WHEREAS by section 3 (1) of the Dried Meat Ordinance, No. 19 of 1908, it was enacted that the Governor in Executive Council might from time to time by Proclamation declare that it shall be unlawful to remove dried meat from any revenue district or chief headman's division :

Now know Ye that We, the Officer Administering the Government, in exercise of the power vested in Us by sub-section (2) of section 20 of the said Ordinance, and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby confirm the by-laws set forth in the said schedule.

And We do hereby proclaim and declare that they shall come into operation from the date hereof.

#### SCHEDULE,

By-laws made under Sections 19 and 20 of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907," for the Area described in the Schedule hereto, by the Puttalam

District School Committee.

1. In these by-laws-

1

The terms "boy," "girl," and "child" mean a boy, or a girl, or a child residing in the area described in the Schedule A hereto.

The term " parent " includes a guardian and any person who has the actual custody of the child.

The term "Code" means the Code for Aided Schools for the time being sanctioned by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council. The term "attendance" means an attendance for the period defined by the

Code as constituting a full attendance recorded in an Attendance Register

in the manner prescribed by the Code. The term "local authority" means the Puttalam District Schools Committee. The term "school" means a school specified in the Schedules B and C hereto. The terms "adequate and suitable provision for the education of a child" and reasonable excuse" shall bear the meaning defined in sub-section (20)

(1) (b) of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907." The term "Inspector of Schools " means an Inspector of Schools appointed by His Excellency the Governor.

2. The parent of every boy of not less than 6 nor more than 12 years of age, and the parent of every girl of not less than 6 nor more than 12 years of age, or in the case of Tamil girls the parent of every girl of not less than 6 nor more than 10 years of age, shall cause such boy or girl to attend one of the schools specified in Schedule B or C, unless he has made other adequate and suitable provision for the education of such boy or girl, or unless there is a reasonable excuse for non-attendance. Provided that no boy shall be compelled to attend school from a distance exceeding three miles, and that no girl shall be compelled to attend from a distance exceeding one mile or at a school not named in Schedule C, and that no Muhammadan girl be compelled to attend any school

The time during which every boy or girl shall attend school shall be the whole time for which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of similar age.

4. Provided always that nothing in these by-laws-

- (a) Shall prevent the presence of children being excused during the hours when religious instruction is given, as provided by section 21 (d) of " Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907." The
- (b) Shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which its parent belongs.

And provided always that when a child between 10 and 12 years of age, being 5. beneficially employed to the satisfaction of the Chairman of the Village Committee, has received a certificate from an Inspector of Schools that it has passed in Reading, Writing, and Arithmetic, the Fourth Standard prescribed by the Code for the time being, it shall not be required to attend school.

6. Every parent who shall not observe, or shall neglect or violate. these by-laws, or any of them, shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding Rs. 2 for the first and Rs. 10 for any subsequent offence.

Note.---The following are the portions of & The Rural Schools Ordinance" referred to in sections 1 and 4 of these by-laws :-

Section 20 (1) (b).--A parent shall be deemed to have made adequate and suitable provision for the education of his child, if he proves that his child is in regular attendance at a school registered by the Director of Public Instruction for the receipt of a grant in aid, or at a school with regard to which an application for a grant in aid is under consideration, or at a school certified by the Director of Public Instruction to provide adequate and suitable instruction; or if he proves that he has made such other provision for his child's education as the Director of Public Instruction shall certify to be adequate and suitable, or if he produces a certificate from the Director of Public Instruction recommending that the child shall be exempted from compulsory attendance. Provided that no parent shall be convicted for not causing his child to attend such school, if he proves to the satisfaction of the Magistrate that he has reasonable excuse for not causing such child to attend. A parent shall be deemed to have a reasonable excuse for not causing his child to attend school, if he proves that the child is prevented from attending by sickness or other unavoidable cause.

Section 21.-No school in which religious instruction is given shall be considered a public vernacular school, unless the local authority is satisfied-

- (a) That religious instruction is given only during the times specified in the school time table ;
- (b) That religious instruction is not given to pupils of other denominations than that to which the school belongs if the parents object ;
- (c) That pupils who do not attend religious instruction are employed in other studies during the hours allotted to religious instruction; (d) That such pupils, if their parents object to their being present in the room
  - where religious instruction is given, are either allowed to study in some other part of the school premises during the hours when such instruction is given, or their presence in the school during such hours is excused ; and
- (e) That a copy of this section in the English, Sinhalese, and Tamil languages is conspicuously posted up in the school.

The above by-laws were made by the Puttalam District Schools Committee at a meeting held on October 23, 1908.

By-Laws for Regulating the Mode and Times of Fishing.

Limits of Fishing.—It shall not be lawful for any person or persons to fish with ma-del in the Matara Bay between Chullalanka Island and Brown's Hill, unless such ma-del shall have been previously registered at the Local Board Office.

Registration of Nets.-Every person desirous of fishing with ma-del within the restricted area shall apply to the Chairman, Local Board, to have his ma-del registered in the Office of the Local Board, and such application shall contain a declaration of ownership. Such registration to be annual, and to be made not later than March 31 in each year.

List of Ma-del.-The Vidane Arachchi of the Local Board shall make out and submit to the Board a list of the ma-del owned by the residents and used within the restricted area.

Registration Fee.--An annual registration fee of Re. 1 shall be paid for each 4. ma-dela so registered.

Order of Fishing.-Every ma-dela so registered shall be cast by turns in the order in the Register (of which order each man is to keep himself informed). For this purpose the 12 hours from 6 A.M. to 6 P.M. shall be divided into four periods, viz., 6 A.M. to 8 A.M.; 8 A.M. to 10.30 A.M.; 10.30 A.M. to 1.30 P.M.; 1.30 P.M. to 5.30 P.M. The turn of each net shall coincide with one of these periods according to the table annexed, and shall begin at sunrise each day and terminate on the net being drawn ashore within the allotted time, so that only four nets may be drawn on one and the sams day. If any owner shall not exercise his right within the time allowed to him, his turn shall be considered as having lapsed, and the next on the roll shall proceed to exercise his turn. Any net owner having his net in the sea after the expiry of his term to be guilty of an offence.

6. No Net allowed inside Ma-del.-After both ends of the ma-dela are brought on shore for the purpose of being drawn, no casting or other net shall be thrown or used within the ma-dela.

Other Nets allowed .- Besides ma-del, nets known as "visi-del" and nets not exceeding ten fathoms in length and the same in breadth may be used within the restricted area, provided that the casting of such nets do not interfere with the casting of ma-del.

Every registered ma-dela must be used only in the registered boat to which it belongs. Mat Mak

#### RULES.

# Meetings and Proceedings of the Commissioners.

1. Half-yearly meetings of the Commissioners shall be held in the first and third quarter of each year respectively. Notice of every such meeting and of the business to be transacted shall be given to each Commissioner at least two clear days before the date fixed for such meeting.

2. The Chief Commissioner may at his own instance, and shall when requested thereto by any other Commissioner, convene a special meeting of the Commissioners, and notice of such meeting and of the purpose for which the meeting is to be held shall be given to each Commissioner at least two clear days before the date fixed for such meeting.

3. A Minute Book shall be kept in which shall be entered the proceedings of the Commissioners, and the minutes of each meeting shall, when confirmed at the next subsequent meeting, be authenticated by the signature of the Commissioner presiding at the meeting at which the minutes are confirmed.

4. At each half-yearly meeting the Secretary of the Loan Board shall submit statements of the funds under the control of the Loan Board to the Commissioners in Form A and a half-yearly statement of transactions in Form B.

An "annual abstract" of transactions, including a statement of investments, showing the date and amount of last appraisement, shall be prepared by the Secretary and submitted to the Commissioners as soon as possible after the close of each year, and a copy thereof shall be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary, together with the abstract or statement of funds in the custody of the Loan Board at that date.

5. The abstract shall be printed, and the date on which it is submitted shall be attested by the Chairman at the foot thereof as follows :---

6. All orders to the Treasurer of the Board for the payment of money shall be signed by two members of the Board of Commissioners, and no payment shall be made otherwise.

#### Rules to be observed regarding Loans.

7. No loan shall be granted on speculative property, nor, as a rule, on any security, but household property. No loans shall be granted on any coffee, tea, or other plantations or estates.

8. Any person desirous of obtaining a loan must make application by letter, addressed to the Secretary of the Board, in which he is to state the amount required and the nature of the security to be tendered.

9. The Secretary, on receiving an application, shall submit the same to the Chief Commissioner; if the Chief Commissioner is of opinion that the application is one which should be entertained, he shall instruct the Secretary to call upon the applicant to submit the title deeds of the property he proposes to mortgage, together with the fees for Counsel's opinion and appraisement.

10. The fee to be paid for Counsel's opinion shall be Rs. 21 as an ordinary rule, but in the event of there being an exceptionally large number of deeds to examine, it shall be within the power and discretion of the Commissioners to recover and pay a sum not exceeding in any case Rs. 52.50.

11. The fee for appraisement shall be one per cent. on the first Rs. 2,000 and half per cent. on sums above on the amount lent, the minimum fee being Rs. 20. The fee for re-appraisement of properties mortgaged to the Board shall be at the discretion of the Commissioners.

12. On receipt of the title deeds the Secretary shall submit them to Crown Counsel for opinion as to their validity, and if the title is approved of he shall cause the property to be appraised.

13. On receipt of the appraisement report, the Secretary shall submit to the Commissioners the question of the advisability of granting a loan and the rate of interest to be charged, together with all documents relating to the case.

14. The decision of the Commissioners shall be communicated to the applicant by the Secretary.

15. (a) No loan shall exceed one-half of the appraised value of the property to be hypothecated, and no mortgage except a primary mortgage shall be accepted.

(b) Interest at a rate not less than 5 per cent. per annum shall be charged on loans granted on the hypothecation of property within the limits of the Municipal Council, Colombo.

(c) Interest at the rate of 7 per cent. per annum shall be charged on loans granted on the hypothecation of property outside the limits of the Municipal Council, Colombo, provided that the Commissioners may in their discretion reduce the rate of interest to 6 or 5 per cent. when the amount of the loan is small in proportion to the value of the property hypothecated.

16. Special loans applied for by Municipal Councils under section 263 of Ordinance No. 7 of 1887, or by Local Boards under section 47 of Ordinance No. 13 of 1898, may be granted at the discretion of the Commissioners. Provided that the rate of interest received shall not be less than  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. per annum.

17. In the event of funds not being immediately available, a register shall be kept in which applications for loans shall be inserted according to priority. The Commissioners have also the authority to invest the funds of the Board in public securities of Great Britain, India, and the Colonies.

18. The necessary mortgage shall be prepared and attested by the Notary of the Board, and all expenses attendant on the legal completion of the loan shall be borne by the borrower.

19. • The interest payable on loans shall be considered to be due monthly in terms of the bond; in no case shall arrears of more than three months be allowed to No notice of the interest due will be given, and any mortgagor allowaccumulate. ing interest to remain unpaid more than fifteen days beyond due date may be required immediately to pay off both principal and interest.

20. All bonds will be made payable on demand as heretofore, and at the commencement of every year all loans will be reconsidered with reference to the then state and value of the property mortgaged, and if it be thought necessary by the Board the securities will be re-appraised at the expense of the borrowers.

21. The Secretary of the Board may from time to time inspect and report upon the existing state and value of the properties mortgaged. The expenses incurred on such inspection by the Secretary shall be considered as forming part of the cost of the working of the Establishment.

22. The Commissioners will from time to time appoint appraisers to the Loan Board, and the names of such authorized persons will be recorded in a register to be kept for that purpose.

The Loan Board shall have an account with each District Court. Such 23.account shall include all sums deposited by that court under the head Suitors or Estate Moneys, or otherwise; and each receipt and payment under its respective number shall be entered in a separate ledger to be kept for that purpose for the several District Courts of each Province.

24. As soon as possible after June 30 and December 31 in each year the Board shall audit the accounts of interest received, and shall set apart one-third to be paid to Government in terms of the 16th clause of "The Loan Board Ordinance, 1865," and after deducting the said one-third shall allot in respect of all sums in deposit in which interest is due a dividend on the interest received by the Board during the preceding half-year. But no interest or dividend shall be declared on sums under One hundred Rupees, nor on fractional parts of Ten Rupees.

25. No interest or dividend shall be declared upon any deposit for the fractional part of the half-year in which such deposit shall have been made or shall have repaid

The funds of the Loan Board may be placed upon fixed deposit in such 26. bank or banks in the Colony as may be determined upon from time to time by the Commissioners. Provided, however, that the amount of the said deposit in any one bank at any one time shall not exceed Twenty-five thousand Rupees.

### Proclamation No. 22.

IN the Name of His Majesty EDWARD THE SEVENTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, &c.

By His Excellency Sir CAVENDISH BOYLE, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and BOXLE. over the Colony of Mauritius and its Dependencies, &c.

CAVENDISH BOYLE.

WHEREAS by article 12 of Ordinance No. 39 of 1881, as amended by Ordinance No. 3 of 1900, powe, is given to the Governor in Executive Council by Proclamation to prohibit absolutely or to admitr subject to such conditions as he may be advised to impose, all or any importations of any kind from any port or place where cattle plague shall be reported to exist, or from any country adjacent thereto, and to impose such measures of disinfection as he may be advised on all vessels, crews, and passengers, and their clothes, luggage, and personal effects, from any port, place, or country :

And whereas there is reason to believe that rinderpest and foot-and-mouth disease are prevailing at Colombo and other parts of Ceylon, and it is expedient to take measures to prevent the introduction of such cattle disease into Mauritius :

Now, therefore, in virtue of the powers in me vested by the Ordinance aforesaid, I do hereby in Executive Council order and proclaim as follows :-

All importations from Colombo and other parts of Ceylon of cattle, not including horses, asses, and mules, or of any carcase, as defined by Ordinance No. 39 of 1881, as well as of any straw, hay, fodder, litter, or raw manure are hereby prohibited.

### THE INSECT PEST AND QUARANTINE ORDINANCE, NO. 5 OF 1901.

T is hereby notified that His Excellency the Officer . dministering the Government, in exercise of the powers vested in him by section 3 of the above-named Ordinance, and with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to vary regulations Nos. 1 and 2 contained in the regulations dated July 1, 1906, and to substitute therefor the following regulations, viz.:-

1. From September 1, 1909, and until further notice, all imported living trees, plants, tubers, roots, bulbs or portions thereof (with the exception of potatoes, onions, ginger, turmeric, and culinary vegetables imported for consumption), and the fruits and seeds specified in section 2, with the packages, cases, pots, or coverings in which they may be packed, shall, before being handed over to the consignee be subject to treatment with hydrocyanic acid gas, or to such other treatment as may be deemed necessary by the Government Entomologist at the Government fumigatorium at Kochchikade. 2. The following fruits shall be subject to fumigation as directed, viz., oranges, lemons, citrons,

limes, and all fruits of the citrus family, also the following seeds, viz., cotton (gossypium).

NOTICE is hereby given that an examination for candidates wishing to enter the Third Class of the Clerical Branch of the Public Service will take place on Tuesday, January 4, 1910, and following days.

2. Applications for admission to the examination by persons not now in the Public Service must be addressed to the Director of Public Instruction, must bear a duly cancelled stamp of Rs. 10 with the words "Ceylon Stamp Duty" only, without the words "Judicial" or "Warehouse Warrant" printed thereon, and must be in the form (Schedule A) attached to this notice. Forms are to be obtained at any Post Office on application, or within four days' notice. A certificate of the registration of the candidate's birth showing him to be on January 4, 1910, between the ages of 18 and 21, and a certificate of good character signed by a responsible person,\* to the satisfaction of the Director of Public Instruction, must be attached to the form of application. If a certificate of birth for a previous examination was sent in, reference may be made to it by mentioning name and date of examination. Affidavits will in no circumstances be accepted. In the case of candidates who submit certificates of registration in the register of past birth, the certificates will only be accepted after consideration of the evidence by which the dates of birth were established. If the name appearing in the birth register differs, either by alteration or addition, from the name by which the candidate is known, the parent or guardian should, before obtaining a certificate, apply to the Registrar-General or his Assistant for such alteration in the manner set forth in section 7 of Ordinance No. 23 of 1900.

3. Clerks in Government service, from whatever funds they may be paid, who have completed three years' satisfactory service and are not members of the Customs, Postal, Survey, or Railway Departments, and those clerks employed by Provincial and District Road Committees whose appointments date prior to July 1, 1875, are eligible for examination irrespective of age and without fee. Their applications (in the same form, Schedule A) for admission to the examination should be forwarded to the Director of Public Instruction through the Heads of their Departments.

4. Applications are to reach the Director of Public Instruction not later than 2 P.M. on Wednesday, December 1, 1909; any applications received after that hour, by whatever cause delayed, will be absolutely rejected.

5. The Director of Public Instruction will return to the candidate his application, approved or disapproved as the case may be, after taking, if necessary, the orders of Government thereon. The approved application shall constitute the candidate's ticket of admission to the examination. Candidates presenting themselves for examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination their forms of application approved by the Director of Public Instruction. A candidate or producing such form, whatever may be the reason for his not so doing, will be refused admittance to the examination.

6. The examination will be held at Colombo only, in the place and under the supervision of the officer specified in Schedule B. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications to present themselves for examination have been returned to them approved by the Director of Public Instruction, leave to present themselves at the examination.

7. The examination will be competitive. The number of places assigned for competition will be thirty.

8. The successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness for service in any part of the Island.

9. The subjects for examination are those set out in Schedule C to this notice. The examination shall be held in two parts. The first part a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, and Arithmetic, and Bookkeeping. Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting, half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively, and one-third of those allowed for Bookkeeping shall be excluded from the remainder of the examination. Special attention will be paid to Handwriting, and candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be rigorously excluded. The kind of writing preferred will be that generally shown as the "Civil Service" hand. The second part of the examination shall be in the remaining subjects in Schedule C. Should a candidate obtain less than one-third of the aggregate marks for the three subject, or, if he be a Sinhalese or Tamil, less than one-half of the marks in his native language, such marks shall not be counted in his favour. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.

10. Clerks of the description given in section 3 above, who have served Government continuously for over six years, will be allowed to compete amongst themselves, and will be eligible, if they obtain a minimum of 66 per cent. in Writing and 33 per cent. in the other compulsory subjects, for seven of the appointments offered for competition. Three of the appointments will be reserved as prizes for deserving

# VITAL STATISTICS.

# Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended August 7, 1909.

Births.—The total births registered were 98(1 European, 8 Burghers, 48 Sinhalese, 19 Tamils, 16 Moors, 4 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1909, viz., 183,872) was  $27 \cdot 8$ , as against  $23 \cdot 0$  in the preceding week,  $21 \cdot 7$  in the corresponding week of last year, and  $25 \cdot 5$  the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 110 (3 Europeans, 9 Burghers, 37 Sinhalese, 33 Tamils, 19 Moors, 7 Malays, and 2 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 31.2, as against 28.6 in the previous week, 41.2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 36.5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 110 total deaths, 26 were of infants under one year of age, as against 24 in the preceding week, 32 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 31 the average for last year.

Still Births.-The number of still births registered during the week was 6.

Selected Causes of Death.—As usual, the largest number of deaths was due to Phthisis and Pneumonia, while Enteric Fever is on the decline.

2. Twenty deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 23 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year), of which 6 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 3 each in Pettah, New Bazaar, and Maradana hospitals, 2 in St. Paul's, and 1 each in Kotahena, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya.

3. Thirteen deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* (against 11 in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 each were in Maradana hospitals and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 in Slave Island, and 1 each in Pettah, St. Sebastian, Kotahena, New Bazaar, and Kollupitiya; and 6 deaths were registered from *Bronchitis*.

4. Eight deaths were registered from Infantile Convulsions, 7 from Enteritis (1 infant), 5 from Old Age 4 from Diarrhæa, 3 from Tetanus (all infants), 3 Debility (1 infant), 3 Dochmius duodenalis, and 3 Fever (2 infants), and 32 from other causes.

5. Three deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 6 in the previous week and 8 the weekly average for last year), 1 each in Kotahena, Slave Island, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals). During the week 13 cases of *Enteric Fever* were reported, against 11 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was  $79\cdot8^{\circ}$ , against  $79\cdot7^{\circ}$  in the preceding week and  $80\cdot0^{\circ}$  in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was  $29\cdot919$  in., against 29.918 in. in the preceding week and 29.918 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was  $1\cdot12$  in., against  $1\cdot93$  in. in the preceding week and  $1\cdot89$  in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
