PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

IN the Name of Her Majesty VICTORIA, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir ARTHUR ELIBANK HAVELOCK, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WHEREAS by the 25th and 26th sections of Ordinance No. 23 of 1889 it is amongst other things enacted that all rules for the enforcement of ancient customs regarding the irrigation and cultivation of paddy lands within any district in the Island, framed under the provisions of section 13 or section 16 of the said Ordinance, shall, when completed, be transmitted by the Government Agent to the Governor for the approval or disallowance thereof by the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, and in case such rules shall be approved, notice of such approval shall be given by Proclamation, and the said rules shall be published in the *Government Gazette* and in the district in such manner as to the Government Agent shall seem expedient, and shall thereupon become binding upon all proprietors within the said district, and shall be as legal, valid, and effectual as if the same had been inserted in the said Ordinance:

And whereas it is expedient that the following rules, which have been transmitted by the Government Agent of the North-Western Province, and approved by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, should be brought into operation in the Anaivilundan and

Munnessaram pattus south of the Dēduru-oya of Pitigal koralé northern division of the District of Chilaw, in the North-Western Province :

Now therefore We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do, by virtue of the powers in Us vested as aforesaid, proclaim that the additional rules above referred to relating to tanks and cultivation of paddy lands in the Anaivilundan and Munnessaram pattus south of the Dēduru-oya of Pitigal koralé northern division of the District of Chilaw, in the North-Western Province, have been approved by Us; the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Tenth day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-four.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN !

Rules referred to.

28. The bunds of all tanks shall be yearly raised, repaired, and cleared by the communal labour of all land-owners benefited by such tanks. The work shall be distributed according to the extent of land under the tank owned by each shareholder, and the share of the work to be done by each shareholder shall be decided by the irrigation headman of the district. Any person failing to attend when labour is called out for the purpose, or failing to contribute his allotted share of the work, shall be guilty of an offence, and liable to the penalties provided for breach of rules.

29. It shall not be lawful to remove any cow dung lying in paddy fields or the beds of the tanks for sale or for any other purpose whatever, except for laying on the floor of houses.

30. No water shall be taken from any tank so long as there is rain water in the fields sufficient for purposes of cultivation.

30. කුඹුරු වැඩකිරීමට උවමණුවූ පමණට වැඩිවතුර කුඹුරු බිම්වල තිබෙනහෙක් වැව්වලින් වතුර නොගතයුතු වේ.
