K NOW Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in exercise of the power in Us vested by section 3 (1) of Ordinance No. 1 of 1909, intituled "The Game Protection Ordinance, 1909," do hereby appoint and ordain that the said Ordinance shall come into operation on January 1, 1910.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Ninth day of December, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Nine.

W HEREAS the District School Committee of Kalutara have, in pursuance of section 19 of the Rural Schools Ordinance, No. 8 of 1907, made the by-laws set forth in Schedule A hereto for the School District of Kalutara, Western Province:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in exercise of the power vested in Us by sub-section (2) of section 20 of the said Ordinance, and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby confirm the by-laws set forth in the said schedule.

We do hereby proclaim and declare that they shall come into operation from the date hereof.

SCHEDULE A.

By-laws made under Sections 19 and 20 of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907," by the District School Committee of the School District of Kalutara.

1. Definitions.—In these by-laws—

The terms "boy," "girl," and "child" mean a boy, or a girl, or a child residing within the School District of Kalutara.

The term "parent" includes a guardian and any person who has the actual custody of the child.

The term "Code" means the Code for Aided Schools for the time being sanctioned by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council.

The term "attendance" means an attendance for the period defined by the Code as constituting a full attendance recorded in an Attendance Register in the manner prescribed by the Code.

The term "District Committee" means the District School Committee for the School District of Kalutara.

The term "school" means a school specified in the Schedule B hereto.

The terms "adequate and suitable provision for the education of a child" and "reasonable excuse" shall bear the meaning defined in sub-section (1) (b) of section 20 of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907."

The term "Inspector of Schools" means an Inspector of Schools appointed by His Excellency the Governor.

- 2. Children to attend School.—The parent of every boy of not less than 6 nor more than 12 years of age, and the parent of every girl of not less than 6 nor more than 10 years of age, shall cause such boy or girl to attend one of the schools specified in the Schedule B hereto, unless he has made other adequate and suitable provision for the education of such boy or girl, or unless there is a reasonable excuse for non-attendance. Provided that no girl shall be compelled to attend school from a distance of more than two miles.
- 3. Time of Attendance.—The time during which every boy or girl shall attend school shall be the whole time for which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of similar age.
 - 4. Religion.—Provided always that nothing in these by-laws—
 - (a) Shall prevent the presence of children being excused during the hours when religious instruction is given as provided by sub-section (d) of section 21 of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907."
 - (b) Shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which the child's parent belongs.
- 5. And provided always that when a child between 10 and 12 years of age, being beneficially employed to the satisfaction of the Chairman of the Village Committee, has received a certificate from an Inspector of Schools that he has passed in Reading, Writing, and Arithmetic, the fourth standard prescribed by the Code for the time being, he shall not be required to attend school.

6. Every parent who shall not observe, or shall neglect or violate, these by-laws or any of them, shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding Rs. 20 for each offence, and an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 10 per day in the case of continuing offence.

Note.—The following are the portions of the Rural Schools Ordinance referred to in sections 1 and 4 of these by-laws:—

Sub-section (1) (b) of Section 20.—A parent shall be deemed to have made adequate and suitable provision for the education of his child, if he proves that his child is in regular attendance at a school registered by the Director of Public Instruction for the receipt of a grant in aid, or at a school with regard to which an application for a grant in aid is under consideration, or at a school certified by the Director of Public Instruction to provide adequate and suitable instruction, or if he proves that he has made such other provision for his child's education as the Director of Public Instruction shall certify to be adequate and suitable, or if he produces a certificate from the Director of Public Instruction recommending that the child shall be exempted from compulsory attendance. Provided that no parent shall be convicted for not causing his child to attend such school, if he proves to the satisfaction of the court that he has reasonable excuse for not causing such child to attend. A parent shall be deemed to have a reasonable excuse for not causing his child to attend school, if he proves that the child is prevented from attending by sickness or other unavoidable cause.

Section 21.—No school in which religious instruction is given shall be considered a public vernacular school unless the District Committee is satisfied—

- (a) That religious instruction is given only during the time specified in the school time table;
- (b) That religious instruction is not given to pupils of other denominations than that to which the school belongs, if the parents object;

(c) That pupils who do not attend religious instruction are employed in other studies during the hours allotted to religious instruction;

- (d) That such pupils, if their parents object to their being present in the room where religious instruction is given, are either allowed to study in some other part of the school premises during the hours when such instruction is given, or their presence in the school during such hours is excused; and
- (e) That a copy of this section in the English, Sinhalese, and Tamil languages is conspicuously posted up in the school.

The above by-laws were made by the District School Committee for the School District of Kalutara at a meeting held on February 23, 1909.

SCHEDULE A.

21. It shall not be lawful for any one to issue the water of one tank for the cultivations under any other tank, nor for the shareholders of lands cultivated under a tank to utilize for their cultivation the water of any other tank, without first obtaining the sanction of the Government Agent or Assistant Government Agent.

The shareholders of lands cultivated under a tank who require for their cultivation a supply of water from another tank, of which the shareholders of the latter tank are not actually in need, shall make their application to the Government Agent or Assistant Government Agent, who after due inquiry may grant permission therefor, and may at his discretion call upon the shareholders who are in need of the water to deposit a reasonable amount to the credit of the tank from which the water is to be issued as value of the water drawn off. This rule is not applicable to any work which has been placed under the control and management of the Director of Irrigation in pursuance of section 56 of "The Irrigation Ordinance, 1906."

- (a) Every owner of a dog shall, after publication has been made by the local authority that an outbreak of rabies is apprehended at any place within his jurisdiction, cause such dog to be muzzled or led by a chain when in any publication or place within such limits and for such period as shall be notified in such publication. The muzzle shall be so constructed as to render it impossible for the dog while wearing the same to bite any person or animal, but not so as to prevent the dog from breathing freely or lapping water.
- (b) A dog shall not be considered effectually controlled unless muzzled as above, or led by some competent person by means of a collar and chain, both of which shall be securely fastened to the dog's neck.
- (c) Any dog found in any public road or place unprovided with a muzzle, or not under control by means of a collar and chain, may be seized by any Police Officer or any person duly appointed for the purpose by the local authority and removed to the nearest dog shelter or slaughter-house, there to be dealt with in the following manner:—
 - (i.) If the dog is affected with, or suspected of, rabies, it shall be forthwith slaughtered.
 - (ii.) If the dog is not affected with, or suspected of, rabies, it shall be detained in the dog shelter or slaughter-house. Provided that where the owner or person having charge of a dog so detained is known, the local authority or some person duly authorized by him shall forthwith cause notice to be given to such owner or person of the fact of the dog having been so seized and detained, and the dog shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the breach of these regulations, be given up to such owner or person on payment of the reasonable expenses of detention.
 - (iii.) If the dog so seized and detained shall not have been claimed by such owner or person within three days after the seizure, or where such owner or person is known within two days after the aforesaid notice has been given, the local authority shall cause the dog to be slaughtered or otherwise disposed of in such manner as the local authority deems expedient.
- (d) The owner or person in charge for the time being of any dog which shall have been seized and detained under these regulations shall be liable to pay to the local authority the following charge:—

For detention: for each day 5 cents; and such charge shall be recoverable if the dog is not affected with, or suspected of, rabies by the sale thereof, unless the said charge shall have been paid before sale by the owner or person in charge of the dog, otherwise the charge shall be recoverable in the manner provided by section 1 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1873, in respect to the order in which the property of public defaulters may be seized and sold.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended December 4, 1909.

Births.—The total births registered were 122 (1 European, 17 Burghers, 61 Sinhalese, 19 Tamils, 18 Moors, 4 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1909, viz., 183,872) was 34.6, as against 35.2 in the preceding week, 28.1 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.5 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 118 (1 European, 6 Burghers, 56 Sinhalese, 30 Tamils, 20 Moors, 4 Malays, and 1 Other). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 33.5, as against 29.5 in the previous week, 48.4 in the corresponding week of last year, and 36.5 the weekly average for last year. Infantile Deaths. Of the 118 total deaths, 29 were of infants under one year of age, as against 32 in the preceding week, 45 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 31 the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of still births registered during the week were 6.

Selected Causes of Death.—As usual, Pneumonia and Phthisis claimed the largest number of victims. Fifteen deaths were registered from Pneumonia (against 14 in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in New Bazaar, 3 in Maradana Hospitals, 2 each in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals) and Slave Island, and 1 each in Pettah, St. Paul's, Kotahena, and Kollupitiya. Four deaths were registered from Bronchitis.

- 2. Twelve deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 16 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 each were in St. Paul's and Kollupitiya, 2 each in New Bazaar and Maradana Hospitals, and 1 each in San Sebastian and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals).
- 3. Ten deaths were registered from Diarrhea (including 1 infant), 10 from Debility (6 infants), 10 Infantile Convulsions, 6 Dysentery, 6 Enteritis (3 infants), 5 Tetanus (3 infants), 5 Old Age, and 32 from Other Causes.
- 4. Three deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 1 in the previous week and 8 the weekly average for last year), of which 2 were in St. Paul's and 1 in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals).
- 5. Eight cases of *Enteric Fever* were reported, as in the previous week. Nine cases of *Chickenpox* were reported, against 3 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79.5°, against 78.9° in the preceding week and 79.9° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.920 in., against 29.962 in. in the preceding week and 29.974 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.14 in., against 4.39 in the preceding week and 0.09 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
