## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir HENRY EDWARD McCalloum, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

### HENRY MCCALLUM.

HEREAS by "The Municipal Councils' Ordinance, 1887," the Governor is empowered, with the W advice and consent of the Executive Council, by Proclamation in the Government Gazette, to define for the purposes of the said Ordinance the limits of the town of Colombo, and to divide the said town into districts, and such limits or divisions from time to time by Proclamation to alter or vary:

And whereas by a Proclamation bearing date December 21, 1909, and made under the provisions of section 5 of the above-recited Ordinance, the limits of the town of Colombo and the districts into which the said town was divided were respectively defined for the purposes of the said Ordinance, and it is expedient to alter such limits and districts:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in exercise of the powers vested in Us by the said section of the said Ordinance, and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby alter in manner hereinafter appearing the limits of the town of Colombo for the purposes of the said Ordinance and the

districts into which the same is divided. And We do declare and ordain that from and after the date hereof the limits of the said town and the districts into which the same is divided shall be as the same are set out in the schedule hereto.

Given at Maskeliya, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Seventh day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Ten.

#### SCHEDILE.

Limits of the Town of Colombo.

Bounded on the north by sea and the Kelani-ganga; east by the Kelani-ganga, by and including the St. Sebastian canal, the Waragoda-ela, a line going south in prolongation of the eastern boundary of the Base Line road reservation to the centre of the Dematagoda-ela, from thence along the centre of the Dematagoda-ela passing under the bridges on the Kandy railway, Kolonnawa and Kotte roads, and Kelani Valley railway, from thence along the centre of the said railway; on the south by the centre of the Kirillapane canal; and on the west by the sea and harbour.

Limits of Districts or Wards.

- 1. Fort and Galle Face.—Bounded on the north by the harbour; on the east by a water-course, Lotus road, and the lake; on the south by a road leading from Slave Island Railway Station to the sea crossing Kollupitiya road; on the west by the sea.
- 2. Pettah Ward.—On the north by the harbour; on the east by St. John's road and 5th Cross street; on the south by the lake; and on the west by Lotus road and the water-course.
- 3. St. Sebastian Ward.—On the north by Dam street and New Moor street; on east by Kuruwe street, Hulftsdorp street, and Maradana road; on the south by St. Sebastian canal and lake; and on the west by 5th Cross street.
- 4. St. Paul's Ward.—On the north by Jampettah street; on the east by Green street, Barber street, and Kuruwe street; on the south by New Moor street and Dam street; and on the west by St. John's road and the harbour.
- 5. Kotahena Ward.—On the north by the Kelani-ganga; on the east by the Kelani-ganga, by and including the St. Sebastian canal, the Weragoda-ela, and a line going south in prolongation of the eastern boundary of the Base Line road reservation; on the south by the Urugodawatta road, Layard's Broadway, Barber street, Green street, and Jampettah street; and on the west by the harbour and the sea.
- 6. New Bazaar Ward.—On the north by Barber street, Layard's Broadway, and Urugodawatta road; on the south by St. Sebastian canal; and on the west by 1st division Maradana road, Hulftsdorp street, and Kuruwe street.
- 7. Maradana Ward.—On the north by St. Sebastian canal and Urugodawatta road; on the east by the eastern boundary of North and South Base Line from Urugodawatta road to the Dematagoda-ela, and by the Dematagoda-ela; on the south by Kotte road, Ward place, and Union place; and on the west by Darley road for a distance of 135 yards and the lake.
- 8. Slave Island Ward.—On the north by the Parson's road bridge and the lake; on the east by Darley road and Union place; on the south by Turret road; and on the west by Hunupitiya cross road, the lake, the railway bridge, and Bridge street bridge. This division includes within it the lake.
- 9. Kollupitiya Ward.—On the north by a road leading from the sea to the Slave Island Railway Station, the lake, Alston place, Hunupitiya cross.road, Turret road, Ward place, and Kotte road; on the east by the Dematagoda-ela and the centre of the Kelani Valley railway line; on the south by the centre of the Kirillapane canal; the and on the west by the sea.

Note.—Where a road is a common boundary between wards, then it means the centre of the road.

And whereas it is expedient to subdivide the said Chief Headmen's divisions into villages or convenient groups of villages:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in exercise of the powers in Us vested by section 5 of the above-recited Ordinance, and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby subdivide the said Chief Headmen's divisions of the East Giruwa pattu and Magam pattu, in the District of Hambantota, Southern Province, into groups of villages as set forth in the schedule hereto, with effect as from and after the date hereof.

#### Rules

- 1. A register in duplicate of all hana-del owned or used within their jurisdiction, together with the boat used in such fishing, shall be prepared by the Patabendi Arachchies of West Giruwa pattu and submitted for approval to the Village Committee. Copies of these registers shall be deposited with the Village Committee: duplicates shall be kept by the Patabendi Arachchies, and be open to inspection at any time by any person.
- 2. No hana-del shall be used by any one within the fishing bays of West Giruwa pattu, unless it has been registered in a Patabendi Arachchi's register.
- 3. All hana-del so registered shall be cast by turns in the order of the register. Only 3 hana-del shall be cast daily within any fishing bay of West Giruwa pattu, one at sunrise and two between 12 noon and sunset.
- 4. The turn of each owner shall begin at sunrise or at 12 noon and shall terminate on the net being drawn ashore; and if such owner shall not exercise his right by 12 noon or sunset respectively of the day on which his turn becomes due, his turn shall pass to the next owner on the register.
- 5. After the casting of a hana-dela or ma-dela no other net shall be thrown or used in the water between it and the shore.
- 6. All registered ma-del or hana-del nets shall be used only in the registered boat to which they belong.
- 7. All registered ma-del or hana-del boats shall be used for ma-del or hana-del fishing only, and no registered boat or net shall be removed from one village to another for fishing purposes except on the written permission of the Chairman.
- 8. Other nets allowed.—Besides ma-del, nets known as visi-del and nets not exceeding 10 fathoms in length and the same in breadth may be used.
- 9. No person shall catch Koramburuwa and Koralawa fish with nets within the fishing bays of West Giruwa pattu.
- 10. No person shall fish on poya days in West Giruwa pattu.
- 11. Disputes to be settled by Committees.—In case of any dispute the matter shall be referred to the Committee of the subdivision to decide, if the net which has been or is about to be used is of the description the use of which is allowed, and such decision shall be final.
- 12. shall be the duty of the Patabendi Arachchi to see that these rules are strictly enforced.

## BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

- 1. No place shall be used as a bakery without an annual license from the Chairman.
- 2. Every bakery shall be well ventilated and well lighted, and the walls and floor thereof shall be cemented, and drainage sufficiently provided, and the roof ceiled with planks or zinc sheeting fixed to the rafters.
- 3. No bakery shall be within 25 feet of any cesspit, latrine, open drain, or sewer, nor in a position where bad odours wafted therefrom shall reach it.
- 4. No place used as a bakery shall be used for any other purpose whatsoever, or shall have internal communication with any part of a dwelling house, or shall have less than 120 square feet of floor space excluding the space occupied by the oven, or walls less than 10 feet in height.
  - 5. All utensils and other furniture shall be kept clean.
- 6. The flour, water, and other materials used in the manufacture of bread shall be good and wholesome. There shall be a separate store room or receptacle for flour, and no flour shall be left lying on the floor in any part of the bakery.
- 7. All refuse and dirt in and about the premises shall be swept off and removed, and the drains well flushed, and the premises at all times maintained in a clean and tidy condition.
- 8. No person suffering from a contagious or loathsome disease, or who has recently been in attendance on such person, or who is unwashed or otherwise unclean shall be employed in a bakery.
- 9. A bakery includes any building or part of a building used for any process connected with the baking of bread, cakes, and articles of the like nature for sale.
- 10. It shall be lawful for any Local Board Inspector or other person authorized in writing by the Chairman at any time to enter and inspect any bakery, provided there is some one on the premises.

## BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

- I. The Board may order cesspools to be closed and dry-earth closets substituted.—The Chairman when specially empowered thereto by resolution of the Board may by notice in writing require the owner or occupier of any house or building or land having a cesspool on his premises to close such cesspool and substitute a dry-earth closet therefor.
- 2. Permission to bury in private premises.—Permission may be granted in writing by the Chairman to any householder to have night soil from his own premises buried or otherwise disposed of on his own premises.
- 3. Removal of night soil to the depot.—Every person (unless specially exempted in writing thereto by the Chairman under by-law 2) on whose premises the dry-earth system is in operation is hereby required to cause the daily removal of night soil to a depot appointed by the Board for the disposal of the night soil.
- 4. Name of person removing night soil to be registered at the Board Office.—Any householder not having received written permission under by-law 2 may employ any person for the purpose of the removal and disposal of night soil. Provided that in the case of such private arrangements being entered into, the name of such person so employed shall be registered at the office of the Board, and the place to which the night soil shall be removed and the method and time of removal and the disposal thereof shall be submitted to the Board for approval.
- 5. Fee for removal of night soil.—Every person employing a Local Board Officer for the removal of night soil shall pay to the Board in advance such sum as shall be determined by the Chairman, not exceeding Rs. 2 per mensem, for each bucket in which such night soil is deposited on his premises for removal by such officer. The sum payable, if not paid on or before the 10th of the month in respect of which it is due, may be reperted by the Chairman to the Police Court and recovered in the same way as if it were a fine imposed by that court.

#### RULES REFFERED TO.

- 1. No person licensed to carry on the trade of a butcher in the town of Ratnapura shall slaughter cattle or sheep at any place other than the public slaughter-houses for cattle and sheep referred to in the Proclamation dated February 12, 1910.
- 2. The building situated behind the petroleum installation in Hospital road. Ratnapura, is hereby appointed the place in which licensed butchers of Ratnapura shall, as required by section 12, sub-section (1), of the Ordinance No. 9 of 1893, expose to public view all cattle intended for slaughter for a period of not less than twenty-four hours immediately preceding the time of slaughter.
- 3. No animals intended for slaughtering shall be kept or left at the place of exposure for more than forty-eight hours, and no animal shall be placed in or removed from such place of exposure except in the presence of the keeper in charge.
- 4. No animals shall be slaughtered at the said slaughter-houses except between the hours of 7 and 9 A.M. and 4 and 6 P.M., or at such hours as may be determined by the [Local Board, notice of which shall be posted at the slaughter-houses, nor until after they have been inspected and approved by the Medical Officer, Ratnapura, as fit to be slaughtered for human food.
  - 5. Any animal rejected as unfit for slaughter shall be immediately removed.
- 6. The said Medical Officer may prohibit the slaughter of any animal, notwithstanding that it has been approved as aforesaid, if it should before slaughter be found to be diseased or otherwise unfit to be slaughtered for human food.
- 7. If on any animal which has been approved as aforesaid being slaughtered the carcase shall appear diseased or unfit for human food, the said Medical Officer shall cause the meat to be immediately destroyed or so disposed of as to prevent it being exposed for sale or used for human food.
- 8. No cattle or sheep shall be slaughtered except in the presence of the officer duly appointed by the Chairman.
- 9. The officer so appointed shall not permit the slaughter of any cattle or sheep which have not been approved as aforesaid as fit to be slaughtered for human food, or the slaughter of which the said Medical Officer has prohibited as provided by rule 6.
- 10. No person shall remove from the slaughter-house, except under the directions of the said Medical Officer, any meat which the latter has declared to be unfit for human food.
- 11. No cattle shall be exposed or slaughtered for which a cattle voucher containing a correct description of the animal is not produced, except by special permission of the Chairman
- 12. In the case of sheep or goats a written permit to slaughter signed by the Medical Officer shall be produced with each animal brought for slaughter.
- 13. It shall not be lawful for any person to sell or expose for sale within the limits of the Local Board the flesh of any cattle, sheep, goats, or pigs slaughtered outside the limits of the Local Board without the same having been previously inspected and passed as fit for human food by the Medical Officer.
  - 14. No meat shall be conveyed from the slaughter-house except in a covered cart.
- 15. The following fees shall be recoverable by the Board for the use of the slaughter-house and the exposing shed:—

## Entrance Examination for 1911 and 1912.

## ENGLISH CLASS (MEN AND WOMEN).

N Entrance Examination for admission to the English classes will be held at the Training College on November 1, 2, and 3, 1910, commencing at 10.30 A.M. In order to gain admission to these examinations, intending candidates must apply to the Principal of the Training College during the month of September for an admission form. These forms must be returned on or before October 15. will then be informed whether they have been selected to appear at the examination.

The students of this class will be trained for teacherships in grant-in-aid and Government schools. Ten studentships worth Rs. 300 per annum tenable for two years are offered for competition. Successful students will receive Rs. 25 per mensem each as long as their conduct, attendance, and progress be satisfactory.

Besides the ten students who receive the above allowances, eight additional students will, if eligible candidates present themselves, be appointed, who will receive no allowance, but will be allowed to take up the first-year course free of charge, at the end of which they will receive a third class certificate, if their record during the year and their performance at the first-year examination be satisfactory.

Students in training must devote the whole of their time to College work. Board and residence will be provided on payment of the prescribed charge during the time the College is in session. Those for whom residence is not available must live within a convenient distance of the College, and must be able to satisfy the Principal that their places of residence afford proper facilities for study and conditions for the maintenance of general good health. Each selected candidate will be examined by the College Medical Officer, whose report must state that the candidate is physically fit to take up the work of a teacher.

The Entrance Examination will consist of two parts :-

I.—Compulsory subjects:-

(1) English Language: Grammar and Idiom.

English Composition. (2)

(3) Reading aloud an unprepared passage from a work of a standard English author.

(4) Arithmetic.

(5) History and Geography, general knowledge of English History, and general Geography of the World.

## II.—Optional Subjects.

Mathematics: Algebra to Quadratic Equations. Geometry: the subject-matter of Euclid's Books I. to III. (experimentally and theoretically).

Languages: A.-Latin: Translation, Grammar, and Composition.

-Sinhalese: Ummagga Jataka and Guttila. Grammar. -Tamil: Panchatantra, Nayadatam (verse), and Ilakkanachchurukkam. C.-Composition.

N.B.—Only one of A, B, or C can be taken.

## SINHALESE CLASS (MEN).

The students in this Department will be trained for masterships in Government Sinhalese schools. Fifteen studentships will be open for competition to selected monitors in Government schools who pass their third-year examination at either of the two examinations immediately preceding the date of the Entrance

The period of training will extend over two years, and at the end of this period those who pass the Final Examination will receive certificates of the second or third class in accordance with the record of their work in the College and their performance at the Final Examination.

Certificates of the first class will be issued only to trained teachers in the service of the Department who hold second class certificates after an uninterrupted service of ten years as head teacher in a school of the class corresponding to the certificate, provided that their conduct and efficiency be approved by the Director. The period of training will extend over two years, and at the end of that period those who pass the Final Examination will receive certificates of the second or third class, in accordance with the record of their work

during their course and their performance at the Final Examination.

Certificates of the first class will be issued only to trained teachers in the service of the Department who hold second class certificates after an uninterrupted service of ten years as head teacher in a school of the class corresponding to the certificate, provided that their conduct and efficiency be approved by the Director. When serving as head teacher they will be paid according to the scale of salaries assigned to third and second class masters in vernacular schools in clause 8 of the Departmental Code, viz., third class certificated teachers, Rs. 240; second class certificated teachers, from Rs. 240 to 420; first class certificated teachers, from Rs. 432 to Rs. 600. The increments will depend on the success of the teachers in maintaining an efficient and well-attended school. All certificated head teachers will be entitled to result payments according to the scale set forth in clause 9 of the Departmental Code, and to pensions in accordance with clause 11.

## VITAL · STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended March 5, 1910.

Births.—The total births registered were 110 (2 Europeans; 6 Burghers, 71 Sinhalese, 15 Tamils, 12 Moors, 3 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1910, viz., 185,704) was 30.9, as against 30.0, in the preceding week, 30.3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 111 (2 Europeans, 9 Burghers, 53 Sinhalese, 26 Tamils, 19 Moors, 2 Malays, and 0 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 31·2, as against 31·7 in the previous week, 31·8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 33·7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 111 total deaths, 36 were of infants under one year of age, as against 28 in the preceding week, 23 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of still births registered during the week was 1.

Selected Causes of Death.—Thirteen deaths were registered from Pneumonia (against 14 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in Kotahena, 2 each in Maradana hospitals and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and 1 each in Pettah, San Sebastian, St. Paul's, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya. Three deaths were registered from Bronchitis.

- 2. Ten deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 13 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 in New Bazaar, and 1 each in Pettah, St. Paul's, Kotahena, Maradana hospitals, and Kollupitiya.
- 3. Twelve deaths were registered from Debility (including 9 infants), 10 from Enteritis (2 infants), 10 Infantile Convulsions, 8 Old Age, 6 Tetanus (5 infants), 4 Diarrhoea (2 infants), 3 Dysentery, 3 Worms, 3 Nephritis, and 23 from Other Causes.
- 4. Three deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 7 in the previous week and 6 the weekly average for last year), 2 in Maradana hospitals and 1 in Kotahena. 13 cases were reported during the week, against 14 in the previous week.
- 5. Three cases of *Measles* were reported, against 5 in the **previous week**; and 57 of *Chickenpox*, against 48 in the **previous** week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79.3°, against 80.4° in the preceding week and 81.7° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.936 in., against 29.942 in. in the preceding week and 29.925 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was nil. against 0.65 in. in the preceding week and 0.50 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
