PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

In the Name of Her Majesty VICTORIA, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir ARTHUR ELIBANK HAVELOCK, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

HEREAS by section 34 of "The Colombo Waterworks Ordinances, 1886 and 1891," it is enacted that the regulations in the schedule thereto annexed shall be observed by all consumers of water within the Municipaltity, and that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Executive Council to make from time to time such further regulations as may appear expedient for, amongst others, the following purposes :-

(a) For preventing waste, misuse, undue consumption, or contamination of the water supplied by the Government for public or private use;

(b) For directing the use and prescribing the size, nature, strength, and materials, and the mode of arrangement, position, alteration, and repair of the pipes, valves, cocks, cisterns, soil pans, water-closets, and other apparatus and receptacles or any of them to be used respectively for carrying, delivering, rendering, and restoring water;

(c) For regulating the public supply of water by standpipes, and the use of the same

(d) For regulating the supply of water by private services, and the materials and fittings to be used therefor;

(e) For regulating the supply of water by water meters and the materials, meters, and fittings to be used therefor;

and that such further regulations shall be published by Proclamation in the Government Gazette, and that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Executive Council, by like Proclamation, to alter, vary, amend, or repeal any regulation so proclaimed, and, if necessary, to substitute other regulations in place thereof:

And whereas it appears expedient to repeal the regulations heretofore made under the authority of the said section by the Proclamations of the Eighteenth day of April, One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-seven; Thirtieth day of July, One thousand Eight hundred and Eightyseven; First day of December, One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-seven; Seventeenth day of April, One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-eight; and the Tenth day of May, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-two, respectively, and to make further regulations for the purposes aforesaid:

Now therefore know Ye that We, the said Governor in Executive Council, do hereby repeal all the regulations which have been proclaimed from time to time by the Proclamations of the Eighteenth day of April, One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-seven; Thirtieth day of July, One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-seven; First day of December, One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-seven; Seventeenth day of April, One thousand Eight hundred and Eightyeight; and the Tenth day of May, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-two, respectively, and We do hereby proclaim and make the regulations set forth in the schedule hereto to be further regulations for the purposes of the aforesaid "Waterworks Ordinances, 1886 and 1891," and the same shall come into operation as from and after the date hereof.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-seventh day of August, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-four.

SCHEDULE.

Water shall not be drawn from the public standpipes otherwise than into a vessel or receptacle.

The public standpipes shall not be used for the purposes of bathing or washing of persons, or animals, or clothes, or any other thing.

3. No contrivance of any kind whatever shall be used for fixing the handles of the standpipes in order to

secure a continuous flow of water.

No owner or occupier of any premises which are supplied with water from the Waterworks shall be entitled to the use of a separate service if the premises are used for the purposes of an hotel or other house of public entertainment, or where there is a bakery or distillery, or where horses, cattle, or vehicles are kept for sale or hire, or where any tap or taps have been placed in the garden or compound, unless such owner or occupier has applied to and entered into an agreement with the Waterworks Engineer for a supply of water under section 16 of the said Ordinances.

5. The Waterworks Engineer may (for good and sufficient reasons) direct from time to time that any piping or fittings on premises supplied, or about to be supplied with water from the Waterworks by separate service, shall be removed to or placed in such positions within the premises as may afford the best security that water shall not be wasted or used to excess, and that any tank, eistern, bath, or other receptacle which may have been constructed or placed under or in connection with any tap, valve, or pipe on the premises shall be reduced in size or removed altogether, and the Waterworks Engineer may refuse to supply or to continue to supply such premises with water until the directions given under this regulation shall have been complied with.

6. Whenever a tap is found running to waste on any premises which are supplied with water from the Waterworks, the Waterworks Engineer or his representative may cut off the water until the owner or occupier of the

waterworks. The waterworks Engineer of his representative may cut off the water until the owner or occupier of the premises has paid to the Waterworks Engineer, as liquidated damages, a sum of Rs. 5. Should such waste occur on any premises on more than three occasions, the supply may be cut off permanently.

7. The quantity of water supplied to any premises for domestic or other purposes may be regulated from time to time by the Waterworks Engineer, as the circumstances of the water supply may require.

8. The service pipe between the street pipe and the stop tap shall be kept in repair at the expense of the Government; but should any damage be done to the stop tap on any premises, it shall be made good by the Waterworks Department at the expense of such awares permises, it shall be made good by the Waterworks Department at the expense of such awares of such aware works Department at the expense of such owner or occupier, and the estimated cost of the repair of such damage shall be paid in advance to the Waterworks Engineer, who is hereby authorized and empowered to discontinue the

supply of water to such premises until such payment has been made.

9 The estimated cost of laying on water to any premises, after it has been cut off for any reason whatsoever, shall be borne by the owner or occupier of such premises, and shall be paid in advance to the Waterworks Engineer.

10. Water may be supplied for other than domestic purposes either by meter or otherwise.

11. The following rents shall be charged for meters:—

12. Meter rents shall be paid in advance quarterly to the Waterworks Engineer.

13. Ordinary repairs to meters shall be made at the expense of Government, but should any meter on any premises be tampered with or wilfully or carelessly damaged or misused, it shall be repaired or set in order, or, if necessary, replaced by the Waterworks Department at the expense of the owner or occupier of such premises; and the estimated cost of such repairing or replacing shall be paid in advance to the Waterworks Engineer by such owner or occupier.

14. If the owner or occupier of any premises which are supplied with water from the Waterworks refuses or omits to perform any part of any agreement for a supply of water for domestic purposes or for a supply of water for other than domestic purposes, or to pay any of the charges incidental to such supply, he shall thereby forfeit his right to the supply of water to which such agreement applies, and the Waterworks Engineer may cause the said service to be discontinued.

15. The following prices shall be paid on demand to the Municipal Council for a supply of water by meter for other than domestic purposes :-

Private Swimming Baths and Fountains (and for other purposes when the water is not sold or used for

trade or profit), 50 cents per 1,000 gallons.

Water sold for General Trade purposes (for the supply of boilers, mills, manufactories, bathing-places, hotels, and for other trade purposes), Re. 1 per 1,000 gallons.

Water for Shipping Supply, Rs. 3.50 per 1,000 gallons.

16. The total quantity of water supplied through any meter shall be paid for, and no deduction shall be made

for any portion of the supply that may have been used for domestic purposes.

17. Water may, at the option of Government, be supplied for other than domestic purposes without a meter provided the following charges be paid in advance to the Munnicipal Council :-

- (c) Charges for horses, cattle, or vehicles kept for sale or hire, but not specified above, shall be determined by the Waterworks Engineer on behalf of the Government at rates proportionate to those specified
- (d) For water supplied to premises where building operations are in progress, 25 cents a month for each workman employed.
- (e) For water supplied to eating-houses, bakeries, and other premises where small quantities of water are used for other than domestic purposes, the Waterworks Engineer on behalf of the Government may assess a charge in each case, based upon the probable quantity of water used.
- (f) For water supplied to public bathing-places:—For each tub kept on the premises (the capacity of any tub must not exceed 80 gallons), Rs. 14 a quarter.
- 18. In case any special fittings, constructions, appliances, or arrangements of any kind shall have been allowed for the supply of water for other than domestic purposes (such as garden taps, tanks, hose, &c.) the owner shall, whenever a change of occupiers occurs, either himself pay the charges previously agreed upon, or procure their payment by the new occupier, or remove at his own expense the said special fittings, constructions, appliances, or arrangements to the satisfaction of the Waterworks Engineer.
