IT is hereby notified that an examination under the Regulations of February 25, 1909, for gentlemen in the Civil Service will be held in the Council Chamber on Monday, October 18, 1909, at 10.30 A.M., and following days, namely:—

The examination in the Criminal Procedure Code prescribed under the Minute of March 26, 1900, for officers in the Fourth Class of the Civil Service, will also be held on October 19, 1909, as well as at the Kandy Kachcheri.

It is also hereby notified that candidates will be given the option of using Codes in the examination in the Criminal Procedure Code and the Penal Code; they must, however, state when sending in their names what their decision is, as the character of the papers set for those who use Codes and those who do not will be different.

The examination for officers in the Police Department, and the *visà voce* examination in the native languages for officers in the Public Works Department, the Irrigation Department, the Forest Department, and the Railway Department, will be held at the same time and place.

Candidates are required to send in their names not later than September 30, 1909.

Gentlemen in the Civil Service should state in their applications whether they are presenting themselves for the first or second examination, and whether they intend taking up Sinhalese or Tamil, and whether they wish to have the option of using Codes.

The hours of examination will be from 10.30 A.M. to 1 P.M. and from 2 P.M. to 5 P.M., exclusive of the *visà voce* examinations, which will be specially arranged for.

NOTICE is hereby given that an examination for candidates wishing to enter the Third Class of the Clerical Branch of the Public Service will take place on Tuesday, January 4, 1910, and following days.

2. Applications for admission to the examination by persons not now in the Public Service must be addressed to the Director of Public Instruction, must bear a duly cancelled stamp of Rs. 10 with the words "Ceylon Stamp Duty" only, without the words "Judicial" or "Warehouse Warrant" printed thereon, and must be in the form (Schedule A) attached to this notice. Forms are to be obtained at any Post Office on application, or within four days' notice. A certificate of the registration of the candidate's birth showing him to be on January 4, 1910, between the ages of 18 and 21, and a certificate of good character signed by a responsible person,* to the satisfaction of the Director of Public Instruction, must be attached to the form of application. If a certificate of birth for a previous examination was sent in, reference may be made to it by mentioning name and date of examination. Affidavits will in no circumstances be accepted. In the case of candidates who submit certificates of registration in the register of past birth, the certificates will only be accepted after consideration of the evidence by which the dates of birth were established. If the name appearing in the birth register differs, either by alteration or addition, from the name by which the candidate is known, the parent or guardian should, before obtaining a certificate, apply to the Registrar-General or his Assistant for such alteration in the manner set forth in section 7 of Ordinance No. 23 of 1900.

3. Clerks in Government service, from whatever funds they may be paid, who have completed three years' satisfactory service and are not members of the Customs, Postal, Survey, or Railway Departments, and those clerks employed by Provincial and District Road Committees whose appointments date prior to July 1, 1875, are eligible for examination irrespective of age and without fee. Their applications (in the same form; Schedule A) for admission to the examination should be forwarded to the Director of Public Instruction through the Heads of their Departments.

4. Applications are to reach the Director of Public Instruction not later than 2 P.M. on Wednesday, December 1, 1909; any applications received after that hour, by whatever cause delayed, will be absolutely rejected.

5. The Director of Public Instruction will return to the candidate his application, approved or disapproved as the case may be, after taking, if necessary, the orders of Government thereon. The approved application shall constitute the candidate's ticket of admission to the examination. Candidates presenting themselves for examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination their forms of application approved by the Director of Public Instruction. A candidate not producing such form, whatever may be the reason for his not so doing, will be refused admittance to the examination.

6. The examination will be held at Colombo only, in the place and under the supervision of the officer specified in Schedule B. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications to present themselves for examination have been returned to them approved by the Director of Public Instruction, leave to present themselves at the examination.

7. The examination will be competitive. The number of places assigned for competition will be thirty.

8. The successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness for service in any part of the Island.

9. The subjects for examination are those set out in Schedule C to this notice. The examination shall be held in two parts. The first part a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, and Arithmetic, and Bookkeeping. Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting, half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively, and one-third of those allowed for Bookkeeping shall be excluded from the remainder of the examination. Special attention will be paid to Handwriting, and candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be rigorously excluded. The kind of writing preferred will be that generally shown as the "Civil Service" hand. The second part of the examination shall be in the remaining subjects in Schedule C. Should a candidate obtain less than one-third of the aggregate marks for the three subjects—Composition, General Paper, Précis Writing—or less than one-fourth marks in any other subject, or, if he be a Sinhalese or Tamil, less than one-half of the marks in his native language, such marks shall not be counted in his favour. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.

10. Clerks of the description given in section 3 above, who have served Government continuously for over six years, will be allowed to compete amongst themselves, and will be eligible, if they obtain a minimum of 66 per cent. in Writing and 33 per cent. in the other compulsory subjects, for seven of the appointments offered for competition. Three of the appointments will be reserved as prizes for deserving clerks of the same description, who have served Government continuously for ten years and upwards, to be selected irrespective of examination. No service under the age of sixteen years will be reckoned for this purpose.

EXAMINATIONS FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA.

An open Competitive Examination for admission to the Civil Service of India will be held in London, under the subjoined Regulations, commencing on August 1, 1910.

The number of persons to be selected at this examination will be announced hereafter.

No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received on or before July 1, 1910, an application on the prescribed form, a copy of which is sent herewith. No question as to the delay or loss in the post of any such Application Form can be entertained. Candidates who delay their applications until the last days will do so at their own risk.

Acknowledgments of such Application Forms are sent, and any candidate who has filled up and returned the printed Application Form but has not received an acknowledgment of it within four complete days should at once write to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, Burlington Gardens, London, W. Failure to comply with this provision will deprive the candidate of any claim to consideration.

The order for admission to the examination will be posted on July 20, 1910, to the address given on the Form of Application. It will contain instructions as to the time and place at which candidates will be required to attend, and as to the manner in which the fee (£6) is to be paid.

REGULATIONS.

** The following Regulations, made by the Secretary of State for India in Council, are liable to alteration from year to year.

1. An Examination for admission to the Civil Service of India, open to all qualified persons, will be held in London in August of each year. The date of the examination and the number of appointments to be made for each Province will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners.

2. No person will be deemed qualified who shall not satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners:—

(i.) That he is a natural-born subject of His Majesty.

(ii.) That he had attained the age of twenty-two, and had not attained the age of twenty-four on the first day of August of the year in which the examination is held.

(N.B.—*In the case of Natives of India it will be necessary for a candidate to obtain a certificate of age and nationality issued under Notification of the Government of India, No. 2,252, dated August 21, 1888, as amended by Notification No. 404, dated May 19, 1898, and signed, should he be a resident in British India, by the Secretary to Government of the Province, or the Commissioner of the Division within which his family resides, or should he reside in a Native State, by the highest Political Officer accredited to the State in which his family resides.*)

(iii.) That he has no disease, constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity, unfitting him, or likely to unfit him, for the Civil Service of India.

(iv.) That he is of good moral character.

3. Should the evidence upon the above points be *prima facie* satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the candidate, on payment of the prescribed fee, will be admitted to the examination. The Commissioners may, however, in their discretion, at any time prior to the grant of the Certificate of Qualification hereinafter referred to, institute such further inquiries as they may deem necessary; and if the result of such inquiries in the case of any candidate should be unsatisfactory to them in any of the above respects, he will be ineligible for admission to the Civil Service of India, and, if already selected, will be removed from the position of a Probationer.

Consistently with the limitations specified above, candidates are at liberty to name any of these subjects, provided that the maximum number of marks that can be obtained from the subjects chosen is limited to 6,000. If this maximum is exceeded by a candidate's selection, he will be required to indicate one of his subjects, the marks for which should, in his case, be reduced so as to bring his maximum marks within the prescribed limit. The marks so reduced will be subject to a correspondingly reduced deduction under Clause 6.

5. The merit of the persons examined will be estimated by marks (a); and the number set opposite to each subject in the preceding regulation denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it.

6. From the marks assigned to candidates in each subject will be made such deduction as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary in order to secure that no credit be allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

7. The examination will be conducted on paper and *vivá voce*, as may be deemed necessary.

8. The marks obtained by each candidate, in respect of each of the subjects in which he shall have been examined, will be added up, and the names of the several candidates who shall have obtained, after the deduction above-mentioned, a greater aggregate number of marks than any of the remaining candidates will be set forth in order of merit, and such candidates shall be deemed to be selected candidates for the Civil Service of India, provided they appear to be in other respects duly qualified. Should any of the selected candidates become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled up or not. In the former case the candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a selected candidate.

9. Selected candidates, before proceeding to India, will be on probation for one year, at the end of which time they will be examined, with a view of testing their progress in the following subjects (b) :—

In Hindustani the candidate will be required to be acquainted with both the Persian and the Nagari character. A Candidate assigned to Eastern Bengal and Assam, whose mother tongue is Bengali, must offer for examination Hindustani; and a candidate assigned to Madras or Bengal, whose mother tongue is either of the languages shown against his Province, must offer the other for examination.

† These subjects may not be offered by any candidate who has offered them at the Open Competition.

In this examination, as in the Open Competition, the merit of the candidates examined will be estimated by marks (which will be subject to deductions in the same way as the marks assigned at the Open Competition), and the number set opposite to each subject denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it. The examination will be conducted on paper and *vivá voce*, as may be deemed necessary. This examination will be held at the close of the year of probation, and will be called the "Final Examination."

(a) Considerable deductions will be made for bad handwriting.

(b) Instructions, showing the extent of the examination, will be issued to selected candidates, as soon as possible; after the result of the Open Competition is declared.

If any candidate is prevented by sickness or any other adequate cause from attending such examination, the Commissioners may, with the concurrence of the Secretary of State for India in Council, allow him to appear at the Final Examination to be held in the following year, or at a special examination.

10. The selected candidates will also be tested during their probation as to their proficiency in riding. The examinations in riding will be held as follows :—

- (1) Shortly after the result of the Open Competitive Examination has been declared, or at such time or times as the Commissioners may appoint during the course of the probationary year.
- (2) Again, at the time of the Final Examination. Candidates who may then fully satisfy the Commissioners of their ability to ride well and to perform journeys on horseback will be awarded from 100 to 200 marks, according to the degree of proficiency displayed, to be added to their marks in the Final Examination. Candidates who fail to obtain 100 marks, but are reported by the Civil Service Commissioners to have reached a minimum standard of proficiency in riding, and are certified by the said Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India, will, on their arrival in India, be subjected to such further tests in riding as may be prescribed by their Government, and shall receive no increase to their initial salary until they have passed such tests to the satisfaction of that Government.

A candidate who fails at the end of the year of probation to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that he has reached the minimum standard of proficiency in riding will be liable to have his name removed from the list of selected candidates.

11. The selected candidates who, on examination, shall be found to have a competent knowledge of the subjects specified in Regulation 9, and who shall have satisfied the Civil Service Commissioners of their eligibility in respect of nationality, age, health, character, conduct during the period of probation, and ability to ride, shall be certified by the said Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India, provided they shall comply with the regulations in force, at the time, for that service.

12. Persons desirous to be admitted as candidates must apply on forms, which may be obtained from "The Secretary to the Civil Service Commissioners, London," at any time after December 1 in the year previous to that in which the examination is to be held. No person will be admitted to the examination from whom the Secretary to the Civil Service Commissioners has not received on or before July 1 (or, if that date should fall upon a Sunday or public holiday, then, on or before the first day thereafter on which their office is open), in the year in which the examination is to be held, an application, in the handwriting of the candidate, on the prescribed form.

The Civil Service Commissioners are authorized by the Secretary of State for India in Council to make the following announcements :—

(i.) Selected candidates will be allotted to the various Provinces upon a consideration of all the circumstances, including their own wishes; but the requirements of the Public Service will rank before every other consideration.

(ii.) An allowance amounting to £150 will be given to any candidate who passes his probation at one of the Universities or Colleges which have been approved by the Secretary of State, viz., the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Dublin, Glasgow, Edinburgh, St. Andrews, Aberdeen, and London (University College or King's College); Victoria University, Manchester. This allowance will be paid to the selected candidate in four instalments on the following dates respectively :— December 24, after his selection, March 25, June 24, and the date of his signing his covenant on being finally appointed to the Service.

With the final instalment an allowance on account of passage to India will be paid to each newly appointed civilian to the amount of £37 10s. for passage to Calcutta, Madras, or Bombay, and £43 for passage to Rangoon, the officer then making his own arrangements for his passage.

The payment of each of the first three instalments will be conditional on the receipt, by the Secretary of State, through the Civil Service Commissioners, of a certificate that the candidate has fulfilled up to date the requirements of the authorities, and shown satisfactory conduct at the authorized University or College; the fourth and final instalment will be paid as soon as the selected candidate has signed his covenant, and for its payment no certificate from College authorities will be required.

The whole probation must ordinarily be passed at the same Institution. Migration will not be permitted except for special reasons approved by the Secretary of State.

(iii.) Each candidate will be required before receiving the first instalment of his allowance to execute an agreement binding himself to refund all moneys he may have received from the Secretary of State for India in the event of—

(1) His failure to pass the Final Examination within the time prescribed by the Regulations, and to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners of his fitness for admission to the Civil Service of India; or

(2) His subsequent failure to execute the usual covenant, and to proceed to India, as and when he shall be directed by the Secretary of State for India.

(iv.) All candidates obtaining certificates will be also required to enter into covenants, by which, amongst other things, they will bind themselves to make such payments as under the rules and regulations for the time being in force they may be required to make towards their own pensions or for the pensions of their families. The stamps payable on these covenants amount to £1.

(v.) The seniority in the Civil Service of India of the candidates obtaining certificates will be determined according to the order in which they stand on the list resulting from the combined marks of the Open Competitive and Final Examinations.

(vi.) Candidates obtaining Certificates will be required to report their arrival in India within such period after the grant of their Certificates of Qualification as the Secretary of State may in each case direct.

(vii.) Candidates who fail to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners at the Final Examination held in any year will be definitely rejected, and will not be allowed to present themselves for re-examination unless it shall appear to the Secretary of State in Council, after reference to the Civil Service Commissioners, that such failure is due to circumstances wholly exceptional and beyond the control of the candidate.

NOTE.—If Open Competitive Examinations for the following Services, viz.:—Eastern Cadetships in the Colonial Service; Clerkships (Class I.) in the Home Civil Service; should be held in 1910 concurrently with the Open Competitive Examination for the Civil Service of India, candidates duly eligible in respect of age will be admitted to compete for any two or all three of these services, subject to the following conditions:—

(1) They must enter and return to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, within the time limited by the several regulations, an application on the form prescribed for each of the respective services.*

(2) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for either the India or the Colonial Service (or both), as well as for the Home Service, will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the India or Colonial Service or on the list of candidates for Clerkships in the Home Civil Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for Clerkships in the Home Civil Service.

(3) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for both the India and Colonial Services will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Civil Service of India or on the list of candidates for Eastern Cadetships in the Colonial Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for Eastern Cadetships.

(4) All declarations of choice are irrevocable.

(5) Candidates for all three or any two of the above-mentioned services will be required to pay a consolidated fee of £6.

EVIDENCE OF AGE TO BE REQUIRED FROM CANDIDATES FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA.

I. Every candidate born in the United Kingdom should be prepared to produce, when required, a certificate from the Registrar-General of Births, Marriages, and Deaths, or from one of his Provincial Officers. This certificate may be obtained from the Registrar-General in London, Dublin, or Edinburgh, or from the Superintendent Registrar of the district in which the birth took place.

II. A candidate born of European parents in India should be prepared to produce, when required, a Certificate of Baptism from the district in which he was baptized. If this does not also mention the date of birth it should be accompanied by a statutory declaration by one of the candidate's parents, stating the date and place of birth. When such certificates are not in the possession of the candidates, an extract from the registers kept at the India Office will probably be obtainable.

III. A candidate who is a Native of India, must, on or before July 1, 1910, produce a certificate of age and nationality issued under Notification of the Government of India, No. 2,252, dated August 21, 1888, as amended by Notification No. 404, dated May 19, 1898, and signed, should he be a resident in British India, by the Secretary to Government of the Province, or the Commissioner of the division within which his family resides; or, should he reside in a Native State, by the highest Political Officer accredited to the State in which his family resides. *No other certificates will be accepted for this Competition.*

**Syllabus of any Open Competitive Examination for the Civil Service of India, Clerkships (Class I.)
in the Home Civil Service, and Eastern Cadetships in the Colonial Service that may be
held in the year 1910, and of any other Competition that may be held in
combination therewith.**

In view of the importance of legible handwriting in the Public Service, candidates are warned that the provision as to deductions for bad handwriting in these competitions will be strictly enforced.

Candidates are warned that full marks cannot be obtained on any paper unless the whole of it is answered, or, in cases where the number of questions to be answered is specified, unless the full number specified is answered.

1. *English Composition*.—An essay to be written on one of several specified subjects.
2. *Sanskrit Language and Literature*.—Translation from Sanskrit into English, and from English into Sanskrit. History of Sanskrit Literature (including a knowledge of such Indian History as bears upon the subject); Sanskrit Grammar; Vedic Philology.
3. *Arabic Language and Literature*.—Translation from Arabic into English, and from English into Arabic. History of Arabic Literature (including a knowledge of such Arabic History as bears upon the subject); Arabic Grammar; Arabic Prosody.
4. *Greek Translation*.—Translation from Greek into English.
5. *Greek Composition*.—Composition in Prose and Verse, or (as an alternative for Verse Composition) an original Prose Composition in Greek.
6. *Greek Literature*.—Critical questions on the Greek Language (including questions on Philology) and Literature.
7. *Latin Translation*.—Translation from Latin into English.
8. *Latin Composition*.—Composition in Prose and Verse, or (as an alternative for Verse Composition) an original Prose Composition in Latin.
9. *Latin Literature*.—Critical questions on the Latin Language (including questions on Philology) and Literature.
10. *English Language and Literature*.—The examination will be in two parts. In the one the candidates will be expected to show a general acquaintance with the course of English Literature, as represented (mainly) by the following writers in verse and prose, between the reign of Edward III. and the accession of Queen Victoria:—

Verse.—Chaucer, Langland, Spenser, Shakespeare, Milton, Dryden, Pope, Gray, Collins, Johnson, Goldsmith, Crabbe, Cowper, Campbell, Wordsworth, Scott, Byron, Coleridge, Shelly, Keats.

Prose.—Bacon, Sir Thomas Browne, Milton, Cowley, Bunyan, Dryden, Swift, Defoe, Addison, Johnson, Burke, Scott, Macaulay (Essays and Biographies).

A minute knowledge of the works of these authors will not be looked for in this part of the examination, which will, however, test how far the candidates have studied the chief productions of the greatest English writers *in themselves*, and are acquainted with the leading characteristics of their thought and style, and with the place which each of them occupies in the history of English Literature. Candidates will also be expected to show that they have studied in these authors the history of the English Language in respect of its vocabulary, syntax, and prosody.

The other part of the examination will relate to one of the periods named below, which will follow each other, year by year, in the order indicated.

1. For the year 1910: 1700 A.D. to 1800 A.D.
[Pope to Cowper.]
2. For the year 1911: 1800 A.D. to 1832 A.D.
[Nineteenth Century writers to the death of Scott.]
3. For the year 1912: 1360 A.D. to 1600 A.D.
[Chaucer to Spenser.]
4. For the year 1913: 1600 A.D. to 1700 A.D.
[Shakespeare to Dryden.]

The examination in this part will require from candidates a more minute acquaintance with the history of the English Language and Literature, as illustrated in the chief works produced in each period, and will be based to a considerable extent, but by no means exclusively, on certain books specified each year by the Commissioners. The names placed beside the dates are intended to suggest the general character of the literary development of the period, and, consequently, the natural limits of the examination. All the works of Shakespeare, for example, will be regarded as falling within the period 1600 to 1700; all the works of Swift within the period 1700 to 1800; all the works of Scott and Wordsworth and all the works of Macaulay within the period 1800 to 1832.

The books specified for the year 1910, period 1700 to 1800, are:—

11. *Italian Language and Literature*.—Translation and Composition. Critical questions on the Italian Language and Literature. Oral examination.

Paper I. will consist of translation from and into the language. In Paper II. (Critical Questions) candidates will be invited to answer in the foreign language some of the questions, and marks will be allotted for accuracy, facility, and elegance in the composition of these answers. Passages for translation may be set, and questions asked, demanding a knowledge of the language in its early stages; but it will not be obligatory upon candidates to master in detail the old forms in use before the time of Dante.

12. *French Language and Literature.*—Translation and Composition. Critical questions on the French Language and Literature. Oral Examination.

Paper I. will consist of translation from and into the language. In Paper II. (Critical Questions) candidates will be invited to answer in the foreign language some of the questions, and marks will be allotted for accuracy, facility, and elegance in the composition of these answers. Passages for translation may be set, and questions asked, demanding a knowledge of the language in its early stages; but it will not be obligatory upon candidates to master in detail the old forms in use before 1500.

13. *German Language and Literature.*—Translation and Composition. Critical questions on the German Language and Literature. Oral Examination.

Paper I. will consist of translation from and into the language. In Paper II. (Critical Questions) candidates will be invited to answer in the foreign language some of the questions, and marks will be allotted for accuracy, facility, and elegance in the composition of these answers. Passages for translation may be set, and questions asked, demanding a knowledge of the language in its early stages; but it will not be obligatory upon candidates to master in detail the old forms in use before 1500.

14. *Lower Mathematics.*—Plane Geometry, including conic sections; Solid Geometry, including the method of orthogonal projection; Algebra and Plane Trigonometry; Elementary Plane Co-ordinate Geometry; Elementary Mechanics of solids and fluids; Geometrical Optics; Elements of Differential and Integral Calculus with simple illustrations from other branches of the subject. The questions may involve the use of drawing instruments. The use of the slide rule is allowed.

15. *Higher Mathematics.*—Higher Algebra (including Theory of Equations), Plane and Spherical, Trigonometry, Differential Calculus, Integral Calculus, Differential Equations, Analytical Geometry (Plane and Solid), Statics including Attractions, Dynamics of a Particle, Rigid Dynamics, Hydrodynamics, the Mathematical Theory of Electricity and Magnetism. The questions may involve the use of drawing instruments. The use of the slide rule is allowed.

16–21. *Chemistry, Physics, Geology, Botany, Zoology, Animal Physiology.*—Candidates are warned that the practical examinations carry a large proportion of the marks.

22. *Geography.*—The history of geographical ideas and methods.

The construction and use of the more familiar map projections. A general knowledge of the methods of exploratory surveying.

The characteristics and cartographical analysis of the physical regions of the world. The configuration of the continents and of the bed of the ocean. The characteristics and distribution of typical land-forms. The circulation of air and water. The climatic characteristics of different parts of the earth. The distribution of plant- and animal-associations.

The classification and distribution of the races of mankind. Past and present lines of communication. The influence of geographical environment (physical features and other natural conditions) upon the habits, arts, industries, social organization, and generally the political economical development of the more important existing people.

23. *Greek History.*—Questions (a) on the General and (b) on the Constitutional History of Greece to the death of Alexander. Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of the original authorities. They must also be prepared to answer questions on historical geography and to draw sketch maps.

24. *Roman History.*—Questions (a) on the General and (b) on the Constitutional History of Rome to the death of Trajan. Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of the original authorities. They must also be prepared to answer questions on historical geography and to draw sketch maps.

25–26. *English History.*—The subject will include (a) the Political history of Great Britain, Ireland, and the Colonies, (b) the Constitutional History of the United Kingdom. Candidates should be acquainted with the following authorities:—

PERIOD I. to 1485.

Stubbs Select Charters (Clarendon Press).

PERIOD II. 1485–1848.

Prothero Statutes and Constitutional Documents (Clarendon Press).

In each period the number of marks assigned to the question or questions dealing with the text of the prescribed books will be about one-sixth of that assigned to the whole period. Candidates must be prepared to answer questions on historical geography and to draw sketch maps.

27. *General Modern History.*—Candidates may at their choice be examined in any one of the following periods:—Periods III., IV., and V. will include Indian History. Candidates are warned that high marks will not be awarded in this subject, unless the text of the prescribed books has been carefully studied by them. Passages for translation may be set, and questions asked, demanding a knowledge of the language in its early stages; but it will not be obligatory upon Candidates to master in detail the old forms in use before 1500.

French, German, Italian, Spanish.—Those candidates who do not take the papers of critical questions in French, German, Italian, and Spanish respectively, will be tested in original Composition by means of a separate paper. The original Composition of those candidates who take the paper of critical questions will be tested by their answers in the foreign language to some of the questions, and such candidates will not take separate Composition paper.

**Regulations for the Administration of a Grant in Aid in providing Equipment in
Science Teaching.**

UNDER certain conditions, the Public Instruction Department will assist managers with a grant towards the provision of appliances necessary for science teaching.

2. (a) Science teaching includes (1) class lessons, with experiments performed by the teacher, and (2) laboratory work, when the experiments are performed by the pupils themselves.

(b) A class lesson should be of one hour's duration, and a practical class of not less than 1½ hours.

(c) A practical class must not contain more than 25 pupils, unless there are two qualified teachers present, when it may be increased to 40.

(d) Pupils should not, as a rule, be allowed to do laboratory work till they have received a fair grounding in elementary algebra.

3. The grant will only be allowed in a school in which there is a laboratory which has been approved by the Department, and in which one or more classes are doing regular laboratory work in addition to the class lessons. For the present the subjects for which aid may be given will be five. For boys' schools experimental science, chemistry, and physics. For girls' schools experimental science.

4. A competent teacher with special qualifications must be employed and must be in charge of the appliances. The following will be accepted as a qualification :—

(a) For chemistry and physics, the Intermediate Examination in Arts or Science of the University of London, provided that the subjects concerned were passed.

(b) An equivalent qualification of the same standard as the above may be accepted, provided that it furnishes proof of a knowledge of the practical part of the subject.

(c) A teacher qualified in chemistry or physics will be considered as qualified in elementary experimental science.

(d) A certificate showing that the student has attended a course of lectures and practical work at the Technical College and has passed satisfactorily an examination at the end of it.

5. The grant made under these regulations must be used solely for the provision of appliances for teaching the above subjects, and must be supplemented by the managers by an amount not less than that granted by the Department. The grant to one school will not exceed Rs. 300 in any year. It should be distinctly understood that the object of the grant is to assist the teaching of elementary science to a considerable number of pupils as a regular school subject, and not to provide expensive apparatus for teaching advanced science to a few exceptional pupils.

6. Managers applying for a grant must state—

(a) The name of the science master or masters and their qualifications.

(b) The total number of pupils in the school, and the number to whom science is taught.

(c) The time table of the science classes with the number of pupils in each class.

(d) The sum for which application is made.

(e) A list of the articles which it is proposed to purchase with the aid of the grant.

(f) The amount by which the grant will be supplemented by the manager.

(g) Any application after the first must be accompanied by the receipted bills or invoices or other documents showing the actual expenditure of the previous grant, and of the amount by which the manager has supplemented it.

7. The appliances must be open to inspection by the Department at all times, and managers must provide the necessary rooms, furniture, &c., for the proper use and preservation of the same.

8. It must be understood that the grant will only be awarded to schools in which the Department is satisfied that efficient work is going on. Managers must not rely on the continuity of the grant unless the work done is shown by inspection to be satisfactory.

Eighteenth Annual Report of the Ceylon Public Service Mutual Guarantee Association, 1908-1909.

ON June 30, 1909, there were on the books of the Association 856 members, as against 805 on June 30, 1908, showing an increase in membership of 51.

2. The total amount of contributions received from members during the year was Rs. 12,228-39, as against Rs. 8,183-44 in the preceding year, an increase of Rs. 4,044-95.

3. A sum of Rs. 8,984-30 in the aggregate was refunded to members on withdrawal from the Association, as against Rs. 5,993-04 refunded during the previous year.

4. During the year the Association was not called upon to make good any claims in respect of defaulting associates.

5. The Association having closed the sixth triennium of its existence, a sum of Rs. 8,960·50 became available on July 1, 1909, for distribution amongst the members as profits under Rule XI. This enabled the apportionment of a dividend of 10 per cent. on the total contributions to credit of members on June 30, 1909, absorbing in the aggregate a sum of Rs. 8,951·26, and leaving a balance of Rs. 9·24 to credit of Profit and Loss Account.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended September 18, 1909.

Births.—The total births registered were 83 (1 European, 11 Burghers, 43 Sinhalese, 12 Tamils, 12 Moors, 3 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1909, viz., 183,872) was 23.5, as against 19.6 in the preceding week, 23.5 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.5 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 102 (0 Europeans, 5 Burghers, 48 Sinhalese, 27 Tamils, 15 Moors, 4 Malays, and 3 Others), including 2 deaths of town residents who died in the Enteric Hospital at Kanatta. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 28.9, as against 32.9 in the previous week, 29.9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 36.5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 102 total deaths, 18 were of infants under one year of age, as against 29 in the preceding week, 22 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 31 the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of still births registered during the week was 7.

Selected Causes of Death.—Fifteen deaths were registered from Phthisis (against 17 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 each were in Maradana hospitals and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and 2 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya, and 1 in San Sebastian.

2. Nine deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* (against 11 in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Kotahena, 2 each in Maradana hospitals and Slave Island, and 1 each in Pettah and Kollupitiya. One death was registered from *Bronchitis*.

3. Nine deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 12 in the previous week and 8 the weekly average for last year), of which 2 were in Pettah and 1 each in San Sebastian, St. Paul's, Kotahena, New Bazaar, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), Slave Island, and Kollupitiya. During the week 12 cases of *Enteric Fever* were reported, against 22 in the previous week.

4. Six deaths were registered from *Debility* (including 2 infants), 5 from *Tetanus* (3 infants), 5 *Infantile Convulsions*, 5 *Dysentery*, 5 *Old Age*, 4 *Diarrhoea* (2 infants), 4 *Enteritis*, and 34 from other causes.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 81.5°, against 80.3° in the preceding week and 82.8° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.950 in., against 29.931 in. in the preceding week and 29.956 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was nil, against 0.51 in. in the preceding week and 0.14 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
