## MINUTES BY THE GOVERNOR.

WITH reference to the Minute of August 26, 1891, it is hereby notified, that the marks required for a pass in the second language, at the second examination of gentlemen in the Civil Service are the same as those required for a pass, in the first language, at the first examination, viz., 40 per cent. in conversation and in newspaper reading, respectively, and a total of 33 per cent. in all subjects; and that the pages 55 to 186 of Vanderlinden's Institutes, refer to Henry's edition of Vanderlinden only. The portion of the text book in which candidates will be examined is the first 23 chapters of Book I. of Vanderlinden's Institutes.

## GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS.

IIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR has been pleased, with the authority of the Secretary of State, to direct the publication of the following regulations:—

REGULATIONS as to the Leave and Leave Pay of temporary Employés of the Government of Ceylon serving under Contracts for definite terms of years.

- 1. Temporary employés of the Ceylon Government, whose contracts contain no stipulation as to leave, are not entitled to leave, and will not be granted leave unless the most exceptional reasons are given to, and are approved by, the Governor.
  - 2. Such leave will never be granted on full pay.
  - 3. The grant of half pay leave will be limited to four months.
- 4. Half pay while on leave shall be drawn at the rate of exchange allowed to ordinary Government Officers for the time being.
- 5. While in England, any such employé who has not been distinctly and definitely sent home to work, shall, as a condition of receiving half pay, be liable to give the Consulting Engineers, or other advisers of Government, the benefit of his assistance and advice without any further payment beyond out of pocket expenses.

No. 416.—Joseph Charles Dunbar, of St. Clair estate, Talawakele, tea planter, an appliance or method of facilitating the withering or drying of tea leaf, cocao, tobacco, cocoanut pulp, or any other substance which it may be necessary to wither or dry.—November 30, 1893.

No. 407.—Henry Carus Wilson, of 22, Fenchurch street, London, England, merchant, improvements relating to the treatment of tea.—November 30, 1893.
