HEREAS by section 2 of Ordinance No. 2 of 1893, intituled "An Ordinance relating to the sale by retail of Opium and Bhang within Municipalities and Local Board Towns," it is enacted that from and after the date at which the said Ordinance shall come into operation it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation to be for that purpose published in the Government Gazette, to bring any town in which a Municipality or Local Board has been or may be established other than Colombo under the operation of the said Ordinance:

And whereas the said Ordinance came into operation on the 7th day of November, 1893:

And whereas it is expedient to bring the town of Chilaw, in the North-Western Province, under the operation of the said Ordinance:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby bring the town of Chilaw aforesaid under the operation of the said Ordinance as from and after the First day of January, 1895.

No know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the powers in Us vested by the said section of the said Ordinance, do hereby revoke so much of the said Proclamation dated the 10th day of October, 1893, as brings the town of Yatiyantota as therein defined under the operation of the said Ordinance, as from and after the First day of October, 1894.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR has been pleased to direct the publication of the following amended Colonial Regulations:—

- 118. The Act of Parliament 22 Geo. 3, c. 75, empowers the Governor and Council of any Colony to grant leave of absence to Colonial Officers, and the Act 57 and 58 Vict., c. 17, regulates the conditions as to such leave.
- 122. Governors are required to report to the Secretary of State each case in which leave of absence has been granted; they must also transmit a certificate in the form inserted in the appendix (p. 353), and a similar certificate in case the Governor should afterwards recommend an extension of leave. If the officer is paid by fees, they must also report what arrangements are made respecting the disposal of those fees during the officer's absence.
- 365. All salaries and personal allowances and emoluments, and all pensions and superannua, tions, retired or compassionate allowances, paid from funds derived from the revenues of Great Britain, whether provided by special Parliamentary Grant or otherwise, are liable to the Income Tax unless the whole annual income of the recipient so derived is such as to entitle him to claim (1) exemption or (2) abatement under the Income Tax Act in force for the time being. In the latter case the balance of the income derived from the Parliamentary Grant or from other sources arising within or from the United Kingdom, after deducting such sum as may be specified in the Act, will be taxable. It will therefore be the duty of the Governor on all occasions to make the proper deductions accordingly from the amount of the bills which he may have occasion in future to draw on the Paymaster-General, whether on his own account or for the salaries or allowances of other persons; and he will convey an intimation to the same effect to any officers or functionaries within his Government who may be authorized to draw bills on the Paymaster-General for any such payments.
- 366. In cases where total or partial exemption may be claimed from the tax, an affidavit must be made by the claimants and transmitted with the bill, to the effect that his income from sources arising within or from the United Kingdom, including that on account of which the bill is drawn, does not exceed the limits prescribed in the Income Tax Act in force for the time being as entitling him to exemption or abatement.

2. The tenders are to be made upon forms which will be supplied upon application to the office of the above-named jail and the Director-General of Prisons, and no tender will be considered unless it is furnished on the

recognized form.

3. A deposit of Rs. 25 must be made at the Treasury or Kachcheri, and will be required before any form of tender is issued. And should any person fail (within a fortnight after he has been written to or notified to the address given by him of the acceptance of his tender) or decline to enter into the contract and bond after he has tendered, or fail to furnish approved security, such deposit will be forfeited to the Crown. All other deposits will be returned upon signature of a contract.

When required samples must be deposited. Sufficient securities will be required to join in a bond for the

due fulfilment of the contract.

5. The amount of the bond and all other necessary information can be ascertained upon application at the

office specified.
6. The Government reserves to itself the right, without question, of rejecting any or all tenders, and the right of accepting any portion of a tender.

Persons whose tenders are accepted by Government will be required to bear the expenses of having the security bonds prepared for the due performance of their contract, which bonds will be subject to the approval of the Attorney-General, but may be drawn by the tenderer's own lawyers.

8. When bonds have been drawn by the tenderers' own lawyers, the name or stamp of the Proctor who drafted the bond should be affixed to the document.

9. Every alteration should bear the initials of the tenderers, and all tenders containing alterations not bearing the tenderers' initials will be treated as informal

and rejected.

10. Every tenderer should write his address on his tender, giving the name of the street and the number of the house he lives in.

Report on the Working of the Ceylon Public Service Mutual Guarantee Association for the year 1893-1894.

N June 30, 1894, there were on the books of the Association 360 Members, as against 242 on the June 30, 1893, showing an increase of membership of 118.

2. The total amount of contributions received from the Members of the Association during

the year amounted to Rs. 9,212.18.

3. During the year under review the Association was called upon to make good a sum of Rs. 12.77 in respect of one defaulter employed in the Railway Department. This was partly met by the forfeiture of his contribution, which amounted to Rs. 8.33, the net loss to the Association being thus reduced to Rs. 4.44.

The Association has, however, received notice of the probability of its being required to make good a further loss of Rs. 605, in respect of another defaulter, also employed in the same Department.

4. A sum of Rs. 270.83 in the aggregate has been repaid to Associates on withdrawal from the

Association, or on account of over remittance.

5. The accounts of the Association for the period under review are enclosed.
