attendance" means an attendance for the period defined by the Code as constituting a full attendance recorded in an Attendance

Register in the manner prescribed by the Code.

The term "school" means a school specified in the schedule hereto.

The terms "adequate and suitable provision for the education of a child" and "reasonable excuse" shall bear the meaning defined in sub-section 20 (1) (b) of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907."

The term "Inspector of Schools" means an Inspector of Schools appointed by

His Excellency the Governor.

- 2. The parent of every boy of not less than 6 nor more than 12 years of age, and the parent of every girl of not less than 6 nor more than 12 years of age, or in the case of Muhammadan and Tamil girls the parent of every girl of not less than 6 nor more than 10 years of age, shall cause such boy or girl to attend one of the schools specified in Schedule B, unless he has made other adequate and suitable provision for the education of such boy or girl, or unless there is a reasonable excuse for nonattendance, provided that no boy be compelled to attend school from a distance exceeding three miles, and that no girl be compelled to attend school from a distance exceeding two miles, or to attend any school which is not a school for girls.
- The time during which every boy or girl shall attend school shall be the whole time for which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of similar age.
 - Provided always that nothing in these by-laws—
 - (a) Shall prevent the presence of children being excused during the hours when religious instruction is given, as provided by section 21 (d) of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907."
 - (b) Shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which its parent belongs.
- 5. And provided always that when a child between 10 and 12 years of age, being beneficially employed to the satisfaction of the Chairman of the Village Committee, has received a certificate from an Inspector of Schools that it has passed in Reading, Writing, and Arithmetic, the Fourth Standard prescribed by the Code for the time being, it shall not be required to attend school.
- 6. Every parent who shall not observe, or shall neglect or violate, these by-laws or any of them, shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding Rs. 10 for each offence, and an additional fine not exceeding Re. 1 per day in the case of a continuing offence.

Note.—The following are the portions of "The Rural Schools Ordinance" referred to in sections 1 and 4 of these by-laws :-

Section 20 (1) (d).—A parent shall be deemed to have made adequate and suitable provision for the education of his child, if he proves that his child is in regular attendance at a school registered by the Director of Public Instruction for the receipt of a grant in aid, or at a school with regard to which an application for a grant in aid is under consideration, or at a school certified by the Director of Public Instruction to provide adequate and suitable instruction; or if he proves that he has made such other provision for his child's education as the Director of Public Instruction shall certify to be adequate and suitable, or if he produces a certificate from the Director of Public Instruction recommending that the child shall be exempted from compulsory attendance. Provided that no parent shall be convicted for not causing his child to attend such school if he proves to the satisfaction of the Magistrate that he has reasonable excuse for not causing such child to attend. A parent shall be deemed to have a reasonable excuse for not causing his child to attend school, if he proves that the child is prevented from attending by sickness or other unavoidable cause.

Section 21.—No school in which religious instruction is given shall be considered a public vernacular school, unless the District Committee is satisfied-

(a) That religious instruction is given only during the time specified in the school time table;

(b) That religious instruction is not given to pupils of other denominations than that to which the school belongs if the parents object;

(c) That pupils who do not attend religious instruction are employed in other studies during the hours allotted to religious instruction;

(d) That such pupils, if their parents object to their being present in the room where religious instruction is given, are either allowed to study in some other part of the school premises during the hours when such instruction is given, or their presence in the school during such hours is excused; and

(e) That a copy of this section in the English, Sinhalese, and Tamil languages is conspicuously posted up in the school.

The above by-laws were made by the District School Committee, Kurunegala, at a meeting held on December 9, 1908.

(a) Decorations.—Decorations requiring the making of holes in the street, minimum fee Rs. 2·50, for which not more than 5 lineal yards of decoration measured along the road surface may be put up.

For every additional yard 10 cents per lineal yard.

The first part a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, and Arithmetic, and Bookkeeping. Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting, half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively, and one-third of those allowed for Bookkeeping shall be excluded from the remainder of the examination. Special attention will be paid to Handwriting, and candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be rigorously excluded. Should a candidate obtain less than one-third of the aggregate marks for the three subjects-Composition, General Paper, Précis Writing-or less than one-fourth marks in any other subject. or. if he be a Sinhalese or Tamil, less than one-half of the marks in his native language, such marks shall not be counted in his favour. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.

Clerks of the description given in section 3 above, who have served Government continuously for over six years, will be allowed to compete amongst themselves, and will be eligible, if they obtain a minimum of 66 per cent. in Writing and 33 per cent. in the other compulsory subjects, for seven of the appointments offered for competition. VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended July 31, 1909.

Births.—The total births registered were 81 (1 European, 5 Burghers, 58 Sinhalese, 8 Tamils, 7 Moors, 1 Malay, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1,1909, viz., 183,872) was 23.0, as against 26.6 in the preceding week, 16.2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.5 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 101 (0 Europeans, 4 Burghers, 54 Sinhalese, 23 Tamils, 19 Moors, and 1 Other), including the death of a town resident, who died in the Enteric Hospital at Kanatta. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 28.6, as against 39.1 in the previous week, 45.5 in the corresponding week of last year, and 36.5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 101 total deaths, 24 were of infants under one year of age, as against 36 in the preceding week, 35 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 31 the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of still births registered during the week was 3

Selected Causes of Death.—Phthisis and Pneumonia, as usual, claimed the largest number of victims. The mortality from Phthisis was much above the average, and from Pneumonia and Enteric Fever slightly below the average.

- 2. Twenty-three deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 25 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year), of which 7 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 6 in Maradana hospitals, 3 each in St. Paul's and New Bazaar, 2 in Kotahena, and 1 each in Slave Island and Kollupitiya.
- 3. Eleven deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* (against 19 in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year), of which 2 each were in St. Paul's, Kotahena, New Bazaar, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and 1 each in Pettah, St. Sebastian, and Slave Island; and 2 deaths were registered from *Bronchitis*.
- 4. Nine deaths were registered from Infinite Convulsions, 8 from Debility (4 infants), 6 from Dysentery, 4 each from Diarrhea, Worms, and Tetanus, and 24 from other causes.
- 5. Six deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 7 in the previous week and 8 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in New Bazaar and 1 each in Kotahena, Maradana hospitals, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals). During the week 11 cases of *Enteric Fever* were reported, against 15 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79.7°, against 81.5° in the preceding week and 81.1° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.918 in., against 29.968 in. in the preceding week and 29.911 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 1.93 in., against 0.08 in. in the preceding week and 0.05 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
