THE CUSTOMS DUTIES AMENDMENT ORDINANCE, No. 20 of 1898.

#### RULES.

- 9. For the purposes of sale of kerosine oil or petrol under rule 8, the Principal Collector of Customs shall issue licenses to persons desirous of selling kerosine oil or petrol for use in motor vehicles.
- 10. If a licensed vendor is the owner of one or more motor vehicles, he shall keep register showing the daily receipts and issues of kerosine oil or petrol from his store in a form to be prescribed by the Principal Collector of Customs, and such register shall, at all reasonable times, be open to inspection by the Principal Collector of Customs or by any person authorized by the Principal Collector of Customs.

IT is hereby notified that His Excellency the Governor, in exercise of the power vested in him by section 124 (1) of the Municipal Councils' Ordinance, No. 7 of 1887 (as amended by Ordinance No. 8 of 1901), and with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to confirm the following by-laws made by the Municipal Council of Colombo, and to add the same to the by-laws published in the Government Gazette of October 20, 1905.

## By-LAWS REFERRED TO.

- 1. The annual tax prescribed by section 128 of "The Municipal Councils" Ordinance. 1887," shall be paid before February I in each year in respect of all carts and hackeries kept or used within the Municipality and in respect of the animals employed in drawing them, whether these vehicles and animals have or have not been licensed type of the Vehicles Ordinance, 1901."
- 2. On payment of the annual tax the proper officer of the Municipal Council will issue a metal plate marked with the letter "C" and with figures denoting the year for which the license is issued and the corresponding number in the register of vehicles kept by the Municipal Council. The proper officer of the Municipal Council before issuing a plate for a cart or hackery may, if he thinks fit, require the owner to paint in a conspicuous place on the cart or hackery the year and the registered number of the vehicle.
- 3. The owner or person in charge of any cart or hackery in respect of which a license has issued shall keep, in addition to any plate which he is required to exhibit by "The Vehicles Ordinance, 1901." the plate issued under these by-laws affixed in a conspicuous place on the body of the cart or hackery.
- 4. Where the plate prescribed by these by-laws is not duly affixed in accordance with these by-laws to any cart or backery kept or used within the Municipality, the owner and the person in charge of such vehicle shall each be liable to a penalty not exceeding Rs. 10.
- 5. Any Municipal Inspector or Police Officer may detain any cart or hackery kept or used within the Municipality to which the prescribed plate is not duly affixed in accordance with these by-laws, and in such case shall forthwith bring the owner or person in charge of the vehicle before the Municipal or Police Magistrate.

THE regulations set out in the schedule hereto made by the Principal Civil Medical Officer in exercise of the powers vested in him by section 20 (1) of the above-named Ordinance, and approved by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, are hereby, in pursuance of sub-section (2) of section 20 of the said Ordinance, published for general information.

#### SCHEDULE

### REGULATIONS REFERRED TO.

- 1. The license which the Government Agent shall issue to every dairyman engaged in selling milk, or to any laundryman washing for persons resident within the Municipality of Colombo, either directly or indirectly, shall be in the following form (see Appendix Y).
- 2. All dairymen shall keep their cow sheds and premises clean and free from accumulations of dung and urine. The dejects shall be removed daily to a place approved by the Health Officer.
- 3. The floors of all rooms where milk is stored shall be cemented, with rounded corners at their junction with wall. The wall shall be plastered and have rounded corners or be constructed of smooth boards, to be painted or limewashed periodically as directed by the Health Officer.
- 4. The floors of all byres or cow sheds shall have an unbroken surface of cement, with a proper fall sloping to a suitable drain, which shall discharge into a cement pit, which shall be provided with an iron pail or bucket, to be removed and emptied as often as required, but not less than once daily, at a place approved of by the Health Officer.
- 5. The ceilings of milk stores in dairies shall be impervious to dust, and constructed of wood or metal or other material approved of by the Health Officer.
- 6. All dairymen shall see that the cattle are washed as to udders and teats before milking, and the milker is to wash his hands thoroughly with soap and water before milking. Every precaution shall be taken to prevent contamination of milk by urine and fæces of cattle.
- 7. All vessels used for the storage, collecting, and transport of milk shall be of glazed earthenware, or zinc, or block tin, with an opening large enough to admit a hand; all such vessels shall be scalded once daily with boiling water, and rendered scrupulously clean before being re-filled. All vessels containing milk shall be covered with a non-absorbent material so as to prevent the entry of dust, flies, &c.
- 8. All vessels used in the transport of milk from dairy to consumer shall be as above defined (see clause 7 above), and in addition be provided with a seal or lock. In the case of bulk vessels from which small supplies are retailed, such vessels shall be provided with a small stop-cock.
- 9. No laundryman shall store soiled linen in any living room, nor in any place where it may come in contact with clean linen.

By-laws made under Sections 7 and 8 of "The Town Schools Ordinance, 1906," for the Area described in the Schedule A hereto by the Sanitary Board of the District of Ratnapura.

In these by-laws-

The terms "boy," "girl," and "child" mean respectively a boy, or a girl,

or a child residing in the area described in the Schedule A hereto.

The term "parent" includes a guardian and any person who has the actual

custody of a child.

The term "Code" means the Code for Aided Schools for the time being sanctioned by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council.

The term "attendance" means an attendance for the period defined by the Code as constituting a full attendance recorded in an Attendance

Register in the manner prescribed by the Code. The term "local authority" means the Sanitary B means the Sanitary Board of the District of Ratnapura.

school" means a school specified in the Schedule B hereto. The term "

The terms "adequate and suitable provision for the education of a child" and 'reasonable excuse" shall bear the meaning defined in section 8 (1) (b) of "The Town Schools Ordinance. 1906."

The term "Inspector of Schools" means an Inspector of Schools appointed by

His Excellency the Governor.

- The parent of every boy of not less than 6 nor more than 12 years of age, and the parent of every girl of not less than 6 nor more than 12 years of age, or in the case of Muhammedan and Tamil girls the parent of every girl of not less than 6 nor more than 10 years of age, shall cause such boy or girl to attend one of the schools specified in Schedule B, unless he has made other adequate and suitable provision for the education of such boy or girl, or unless there is a reasonable excuse for non-attendance.
- 3. The time during which a boy or girl shall attend school shall be the whole time on each day for which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of the age of such boy or girl.
  - Provided always that nothing in these by-laws—
    - (a) Shall prevent the presence of children being excused during the hours when religious instruction is given, as provided by section 9 (2) (d) of "The Town Schools Ordinance, 1906."
    - (b) Shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which its parent belongs.
- And provided always that when a child between 10 and 12 years of age, being beneficially employed to the satisfaction of the Chairman of the Sanitary Board of the District of Ratnapura, has received a certificate from an Inspector of Schools that it has passed in Reading, Writing, and Arithmetic, the Fourth Standard prescribed by the Code for the time being, it shall not be required to attend school.
- Every parent who shall not observe, or shall neglect or violate, these by-laws or any of them, shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty rupees for each offence, and an additional fine not exceeding ten rupees per day in the case of a continuing offence.

Note.—The fellowing are the portions of the Town Schools Ordinance referred to in sections I and 4 of these by-laws :-

Section 8 (1) (b).—A parent shall be deemed to have made adequate and suitable provision for the education of his child if he proves that his child is in regular attendance at a school registered by the Director of Public Instruction for the

receipt of a grant in aid, or at a school with regard to which an application for a grant in aid is under consideration, or at a school certified by the Director of Public Instruction to provide adequate and suitable instruction; or if he proves that he has made such other provision for his child's education as the Director of Public Instruction shall certify to be adequate and suitable, or if he produces a certificate from the Director of Public Instruction recommending that the child shall be exempted from compulsory attendance. Provided that no parent shall be convicted for not causing his child to attend such school if he proves to the satisfaction of the Magistrate that he has reasonable excuse for not causing such child to attend. A parent shall be deemed to have a reasonable excuse for not causing his child to attend school if he proves that the child is prevented from attending by sickness or other unavoidable cause.

Section 9 (2).—No school in which religious instruction is given shall be named in any by-law made under clause (a) of the last preceding section as a school in which efficient provision is made for a vernacular education, unless the local authority is satisfied—

- (a) That religious instruction is given only during the times specified in the school time table;
- (b) That religious instruction is not given to pupils of other denominations than that to which the school belongs if the parents object;
- (c) That pupils who do not attend religious instruction are employed in other studies during the hours allotted to religious instruction;
- (d) That such pupils, if their parents object to their being present in the room where religious instruction is given, are either allowed to study in some other part of the school premises during the hours when such instruction is given, or their presence in the school during such hours is excused; and
- (e) That a copy of sub-section (2) of this section in the English, Sinhalese, and Tamil languages is conspicuously posted up in the school.

The above by-laws were made by the Sanitary Board of the District of Ratnapura at a meeting held on December 13, 1909.

## SCHEDULE A.

Description of the Area of the Small Town of Balangoda referred to in the foregoing By-laws.

A straight line drawn from the 82½ milepost on the Government cart road to the land known as Kotugodella, from thence a straight line to the old path to Petigala, along this road to the Gama-ela, along the Gama-ela to its junction with the Dorawel-oya, from the Dorawel-oya along the Ranawinna Amara-ela to the road to Agar's land, along the road to Agar's land to its junction with the willage path to Weliharanawa, and along this path to its junction with the Government cart road near the Roman Catholic Church at the 83½ milepost, thence a line 30 yards from the centre of the cart road, and along the road to the iron bridge over the Dorawel-oya, and thence the Dorawel-oya as far as the bathing place known as Kekunagahayatawala, and from thence a straight line to join the afore-mentioned 82½ milepost on the Government cart road.

Description of the Area of the Small Town of Rakwana referred to in the foregoing By-laws.

On the north by the northern boundary of lot R 636½ in preliminary plan 4,428; west, a line drawn from the western boundary of lot 636½ in preliminary plan 4,428 to the northern boundary of lot J 60½ in preliminary plan 2,744, and from thence a line forty yards from the minor road from Rakwana to Bulutota and parallel with it as far as the junction of the southern boundary of lot 482 in preliminary plan 7,808 to the Rakwana-oya; east, a straight line drawn from the eastern boundary of lot R 636½ in preliminary plan 4.428 to the point of junction of the northern boundary of lot 842 in preliminary plan 2,744 with the Rakwana-oya, and thence the oya as far as the junction with it of the line described as the southern boundary.

The KING has been pleased to issue a Warrant under His Majesty's Royal Sign Manual to the following effect :-

EDWARD, R. & I.

EDWARD THE SEVENTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, to all to whom these Presents shall come,

GREETING. '

Whèreas We, by a Warrant under Our Royal Sign Manual, bearing date the Thirteenth day of July, One thousand Nine hundred and Seven, in the seventh year of Our reign, did institute and create a new medal to be entitled the Edward Medal, to be awarded for heroic acts performed by miners and quarrymen and others who endanger their own lives in saving or endeavouring to save the lives of others from perils in mines and quarries within Our Dominions and Territories under Our protection and jurisdiction

And whereas We are desirous of extending the scope of this decoration:

It is ordained that the Edward Medal of the First Class and the Edward Medal of the Second Class shall be awarded to those of Our faithful subjects who in course of industrial employment endanger their own lives in saving or endeavouring to save the lives of others from perils incurred in connection with such industrial employment in these Our Dominions and in Territories under Our protection or jurisdiction, and such awards shall be made only on a recommendation to Us by Our Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department.

Where the said medal is granted otherwise than for acts performed in mines, the medal shall bear Our effigy on the obverse, and on the reverse a suitable design with the words "For Courage."

Given at Our Court at Sandringham, the First day of December, One thousand Nine hundred and Nine, in the Ninth year of Our reign.

(3) One of the following subjects:—Pure Mathematics; Applied Mathematics; Physics; Chemistry;

Botany; Logic.

(4) Any one of the previous subjects not already taken or History.

(5) English Literature and Essay (this subject may be taken at the Intermediate Examination for which the candidate first presents himself, at a subsequent Intermediate Examination for a Pass only; or for the Pass only at the final examination).

Algebra. - The Arithmetic and the Algebra of the Matriculation Examination, and further Algebra, including the theory of Quadratic Equations, the Convergency of Geometric Series, Permutations and Combinations, the Binomial Theorem for Positive Integral Indices, the Graphs of Simple Algebraic Functions, the Theory of Indices, the Nature and Use of Logarithms and of Logarithmic Tables, Interest, and Annuities.

Focal Lengths of Concave Mirrors. Focal Lengths of Convex Lenses.

Arrangement of two Lenses to make simple forms of Telescope, Microscope, and Magic Lantern.

Arrangement of a Slit. Lens. and Prism to get a pure Spectrum.

Tracing the path of a Ray of Light through a block of glass and Deduction of Refractive Index. \*Tracing the lines of force in the neighbourhood of a Magnet.

Mode of making a simple Electro-magnet.

Gold Leaf Electroscope and its use to find the sign of a given charge. Mode of setting up common Volatic Cells. Modes of joining up Cells.

Determination of the signs of the terminals of a Cell.

Use of Simple Galvanometers. Measurement of Resistance.

Simple Experiments on Induced Currents.

Candidates must bring to the practical examination the notebooks containing the record of their laboratory work.

Chemistry (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

The following outline is given for the general guidance of candidates as indicating the range of the Written Part (I.) and Experimental Part (II.) of the Examination in Chemistry:

The methods which lead to the discovery of the composition of common materials occurring in nature

The determination of molecular weights, equivalents, and of atomic weights. Valency and structural formulæ.

Classification of the elements, including the Periodic Scheme.

General characters of the chief types of compounds, including acids, bases, and salts, and a few prominent carbon compounds, especially as illustrating the relations of properties to composition and structure. No distinction will be admitted between Organic and Inorganic Chemistry.

History, production, and properties of the more important and typical elements and their most-

familiar compounds.

The character of chemical changes, including combustion, thermal dissociation, and electrolysis; the conditions which determine and influence them, and the attendant phenomena.

The whole of the above to be treated in an elementary manner.

Candidates will be required to show that they have seen and practised a great variety of experiments, and are familiar with the appearance of common laboratory materials.

## II.—Practical Examination.

Candidates will be required to show that they are familiar with easy quantitative operations, gravimetric and volumetric, with the rudiments of qualitative analysis, and that they have prepared a number of elements or compounds by processes involving the manipulation of gases and the purification of substances by crystallization, distillation, &c. Candidates must bring to the practical examination the notebooks which contain the record of the experimental work they have performed. Specimens made by the candidate, duly attested by the teacher, if any, may be submitted to the examiners.

## Botany (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

Morphology.—The structure and properties of the cell and of the various kinds of tissue; cell formation and the development of the tissues; the Plant body; its structure; development and various modifications.

## Special Morphology, Reproduction, and Taxonomy.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Angiosperms as exemplified by plants belonging to the following natural orders:-

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Gymnosperms as exemplified by Cycas. The morphological and physiological characteristics of Pteridophyta as exemplified by Selaginella Aspidium, Asplenium, or Adiantum.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Bryophyta as exemplified by Polytrichum

(or Funaria) and by Marchantia (or Lunularia).

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Algæ as exemplified by Fucus, Ophiocytium, Coleochæte, and Spirogyra.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Fungi as exemplified by Agaricus, Eurotium, Pythium, Saccharomyces, Bacillus.

## Elementary Physiology.

The chemical nature of the food elements of plants. Their sources, the modes in which they are respectively absorbed by the organism.

The absorption of water-turgescence, transpiration, root-pressure.

Movements of water in plants.

Aeration and respiration.

Outlines of metabolic changes within the plant. Photosynthesis.

Growth.

Irritability, Geotropism, Heliotropism.

## Practical Examination.

The practical work will include the dissection and examination of plants or parts of plants, and the reference to their systematic position of plants or parts of plants comprised in the foregoing syllabus. Simple experiments in Practical Physiology may be set.

Candidates must bring to the practical examination the notebook containing the record of their

laboratory work.

## Logic (Two Papers).

This Syllabus is intended to indicate the general scope and character of the curriculum without being exhaustive of all parts of the subject.

Note.—Candidates who enter for Philosophy at the B.A. Pass Examination must either have taken Logic as one of their alternative subjects at the time of passing the Intermediate Examination in Arts or must take an equivalent paper at the B.A. Examination.

A certain amount of 14th century literature, † e.g., some of the Canterbury Tales or some of Piers Plowman.

Note.—Anglo-Saxon will not be required.

#### ALTERNATIVE SUBJECTS.

One of the following subjects may be taken in place of one of the languages, French or German:—

(a) Advanced Modern English Literature (two papers).

(b) Sanskrit (two papers).

(c) The existing British Constitution as defined in the Syllabus for the Intermediate Examination in Economics, but with special reference to the Government of the Colonies and Dependencies (two papers).

## (c) The Existing British Constitution.

Candidates will be expected to have some acquaintance with the chief events in the developments

of British political institutions since 1832.

The above will be treated with special reference to the Government of Colonies and Dependencies.

### CERTIFICATES IN ENGLISH.

Any person who has obtained the English Certificate at a Matriculation Examination will be admitted to take the English papers at the Intermediate Examination in Arts (Pass) for External Students and a viva voce test, on payment of a fee of £3, and subject to the General Regulations affecting that examination.

A certificate will be issued to each successful candidate stating that he has shown an adequate knowledge of the English language, and of the period of English Literature and of the Texts prescribed for that examination.

## SPECIAL REGULATIONS FOR THE UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIP.

No candidate will be eligible for the Scholarship awarded on the Intermediate Arts Examination

who does not take up the two subjects, Latin and Greek.

Candidates for the University Scholarship will, if they wish to do so, be allowed to take either two higher Classical papers, or two higher Mathematical papers, and their work in these papers will (for the purpose of awarding the Scholarship) be considered instead of their work in either French or German, or the alternative subjects (a), (b), (c). Candidates who take these higher papers will be allowed, for the purpose of passing the Intermediate Examination, to take also the papers on either French or German or one of the alternative subjects (a), (b), (c); but the marks obtained by such candidates in these subjects will not be considered in awarding the Scholarship.

## Mathematics.

3. (1) Analytical Geometry.

(a) Equations in rectangular and polar co-ordinates of (1) the straight line, (2) the circle, (3) the parabola, (4) the ellipse, (5) the hyperbola and the properties of the same; (b) change of axes.

(2) Applied Mathematics.

Statics.—Composition, Resolution, and Equilibrium of Forces; (1) acting at a point; (2) acting in a plane; (3) acting in parallel lines. The properties of the Centre of Gravity; the Laws of Friction; the Mechanical Powers; and the principle of Virtual Work.

Dynamics.—Definition and Measurement of Mass, Force, Velocity, Acceleration, Momentum, Work, and Energy. Composition and Resolution of Velocities and Accelerations.

The laws of Elastic Fluids and the principle of the barometer, thermometer, siphon, diving bell, manometer, and the various pumps.

## SUBJECTS FOR THE INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION IN SCIENCE.

Candidates shall be examined for a pass in any four subjects selected by themselves out of the following seven subjects of examination, viz., (1) Pure Mathematics, (2) Applied Mathematics, (3) Experimental Physics, (4) Chemistry, (5) Botany, (6) Zoology, and (7) Geology (one at least of the four subjects selected from the foregoing list st be taken from amongst the first three).

Questions will be set involving (1) the translation of passages in French or German, and (2) answers with regard to the subject matter thereof.

The questions in French or German, which by the regulations are set for the home candidates,

will be made optional in the examinations as held in the Colonies.

N.B.—Candidates for the University Scholarship will, in addition to the papers prescribed above, be required to take English Literature and Essay, which from the last section of the Intermediate Examination in Arts.

Candidates must bring to the practical examination the notebooks containing the record of their laboratory work.

## Chemistry (Two Papers).

The following outline is given for the general guidance of candidates as indicating the range of the Written Part (I.) and Experimental Part (II.) of the Examination in Chemistry:—

L

The methods which lead to the discovery of the composition of common materials occurring in nature.

The determination of molecular weights, equivalents, and of atomic weights. Valency and structural formulæ.

Classification of the elements including the Periodic Scheme.

General characters of the chief types of compounds, including acids, bases, and salts, and a few prominent carbon compounds, especially as illustrating the relations of properties to composition and structure. No distinction will be admitted between Organic and Inorganic Chemistry.

History, production, and properties of the more important and typical elements and their most

familiar compounds.

The character of chemical changes, including combustion, thermal dissociation, and electrolysis; the conditions which determine and influence them, and the attendant phenomena.

The whole to be treated in an elementary manner.

Candidates will be required to show that they have seen and practised a great variety or experiments, and are familiar with the appearance of common laboratory materials.

## II.—Practical Examination.

Candidates will be required to show that they are familiar with easy quantitative operations, gravimetric and volumetric, with the rudiments of qualitative analysis, and that they have prepared a number of elements or compounds by processes involving the manipulation of gases and the purification of substances by crystallization, distillation, &c. Candidates must bring to the practical examination the notebooks which contain the record of the experimental work they have performed. Specimens made by the candidate, duly attested by the teacher, if any, may also be submitted to the examiners.

## Bolany (Two Papers, and a Practical Examination).

Morphology.—The structure and properties of the cell and of the various kinds of tissues; cell formation and the development of the tissues. The plant body; its structure, development, and various modifications.

## Special Morphology, Reproduction, and Taxonomy.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Angiosperms as exemplified by plants belonging to the following natural orders:—Dilliniaceæ, Malvaceæ, Portulacaceæ, Myrtaceæ, Leguminosæ, Cucurbitaceæ, Compositæ, Convolvulaceæ, Acanthaceæ, Scrophulariaceæ, Euphorbiaceæ, Palmaceæ, or Commelinaceæ, Orchidaceæ, Gramineæ.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Gymnosperms as exemplified by Cycas. The morphological and physiological characteristics of Pteridophyta as exemplified by Selaginella.

Aspidium, Asplenium, or Adiantum.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Bryophyta as exemplified by Polytrichum (or Funaria) and by Marchantia (or Lunularia).

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Algæ as exemplified by Fucus, Ophiocy-

tium, Coleochæte, and Spirogyra.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Fungi as exemplified by Agaricus, Eurotium, Pythium, Saccharomyces, Bacillus.

### Elementary Physiology.

The chemical nature of the food elements of plants. Their sources, the modes in which they are respectively absorbed by the organism.

The absorption of water: turgescence, transpiration, root-pressure.

Movements of water in plants.

Aeration and respiration.

Photosynthesis. Outlines of metabolic changes within the plant.

Growth.

Irritability, Geotropism, Heliotropism.

## Practical Examination.

The practical work will include the dissection and examination of plants or parts of plants, and the reference to their systematic position of plants, or parts of plants comprised in the foregoing syllabus. Simple experiments in Practical Physiology may be set.

Candidates must bring to the practical examination the notebooks containing the record of their

laboratory work.

## Zoology (Two Papers).

1. The fundamental facts and laws of Zoology, as exhibited in the following types:—Amœba, Euglena, Paramecium, Monocystis, Hydra, Obelia, Lumbricus, Distomum, Astacus, Amphioxus, Scyllium, Rana, Lepus.

2. The student will be expected to acquire a practical knowledge of the general organization of each of the types above specified and an elementary knowledge of—

(a) The chief biological laws which the structural phenomena illustrate.

- (b) The structure and properties of the Cell, and the general characters of the Tissues, including Epithelia, Blood, Lymph; Nervous, Muscular, Connective, and Skeletel Tissues; and the microscopic structure of the more important organs of the body.
- (c) The phenomena of the Sexual and Asexual Reproduction, including the general history and characters of the Germ Cells, the chief types of Segmentation of the fertilized Ovum, the Metamorphosis of the Frog, and an elementary knowledge of the Development of the Chick up to the third day of incubation, and the formation of the Feetal Membranes in the Bird and Mammal
- 3. A knowledge of the diagnostic characters of the following groups:—Protozoa: Lobosa, Foraminifera, Radiolaria, Sporozoa, Flagellata, Ciliata; Cœlenterata: Hydrozoa, Anthozoa; Platyhelmia; Turbellaria, Trematoda, Cestoda; Annelida: Oligochæta, Polychæta; Articulata: Crustacea, Insecta, Arachnida; Chordata: Urochorda, Cephalochorda; Craniata: Pisces, Reptilia, Amphibia, Aves, Mammalia.

The candidate must be prepared to examine microscopically, to dissect, and to describe specimens or parts of the animals comprised in paragraphs 1 and 2 in the foregioing Syllabus (with the exception that for the skull of Lepus will be substituted that of Canis), and the determination of the zoological position of specimens in accordance with paragraph 3.

Geology (Two Papers).

(I.) Physical Geology.—The Earth as a Planet. Its larger surface features.

Distribution of Temperature and Pressure in the Earth, and its Density. The Internal Forces and their Effects. Subsidence and Elevation. Volcanoes and Earthquakes.

Characters and Relations of Rock Masses. The nature of Aqueous and Igneous Rocks and their Modes of Occurrence (Strike, Dip, Jointing, Folding, Faulting, Cleavage, Foliation; Interbedding, and Intrusion of Igneous Rocks). Features produced by Denudation (Outcrop Escarpments, Outliers, Inliers, Unconformity Overlap).

(II.) Mineralogy relating to the important rock-forming Minerals.—The common crystal forms and

combinations, with the principles of crystallographic notation.

Minerals, their Physical Properties and Chemical Composition. Silica in its different forms. The chief minerals of the following groups:—Pyroxenes, Amphiboles, Felspars, Micas, Garnets, Zeolites, Chlorites. Also Olivine, Zircon, Beryl, Epidote, Zoisite, Cordierite, Leucite, Nepheline, Sodalite, Nosean, Haüyne, Tourmaline, Andalusite, Fibrolite, Kyanite, Staurolite, Sphene, Serpentine, Talc, Kaelin, Native Elements [Carbon, Sulphur]. Oxides [Iron Oxides, Spinels, Corundum, Rutile]. Rock Salt. Fluor Spar. Apatite. The Rock-forming Carbonates, Sulphides, and Sulphates.

## Practical Examination.

Interpretation of Weather Charts. Physical Maps with contour lines and the method of drawing sections across them.

Drawing sections across some simple Geological Map.

Identification and Description of simple crystal forms and combinations by means of models or from actual specimens. Determination of the important Rock-forming Minerals in hand-specimens, and in thin slices under the microscope.

Candidates must bring to the practical examination the notebooks containing the record of their laboratory work.

## VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended February 5, 1910.

Births.—The total births registered were 100 (3 Europeans, 17 Burghers, 46 Sinhalese, 14 Tamils, 14 Moors, 3 Malays, and 3 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1910, viz., 185,704) was 28:1 as against 25:3 in the preceding week, 22:3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25:1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 120 (1 European, 6 Burghers, 63 Sinhalese, 26 Tamils, 20 Moors, 3 Malays, and 1 Other), including the death of a town resident who died in the Enteric Hospital at Kanatta. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 33.7, as against 37.3 in the previous week, 43.0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 33.7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 120 total deaths, 35 were of infants under one year of age, as against 25 in the preceding week, 27 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of still births registered during the week was 5.

Selected Causes of Death.—Twelve deaths were registered from Phthisis (against 11 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year), of which 2 each were in San Sebastian, St. Paul's, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Slave Island, and 1 each in Pettah, New Bazaar, Maradana hospitals, and Kollupitiya.

- 2. Ten deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* as in the previous week (against 15 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in Kotahena, 3 in St. Paul's, 2 in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and 1 in Kollupitiya. Five deaths were registered from *Bronchitis*.
- 3. Fourteen deaths were registered from Infantile Convulsions, 12 from Dysentery (including 1 infant), 10 Debility (9 infants), 6 Enteritis (4 infants), 5 Diarrhæa (1 infant), 5 Old Age, 4 Tetanus (3 infants), and 32 from Other Causes.
- 4. Five deaths were registered from Enteric Fever (against 6 in the previous week, which was also the weekly average for last year), of which 2 were in Kotahena, and 1 each in Pettah, San Sebastian, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals). There were 10 cases reported during the week, against 14 in the previous week.
- 5. Thirty-eight cases of Chickenpox were reported, against 20 in the previous week; and 12 of Measles, against 13 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 80.6°, against 80.0° in the preceding week and 79.4° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.971 in., against 29.988 in. in the preceding week and 29.980 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.09 in. against n:1 in the preceding week and in the corresponding week of the previous year.
