PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir HUGH CLIFFORD, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Officer Administering the Government of the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

HUGH CLIFFORD.

WHEREAS by section 28 of "The Courts Ordinance, 1889," it is amongst other things enacted that Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be held by one of the Judges thereof, or by a Commissioner of Assize duly appointed under the provisions of the said Ordinance, for each of the Circuits into which the Island is divided, for the hearing, trying, and determining all prosecutions which shall be commenced against any person for or in respect of any crime or offence, or alleged crime or offence—

For the Midland Circuit, three times at least at Kandy, and such other places in such Circuit as the Governor, after previous consultation with the Judges, shall appoint; such Sessions commencing at Kandy on March 10, on August 1, and on December 1 in every year:

And whereas it appears to Us expedient to order that a Criminal Session of the Supreme Court should be holden, on the day hereinafter mentioned, at Badulla, a place included within the said Midland Circuit:

Now therefore know Ye that We, the said Officer Administering the Government, for sufficient reasons to Us appearing, and after previous consultation with the Judges of the Supreme Court, do order and appoint that a Criminal Session of the Supreme Court shall be holden at Badulla, in the said Midland Circuit, on or about Monday, September 6, 1909.

SCHEDULE.

Boundaries of Rakwana.

Bounded on the north by the northern boundary of lot R 636½ in preliminary plan No. 4,428, west by a line drawn from the western boundary of lot 636½ in preliminary plan No. 4,428 to the northern boundary of lot J 60 in preliminary plan No. 2,744, and from thence a line forty yards from the minor road from Rakwana to Bulutota and parallel with it as far as the junction of the southern boundary of lot 482 in preliminary plan No. 7,808 with the above-mentioned minor road, south by a straight line drawn from the southern boundary of lot 482 in preliminary plan No. 7,808 to the Rakwana-oya, east by a straight line drawn from the eastern boundary of lot R 636½ in preliminary plan No. 4,428 to the point of junction of northern boundary of lot 842 in preliminary plan No. 2,744 with the Rakwana-oya, and thence the oya as far as the junction with it to the line described as the southern boundary.

Limits of Balangoda.

A straight line drawn from the 82½ milepost on the Government cart road to the land known as Kotugodella from thence a straight line to the old path to Petigala along this road to the Gama-ela, along the Gama-ela to its junction with the Dorawela-oya, from Dorawela-oya along the Ranawinneamara-ela to the road to Agar's land, along the road to Agar's land to its junction with the village path to Weliharanawa, and along this path to its junction with the Government cart road near the Roman Catholic Church at the 83½ milepost, thence a line 30 yards from the centre of the cart road, and along the road to the iron bridge over Dorawela-oya, and thence the Dorawela-oya as far as the bathing place known as Kekunagahayatawala, and from thence a straight line to join the afore-mentioned 82½ milepost on the Government cart road.

Definition of Dehiowita.

The town of Dehiowita includes an extent of three chains on either side of the high road leading from Atulugama to Algoda from the 35½ milepost at Alutgama on the north to the southern boundary of Urupellewwa village on the south.

Boundaries of Yatiyantota.

Bounded on the north by the We-oya from its junction with the Kelani river to a point opposite the half milepost on the Polatugama grant-in-aid road, east a line drawn from the We-oya at right angles to the Polatugama road and through the half mile to a point three chains to the south of it, thence running parallel to the Polatugama road to a point three chains from the Yatiyantota-Kitulgala road and thence running parallel to the latter road till it meets the southern boundary, south a line drawn due east and west through the 42½ milepost on the Yatiyantota-Kitulgala road till it meets the east and west boundaries respectively.

And We do hereby proclaim and declare that the said by-laws shall come into operation from the date hereof.

SCHEDULE.

*By-laws made under Section 19 of the Rural Schools Ordinance, No. 8 of 1907,
for the Area described in Schedule B hereto, by the School Committee
for the Kurunegala District.*

1. In these by-laws—

The terms "boy," "girl," and "child" mean a boy, or a girl, or a child residing in the area described in the Schedule A hereto.

The term "Code" means the Code for Aided School for the time being sanctioned by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council.

The term "attendance" means an attendance for the period defined by the Code as constituting a full attendance recorded in an Attendance Register in the manner prescribed by the Code.

The term "school" means a school specified in the schedule hereto.

The terms "adequate and suitable provision for the education of a child" and "reasonable excuse" shall bear the meaning defined in sub-section 20 (1) (b) of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907."

The term "Inspector of Schools" means an Inspector of Schools appointed by His Excellency the Governor.

2. The parent of every boy of not less than 6 nor more than 12 years of age, and the parent of every girl of not less than 6 nor more than 12 years of age, or in the case of Muhammadan and Tamil girls the parent of every girl of not less than 6 nor more than 10 years of age, shall cause such boy or girl to attend one of the schools specified in Schedule B, unless he has made other adequate and suitable provision for the education of such boy or girl, or unless there is a reasonable excuse for non-attendance, provided that no boy be compelled to attend school from a distance exceeding three miles, and that no girl be compelled to attend school from a distance exceeding two miles, or to attend any school which is not a school for girls.

3. The time during which every boy or girl shall attend school shall be the whole time for which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of similar age.

4. Provided always that nothing in these by-laws—

(a) Shall prevent the presence of children being excused during the hours when religious instruction is given, as provided by section 21 (d) of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907."

(b) Shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which its parent belongs.

5. And provided always that when a child between 10 and 12 years of age, being beneficially employed to the satisfaction of the Chairman of the Village Committee, has received a certificate from an Inspector of Schools that it has passed in Reading, Writing, and Arithmetic, the Fourth Standard prescribed by the Code for the time being, it shall not be required to attend school.

6. Every parent who shall not observe, or shall neglect or violate, these by-laws or any of them, shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding Rs. 10 for each offence, and an additional fine not exceeding Re. 1 per day in the case of a continuing offence.

NOTE.—The following are the portions of “The Rural Schools Ordinance” referred to in sections 1 and 4 of these by-laws :—

Section 20 (1) (d).—A parent shall be deemed to have made adequate and suitable provision for the education of his child, if he proves that his child is in regular attendance at a school registered by the Director of Public Instruction for the receipt of a grant in aid, or at a school with regard to which an application for a grant in aid is under consideration, or at a school certified by the Director of Public Instruction to provide adequate and suitable instruction ; or if he proves that he has made such other provision for his child’s education as the Director of Public Instruction shall certify to be adequate and suitable, or if he produces a certificate from the Director of Public Instruction recommending that the child shall be exempted from compulsory attendance. Provided that no parent shall be convicted for not causing his child to attend such school if he proves to the satisfaction of the Magistrate that he has reasonable excuse for not causing such child to attend. A parent shall be deemed to have a reasonable excuse for not causing his child to attend school, if he proves that the child is prevented from attending by sickness or other unavoidable cause.

Section 21.—No school in which religious instruction is given shall be considered a public vernacular school, unless the District Committee is satisfied—

- (a) That religious instruction is given only during the time specified in the school time table ;
- (b) That religious instruction is not given to pupils of other denominations than that to which the school belongs if the parents object ;
- (c) That pupils who do not attend religious instruction are employed in other studies during the hours allotted to religious instruction ;
- (d) That such pupils, if their parents object to their being present in the room where religious instruction is given, are either allowed to study in some other part of the school premises during the hours when such instruction is given, or their presence in the school during such hours is excused ; and
- (e) That a copy of this section in the English, Sinhalese, and Tamil languages is conspicuously posted up in the school.

The above by-laws were made by the District School Committee, Kurunegala, at a meeting held on December 9, 1908.

And We do hereby proclaim and declare that the said by-laws shall come into operation from the date hereof.

SCHEDULE.

By-laws made under Sections 19 and 20 of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907," by the Ratnapura District Schools Committee, for the Area described in the Schedule A hereto.

1. In these by-laws—

The terms "boy," "girl," and "child" mean a boy, or a girl, or a child residing in the area described in the Schedule A hereto.

The term "parent" includes a guardian and any person who has the actual custody of the child.

The term "Code" means the Code for Aided Schools for the time being sanctioned by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council.

The term "attendance" means an attendance for the period defined by the Code as constituting a full attendance recorded in an Attendance Register in the manner prescribed by the Code.

The term "local authority" means the Ratnapura District Schools Committee.

The term "school" means a school specified in the Schedule B hereto.

The terms "adequate and suitable provision for the education of a child" and "reasonable excuse" have the meanings respectively assigned to the said terms in section 20 (1) (b) of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907."

The term "Inspector of Schools" means an Inspector of Schools appointed by His Excellency the Governor.

2. The parent of every boy of not less than 6 nor more than 12 years of age, and the parent of every girl of not less than 6 years nor more than 12 years of age, or in the case of Muhammadan and Tamil girls the parent of every girl of not less than 6 years nor more than 10 years of age, shall cause such boy or girl to attend one of the schools specified in Schedule B, unless he has made other adequate and suitable provision for the education of such boy or girl, or unless there is a reasonable excuse for non-attendance. Provided that no boy shall be compelled to attend school from a distance exceeding three miles, and that no girl shall be compelled to attend any school, except a school for girls situated within two miles of her residence.

3. The time during which every boy or girl shall attend school shall be the whole time for which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of similar age.

4. Provided always that nothing in these by-laws—

(a) Shall prevent the presence of children being excused during the hours when religious instruction is given, as provided by section 21 (d) of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907."

(b) Shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which its parent belongs.

5. And provided further that when a child between 10 and 12 years of age, being beneficially employed to the satisfaction of the Chairman of the Village Committee, has received a certificate from an Inspector of Schools that he or she has passed in Reading, Writing, and Arithmetic, the Fourth Standard prescribed by the Code for the time being, he or she shall not be required to attend school.

6. Every parent who shall not observe or shall neglect or violate any of these by-laws shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding Rs. 2 for a first offence, Rs. 5 for a second offence, and Rs. 20 for a third offence and subsequent offences.

NOTE.—The following are the portions of "The Rural Schools Ordinance" referred to in by-laws Nos. 1 and 4 :—

Section 20 (1) (b).—A parent shall be deemed to have made adequate and suitable provision for the education of his child, if he proves that his child is in regular attendance at a school registered by the Director of Public Instruction for the receipt of a grant in aid, or at a school with regard to which an application for a grant in aid is under consideration, or at school certified by the Director of Public Instruction to provide adequate and suitable instruction, or if he proves that he has made such other provision for his child's education as the Director of Public Instruction shall certify to be adequate and suitable, or if he produces a certificate from the Director of Public Instruction recommending that the child shall be exempted from compulsory attendance. Provided that no parent shall be convicted for not causing his child to attend such school, if he proves to the satisfaction of the court that he has reasonable excuse for not causing such child to attend. A parent shall be deemed to have a reasonable excuse for not causing his child to attend school, if he proves that the child is prevented from attending by sickness or other unavoidable cause.

Section 21.—No school in which religious instruction is given shall be considered a public vernacular school, unless the District School Committee is satisfied—

(a) That religious instruction is given only during the times specified in the school time table ;

(Section 175 of Ordinance No. 7 of 1887.)

(a) *Decorations.*—Decorations requiring the making of holes in the street, minimum fee Rs. 2.50, for which not more than 5 lineal yards of decoration measured along the road surface may be put up.

For every additional yard 10 cents per lineal yard.

Where two sides of the street are to be decorated, then the length of decoration on both sides of the street shall be separately measured and charged for.

(b) For decorations not requiring holes in the street, and not obstructing the street in any particular, a fee of Re. 1 for every 100 yards of street decorated.

(c) Pandals parallel to the side of the street, if on a metalled or gravelled road or on a footway, then Rs. 10 for a length of not more than 20 feet.

If on the grass sides of a road, then Rs. 5 for a length not exceeding 20 feet.

(d) Pandals across the street requiring holes or obstruction to the metalled or gravelled portion of the street or of a made up footway, then Rs. 20 for each such pandal.

NOTICE is hereby given that an examination for candidates wishing to enter the Third Class of the Clerical Branch of the Public Service will take place on Tuesday, January 4, 1910, and following days.

2. Applications for admission to the examination by persons not now in the Public Service must be addressed to the Director of Public Instruction, must bear a duly cancelled stamp of Rs. 10 with the words "Ceylon Stamp Duty" only, without the words "Judicial" or "Warehouse Warrant" printed thereon, and must be in the form (Schedule A) attached to this notice. Forms are to be obtained at any Post Office on application, or within four days' notice. A certificate of the registration of the candidate's birth showing him to be on January 4, 1910, between the ages of 18 and 21, and a certificate of good character signed by a responsible person,* to the satisfaction of the Director of Public Instruction, must be attached to the form of application. If a certificate of birth for a previous examination was sent in, reference may be made to it by mentioning name and date of examination. Affidavits will in no circumstances be accepted. If the name appearing in the birth register differs, either by alteration or addition, from the name by which the candidate is known, the parent or guardian should, before obtaining a certificate, apply to the Registrar-General or his Assistant for such alteration in the manner set forth in section 7 of Ordinance No. 23 of 1900.

3. Clerks in Government service, from whatever funds they may be paid, who have completed three years' satisfactory service and are not members of the Customs, Postal, Survey, or Railway Departments, and those clerks employed by Provincial and District Road Committees whose appointments date prior to July 1, 1875, are eligible for examination irrespective of age and without fee. Their applications (in the same form, Schedule A) for admission to the examination should be forwarded to the Director of Public Instruction through the Heads of their Departments.

4. Applications are to reach the Director of Public Instruction not later than 2 P.M. on Wednesday, December 1, 1909; any applications received after that hour, by whatever cause delayed, will be absolutely rejected.

5. The Director of Public Instruction will return to the candidate his application, approved or disapproved as the case may be, after taking, if necessary, the orders of Government thereon. The approved application shall constitute the candidate's ticket of admission to the examination. Candidates presenting themselves for examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination their forms of application approved by the Director of Public Instruction. A candidate not producing such form, whatever may be the reason for his not so doing, will be refused admittance to the examination.

6. The examination will be held at Colombo only, in the place and under the supervision of the officer specified in Schedule B. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications to present themselves for examination have been returned to them approved by the Director of Public Instruction, leave to present themselves at the examination.

7. The examination will be competitive. The number of places assigned for competition will be thirty.

8. The successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness for service in any part of the Island.

9. The subjects for examination are those set out in Schedule C to this notice. The examination shall be held in two parts. The first part a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, and Arithmetic, and Bookkeeping. Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting, half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively, and one-third of those allowed for Bookkeeping shall be excluded from the remainder of the examination. Special attention will be paid to Handwriting, and candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be rigorously excluded. The kind of writing preferred will be that generally shown as the "Civil Service" hand. The second part of the examination shall be in the remaining subjects in Schedule C. Should a candidate obtain less than one-third of the aggregate marks for the three subjects—Composition, General Paper, Précis Writing—or less than one-fourth marks in any other subject, or, if he be a Sinhalese or Tamil, less than one-half of the marks in his native language, such marks shall not be counted in his favour. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.

10. Clerks of the description given in section 3 above, who have served Government continuously for over six years, will be allowed to compete amongst themselves, and will be eligible, if they obtain a minimum of 66 per cent. in Writing and 33 per cent. in the other compulsory subjects, for seven of the appointments offered for competition. Three of the appointments will be reserved as prizes for deserving clerks of the same description, who have served Government continuously for ten years and upwards, to be selected irrespective of examination. VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended July 31, 1909.

Births.—The total births registered were 81 (1 European, 5 Burghers, 58 Sinhalese, 8 Tamils, 7 Moors, 1 Malay, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1909, viz., 183,872) was 23·0, as against 26·6 in the preceding week, 16·2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25·5 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 101 (0 Europeans, 4 Burghers, 54 Sinhalese, 23 Tamils, 19 Moors, and 1 Other), including the death of a town resident, who died in the Enteric Hospital at Kanatta. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 28·6, as against 39·1 in the previous week, 45·5 in the corresponding week of last year, and 36·5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 101 total deaths, 24 were of infants under one year of age, as against 36 in the preceding week, 35 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 31 the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of still births registered during the week was 3

Selected Causes of Death.—*Phthisis* and *Pneumonia*, as usual, claimed the largest number of victims. The mortality from *Phthisis* was much above the average, and from *Pneumonia* and *Enteric Fever* slightly below the average.

2. Twenty-three deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 25 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year), of which 7 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 6 in Maradana hospitals, 3 each in St. Paul's and New Bazaar, 2 in Kotahena, and 1 each in Slave Island and Kollupitiya.

3. Eleven deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* (against 19 in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year), of which 2 each were in St. Paul's, Kotahena, New Bazaar, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and 1 each in Pettah, St. Sebastian, and Slave Island; and 2 deaths were registered from *Bronchitis*.

4. Nine deaths were registered from *Infantile Convulsions*, 8 from *Debility* (4 infants), 6 from *Dysentery*, 4 each from *Diarrhœa*, *Worms*, and *Tetanus*, and 24 from other causes.

5. Six deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 7 in the previous week and 8 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in New Bazaar and 1 each in Kotahena, Maradana hospitals, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals). During the week 11 cases of *Enteric Fever* were reported, against 15 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79·7°, against 81·5° in the preceding week and 81·1° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·918 in., against 29·968 in. in the preceding week and 29·911 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 1·93 in., against 0·08 in. in the preceding week and 0·05 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
