ABSTRACT OF SEASON REPORTS FOR THE MONTH ENDED JULY 31, 1894.

WESTERN PROVINCE.

COLOMBO DISTRICT.

The yala cultivation is progressing favourably, and is blossoming in some localities. The muttes paddy plants in Alutkuru koralé south are thriving. Preparations for maha cultivation are going on in Héwágam koralé and Siyané koralé west.

Other Food Supplies.—Jakfruit, breadfruit, plantains, and other vegetables are becoming scarce and dear. Yams have been largely cultivated in Salpiti koralé. The cocoanut crop is considered to be below the average; prices range from Rs. 30 to Rs. 40 a thousand nuts.

NEGOMBO DISTRICT.

Alutkuru koralé north: the fields sown for yala are partly damaged by the disease called "bambupiduma," the rest are thriving well. Vegetables are scarce and dear. Cocoanut crops and their prices good.

Hápitigam koralé: most of the fields have been sown for the present yala harvest, and some are being ploughed for the maha harvest. It is feared that bambupiduma will damage some of the fields.

Vegetables scarce, but breadfruit is plentiful. Cocoanut crops fairly good; prices high owing to scarcity of nuts.

KALUTARA DISTRICT.

The yala cultivation is progressing, and the crop will be reaped in September next. The prospects of harvest in the Kalutara Totamuna and Pasdun koralé are fair, but indifferent in Rayigam koralé. No intermediate cultivation.

Vegetables: jak and plantains are scarce at present. Breadfruits are plentiful. Cocoanut crop is fair; price Rs. 30 to Rs. 35 a thousand.

CENTRAL PROVINCE.

KANDY DISTRICT.

Udunuwara: maha paddy cultivation progressing, some fields delayed for want of rain; yala paddy in ear, some blossoming, growth fair; growth of kurakkan fair. Yatinuwara: maha paddy cultivation going on; yala paddy being transplanted; paddy sown early in ear; prospects good. Tumpane: yala paddy fields sown; in some places hill paddy being sown. Harispattu: maha paddy being cultivated; yala paddy in ear; prospects bad for want of rain at proper time; kurakkan and hill paddy chenas contain small plants. Pata Dumbara: yala paddy transplanted, fields cultivated earlier are in ear; kurakkan in small plants; maha paddy being cultivated; want of rain has retarded cultivation in some villages; rain this month, so good crops expected. Uda Dumbara: maha paddy being transplanted, prospects good; yala kurakkan in plants. Pata Hewaheta: yala paddy plants growing well, prospects good; maha paddy cultivation going on. Udalalata: maha paddy fields being ploughed; yala crop not ripe yet. Uda Bulatgama: maha paddy fields being ploughed; growth of kurakkan good after the rain this month.

MÁTALÉ DISTRICT.

Rain scanty in Mátalé south, nothing in north and east; the extent cultivated for yala is extremely limited; large acreage of paddy land is damaged by want of rain.

NUWARA ELIYA DISTRICT.

Kotmalé: paddy, ploughing and sowing for maha; kurakkan chenas sown. Uda Hewaheta and Walapane: yala cultivation commenced; severe drought prevails, and water is scarce; no work on chenas.

NORTHERN PROVINCE.

JAFFNA DISTRICT.

Total absence of rain during month. Reaping and threshing of tinaichamy and panichamy commenced; crops reported fair; kurakkan in plants and in ear; prospects indifferent for want of rain.

MANNÁR DISTRICT.

Kalapokam paddy crops are being threshed in some villages; in Mantai division paddy lands are being manured for next kalapokam; lands in the island are being cleared for dry grain cultivation; extreme drought; people and cattle both suffering much from want of water.

MULLAITTIVU DISTRICT.

Good rain in Karikkadumulai south in early part of month, and slight showers at Tunukkai. Ploughing and manuring for kalapokam in maritime pattus and Mulliavalai; tobacco watered, cut, and cured in Mulliavalai; health of people and cattle fair; rain badly wanted.

VAVUNIYA DISTRICT.

In Melpattu 6 acres sirupokam reaped, 6½ acres ripe, fair crop; 50 acres of gingelly reaped; scarcity in Panankamam; sirupokam a failure. In Chaddikulam idaipokamam harvested, sirupokam in blossom and ear; 37 acres under Vavuniya harvested; fair crop; many small patches of sirupokam in Kilakkumulai north; in Sinhalese divisions paddy under restored tanks very promising, tank beds being generally cultivated with paddy; general health good; rain much needed.

SOUTHERN PROVINCE.

GALLE DISTRICT.

Crop middling on high lands of Bentota-Walailawiti koralé and Gangaboda pattu and in Wellaboda pattu good elsewhere; reaping going on.

HAMBANTOTA DISTRICT.

Paddy: standing crops in Kirama valley middling; under Udukirinde good; Tissamaharama fair; under small village tanks middling; fine grain chena clearings restricted to private lands; cattle free from disease.

MÁTARA DISTRICT.

Crop prospects fair throughout the district.

EASTERN PROVINCE.

BATTICALOA DISTRICT.

Eight thousand acres of pinmari is being harvested ; sowing of 1,000 acres as ettala, and as second crop, is over ; drought continues with slight rain now and then ; children suffer from whooping cough, fever, and dysentery in some parts of the district ; hoof-disease among cattle prevalent in some villages.

TRINCOMALEE DISTRICT.

Rain on the 28th instant has done some good to crops ; water in Allai tank not sufficient for pinmari cultivation ; in Tampalakam and Kandukulam part of crops has ripened, and are being reaped.

NORTH-WESTERN PROVINCE.

KURUNÉGALA DISTRICT.

A few light but partial showers during the month have improved prospects of grown crops ; wet and dry area thereof much below average ; maha cultivation very backward for want of water ; prospects not bad in Weuda, Dewamedi, and Dambadeniya, but in Katugampola and Wanni fears are entertained of short food supply ; in Hiriyala report tolerably favourable ; the rain has done little or nothing towards filling tanks ; cattle and people free from sickness.

CHILAW DISTRICT.

Northern division : the bala-wi cultivation referred to in previous reports not thriving well owing to want of rain ; fine grain being reaped in some villages ; others abandoned. Central division : 263 bushels sown extent of paddy damaged for want of rain ; remaining sown extent thriving well ; rain required for maturing fine grain similarly damaged for want of rain ; about 50 bushels of mun and meneri maturing ; preparations for maha cultivation going on. Southern division : paddy cultivation partially abandoned, and more fields will meet same fate if no rain falls ; few showers on the 19th and the 20th good for standing crop.

PUTTALAM DISTRICT.

Paddy crop in a few villages in some divisions of Demala hatpattu fair ; plants young and earing ; gingelly crop in some villages gathered early part of month, and in others died for want of rain ; no paddy or fine grain in other pattus of the district owing to same cause.

NORTH-CENTRAL PROVINCE.

Continued drought ; paddy crops partly reaped, partly growing ; some are damaged by caterpillars and some fail from drought ; few tanks half full, small tanks have no water ; cold, fever, whooping cough, and sore-eyes reported prevalent.

PROVINCE OF UVA.

Yala crop of paddy in all the divisions of the Province now being reaped and harvested ; return very poor in consequence of prolonged drought ; in Udukinda kóllu crop below the average from same cause ; clearing of chenas commenced.

PROVINCE OF SABARAGAMUWA.

RATNAPURA DISTRICT.

In Kuruwiti kóralé the crop of nearly all the maha fields has been harvested ; and the first maha fields in Nawadun and Atakalan kóralés are being prepared and sown. The yala fields throughout the district have been cultivated under favourable weather, except in Kolonna, Kadawata, and Meda kóralés, where, on account of the drought, some tracts have suffered damage, and failure of crop is anticipated ; el-wi chenas and crops on owita lands in Kuruwiti, Nawadun, and Kukulu kóralés maturing, and promise well ; in the Medapattu of Atakalan kóralé and in Kadawata, Meda, and Kolonna kóralés kurakkan chenas for 1895 are now being cleared ; one-third of the tana chenas in Kolonna kóralé is reported to have failed owing to drought ; no disease among cattle.

KÉGALLA DISTRICT.

Paddy : yala prospects, Beligal kóralé middling ; Three kóralés and Lower Bulatgama good ; only a small proportion of fields under cultivation in Galboda and Kinigoda kóralés and Paranakúru kóralé owing to want of water ; prospects fair ; ploughing for maha in progress throughout the district ; more rain is wanted ; fine grain, hill paddy ; and iringu sown ; prospects fair ; kurakkan prospects : Galboda and Kinigoda kóralés and Paranakuru kóralé fairs Beligal kóralé middling ; Three Kóralés and Lower Bulatgama good ; mun prospects, Galboda and Kinigoda kóralé, and Paranakuru kóralé fair ; Beligal kóralé middling ; gingelly prospects good in Beligal kóralé ; cattle disease in parts of Dehigampal and Atulugam kóralés.
