HEREAS the rules set forth in the schedule hereto made by the Irrigation Committee of Puttalam District, North-Western Province, in pursuance of section 8 of the Irrigation Ordinance, No. 16 of 1906, for the enforcement of ancient customs regarding the irrigation and cultivation of paddy lands, were duly transmitted by the Government Agent of the North-Western Province to His Excellency the Governor, in pursuance of section 20 of the said Ordinance, for approval or disallowance thereof:

And whereas the said rules have been approved by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, in exercise of the powers in Us vested by section 20 of the said Ordinance, do hereby give notice of Our approval of the said rules set forth in the schedule hereto.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-third day of November, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Nine.

SCHEDULE.

Irrigation Rules for the Puttalam District.

1. Any custom now existing relating to paddy cultivation, not expressly provided for in these rules and not opposed thereto, shall have the force of these rules and be considered part of them.

2. The following provision shall be made for the upkeep, repair, and improvement of the tanks, elas, channels, water-courses, or other source of supply of water to lands belonging to private individuals. Provided that in case of tanks restored and maintained by Government no labour shall be called out for the repair and upkeep of the bund and the main channels:—

(a) Every "pangu" shall give for each amunam and proportionately for each part of an amunam such labour not exceeding thirty days' labour in each year for an able-bodied adult, as the Assistant Government Agent may declare to be necessary for the upkeep, repair, or improvement of the tanks, elas, channels, water-courses, or other source of supply of water on which it is dependent for its water supply.

(b) Provided that each proprietor may commute such labour by a money payment of 50 cents for each day's labour of an able-bodied adult, which commutation must be paid on or before June 30 of every year.

- 3. In addition to the ordinary labour of the year as above provided for, whenever the Assistant Government Agent or person acting under his orders shall find it necessary to call out the labour of a village to perform an urgent work of repair, or of prevention of inevitable damage, uncommuted labour either in person or by substitute shall at once be furnished by every shareholder and continued daily until the completion of the work.
- 4. When Government provides a sluice or a spill or any other work of permanent improvement costing Rs. 1,000 or over, the ordinary labour contribution shall be doubled.
- 5. The above labour shall be called out at such times and in such proportion as the Assistant Government Agent or any person deputed by him on that behalf may determine; and notice published by beat of tom-tom shall be held to be sufficient notice to all persons liable for the labour.
- 6. Before the commencement of any sowing season the majority of the proprietors of each tract of field intending to cultivate for the season shall decide on the kind or kinds of paddy that shall be sown for that season, and the times of beginning and finishing, mudding and sowing, and such decision shall be adhered to by all proprietors. Any proprietor sowing any other kind of paddy than that decided on, or mudding and sowing outside the times fixed, shall, besides being liable to the penalty provided for the breach of the rules, do so at his own risk, and shall perform the duties of watching, fencing, &c., with the other proprietors until all their paddy is reaped. If the proprietors neglect to decide as above, the Irrigation Headman shall do so for them.
- 7. If a proprietor shall absent himself at the sowing season or neglect to cultivate his share, it may be cultivated by the other proprietors or by one of them, as the majority may decide, free of rent for that season. All the duties required of the owner shall be performed by the cultivators or cultivator for that season, provided that such duties do not include the labour required of the proprietor under rules 2 and 3, for which the owner is liable.
- 8. Should a case occur in which from any cause the source of water supply to the tract of fields proves insufficient, after sowing has been completed, to bring the whole extent sown to maturity, a majority of the proprietors of the fields sown shall decide what part of the tract shall be abandoned, and the remainder shall be divided among the proprietors who sowed in proportion to the extent sown by each.
- 9. Should a case occur in which before sowing has commenced, it is found that the source of supply to the field is insufficient to irrigate the whole extent of the field, the Vel-Vidane shall publish a notice calling on the proprietors to decide within a specified time on the extent and the portion of the fields to be cultivated, and that portion shall be divided among such proprietors in proportion to their shares of the field. If the proprietors neglect, though requested, to decide as above, the Irrigation Headman shall do so for them.
- 10. Each proprietor shall join in putting up the fence of the field in proportion to his share of the field. The fence shall be made sufficiently strong to keep out cattle, and all cultivators shall put up the fences before commencing to cultivate, and each proprietor shall keep his portion of the fence in proper order throughout the cultivation season until the crop is reaped, whether he cultivates his share or not, unless his share is cultivated by another proprietor.
- 11. Each proprietor shall erect a proper watch-hut in his share and shall watch his share until all the paddy in the field is reaped, whether his own paddy has been reaped or not.
- 12. Each proprietor shall be allowed a share in one of the threshing-floors in which to stack his paddy till it is threshed; and all the shareholders of each threshing-floor shall join, each proportionately to his share in the field, in putting up a strong stake fence round it, and each proprietor shall keep up his portion of the stake fence and watch the threshing-floor until his own paddy has been threshed and removed. But before such shareholder vacates the threshing-floor, he shall properly repair any breaches made by him in the stake fence.

- 13. No fence shall be put up on any part of a tank bund.
- 14. All owers of buffaloes shall drive them away and keep them at a safe distance from the field during cultivation season and till all the paddy has been secured; all buffaloes shall have wooden bells attached to their necks, and all known fence-breakers and dangerous animals shall be yoked to others. All owners of other cattle, goats, and sheep shall herd them during the day, and tie or fold them during the night at a safe distance from the fields. Pigs trespassing on the fields and injuring the paddy may be shot, and the carcases shall be restored to the owners.
- 15. Each proprietor shall be allowed water from the source of supply for his paddy cultivation in proportion to his share in the field.
- 16. The distribution of water from the tank, potawa, amuna, or other source of supply shall be made under the control of the Irrigation Headman, and no person shall issue, distribute, cut off, divert, or use in any manner the water except under the direction of, or with the consent of, the Irrigation Headman.
- 17. In distributing water from any source of supply to the fields in a tract, the water shall first be taken to the fields on the high level, and thence to those on lower levels, and no one shall in any way interfere to the prejudice of others with the distribution of water.
- 18. No proprietor shall take water for any other purpose than paddy cultivation without the consent of all the other proprietors.
- 19. Water-courses and channels within the fields shall be kept in proper order by the owners of the lands through which they flow.
- 20. The bunds of all tanks shall be divided among the proprietors of lands under them in proportion to their shares of the field, and each proprietor shall keep the portion assigned to him always free from jungle, brushwood, and overgrowth of every description, and from white ants' nests, and the slopes free from scours, and also shall keep such portion properly turfed.
- 21. The tank bed may be cultivated when the majority of the proprietors under it so decide with the permission of the Assistant Government Agent. Unless the majority decide to cultivate the tank bed, and the permission of the Assistant Government Agent is obtained, no proprietor shall cultivate the tank bed or any portion thereof.
- 22. No persons other than the proprietors or persons acting on their behalf shall fish in the tanks, elas, channels, water-courses, or other source of supply of water to lands belonging to them.
- 23. No person shall commit any act in opposition to these rules whereby damage may occur to any of the proprietors or to any irrigation work.
- 24. Every proprietor shall pay to the Irrigation Headman over his lands a huwandiram or commission at the rate of 2 per cent. of the paddy reaped by him.
- 25. Whereas in the Pomparippu pattu the season for the "kalapokam" commences long before the tanks are full, and it cannot possibly be known until after the heavy rains how much water will be available, and whether there will be sufficient for the full extent of the field sown, if, after the rains, it be found that the supply of water is insufficient for all the fields sown, a majority of the proprietors of the fields sown for the season shall decide what extent of each field shall be abandoned.

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in exercise of the power vested in Us by sub-section (2) of section 20 of the said Ordinance, and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby confirm the by-laws set forth in the said schedule.

And We do hereby proclaim and declare that they shall come into operation from the date hereof.

SCHEDULE.

By-laws made under Sections 19 and 20 of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907," for the Area described in the Schedule A hereto by the District School Committee of Trincomalee.

1. In these by-laws—

The terms "boy," "girl," and "child" mean a boy or a girl or a child residing in the area described in the Schedule A hereto.

The term "parent" includes a guardian and any person who has the actual custody of the child.

The term "Code" means the Code for aided schools for the time being sanctioned

by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council.

The term "attendance" means an attendance for the period defined by the Code as constituting a full attendance recorded in an Attendance Register in the manner prescribed by the Code.
The term "local authority" means the District School Committee of Trinco-

malee.

The term "school" means a school specified in the Schedule B hereto. The terms "adequate and suitable provision for the education of a child" and reasonable excuse "shall bear the meaning defined in section 20 (1) (b) of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907."

The term "Inspector of Schools" means an Inspector of Schools appointed by His Excellency the Governor.

- 2. The parent of every boy of not less than 6 nor more than 12 years of age, and the parent of every girl of not less than 6 nor more than 12 years of age, or in the case of Muhammadans and Tamil girls, the parent of every girl of not less than 6 nor more than 10 years of age, shall cause such boy or girl to attend one of the schools specified in Schedule B, unless he has made other adequate and suitable provision for the education of such boy or girl, or unless there is a reasonable excuse for non-attendance, provided that no boy or girl is required to attend school from a distance exceeding two miles.
- The time during which every boy or girl shall attend school shall be the whole time for which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of similar age.
 - 4. Provided always that nothing in these by-laws-
 - (a) Shall prevent the presence of children being excused during the hours when religious instruction is given, as provided by section 21 (d) of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907."
 - (b) Shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which its parent belongs.
- 5. And provided always that when a child between 10 and 12 years of age, being beneficially employed to the satisfaction of the District School Committee, has received a certificate from an Inspector of Schools that it has passed in Reading, Writing, and Arithmetic, the examination prescribed for the Third Standard under Schedule D in the Second Class Upper Division, it shall not be required to attend school.
- 6. Every parent who shall not observe, or shall neglect or violate, these by-laws or any of them, shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding Rs. 20 for each offence, and an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 10 per day in the case of a continuing offence.

Note.—The following are the portions of the Towns Schools Ordinance referred to in sections 1 and 4 of these by-laws:

Section 20 (1) (b).—A parent shall be deemed to have made adequate and suitable provision for the education of his child if he proves that his child is in regular attendance at a school registered by the Director of Public Instruction for the receipt of a grant in aid, or at a school with regard to which an application for a grant in aid is under consideration, or at a school certified by the Director of Public Instruction to provide adequate and suitable instruction; or if he proves that he has made such other provision for his child's education as the Director of Public Instruction shall certify to be adequate and suitable, or if he produces a certificate from the Director of Public Instruction recommending that the child shall be exempted from compulsory attendance. Provided that no parent shall be convicted for not causing his child to attend such school if he proves to the satisfaction of the Magistrate that he has reasonable excuse for not causing such child to attend. A parent shall be deemed to have a reasonable excuse for not causing his child to attend school if he proves that the child is prevented from attending by sickness or other unavoidable

Section 21.-No school in which religious instruction is given shall be considered a public vernacular school unless the District Committee is satisfied-

- (a) That religious instruction is given only during the times specified in the school time table;
- (b) That religious instruction is not given to pupils of other denominations than that to which the school belongs if the parents object;
- (c) That pupils who do not attend religious instruction are employed in other studies during the hours allotted to religious instruction;

(d) That such pupil, if their parents object to their being present in the room where religious instruction is given, are either allowed to study in some other part of the school premises during the hours when such instruction is given, or their presence in the school during suc'i hours is excused; and

(e) That a copy of this section in the English, Sinhalese, and Tamil languages is conspicuously posted up in the school.

The above by-laws were made by the District School Committee of Trincomalee at a meeting held on February 4, 1909.

AMENDED RULE.

6. Coasting vessels may call at places and out bays at which no custom-house office is stationed, and may, under the written permit of the Principal Collector of Customs or of the Collector of the Province in which such place is situated, land or ship any goods specified in the said permit; and the headman (duly authorized by the Government Agent for that Province) of any place at which a vessel may anchor, discharge, or ship cargo, shall require the master of such vessel to produce to him the clearance or permit of such vessel; and the headman is enjoined and required frequently to visit such vessel, to examine and take an account of the goods landed or shipped, to note and write such particulars upon the clearance or permit of the vessel, to detain such goods as shall be illegally landed or shipped, and to report any irregularity to the Government Agent or the nearest officer of Customs.

THE following rule made by the Governor in Executive Council, with the approval of the SECRETARY OF STATE FOR THE COLONIES, in substitution for amended rule 18 of the rules and regulations concerning land sales, referred to in the Notification dated April 7, 1908, published in the Government Gazette of the 10th idem, is published for general information.

RULE REFERRED TO.

Lands shall be sold by public auction at an upset price which shall not be less than Rs. 15 an acre, except where the Governor is satisfied that from the presence of rock, swamp, or other cause the average value of the land is less than Rs. 15 an acre. A sum of Re. I per acre shall in every case be added to the amount finally bid for the land to cover the cost of erection of boundary marks.

In the case of explosives to be shipped to the steamers of the Ceylon Steamship Company sailing round the Island north-about, shipment shall also be allowed on the sailing date between the hours of

1 and 2 P.M.

2. 3. Clerks in Government service, from whatever funds they may be paid, who have completed three years' satisfactory service and are not members of the Customs, Postal, Survey, or Railway Departments, and those clerks employed by Provincial and District Road Committees whose appointments date prior to July 1, 1875, are eligible for examination irrespective of age and without fee. Their applications (in the same form, Schedule A) for admission to the examination should be forwarded to the

Director of Public Instruction through the Heads of their Departments.

4. Applications are to reach the Director of Public Instruction not later than 2 r.m. on Wednesday, December 1, 1909; any applications received after that hour, by whatever cause delayed, will be

absolutely rejected.

5. The Director of Public Instruction will return to the candidate his application, approved or disapproved as the case may be, after taking, if necessary, the orders of Government thereon. The approved application shall constitute the candidate's ticket of admission to the examination. Candidates presenting themselves for examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination their forms of application approved by the Director of Public Instruction. 6. The examination will be held at Colombo only, in the place and under the supervision of the officer specified in Schedule B. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications to present themselves for examination have been returned to them approved by the Director of Public Instruction, leave to present themselves at the examination.

7. The examination will be competitive. The number of places assigned for competition will

be thirty.

8. The successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical

fitness for service in any part of the Island.

9. The subjects for examination are those set out in Schedule C to this notice. The examination shall be held in two parts. The first part a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, and Arithmetic, and Bookkeeping. Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting, half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively, and one-third of those allowed for Bookkeeping shall be excluded from the remainder of the examination. Special attention will be paid to Handwriting, and candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be rigorously excluded. The kind of writing preferred will be that generally shown as the "Civil Service" hand. The second part of the examination shall be in the remaining subjects in Schedule C. Should a candidate obtain less than one-third of the aggregate marks for the three subjects—Composition, General Paper, Précis Writing—or less than one-fourth marks in any other subject, or, if he be a Sinhalese or Tamil, less than one-half of the marks in his native language, such marks shall not be counted in his favour. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.

10. Clerks of the description-given in section 3 above, who have served Government continuously for over six years, will be allowed to compete amongst themselves, and will be eligible, if they obtain a minimum of 66 per cent. in Writing and 33 per cent. in the other compulsory subjects, for seven of the appointments offered for competition. Three of the appointments will be reserved as prizes for deserving clerks of the same description, who have served Government continuously for ten years and upwards, to be selected irrespective of examination. No service under the age of sixteen years will be reckoned for

this purpose.

The Government reserves to itself the right, without question, of rejecting any or all tenders.

6. The person whose tender is accepted will be required to bear the expenses of having the lease bond prepared, which bond will be subject to the approval of the Hon. the Attorney-General, but may be drawn by the tenderer's own lawyers.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weeksy Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended November 20, 1909,

Births.—The total births registered were 107 (3 Europeans, 8 Burghers, 53 Sinhalese, 19 Tamils, 22 Moors, 1 Malay, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1909, viz., 183,872) was 30 3, as against 29 2 in the preceding week, 27 0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25 5 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 108 (2 Europeans, 4 Burghers, 52 Sinhalese, 38 Tamils, 7 Moors, 2 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 30.6, as against 26.9 in the previous week, 45.2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 36.5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 108 total deaths, 27 were of infants under one year of age, as in the preceding week, against 39 in the corresponding week of the previous year and 31 the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of still births registered during the week was 5.

Selected Causes of Death.—Fifteen deaths were registered from Phthisis (against 13 in the previous week and the weekly average for last year), of which 4 each were in New Bazaar and Maradana Hospitals, 3 in St. Paul's, 2 in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and 1 each in Slave Island and Kollupitiya.

- 2. Thirteen deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* (against 7 in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Kotahena, 2 each in St. Paul's, Maradana Hospitals, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Kollupitiya, and 1 each in San Sebastian and New Bazaar. Four deaths were registered from *Bronchitis*.
- 3. Fourteen deaths were registered from *Debility* (including 6 infants under 1 year), 10 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 6 Old Age, 5 Diarrhæa (3 infants), 4 Dysentery, 3 Enteritis, 3 Dochmius Duodenalis and 28 from Other Causes.
- 4. Three deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* as in the previous week (against 8 the weekly average for last year), one each in San Sebastian, St. Paul's, and Kotahena.
- 5. Sixteen cases of *Enteric Fever* were reported, against 11 in the previous week. Five cases of *Chickenpox* were reported, against 7 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was $78\cdot6^{\circ}$, against $78\cdot4^{\circ}$ in the preceding week and $80\cdot3^{\circ}$ in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was $29\cdot962$ in., against $29\cdot995$ in. in the preceding week and $29\cdot960$ in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was nil, against $5\cdot69$ in. in the preceding week and nil in the corresponding week of the previous year.
